

Income Guidelines Set

The Groom Independent to determine eligibility. School District will again participate in the U.S. Department of Agriculture programs dealing with child nutrition services. Assistance for providing meals to families will be carried out, as in the past, through the busiress office of the school.

According to Joyce Hutsell, Business Manager of the school district families should check their income against the chart published elsewhere in this issue of The Groom News

The District policy requires that payment for student meals be made in advance. The policy allows for a three day grace period in which meals may be charged while the family makes arrangements to pay.

Lunch prices for Groom ISD students in grades 7 through 12 will be \$1.50 and for students in Kindergarten through 6th grade the meal price will be \$1.40. Breakfast will be 75¢ a student.





Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor, Mayor and City Commissioners:

For almost 20 years I have received nothing less than excellent services as a taxpayer and subscriber to Groom City services provided me. Therefore, I will not let one unfortunate incident which occurred on 3 July 1996 undermine these good feelings of trust and cooperation that stand out in my mind.

However, it is apparent to me that the on-call policy and related customer services should be reviewed and given some serious discussion. As a result of the incident mentioned above, I simply would like to ask 4 questions of the Mayor and Board Members:

1) If there indeed exists an on-call policy or 24 Hour Emergency Service, then is it not reasonable to assume that an emergency existing at 2:05 P.M. on a normal work day could be handled in a timely manner?

2) If a taxpayer/subscriber has to resort to hiring an independent operator and machine to open a city main sewer line, should not that in dividual expect reimbursement for all reasonable expenses?

3) If that taxpayer/subscriber is forced to evacuate the premises and seek accommodations elsewhere would the city reimburse that taxpayer/subscriber all reasonable expenses?

4) Lastly, but most

important, and again I'm not trying to be antagonistic about this whole matter, but just put yourselves for a moment in my situation. How many of you would have let this situation be treated in the manner with which my situation was treated.

I am reminded by my lovely spouse that the doctor told me to avoid these types of conflicts, therefore I hope this letter will be read during the open portion of the next meeting. I would welcome any and all one-on-one discussions concerning any part of this communication.

Minimizing Risks To Our Armed Forces

Capitol Comment by U.S.
Senator Kay Bailey
Hutchison:

As this is written the Senate is debating the authorization of military spending for 1997. Listening to the debate, I remain deeply concerned that continuing cuts in defense spending will leave us with a military that lacks the manpower and equipment to defend the United States and its vital interests. This would be disastrous, not only for the United States but for the peace and stability of the world as well.

What we are talking about is making sure we have a long term strategy: that we have the technology; that we have the airlift and sealift capability for taking that last step of putting our troops on the ground. We are talking about training and arming our troops who must capture and hold that ground, while at the same time making sure we have all the strategic and technological advances which would keep them from having to go in the first

But if we must send our forces, we want them to

have all the protections we can give them. So we need the technology, we need the equipment, we need the personnel and we need the

Congress and the executive branch are having a major conflict on just what we need in terms of military capability. Congress is trying to get adequate military spending so that we will be able to win two major regional conflicts simultaneously and with the fewest possible casualties, that is what readiness is.

That is why Congress wants to spend \$10 billion more than the executive branch wants so spend to ensure that when our troops are in the field, they are trained and equipped - and to make sure our shores are protected from any kind of incoming ballistic missile, which we know 32 countries in the world have the capability to produce and some day soon send to our shores. We even have terrorist groups that are not countries with that capability.

We do not know where the threats will come from in the future, but recent history gives us an idea of the magnitude of the challenge. While we have U.S. forces currently deployed in operations other

than war in Haiti, northern Iraq, the Sinai and Bosnia, we could conceivably find ourselves facing the threat of an all-out North Korean invasion, or renewed aggression by Saddam Hussein.


We face increased risks when we dissipate our military strength through involvement in operations that do not represent clearcut threats to our national security.

Depending on our slimmed-down forces to meet the very real threats that could become conflicts is an extraordinary expectation, but our men and women in uniform can meet them - if we provide the support they need.

The success of Operation Desert Storm proved the unparalleled capabilities of our military. Even after the post-Cold War drawdown, our armed forces remain the best trained, best led and most formidable fighting forces in the world.

Our responsibility in Congress is to minimize the risks they face. I am personally committed to that goal. As we pursue that elusive peace dividend, we must not do so at the expense of our military capability. We have always won peace through strength and it will always be so.

Off Season **Scholarships** Reward Students

success in securing for college scholarships during the "off-season" of scholarship applications. A recent survey of college applicants found that the rush for scholarship applications comes at the start of the school semesters in September and again in Yet many January. scholarships have rotating or multiple award dates, scholarships to awarding applicants 2, 3 or more times per year.

Timing can help in receiving these scholarships. many of these scholarships are awarded on a first come first served basis, students are finding that their success increases when there is less competition. Since many students wait until fall and winter months at the start of each semester to apply, there is more competition at those times. According to the National Commission on Student billions of dollars of scholarships available to students each year yet many students are just not aware of them. Currently, there are over 375,000 scholarship and grant sources available which do not have to be paid back. More than 80% of these scholarships do not depend on family need or exceptional grades but are awarded based on factors such as the student's interests, hobbies, academic focus, age, heritage or parent's work or military service.

Now, through the resources of the National Academic Funding Administration (NAFA), an updated publication for 1996 is available which provides important information that will help all students seeking financial assistance.

FERC Clears Way For Hearings On Merger

Federal Energy Regulatory Commission recently announced a date of January 31, 1997, for an initial decision on the proposed merger of SPS and Public Service Company of Colorado to create New Century Energies.

Based on that January date, the companies expect a final decision by the commission and completion of the merger by the spring of 1997. However, the settlement with all parties before the issue goes to hearing could result in an earlier completion.

"We are pleased to be moving forward," said

Chairman and CEO Bill Helton. "We had been working toward a completion as early as this fall, but we understand the degree of change in the utility industry with which the FERC is having to deal. Still, it is important to proceed as quickly as reasonable, because there are merger cost-savings and other benefits for our customers that cannot begin until the merger complete."

"We continue to make good progress seeking required approvals from various other regulatory

The Methodist, Baptist and Catholics took advantage of the offer and each put up free buildings on free land. Mr. Wilkerson opened the first stores in Groom. He bought a drug store and general merchandise store that had failed in Amarillo. He moved the stock to Groom. Lum Slay come over from Claude and managed the general store that he bought in 1903. 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

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
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

Ranch Offers Legends

By Delbert Trew In 1950, my father and T.L. Griffin purchased the Rana Ranch just north of Endee, New Mexico. Each time I traveled there to work, it was like stepping back 25 to 50 years in time. The way of life, the matter of work, and the neighbors, all seemed to belong to an earlier time. I became fascinated with the history of the area, and enquired of everyone to tell me the old

time stories of the ranch. The history was fresh, as the area was homesteaded in 1908. Drought and depression drove most of the original settlers away in 1916 and 1918. Jules Bivins, of Amarillo fame, began to buy up the small 160 acre blocks of land, and eventually acquired 100 sections in one block. Through the years, the land sold several times, with Trew and Griffin buying 60 sections on the head of Rana Creek, along the west side. The Canadian River was the north boundary, and the school community of Porter the south boundary.

Some of my favorite stories include the following: A young couple who taught school in Clovis, New Mexico, bought one of the early homesteads in 1908. They built a small two room frame house on the property to live in each summer. When school turned out in the spring, they traveled to the site by

wagon and worked throughout the summer. When school started each fall, they packed up and moved back to Clovis. As soon as the couple left, a neighbor jacked up the house, placed in on long poles, and dragged it to his place to help house his rather large family. Each spring the couple had to get the sheriff to make the man drag the house back to their farm. This process went on for years and years.

In the Bull pasture, near a small dirt dam, I found 5 white rocks, carefully placed in the shape of a body. This was where Boss Jackson, an unliked man of the Porter area, was found murdered. No clues were ever found as to his killer. A death bed confession, 30 years later, revealed the killer had been let out of the Santa Fe prison, furnished with a relay of horses, allowing him to ride to Rana Creek, kill Jackson, and return to the prison without many people knowing. He was released early from his sentence.

I discovered a remote grave site while feeding cattle, and returned to build a fence to protect the site. I could find no one who recalled the burial, and most thought it must have been an earlier site before the homesteading era.

As my feeble mind recalls the stories I heard about the area, I'll pass them on to you.

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
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
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
