The City Council of McLean met in regular session Monday, October 16, 2000, in the City Hall. The meeting was called to order by Mayor and opened with Joe invocation by Billingsley at 6:00 p.m. with the following members present: Creed Lamb, Doyle Lee, Joe Billingsley, Jim McDonald, Bob Martin and Charles McClendon.

Others present were Toni Bohlar, Allen Mixon and Lavon Watson.

The minutes of the September meeting were approved.

All motions were unanimously approved unless otherwise stated. Lavon Watson came



This money was used for capital improvements. \$368,000 paid for the renovation to the to renovation the electrical system needed to complete the "Lone Star" Program that reduced energy consumption by replacing the outdated boiler system.

The other \$203,845.01 was spent for the renovation and furnishing of the new science lab, the video conference lab and the teachers

In other business the board was in executive session for approximately 1 hour to discuss 1 hour to d personnel concerns. action was taken by the board.

Principal Noack reported on several items of interest. He updated the board on discipline action and upcoming school events. After the report on the Gifted and Talented Program plan, the board unanimously approved it.

The council went into executive session to discuss the position of City Fire Marshall at 7:45. The Council reconvened into Open Session at 8:02 p.m. action was taken on the


