

Lengthy agenda, but routine matters sail through Commissioners Court

Twenty items appeared on the agenda for the June 14 session of Commissioners Court, but wre cleared in less than an hour. Teresa Howard, Human Resources Director, requested approval to use \$1712 from the equipment line item to purchase an office desk and chair from Frank McGlaun in Lubbock, to be delivered and in-

stalled at that price. The pur-

chase was approved.

Commissioner Cobb described a proposed compensation package prepared by Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) for the purchase of 207 acres land to be used in the construction of a new runway at the county airport. The expansion project had been approved by the court in an earlier session. The court approved TxDOT submission of the offer to landowners.

Processors to install and mainpipeline across County Road 370 was approved.

Clay Taylor, Yoakum County

Hospital Administrator, reviewed recently received bids on equipment for the labor and deliver room addition in the hospital expansion project. He said because of a large price difference between bidders Stryker Medical and Hill-Rom Co. he and an assistant had visited a hospital at Dalhart with recently purchased Stryker equipment. He told the court, "The equipment looked like it will serve our needs very well, and save a bit over \$20,000 on our budget, and this is what I am recomending we purchase." on duty, and the dispatcher office to call for assistance in emergencies. The paging system could be purchased and installed for \$7517. Judge Brewer told the court there had been numerous occasions when this type system could have been utilized. The request was approved.

Corzine also presented a request from South Plains Association of Governments for all SPAG communities and counties to adopt and publicly announce local Hazard Mitigation Action Plans. The Plan submitted by SPAG for the county's study covers 17 pages, and focuses on emergency issues including water quality and supply, agreements between emergency responders and hazmat teams, early warning for hazardous events, and enhanced emergency communications systems. Judge Brewer pointed out if a catastrophic event occured in the county, and the county did not have an mitigation action plan approved and in place, the county would not be eligible for federal emergency funds. The public notice will be in place prior to the June 28 deadline.

In 2003, Carter and Van Hoose joined Pastor Bill Wright, Plains First Baptist, and Pastor Joseph Rodriguez, Plains Templo Bautista Nuevo Vision, and sought permission from the Plains School District Administration and individual teachers to visit the three campuses and bring their prayers and messages directly to students in class rooms, and on the campus."We felt this mission was a great success. More than 85 percent of the teachers asked us into their class rooms, and the feedback from them, the administration and the students themselves was really gratifying.," Carter told CCN this week.

He added, "We had a great five years in Plains. It was a true learning experience for Rhonda and I, and I hope the community benefited from our stay in some small way. We are appreciative to all."


