

Water for the City of Plains continues to be in critically short supply. Demands on the aquifer during the recent hot dry weather have severely reduced the underground water level.





### 1995 PROPERTY TAX RATES IN PLAINS IS D

This notice concerns 1995 property tax rates for PLAINS ISD. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the school district used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare. properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the school district can set before it must hold a rollback election. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes and state funds by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.
