Board Votes To Accept Gym & Resignation Of Frank Sparling, Maintenance Supervisor

The McLean Independent School District Board of Education met for a regular meeting at 7:00 p.m. on April 19, 1999. Board members present were Bob Glass, Neal Odom, Mike Darsey, Eugene Galley, and T.D. Simmons. John Holland and Don Dorsey were absent from the meeting. Others present were John Griffin, Superintendent, Leslie Darsey, Secretary, Ed Bailey, High School Principal, Dick Crockett, Elementary Principal, Margaret Milam, Food Service Director, Terri Adams, Toni Bohlar, Jenny Everett, Alicia Reynolds, Cynthia Hauck,

Cledon Billington and Keith from CIB, Billie Ward, Frank Sparling, Jessi, Becky and Jay Dee Fish, Valerie Joiner, Vickie Floyd, Jeffery Lee, Julia Lee, Donna Rounton, Katrina Rounton, Tami Marsh, Sue Marsh, Kendall Newton, Quenton and Paula Newton.

All votes were unanimous unless otherwise stated.

The meeting was called to order at 7:08 p.m. by President, Neal Odom. Opening prayer was led by Mike Darsey. Minutes of the last meeting of March 15 were approved.

Visitor comments came

from Elementary teacher, Cynthia Hauck, as Mr. Crockett wanted the Jr. High students to be recognized for their accomplishments in an essay writing contest. Mrs. Hauck submitted the essays and 11 students were chosen in the finals. The Board commended the students on an outstanding job. Other comments were from Terri Adams to inform everyone of the PTA School Board Forum to be held April 26th.

The Agreement was approved between John W. Griffin, representing McLean ISD, and Cledon Billington of CIB, stating the final cost of the new

gym construction would be \$578,226.00, (original bid) including change orders. CIB is to be responsible for any further cost incurred for reworking bleachers or handicapped showers.

Motion was made by Eugene Galley, second by T.D. Simmons to accept the new gym and agree to the final payment of \$52,369.14, to be issued to CIB and their subcontractors. This acceptance was under the understanding that CIB would provide a certificate of completion, state of limitations required from Builders Risk insurance in regards

to the gym floor, and clarifying the contract from CIB to extend the warranty on the concrete floor for 3 years from date of completion.

The Board went into Executive Session with motion by Mike Darsey, second by Eugene Galley, at 7:50 p.m. Recess of Executive Session came at 8:00 p.m. at which time Frank Sparling being on the agenda wanted to be heard in open session. Mr. Sparling asked for his verbal, written contract agreement to be paid off through August 1999, including 23 sick days and 2 weeks vacation pay, and to be dismissed as Maintenance Foreman for McLean ISD.

Executive Session was reconvened at 8:07 p.m. with motion by Mike Darsey, second by Eugene Galley for Board discussion as to Mr. Sparling's request.

Return to open session came at 8:25 p.m. for voting purposes. Board President, Neal Odom, stated that the Board would like to reiterate that the decision not to rehire Mr. Sparling was truly a reduction in force, contrary to his beliefs. It was the consensus of the Board that Mr. Sparling was a very important factor and

valued his efforts put forth in the construction of the new gym, and they were sorry that Mr. Sparling thought the reason of termination was in any way related to the gym construction; which in fact the gym project could not have been done without all of Mr. Sparling's contribution and input. However, Mr. Sparling stated, "I feel like I'm getting the shaft." Mr. Sparling also commented he felt that the dismissal was stemmed from a personal vendetta between himself and Mr. John Griffin, the superintendent. Mr. Sparling has recently bought a building to open a business in McLean and he stated, "I've already spent over \$5,000.00 on a building, even if I wanted to stay, I have to leave, I couldn't work with John Griffin now." The Board felt that it would be in McLean ISD's best financial interest to take the course of action they did, concerning all reductions in force.

Motion by T. D. Simmons, second by Bob Glass, due to Frank Sparling's contribution to offer him a severance package equal to his salary through June 30, 1999, and accept his resignation as Maintenance Foreman. Jessi Fish proposed

that the High School cheerleading squad be increased to 8 cheerleaders, and 1 mascot. Ms. Fish gave a very impressive proposal, upon which former cheerleading sponsor, Alicia Reynolds commented, also giving some of the reasons why she did not agree to the increase of more cheerleaders, due to the financial burden and lack of time each girl would need to spend. The Board agreed to increase the number of cheerleaders to 8, and 1 mascot, for a trial period this year, in which the girls would be allowed to enter competition in advanced cheerleader stunts. The proposal stated that the cheerleaders would be solely responsible for all of their own funding related to purchase of suits, camps, fees; and would not request any funding from the School Board. They would be responsible for raising all their money needed by holding various fund raisers, and hoped a cheerleading scholarship could possibly be awarded in the future as a result of entering the advanced competitions. Motion to accept this proposal and increase was made by Bob Glass, second by Eugene Galley; with T.D. Simmons

abstaining, 3 voting for, Bob Glass, Eugene Galley, and Neal Odom; 1 voting against, Mike Darsey.

Mr. Eugene Galley left the meeting before the following votes.

WTRCA was accepted as health care provider for McLean ISD. T.D. Simmons abstained, with 3 voting for Mike Darsey, Bob Glass, and Neal Odom.

Payment was approved to WTRCA for advance premium requested, T.D. Simmons abstained, with 3 voting for Bob Glass, Mike Darsey, and Neal Odom.

A budget amendment was approved in the amount of \$21,503.00, to pay WTRCA's advance premium. T. D. Simmons abstained, with 3 voting for Mike Darsey, Bob Glass, and Neal Odom.

Adoption fees for use of the Video Conference room was tabled until the next board meeting.

Year-to-date attendance was reviewed for 1998-99, with McLean ISD averaging 95.8% through the 5th Six Weeks. School Board Training workshop to be held in Canyon on May 12th, was discussed, with special sessions being offered to newly elected board members.

Motion by T.D. Simmons, second by Mike Darsey to approve 6 hrs. of certified training received by Mr. John Griffin, as investment officer for McLean ISD.

Adoption of cafeteria rules pertaining to past due accounts was tabled until the next board meeting.

Motion by T.D. Simmons, second by Mike Darsey, to accept Larry Swanson's bid for steps and a sidewalk at the new gym. Swanson's bid of \$5700.00, for Part I of this construction phase, was the only bid submitted, as other contractors said the job was too small to consider.

Board Policy Update 60, as recommended by Mr. Griffin was adopted.

May 4th, 6:00 p.m. was set as the date to canvass results of the May 1st School Board election.

District Improvement Plan compliance was tabled until the next board meeting.

Financial Reports A,B, & C. were approved and approval was granted to pay March bills as presented.

No other business was discussed at this time.

Motion came to adjourn at 10:04 p.m.

Weekly Bible Question
Sponsored By The McLean Church Of Christ

Q. Why Miracles (wonders, signs, gifts of the Spirit?) (Part 3-What is the purpose of gifts? Are they necessary today?)

Hebrews 2:3,4 says that God confirmed His word by using "...signs and wonders and by various miracles and by gifts of the Holy Spirit..." Paul said that his preaching was confirmed by the demonstration of the Spirit and power, 1 Corinthians 2:4,5. Two other passages which show God's intent for gifts are found in Romans 15:18,19 and 1 Thessalonians 1:5. In addition to the human good that gifts accomplished, their primary purpose was to prove the Word of God. Romans 15:18,19 states that Paul's preaching combined with "power and signs" led to obedience in the Gentiles.

We must remember that simply manifesting some kind of "power or sign" does mean that its origin is from God. 2 Corinthians 11:13,15 warns that Satan and his angels disguise themselves as angels of light. 2 Thessalonians 2:9-11 warns of the false signs and powers that Satan uses to deceive people. In fact, there are many well-documented cases of pagan tribal groups walking on fire, using levitation, engaging in visions and ecstatic utterings. We would certainly not attribute these powers to the work of the Holy Spirit.

We must also realize that at the time that the Apostles and the early church were manifesting gifts of the Spirit, the written Word of God was not totally transcribed for everyone to use. Therefore, the miracles confirmed the preaching of the Apostles and the gifted. But, today we have the written word, the Bible, and the need for miracles to prove that God's Word is true is past.

John 20:30,31 clearly says that the Bible is written to produce belief in Jesus and that believing you have life in His name. 2 Timothy 3:16,17 says that the Scriptures are "God-breathed" and sufficient to bring us to Christian maturity. James writes that God's Word has the power to save, James 1:21. Peter says that one is born again by the Word of God and that this Word abides forever, 1 Peter 1:22-25.

However, the miracles were to cease or be done away when "the perfect" came, 1 Corinthians 13:8-10. These tongues, prophesies, and knowledge are called partial things. When the complete "knowledge, tongue and prophesy" came the partial things were to be done away. The complete prophesy, knowledge and tongue is the Bible. "The perfect" in this text does not mean "Jesus" or "heaven." In he Greek, it is a neuter word and must refer to something that is "a thing." Both "Jesus" and "heaven" in the Greek are masculine gender. In addition, the context of the writing can leave no other conclusion. The "perfect thing" has come... the Bible, the Word of God. Therefore, the purpose of miracles to attest to the validity of God's message has passed. The Bible stands on its own merit and satisfies the longings of the heart to produce belief in Jesus.

To summarize the past three articles: (1) In the first century, the Apostles worked miracles and passed on that ability by the laying on of hands. (2) The Holy Spirit directly distributed gifts in two instances, on the Apostles and the household of Cornelius. He used the Apostles to distribute gifts. (3) Since the Apostles had died, they can no longer bestow gifts on people. (4) The miracles, wonders, signs and gifts were to produce belief and to affirm the validity of God's message. (5) Since the Bible satisfies God's intent to produce belief in His Son, the necessity for the use of miraculous gifts has passed.

Refit scheduled to begin as school year ends...

Basketball Coach Hired

Groom School Board met last week in regular session. Present were Dennis Babcock, Tony Treadwell, Tim Case, Tony Britten, Barry Fields, Brad Rogers and Clif Britten, all members of the board; Donnie Carroll, principal; John Wilson, superintendent; Joyce Hutsell, business manager; and visitors Curtis Downs, Annetta Childress and Kelvin Ollinger.

The board approved the plans for Senior Day 1999. The Class will visit Amarillo on May 7.

Chris Summerall was hired by the board as a teacher/coach at step 3 plus housing, a \$3000 coaching increment and a \$1500 stipend for a head coaching position. The 1999 step 3 salary is \$22,960; however, Summerall is hired on the year 2000 schedule which is still in Legislature.

Summerall attended Hardin Simmons University. He was an assistant coach at Howard Payne University and has been the girls basketball coach at Electra for two years. Summerall is married but has no

children. Superintendent Wilson stated that Summerall will most likely be coaching girls high school and junior high basketball and teaching social studies. Assignments, however, may change by the time the fall schedule is made out.

Groom School Board approved a \$298,700 retrofit bid from Fostech Construction of Throckmorton. The energy conservation project is part of the Lone Star Program, which will do away with the old boiler system, redo the air conditioning, and update the lighting. The system is to be paid for by the savings the facility will observe in energy costs.

Superintendent Wilson stated, "We expect to see \$24,000 - \$30,000 in savings per year. If we do not see that kind of savings we can reschedule the payments."

About \$98,700 of the total cost is expected to be used to update the school's electrical system. This figure is not part of the Lone Star Program and will not be included in the re-payment from

the energy savings plan.

"We are currently looking for alternative ways to pay for the required electrical work to meet current code and safety requirements. We do, however, have the funds in our designated reserves to pay for the work," commented Wilson.

Work is scheduled to begin on May 26th with final inspection on August 6th.

Health Insurance for school employees was discussed. No action was taken.

Property and Casualty Insurance was discussed and will be up for bids on May 6th.

Mr. Wilson presented the board the "Successful School Award," which was earned by the school system.

He also reminded the trustees that board training would be held on May 3rd.

A tentative calendar was approved for the 1999-2000 school year, with school beginning on August 12 and ending May 26th.

Others competing and placing in the meet were as follows:

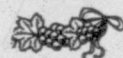

The Council approved a motion to allow Camp Fire Inc the use of the Community Center for a summer youth program, 5 days a week, from May 24 through August 20, from 7:00 am to 6:00 pm at no cost to them provided the building meets their inspection. On Tuesday and Friday each week, Camp Fire summer youth program will schedule some activity away from the Community Center from 10:30 am until 1:30 pm so they will not interfere

with Senior Citizens.

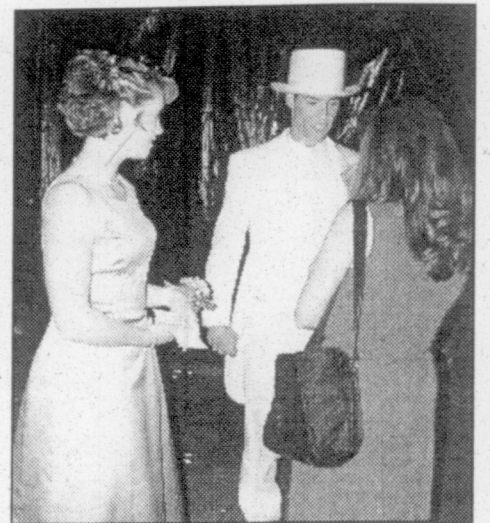

David Patterson Named Professor Emeritus At West Texas AMU

David N. Patterson, retired associate professor of mathematics at West Texas A&M University, joined an elite group of educators when he was named professor emeritus at a recent meeting of The Texas A&M University System board of regents.

Patterson, who is credited with pioneering the use of computers in teaching at WT, spent 30 years at the university, from 1965-1995.

"We are delighted to add David Patterson to our distinguished list of professors emeriti," said WT president Russell Long. "His many contributions to the university have been far-reaching."

The university initiated the professors emeriti program in 1992. Patterson is the 47th faculty member upon whom the title has been conferred.

The prime criterion for awarding the title is "a significant contribution through long and distinguished service to the university in administration, teaching, research and professional service."

Patterson, who received the University Teaching Excellence Award of 1982-83, served as acting

head of the Department of Mathematics and Physics in 1983-84. He received the President's Teaching Fellow Award for 1992-93.

Additionally, Patterson conducted workshops supported by Eisenhower Grants from 1991-93; served on the Arts and Sciences Advisory Committee, the University Committee on Instructional Computing and the Arts and Sciences Promotion and Tenure Committee.

Patterson is a 1953 graduate of Groom High School. He received a degree from West Texas in 1961 with BS in Math Degree from OU Master of Science in Math in 1965; and attended A&M for additional courses. He did graduate work at Oklahoma State University and Colby College in Waterville, Maine.

He married Jackie Estlack at Clarendon in 1956, has a daughter Marcy Cropper of Ft. Worth and a grandson. He is the son of the late John and Clara Patterson.
