A. "Doctrine" simply means "teachings or the things which are taught." One might rephrase the question to: "Does it matter what we teach?" The logical extension of the question is: the question to: Does it matter what we learn? The logical extension of the question is:
"Does it matter what we believe?" After all, what we are taught is what we tend to believe.
Jesus condemned the scribes and the Pharisees for their hypocrisy. He said, "Rightly did. Isaiah prophesy of you hypocrites, as it is written, 'this people honors Me with their lips, but their heart is far away from Me. 'but in vain do they worship Me, teaching as doctrines the precepts of men," Mark 7 6,7. Their hypocrisy involved adding their own doctrine to God's doctrine and then binding it on the people. Note that Jesus says that they were putting their own teachings on the level with God's teachings. Their teachings were man-made. Jesus further insists that they had the appearance of pure religion (this people honors me with their lips) but their attitudes (hearts) were in conflict with God's teachings. As a result, their worship was useless (in vain do they worship Me). So, according to Jesus, what we teach is vitally important!!





Medicaid Now Available To Teens

As of July 1998, more Texas teenagers can qualify for Medicaid for their health care.

Medicaid changed the family income limits for teens. Teenagers who are under 19 years old may now qualify for Medicaid even if they did not qualify before.

who are Texas has children uninsured, expanded Medicaid for older teens 15 through 18 years old whose family income is less than 100% of the federal poverty limits (based on family size; about \$16,700 for a

> family of four). Teens younger that 15 (and born after September 30, 1983) are currently eligible at this family income level. Families still meet other

Please help teenagers take advantage of this opportunity to get health coverage. Medicaid, teens can receive medical check-ups, dental checkups, and any necessary medical and dental treatment. Benefits include office visits, hospital care, medical equipment and es, prescription and many other ally necessary supplies. drugs, and man, medically necessary medically necessary medicaid does not provide any cash benefits.


