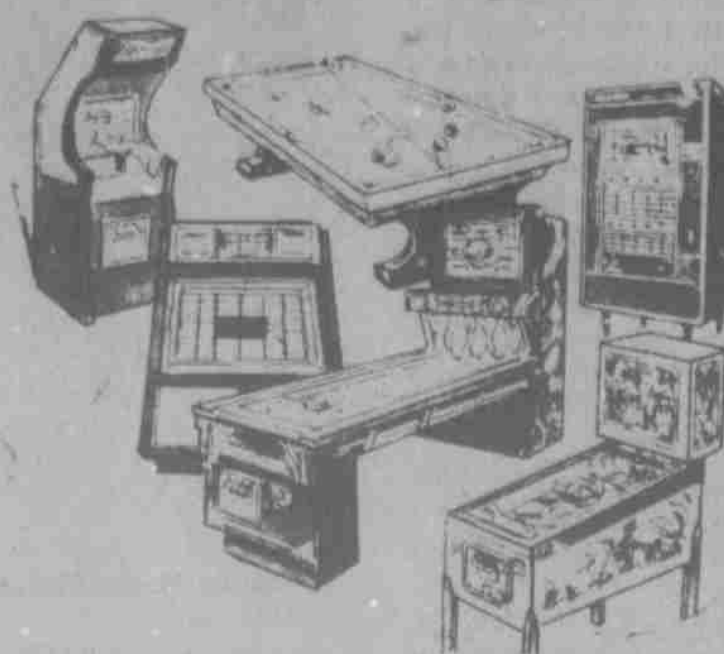

View from Capitol Hill:

Nakasone Needs A History Lesson

About five months ago, Japanese Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone suggested that our large Black American, Puerto Rican American and Mexican American populations make this country intellectually inferior to Japan — one of the most racially homogeneous societies in the world.

By implying that Japan's uniraacial society is inherently superior to America's diverse, multi-ethnic melting pot, Nakasone unearthed the same scurrilous "master race" rhetoric that helped bury Japan at the end of World War II. Nakasone did extend a lukewarm apology a few days later, only after receiving considerable pressure from his own advisors.

The fact remains, however, that Japanese arrogance about its closed society and exacerbated by its protectionist trade practices have fueled a considerable amount of resentment among world trade leaders.

Recently, I had the privilege of traveling to Japan, as well as China and Seoul, Korea upon the invitation of the House Committee on Science and Technology. My primary purpose for participating in this delegation was to research some of the technologies, public policies and societal philosophies in the orient that have contributed to the U.S./Japan trade imbalance in hope of shedding some light on industrial trade practices here nationally.

As the newly elected chairman of the House Subcommittee on Economic Development I am deeply troubled and concerned about the future of our major cities, many of which have derived

their economic strength from the labor-intensive smokestack industries that are continuing to suffer at the hands of Japanese competitors.

To more fully understand the dilemma facing American manufacturers who must re-tool and reorganize to compete domestically and abroad with more efficient Japanese exporters, let me first provide some historical perspective.

Following the defeat of Japan in World War II, which left that nation physically and psychologically devastated, U.S. occupation forces tightly controlled Japan's international and economic relations. Its imports were limited to essential food and raw materials and its exports were virtually nonexistent.

During the period between the Korean conflict and the Viet Nam war, demand for Japanese exports rose significantly because of its geographical convenience, cheap labor and political sympathies.

Today, Japan is the world's third largest exporting country (behind the United States and West Germany). While its closed society has created a unity of purpose among the Japanese people over the centuries, race is not the unifying factor in that nation so much as national pride. Therein lies the lesson that we (and Nakasone) must learn from all this.

In the long run, this country's multi-ethnic society has created a much stronger and richer blend of cultures containing the best that each race has to offer. This "master blend" will make our nation much stronger once we become committed to a national ideal — namely, making America work for everyone.

An Open Letter to Reverend King

Dear Dr. King,

Eighteen years later, I miss you still. And 18 years later, the nation needs you still.

I remember especially well your love of children — of all children, regardless of color, regardless of ethnicity or social status. You saw them all as God's children. In their presence, your affection flowed freely.

I sometimes think it was that love that energized you, that sustained you during days of despair and years of adversity.

When you sat in the Birmingham jail, penning your plea to the conscience of white America, your thoughts turned to your six-year-old daughter. You lamented the "ominous clouds of inferiority beginning to form in her mental sky," and you worried that her young personality was already being twisted and distorted by "an unrecognizable bitterness toward white people."

With that letter, you tried to tell us, as so often you tried throughout your life, that we must learn to hate hatred. And you knew that if America were to be freed from malice, America must be freed from ignorance. If our children were to secure the blessings of liberty, they had first to secure the blessings of learning. Justice for all, you reminded us, demands education for all. You warned that our nation could not for long endure if the ideals embodied in the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence were infected by the poison of prejudice and exclusivism.

What you understood so well, the rest of the nation slowly learned. But today, you would be saddened. For today, we are again witness to explosive racist brutality. And today, the U.S. Civil Rights Commission, once the conscience of the country, closes its eyes and refuses to see the terror in our midst.

This experience is teaching us a new lesson, a lesson we should long ago have learned. We are learning that the struggle against the forces of bigotry must be waged anew by each generation of Americans. We are learning that the quest for equality is never over. We know now

that we must teach a new generation of Americans that the soul of America must never be stained by the sins of malice.

We are learning, Dr. King, what you so often maintained: that education is a moral mission. The cause of justice demands the education that you so relentlessly advocated: an education that elevates moral character as much as it energizes the inquiring mind. An education that develops conscience as much as it develops intellect. An education that frees us from malice as it frees us from ignorance.

On this second annual observance of the holiday that honors your ideals, Dr. King, our responsibility, I believe, is clear. We must re-educate America so that we may re-liberate America. For education is fundamentally an act of liberation. Liberation from hunger and poverty. Liberation from the ghetto of despair. But more important still, liberation from fear, from bigotry, from hatred.

Only when this liberation is complete will all Americans be able to say—Free at last, free at last, thank God Almighty we are free at last. For in the last analysis, none of us can be free so long as one among us is enslaved. None of us can be free so long as one among us remains enchained by poverty, by limited opportunity, by prejudice, by illiteracy, by justice delayed and justice denied.

That lesson is your lasting legacy. We learned that lesson once. We will learn it again. We will move forward, as you asked us to, with "restless determination" toward a community of understanding and a culture of compassion, toward a society in which there is malice toward none.

Your memory, Dr. King, sustains my faith in education as a force of moral renewal. And as a teacher, I remain confident that we shall see the day when all our nation's children sing out in joy—not we snail overcome, but we have overcome.

It's healthy, because at least people are questioning the belief that racism is dead; that the laws, court decisions and executive orders have finished it

off; and that whatever lingering discrimination exists, it's not severe or important.

Overt racism has, by and large, diminished in comparison with the past. But racial barriers remain. The growth of "racism is dead" sentiment is paralleled by too many indications that racism is alive and well for fair minded people to ignore.

In fact, the growing belief that racism has lost its force is itself a factor that encourages latent racism to surface.

When Attorney General Ed Meese campaigns against affirmative action; tells all who will listen to him that we're now a color blind society; and publicly questions the right of the Supreme Court to be the final arbiter of constitutional issues, he sends important signals to those who are still locked into racist attitudes.

Meese's radical position on the courts and on the meaning of constitutional guarantees, and his raising the states' rights banner that had been furled for two decades, encourages racist die-hards.

And so does Assistant General Brad Reynolds, who had the audacity to give a speech after the racist incidents in Forsyth County, Howard Beach and the Citadel, that maintained that the media are blowing up isolated racial incidents and that actually fewer such incidents take place now.

Why did he say that, when his own Justice Department has documented almost a tripling of racial incidents over the past six years?

And doesn't he understand that when the government belittles racist incidents it abandons its moral duty to combat racism? Doesn't he realize that minimizing brutal acts sends a message to people prone to commit them that the highest officers in the land don't think their excesses are worth fighting?

Maybe he doesn't care — which is why civil rights groups have been calling for his resignation for years now.

Certainly he and Ed Meese perform a disservice to the President they serve and to the Department they administer by making statements that just encourage the racists. Just as some White House staffers got us into the Iran mess, Ed Meese and Brad Reynolds are getting the nation into an even more serious mess by their implicit encouragement of a mindset that downgrades the importance of fighting racism.

Certainly no one can be complacent about the growth of the Klan, the mushrooming numbers of incidents against blacks. Nor can anyone be complacent about the apparent freedom with which public officials publicly insult black citizens — whether it's Arizona's governor rescinding celebration of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, or police chiefs giving the green light to their forces to harass blacks.

No one can deny that we've made great strides in reducing overt racism over the past two decades. But raw racism still thrives and its more subtle forms grow stronger daily.

When Ed Meese and Brad Reynolds ignore that, they just give aid and comfort to those who would like to restore the segregated world of the past.

But if the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you. Therefore, brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live after the flesh. For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die: but if ye through the Spirit do mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live. For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God. For ye have not received the spirit of bondage again to fear; but ye have received the Spirit of adoption, whereby ye cry, Ab'ba, Father. The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God:"

Only believers that have the righteousness of God imputed unto them and have been delivered out of darkness into his light and our bodies are the temple of the living God and he dwells within us and walks in us then we are his children.

2 Corinthians 6:14-16 "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers: for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? and what communion hath light with darkness? And what concord hath Christ with Belial? or what part hath he that believeth with an infidel? And what agreement hath the temple of God with idols? for ye are the temple of the living God; as God hath said, I will dwell in them, and walk in them; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you, And will be a Father unto you, and ye shall be my sons and daughters, saith the Lord Almighty."

God only chastens and rebukes his children that he receives as his children and if a person is never chastened by God, then they are not children of God.

Hebrews 12:1-8 "Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us. Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God. For consider him that endured such contradiction of sinners against himself, lest ye be wearied and faint in your minds. Ye have not yet resisted unto blood, striving against sin. And ye have forgotten the exhortation which speaketh unto you as unto children. My son, despise not thou the chastening of the Lord, nor faint when thou art rebuked of him: for whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom he receiveth. If ye endure chastening, God dealeth with you as with sons; for what son is he whom the father chasteneth not? But if ye be without chastisement, whereof all are partakers, then are ye bastards, and not sons."

In conclusion, only believers are the children of God and all unbelievers are the children of the devil.

1 John 3:1-10 "Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God; therefore the world knoweth us not, because it knew him not. Beloved, now are we the sons of God, and it doth not yet appear what we shall be; but we know that, when he shall appear, we shall be like him: for we shall see him as he is. And every man that hath this hope in him purifieth himself, even as he is pure. Whosoever committeth sin transgresseth also the law: for sin is the transgression of the law, and ye know that he was manifested to take away our sins; and in him is no sin. Whosoever abideth in him sinneth not: whosoever sinneth hath not seen him, neither known him. Little children, let no man deceive you: he that doeth righteousness is righteous, even as he is righteous. He that committeth sin is of the devil; for the devil sinneth from the beginning. For this purpose the Son of God was manifested, that he might destroy the works of the devil. Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin; for his seed remaineth in him: and he cannot sin, because he is born of God, in this the children of God are manifest, and the children of the devil; whosoever doeth not righteousness is not of God, neither he that loveth not his brother."
