# **Assessment Dates And Rates Set**

The Texas Department of Agriculture has established the 2005 assessment rate, due date and discount date for the Western High Plains zone of the boll weevil eradication program.

The assessment for 2005 in the WHP is \$6 per dryland acre and \$12 per irrigated land acre, the rate established by growers and landowners in the original referendum.

Growers with failed acres are eligible to receive a credit on those demonstration of the conseacres destroyed before the final certification date. Qualifying failed acres must be free of all hostable cotton until a killing freeze to ing. In the United States one receive the credit.

Assessment notices will be mailed by August 19, and payment from an alcohol related acciis due September 30. Growers who pay by September 15 are elident. gible to receive a two percent discount on their assessment.





> At 10:45 AM classes were interrupted with a 911 emergency call on the intercom. Students were instructed to proceed to the end of the football practice tice field in the gymnasium parking lot. There, they saw a white Ford pickup had crashed into a white Cutlass auto. Two boys in the pickup played students who were drinking. The three students in the white car played victims of the crash.





THE DRUNK DRIVER'S ARREST

Very realistic makeup had been applied to all five of the students to make it appear they were actually in a wreck. The entire high school student body, teachers and administrators walked around the wreck, viewing the victims and the 'drunk driver' and his passenger.

After the wreck scene was viewed, realistic action began. The EMS and Fire Department began working on removing and treating victims in the car. The Sheriff Department deputies and DPS Troopers began testing and eventually arresting the drunk driver and his minor in possession passenger. EMS members carefully removed the passengers of the car, and they were placed in an ambulance and taken to Yoakum County Hospital in Denver City. Their parents had been notified of the wreck and asked to go to the hospital.

There, one of the victims was officially pronounced dead, and his mother was notified. The other victims injuries were severe enough to have him airlifted to Lubbock.

The driver of the car had been pronounced dead by the Justice of the Peace. A hearse arrived, and her body was placed in a bag and she was taken to the funeral home.

A DPS Trooper was sent to the victim's home to notify her mother of her daughter's death, and asked her to accompany him to officially identify the

#### Sales tax collections rise

in February, Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn reported that state sales tax collections rose for the 17th consecutive month in January. The state collected \$1.39 billion in sales tax revenue, up 6.1 percent compared with January 2004.

Also, Strayhorn returned \$502.8 million in local sales tax to Texas cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, up 5.2 percent compared with sales tax distributions to local governments in February 2004.

"These numbers indicate that Texas' recovering economy had a positive impact on holiday season sales," Strayhorn said.
