Moisture Holding Helps To Improve All Soil Structure

Would you like to increase moisture holding potential of your soil, help improve soil structure, get a better and more efficient response to fertilizer elements and also reduce the amount of blowing on your farm. The answer is by applying cotton burs.

Organic matter content in the soil is reduced by excessive tillage operations and by planting continuous low residue producing crops such as cotton.

An application of cotton burs is one way of returning organic matter to the soil.

Another important benefit from applying burs is soil protection from wind and water erosion. Cotton burs should be maintained on the soil surface from harvest time until about April 1st.

The amount of burs required depends on several factors. The soil texture is a major factor to consider. A sandy soil is more likely to blow than a soil that has a greater clay content.

For example: Amarillo fine sandy loam would require an application of 3 tons/acre. This would hold the soil loss from wind erosion to a projected minimum of 2 tons/acre for the period November 1st to April 1st. Amarillo loamy fine sand, which has a sandier texture, would require an application of 5

Tax Rebate Checks Increased For Year

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said this week that city sales tax rebates to Texas cities through November are 11 percent higher than payments during the same period in 1978.

Bullock also announced that 923 Texas cities would share \$25.8 million in rebates for the month of November.

He said 1979 payments to date now total \$390.4 million, compared to allocations of \$349.8 million through November of last year.

Net payments to cities during November of last year totaled about \$19.8 million.

Muleshoe reflects a five percent increase for the year, with payments received through November of \$124,589.86, compared to \$118,153.61 at the same time last year.

The city's check for November was down slightly from last years amount at \$8,472.66, compared to \$8,939.93 for November last year.

Morton has an eight percent increase for this year. To date, payments have been \$39,806.94, compared to the \$36,708.94 at this time last year. Morton's November payment was \$2,992.24, compared to \$2,079.98 at this time last year.

From Littlefield, reports indicate a six percent increase during the year. Payments to date in Littlefield are \$173,167.89, compared to \$163,065.87 rebated to the city at this time in 1978. Their November, 1979 payment was \$10,331.15 and the November 1978 payment was \$9,015.86.

Friona also has shown a six percent increase, with payments to date for this year of \$60,258.91, compared to the \$56,391.75 for this time last year. In November last year, Friona received \$4,362.12, up to \$5,490.68 at this time this year.

Dallas will get a check this month for \$3.5 million, bringing this year's pay-

ments to \$46.7 million, an increase of 14 percent over last year's rebates.

Houston's check for November will be \$4.9 million, pushing its yearly total to \$81.4 million, up 11 percent.

Fort Worth will get \$1 million, bringing that

city's payments up to \$15.6 million for the year, a seven percent increase over 1978.

San Antonio will receive \$1.4 million this month. That city's rebates this year have been \$21.7 million, a seven percent increase over 1978.

First Half Defense Held Teams Scoreless Superintendent Named For School

Friday morning, Don Harmon, president of the school board for the Muleshoe Independent School District, announced that following a search that consumed several months, a new superintendent of schools for Muleshoe has been chosen.

Effective March 1, 1980, Harold N. Horne, Jr., currently superintendent of the McGregor Independent School District (Class AA) has been chosen as the new superintendent to replace Neal B. Dillman, who has scheduled his retirement for the end of January, 1980.

The new superintendent has been Superintendent at McGregor for the past five years. He has 21 years of experience as a teacher-coach, assistant principal, high school principal, assistant superintendent and superintendent.

He earned his Bachelor of Science Degree at Baylor University in 1958; Master of Science Degree at Baylor University in 1962 and has 42 hours toward a Doctorate Degree at North Texas State University and Baylor University.

Muleshoe's new superintendent of schools is 42 years of age and is married to the former Carol Morris.

They have two sons, Monte, age 11 and Cory, age 6. Mrs. Horne is a certified teacher and counselor, and is currently serving as director of Plan a Specialized Education Cooperative.

Harmon said approximately 4,500 people live in the community of McGregor, which is about 20 miles west of Waco. He commented, "We had 32 applications for the job of superintendent when we started out, and it was a

Gins Show Increase For Bales

As 'Mother Nature' has cooperated since the cotton harvest has gotten underway, the local ginners report they are staying far ahead of last year in cotton ginning.

Muleshoe Co-op Gin had ginned less than 200 bales on November 20 last year, but to date this year, as of Friday, the count of bales which have been processed by the gin has made a dramatic increase. The gin reports having ginned 11,800 bales as of November 30 this year.

Total for all the rural gins as served by Bailey County Electric Cooperative were 77,000 bales. This is added to the Muleshoe Co-op and at least one more rural gin for a total of 89,351 bales processed this fall.

This does not present an accurate picture as to all the bales harvested and ready to gin, as thousands of bales are reported to be stored in modules in southern Bailey County. The modules are ginned as the rural, southern gins catch up with the trailers on the yard.

There are predictions that cotton harvest and ginning this year will extend through the month of January, 1980 and probably into February.

Dreams of winning a regional championship went up in cold wisps Friday night, at Canyon, when the Mules' fragile statistics crumbled before an onslaught of fired-up Childress Bobcats in the second half of what had been a scoreless ballgame.

During the first half of the regional championship game, it was pure defense, and frustrated Mules and Bobcats battled from one end of Kimbrough Stadium to the other, with the goal posts and end zone remaining an illusion on the cold football field.

The Mules had three chances to score in the first half, but none of the scoring opportunities worked out. Bobcats had a problem of seeing the Mules take advantage of two miscues, but saw the Mules fail to capitalize on the opportunities. At 4:16 in the first, Sam Whalin recovered a Bobcat fumble on the Childress 26, then on a fourth and long, he attempted a 31 yard field goal which was blocked at 2:19 on the scoreboard clock.

With .22 seconds left if the first quarter, Jim 'Bones' Norman intercepted a Perry Morren pass and returned it from the Childress 36 yard line to the 22, again the opportunity went by as the Mules failed to put points on the board.

With just .54 seconds to halftime, Ricky Husband stopped a Mule scoring drive when the guard intercepted a Mike Northcutt pass on the Childress 40 yard line.

Going into the locker room at halftime, the statistics were fairly even, as the Mules had five first downs to four for the Bobcats; the Mules had 15 yards in penalties to 25 for the Bobcats and Mike Northcutt has 27 yards in the air to 43 yards for Perry

Morren. On the ground at halftime, the Mules were leading in penetrations and had 74 yards on the ground to 32 for the Bobcats.

Taking advantage of the halftime break to re-group, the Bobcats came back and their first score in the game was at 5:31 of the third when Morren found Rodger Hughes in the end zone on a 13 yard pass for six Morren managed two points when he scampered to the left.

The Bobcats second TD was set up by Timmy Dean, who intercepted a Northcutt pass and took it back to the Muleshoe 10 yard line, where three plays later, Morren connected with Clifton Cornish for an eight yard TD pass at 3:30 of the third. Carroll Precure blocked an attempted kick by Morren for an extra point, and the game was at

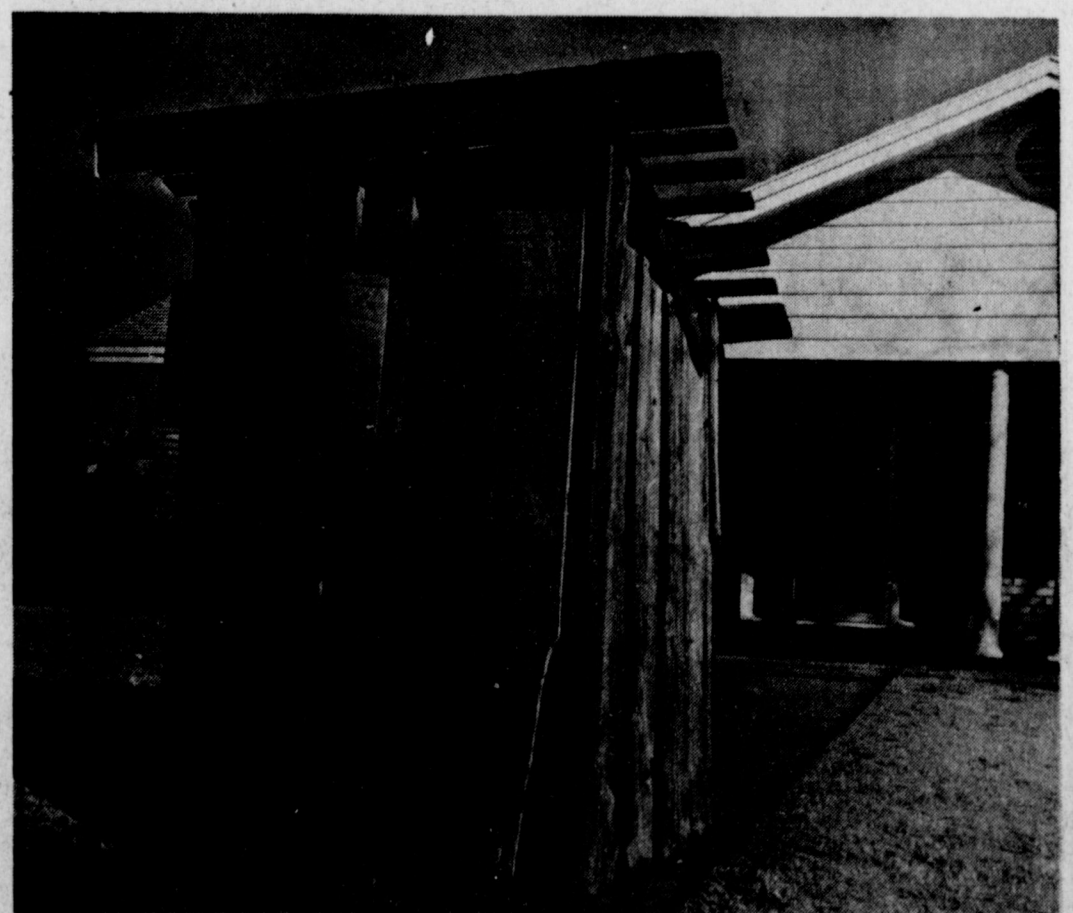
Early Morning Fire Destroys Mobile Home

About 18-24 tart shells
1 jar (28 oz.) prepared mincemeat
1/3 cup gold Puerto Rican rum

Make and bake tart shells using packaged pie crust mix: or, buy ready-to-fill tart shells. Arrange shells on a cookie tin. Mix mincemeat and rum and fill shells. Cover with foil (so filling won't get too dry) and bake in a moderate oven, 350°, for about 20 minutes. Serve warm with a generous dollop of hard sauce. Makes 1-1/2 or 2 dozen, depending on size of tart shells.
