IN ALL-OUT EFFORT TO REGISTER VOTERS

What are the execuses this time??? The public was given a fifteen day period to become qualified voters, because of the new Voter's Registration Law passed on March 2, 1966, at Austin, Texas, by the State Legislature. It's bad to say, but it appears as though the public wants everything given to them.

It is time you learned, Mr. and Mrs. Public, some things you must do on your own, with a little effort on your part. You can't sit back and expect people to give you everything, without accepting some responsibility on your own part. This new law, which affected a great many of you, isn't worth a darn quarter unless you execute your right by registering now to vote.

In talking to many of you so-called citizens, those of you who must know everything, and are ready to critize anything, it appears as though you come up with the same line; "I don't have any time", yet, if Bobby Bland or L. C. Cooke is comming to town you make arrangements weeks ahead of time in order to prepare for this one night of activity. Why can't you make this same type of effort toward something that will benefit you more than one night.

Perhaps some of you haven't heard about the New Voter's Registration Law, but this execuse won't hold water. Perhaps our ministers are concerned about the welfare of the community. But are they all batting 1.000 when it comes to informing the members of the community that

now is the time to register. Reverend M.T. Reed, pastor of Mount Vernon Methodist Church and president of the local chapter of the NAACP, has been concerened about the matter and has had circulors printed in order that people may be informed in the new law.

The Lubbock Chapter of United Political Organization of Texas has asked for publicity every week since the law's passage in order to inform the public of the new law and the need for registration.

Even your paper, The Times, has played the information up in every manner it knows how. Now the time has come for you, the individual to act, register now, before midnight tonight so that your voice may be heard in the cry for the things you know you need.

You must not continue to say you don't have time. Remember, the legislature passed this law in order to make it possible for you to register free, so that you may have a voice in your city, county, state and national elections. You must register if you are to prove to the

public that you are ready to have a voice in your government. Let's do without the execuses, because as one author says, "Execuses are merely equipment and tools for making mountains of nothing.



left behind when they checked out, or the cashier who had to pay their ticket for their meal after they had "walked their check".

If this is sportsmanship, then please, and if this is civil rights, and if this is equality, please --please --- don't teach it to my son, because it just doesn't fit my code of morals. It seems like something out of a book of gangsters not fit to play sports, much less repreall the fine white AND Negro people who were pulling for them to beat Kansas State so they could go on to Maryland and represent the great southwest where we live.

A lot of the time, I must start a column at a time when I can't possibly investigate whether the story will check out or not. Thus the reason for the inclusion above of the mention of the fact that this might be just rumor, but it is not.

I talked to the restaurant operator and in his words, "The young men did not behave in the manner we generally receive from the Negro customers we have always served in the past."

He went on to say that he even had mixed emotions about the fact that he pulled for the team at the Colisum Saturday night and then returned to his business to find that his establishment and employees had been mistreated by the boys. He was quick to point out that he had never expected such treatment since his business had been integrated for a number of years and he had nothing but high praise for the Negroes of this city that did business with him.

WELDER CRARGED WITH PLOT TO MURDER NEGROES

Los Angeles--NPI--A diabolical plot to kill Negroes wholesale was brought to light last week when a 43 year-old Sun Valley welder was arraigned in Superior court on charges of soliciting for the purpose of murder.

Herman Henry, who was arrested by three undercover agents, is accused of conceiving an elaborate scheme to send free food samples--laden with poison--to almost every Negro in the country. He proposed to establish four central national distribution points, manned by aids, to obtain effective

The samples would have consisted of easily alterable foods -powdered gelatine desserts -- each containing an unspecified poison and a dose of chloral hydrate or knockout drops. The latter was included so that the victims would not be conscious long enough to take an antidote.

Originally, Henry allegedly sought the assistance of the Alabama Ku Klux Klan to help implement the scheme, but he later abandoned the idea, he said, for fear of someone informing on him.

However, before he dropped the idea, he reportedly telephoned the KKK on several occasions over theperiod of two months.

He is said to have told them they could set up discount clubs in supermarkets, using forms on which applicants would state their race. Then the organization would begin sending free samples.

Initially, untained samples would be sent, to divert suspicion. Later, each distribution point would mail a barrage of poisoned packages simultaneously. Henry planned to finance the scheme, which he viewed as being effective in 12 months, through the sale of an invention.

Integrated Jury Convicts One of Two In Slaying, But Recommends Mercy

Americus, Ga. -- (NPI) -- Eddie James Lamar, the second Negro charged with the slaying of a white Marine enlistee during last summer's racial disorders, has been

sentenced to five years in prison. Indicted for murder, Lamar pleaded guilty to voluntary manslaughter in the slaying of Andrew Whatley, 21.

His accomplice, Charles Lee Hopkins, 23, earlier received life imprisonment when an interracial jury recommended mercy.

Hopkins admitted firing blindly last July 28 into a group of white counter-demonstrators while Negroes were holding a prayer vigil at the courthouse two blocks away from where Whatley was slain.

The vigil was in protest to racial terroism and harassment.

A broken heart, oddly enough, is portrayed by guady ornaments. White beads signify love, purity and hope. Black denotes marriage.

Watch out if the wearer threads r e d into her necklace, for she's a p t to be boiling mad with her l o e e trouble. For the opposite mood, she'll wear blue, representing t h e mountain dove, carrier of love messages.





How's about that, girls? Those of us who love jewelry--whether costume or the real McCoy--have to admit the girl who shows taste in the selection of that important fashion accessory turns the admiring (and we mean, male) glances her way.

The beads, to the Zulus, express love, frustration, hope and purity, marriage and anger. Written love letters are almost unheard of, because the girls have been communicating affairs of the heart through beaded necklaces and ornaments for centuries.

The trick to reading them is

the sequence in which the beads are threaded and the colors---all indicative of the wearer's mood or passion.

A broken heart, oddly enough, is portrayed by guady ornaments. White beads signify love, purity and hope. Black denotes marriage.

Watch out if the wearer threads r e d into her necklace, for she's a p t to be boiling mad with her l o e e trouble. For the oppo-site mood, she'll wear blue, representing t h e mountain dove, carrier of love messages.

There's no need to elaborate on green, since it has, since time began, represented the greene y e d monster called jealousy. Yellow signifies wealth, while pink --- and this is an odd one --denotes poverty and despondency.

Last week-end, Texas Tech wasn't even in the running, but most of the Tech fans I talked to were pulling for the two Southwest teams that were represented in the NCAA tournament that was held here in Lubbock (SMU and Texas Western) to win their games in order to represent this part of the country in the finals.

Now, after the games are over reports come to me about the conduct of the TW Negro athletics that stayed in our town. First, let me say, these are unofficial reports, but at the same time, the rumor that these boys, away from home and campus would conduct themselves in anything but complete accord, is not good for the public image they and the rest of the Negrorace wishes to put forth for public exhibition, and a rumor is just as bad as the true thing, especially if it won't wash clean under inspection.

Seven thousand-five hundred people yelled them selves horse, while probably ten thousand more sat by their radios and listened and pulled for the people who played for the School of Mines here and at the same time, a very few of the people here in Lubbock were thinking about how they had been treated by the boys that everyone in this area was pulling for.

Like the waitress the young 'gentlemen" from TW insulted, or the room clerk who had to explain about the wrecked room they



A lot of the time, I must start a column at a time when I can't possibly investigate whether the story will check out or not. Thus the reason for the inclusion above of the mention of the fact that this might be just rumor, but it is not.

I talked to the restaurant operator and in his words, "The young men did not behave in the manner we generally receive from the Negro customers we have always served in the past."

He went on to say that he even had mixed emotions about the fact that he pulled for the team at the Colisum Saturday night and then returned to his business to find that his establishment and employees had been mistreated by the boys. He was quick to point out that he had never expected such treatment since his business had been integrated for a number of years and he had nothing but high praise for the Negroes of this city that did business with him.

WELDER CRARGED WITH PLOT TO MURDER NEGROES

plot to kill Negroes wholesale was brought to light last week when a 43 year-old Sun Valley welder was arraigned in Superior court on charges of soliciting for the purpose of murder.

Herman Henry, who was arrested by three undercover agents, is accused of conceiving an elaborate scheme to send free food samples--laden with poison--to almost every Negro in the country. He proposed to establish four central national distribution points, manned by aids, to obtain effective saturation.

The samples would have consisted of easily alterable foods -powdered gelatine desserts -- each containing an unspecified poison and a dose of chloral hydrate or knockout drops. The latter was included so that the victims would not be conscious long enough to take an antidote.

Originally, Henry allegedly sought the assistance of the Alabama Ku Klux Klan to help implement the scheme, but he later abandoned the idea, he said, for fear of someone informing on him.

However, before he dropped the idea, he reportedly telephoned the KKK on several occasions over theperiod of two months.

His arrest came about after two investigators, posing as members of the White Citizens council, contacted and spent two weeks dickering with him on the mass murder

He is said to have told them they could set up discount clubs in supermarkets, using forms on which applicants would state their race. Then the organization would begin sending free samples.

Initially, untained samples would be sent, to divert suspicion. Later, each distribution point would mail a barrage of poisoned packages simultaneously. Henry planned to finance the scheme, which he viewed as being effective in 12 months, through the sale of an invention.
