The Lubbock County Community Action Board was awarded a \$35,305 grant by the Office of Economic Opportunity to conduct this special summer youth program by Congressman George Mahon's office this week.

The program is directed primarily to Negro youth in the comunity, although it includes Anglo and Latin teenagers.

Aside for Wiley, Elton Conger, also a graduate of Dunbar and a student at Prairie View College, and Lewis Prez are the assistant directors of this project.

The program includes 16 coaches and 12 teachers who are hired for the program.

Youths involved in the program will work one hour per day in city beautification projects, and the remainder of the day will be spent in recreation and instruction. The program last from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m.

F o r their one hour of work, youths will be paid \$1.25, according to T.J. Patterson, Assistant Executive Director of CAB.

This type of program will enble the young participants involved to stay off the streets and make a constructive contribution to their community.




