

## Correspondent keeps community informed through years of change

of 86-year-old Ellen Bayless. From her hilltop home nestled off Highway 214, she has managed to keep the community informed and has also managed to maintain record books of it all.

Ellen has been the correspondent for the Muleshoe Journal for almost 28 years. Ellen considers herself a historian too and her shelves are lined with scrapbooks containing most anything and everything that has to do with the Enochs community - from news clippings and weather reports, to family reunions, new articles and obituaries.

Ellen's collection of scrapbooks serve as a record of the history she has been able to collect. Like a roll of film, all of the pictures and stories follow one another and reveal a pattern of major changes over the past several decades.

The most notable change Ellen said, is the diminishment of the population and town of Enochs. Once home to two cotton gins, three grocery stores (at different times), a school, several cafes, several filling stations and three churches; this town has been reduced to one gin, a post office and a church with a membership of 13.

Ellen admits that it gets more difficult to report what people in Enochs are doing when there aren't many people left to report on. But Ellen enjoys what she does and hopes to keep at it, at least until she reaches the 30th anniversary of her news writing. She will have two more years from May to go.

"It is getting to where we don't have too many people here, but I like to keep in touch with people and like to get news of other people in the newspaper," Ellen said. "As

long as there are people out here, there is some news."

Ellen gathers most of her news by calling around to her friends and neighbors homes on Mondays.

Ellen began writing for the Muleshoe Journal on May 9,

1967. She has that exact date recorded in one of her scrapbooks. She was paid \$6 for her first Enochs news column in 1967.

Ellen took over as the correspondent for Enochs when former correspondent Blanche Cash Aubrey retired from the position.

Ellen came to Bailey County in 1923 with her parents after enduring a sevenday journey from Crosby

County by covered wagon and truck. Enochs was home to her now and she knew most of what was going on. So her new correspondent position fit her well.

Ellen said she enjoys the peace she finds in the remote town of Enochs, and doesn't mind too much, having to drive 2-1/2 miles to get her mail. She hopes to remain in Enochs until the day she dies.

Ellen once moved to Arkansas for three years, but came back to the place she calls home.

Ellen vividly recalls the changes she has seen in her life, mainly changes in technology. From oil lamps and burning cow chips in stoves to central heating. She also recalls burning maize and corn in the heater because it was cheaper than coal.

She also recalls many of the major events which occurred in Enochs throughout the years and drew this small community even closer together, like a big snow drift in the late 1920s.

"It got 10 below zero that year and all of the neighbors had to pull together," Ellen said. "There were chickens and hens that had to be put in incubators."

She said that there was snow on the ground for six weeks during this snow drift and the

snow drifts measured 36 inches in some places.

Ellen recalls when there was an outdoor basketball court in Enochs, as well as a rodeo ground, a baseball diamond, crochet court, a produce house where they would sell there eggs, cream and chickens. There was also a beauty shop and barber shop. The post office was built in Enochs in the late 1920s.

Ellen and her late husband J.D. Bayless bought the farm that Ellen still lives at on Jan. 11, 1942. There they reared their three daughters. J.D. farmed until his death, Aug. 9, 1986.

Ellen was a true farmer's wife, having driven tractors and worked in the field alongside her husband. She said she did everything on the farm except ride a binder

She also worked at the former Bula School lunchroom for seven years. The Bula School was closed in 1975.

Summing up her life, Ellen said it has been "a long winding trail."

"I have lived through all kinds of times, good and bad."

Ellen is currently in the process of writing her life history and hopes to get it published.

Ellen is recording it the

way she records all of her Enochs News, by typewriter. But a nephew, James Parsons of Arlington, has offered to transfer it to computer.

Ellen also spends a great deal of her free time crocheting and doing needlework. She makes quilts, many of which

she gives away, and makes afghans, pin cushions and many other handmade articles.

While many folks have moved away from Enochs and into the city, Ellen is content where she is.

"I enjoy my pictures and hobbies. I can spend hours working on it and going

through my scrapbook. It brings back so many memories...."

## Memories of the 'dustbowl days' of the 1930s and more

Yours truly has been at it again. This time we begin in March of 1935. How many of you remember that year? Probably quite a few.

The First Baptist Church began building a new auditorium over the basement in which they worshiped for over 10 years. It was located on the north corner of their present location. (The parking lot!)

March came in like a lion in 1935 - with a terrific sandstorm. Mother used to call those days the dustbowl days. The sandstorm would be so intense that it would be as black as night in the middle of the day, and nothing would keep the sand out of the house.

The MHS girls basketball team was in a tournament in Wilson. Among those playing were Melzine (Rockey) Elliott, and Ruby (Sterling) Hart. Ruby was chosen outstanding player and received a medal.

Specials at Muleshoe Motor included a 1930 Chevy Pickup for \$100.

The second week in March saw six inches of snow on the ground. This was much needed moisture.

### 1945

March 1, J.W. Parkman was found guilty of murder in District Court of Bailey Co. He was given three years in the penitentiary. The murder took place in Bula, November 13, 1944. He shot his son-in-law, R.C. Denningham.

Mrs. Buck Ragsdale was elected President of the

Baileyboro Home Demonstration Club.

Burglars broke into the Texaco station and stole gas stamps worth about 27,000 gallons of gas.

### 1955

Jimmy Holt was outstanding at a track meet between Texas, Houston and Texas A&M. Holt also had a very impressive track career while attending MHS.

Buck Johnson won a couple of 1st places at Tech. He took the 880 yard run in 2:05.3 and the mile in 4:41.3.

Alice Dawson and Leon Harvey were married in Clovis March 4, 1995. After a short trip they will be at home in Muleshoe where they both are seniors at MHS.

Miss Donna Wright and Eugene Shaw were married in the Progress Baptist Church, Sunday, March 13, 1995. They also attend MHS.

At Anthonys you could buy your Easter finery for \$5.90 and get a matching handbag for \$2.98.

The MHS Drama took District 5A honors in Littlefield. They presented the play "Circumstances After Cases" Among the cast were Bobby Nelms, Bettie Collins, Mary Alice Baker and Keith Buhrman. The Senior Class of 1955 presented the play "We Shook The Family Tree". The cast consisted of Wanda Cherry, Bill Ellis, Mona Mitchell and Wayne Bristow.

### 1965

Fourteen county youths entered their stock in the Lubbock Stock Show, according to J.K. Adams, County Agent, there were 27 barrows, 3 lambs and 2 calves.

The Senior Class of 1965 was honored with a party and dance at the County Club. Hosting the party were Caryn Haley, Beverly Bartley, Julie Williams and Barbara Jones.

Fry and Cox unveiled the new Minneapolis Moline Thursday, March 25.

MHS golfers won second at the tournament held at the Muleshoe County Club. Among the winners were Bill Hart, Sam Johnson, Dave Walts, Mike Bryant, Jay Ward and Paul Leman. Their coach was Bob Coleman.

The First Baptist Church of Muleshoe, hosted a banquet honoring the '65 Seniors of MHS.

In the local stock show Jill Wheeler (who was 12 at the time) won Grand Champion with her calf. J.C. Pearson had the Grand Champion Barrow and Stanley Black the Lamb.

The new Wallace Theater opened Wednesday by show A FREE movie to all who attended.

### 1975

Greg Harrison and Kirk Lewis won Grand Champion honors in Houston with their animals on Feb. 27, 1975. Also Craig Kirby, who won a calf in

1974 at the Houston Calf Scramble, took the calf back to Houston and placed 3rd.

A headline that caught my attention on March 6, 1975 was "Sam Fox Sells Business To Herman Morrison". Mr. Fox owned the Texaco Wholesale business here in Muleshoe.

Shelly McGlaun won the Youth Western Pleasure and the Youth Western Horsemanship divisions at the Houston Livestock Show on her horse "Ko-Ko-Deck".

Showing at the XIT Drive In was "Man of the East".

In Anthonys' Pre-Easter Sale a man's leisure suit could be purchased for \$35.00.

In an advertisement for Gibsons I noticed that a gallon of milk sold for 59¢.

In an election at MHS Gary White and Jana Bruns were elected Most Handsome and Most Beautiful.

Brad Poynor won the local spelling bee by correctly spelling the word "Flare".

### 1985

Three of the MHS basketball boys were picked for the All District Team. They were Rob Donaldson, Mark Moton and John Isaac.

Lonnie Adrian was named SCAC Citizen of the month.

The Muleshoe Roadriders held their 3rd Annual Rally with approximately 227 motorcyclist registering.

Debbie Isaac was named to the All District Girls Basketball Team.

A new business in Muelshoe, "Muleshoe Truck & Auto Service" had their ribbon cutting and formal opening. The business was owned and operated by H.E. Reeder and John Grippando.

At the Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet, Bob Finney and Janie Moraw were named "Man and Woman of the Year". Wayne and Joyce Holmes were named "Couple of the Year" and the Larry Clawsons were named "Farm Family of the Year". Hubert Kidd and Eddie Morris were given certificates of appreciation for their work in the Cham-

to a location West of the Mule Putt Putt Course and North of Ben Franklin. The building will be remodeled and used for a Senior Citizen Center and Museum, by the Bailey County Historical Commission.

## **Master Gardener training** to be conducted in area

LUBBOCK - Serious horticulturists and amateur gardeners across the South Plains can improve their knowledge and skills and help others in their communities by taking part in the Texas Master Gardner training to be conducted here in March and April by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
