Muleshoe upsets Friona, finishes tied for second

The payoff is a playoff. Muleshoe upset District 2-3A champion Friona, 39-35, Friday, setting off an improbable series of events that left the Lady Mules in a three-way tie for second with Dimmitt and Littlefield. A playoff for the district's second spot in the state playoffs starts Monday.

Muleshoe needed three things to happen to force a playoff. The Lady Mules needed to beat Friona, Dimmitt to lose at Shallowater (65-60) and Littlefield to beat Floydada (65-42).

A coin flip was being held Saturday morning to decide the playoff format. The losers of the coin flip would meet Monday on a neutral court, with the winner taking on the coin flip winner Tuesday. The result of

the coin flip was not known at press time.

The district playoff winner meets District 1-3A champion Childress Friday in the bi-district playoffs.

"This feels great," said Muleshoe senior Michelle Williams, who scored six huge points in the fourth quarter to help ward off a Friona rally. "We knew this could be our last game, especially for the seniors."

Muleshoe (21-9 overall, 6-4 in district) played a near-perfect first half and still had a 12-point lead heading into the fourth quarter.

Friona (23-7), showing why they are district champs, cut the lead to 35-32 on a 3-pointer by Mary Cass with 21 seconds left. But Brandi Harrison and

MISD talks future

Muleshoe Independent School District Trustees Tuesday reviewed goals and objectives for the district this year.

Goals and objectives for next year also were considered at the day-long Board meeting in the Bailey County Coliseum meeting room.

The workshop, which involved Trustees as well as administrative staff, was "the start of our planning process for next year," MISD Superintendent Bill Moore said.

"It is a work in progress, a rough draft of revised goals and objectives for campus and district-wide committees to review. The process involves community members, parents and interested groups."

Campus and district-wide committees will suggest changes and revisions, Moore said.

"By the time school starts next year, we will have had lots of input before the final adoption by the school board of campus action plans—road maps for campus and department schedules of work."

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WJHS studies Roman culture

Sixth grade social studies students at Watson Junior High School were busy Thursday putting the final touches on the art room, which they were converting into a Roman banquet hall.

Columns, arches, a Roman road, a kitchen, a bath house, stained glass windows, Grecian urns and a bulletin board announcing chariot races and gladiator fights all were part of a Roman Dress-up and Feast Day arranged by social studies and art teachers at the school.

"It's my first year in junior high. We've never done anything like this before," said Nikki Felan.

Sixth grade social studies teachers came up with the idea for the Roman Festival after WJHS teacher Neva Gray heard students call her class "boring."

"Social studies becomes boring if you just read it—if

you don't have empathy with these people you are studying and put yourself in their place," Gray said.

Students were promised 100 points of extra credit for dressing up like Romans Friday. They looked at pictures of Roman statues and paintings to learn how Romans dressed and wore their hair.

Nikki said she would put part of her long black hair up in a braid and leave the rest straight. She said she might wear a few leaves in her hair.

"I'll probably wear a big sheet over my head and a long dress with boots—and a head band," said Denise Lopez. "And I'll make myself some big ol' rings."

Some of the students plan to dress like Roman soldiers.

"The bad thing about being a Roman back then would be if you got caught up in a war," said Jeffrey Skipworth. "The Romans used weapons like spears and arrows. They fought

on foot, carried shields and wore metal helmets and metal on their chests."

"The Romans fought heroically, with confidence and the will to win," Nikki said.

"But the Romans were a lot like us—they liked peace," Jeffrey said. "They had a lot of inventions, they had restaurants, and they liked to compete. They had races and they bet on them."

"They were different from us because they had big noses," quipped Eric Flores.

"I would have liked being a Roman," said Denise. "They gave us lots of ideas. If they had never lived, we wouldn't be like we are now. We wouldn't have libraries either."

"I would have liked being rich," Denise continued, "and having servants—but I wouldn't kill them. It would have been hard being a Christian. The King could burn you up or do anything he wanted

MISD Board discussing laptop computer checkout program

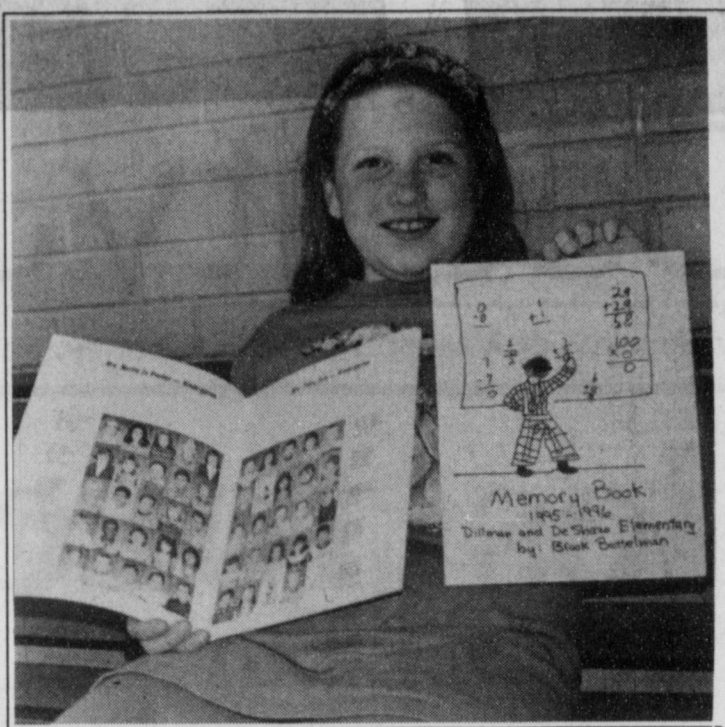

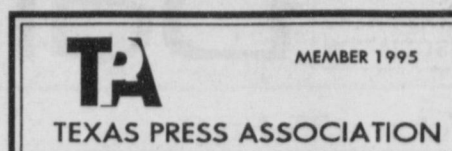
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West Texas A&M offers teacher certification

Social Security reps make monthly visits

This time of year, people might need to contact Social Security for a number of reasons.

A Social Security representative is available at the Bailey County Courthouse from 9:15 to 10:45 a.m. the second Tuesday of each month (Feb. 13 and Mar. 12).

People who are 65 and older and don't have Part B Medicare have a chance to sign up for this insurance coverage during the 1996 annual enrollment period—Jan 1 to March 31.

Most people sign up for Medicare when they file for cash benefits. However, those who refused Part B coverage initially have another opportunity to enroll during the first three months of this year.

Coverage of doctors' care, outpatient hospital visits and other medical services for

people who enroll during the current sign-up period will begin July 1.

For 1996, the cost for Part B coverage is \$42.50 per month. (You can determine if you have Part B Medicare by looking at your Medicare card.)

Also, taxpayers will need to contact the Social Security office for numbers required by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) for tax purposes.

A new IRS policy will delay processing of returns with missing or incorrect Social Security numbers.

The IRS must have the correct information before issuing a refund.

To get a new or replacement card, you can call the toll-free number (800) 772-1213 or (806) 743-7383, or visit the Social Security office at 1611 10th St., Suite 100, in Lubbock.

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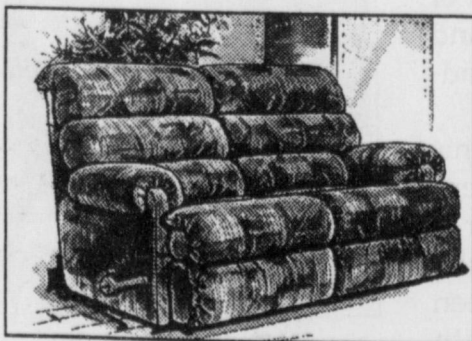
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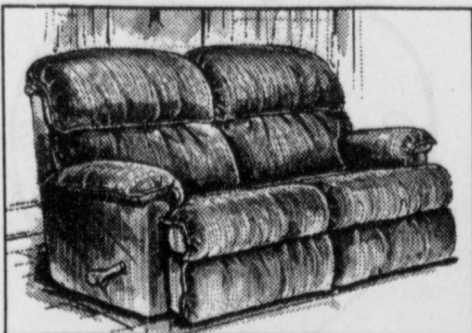
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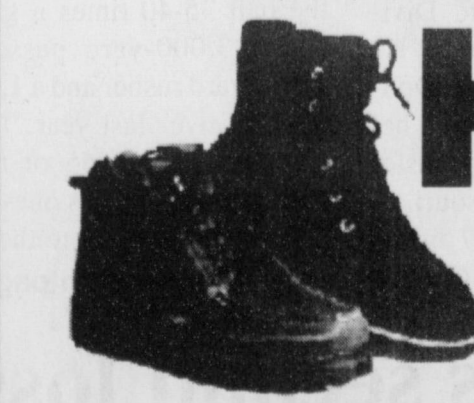

MHS finishes with 93-79 loss

FRIONA — Call him the Friona microwave, capable of heating up in an instant.

Eric McInroe came off the bench and scalded Muleshoe for 23 points in the second and third quarters Friday, leading Friona to a 93-79 win in the District 2-3A season finale for both teams.

"We adjusted our defense and switched to man-to-man and we still lost him," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said. "He was unconscious."

McInroe hit three straight 3-pointers in the span of 20 seconds in the third quarter, when Friona stretched a three-point halftime lead to 67-53 with 2:57 left in the third quarter. McInroe finished with six 3-pointers while playing less than half the game.

Muleshoe got within five twice in the fourth quarter, including 78-73 on a pair of free throws by Alfredo Gonzales with 4:24 left.

But sloppy ball handling, a sporadic Muleshoe problem throughout the game, fueled a 7-0 Friona run that ended any chance of a comeback. Six of the seven points came on layups

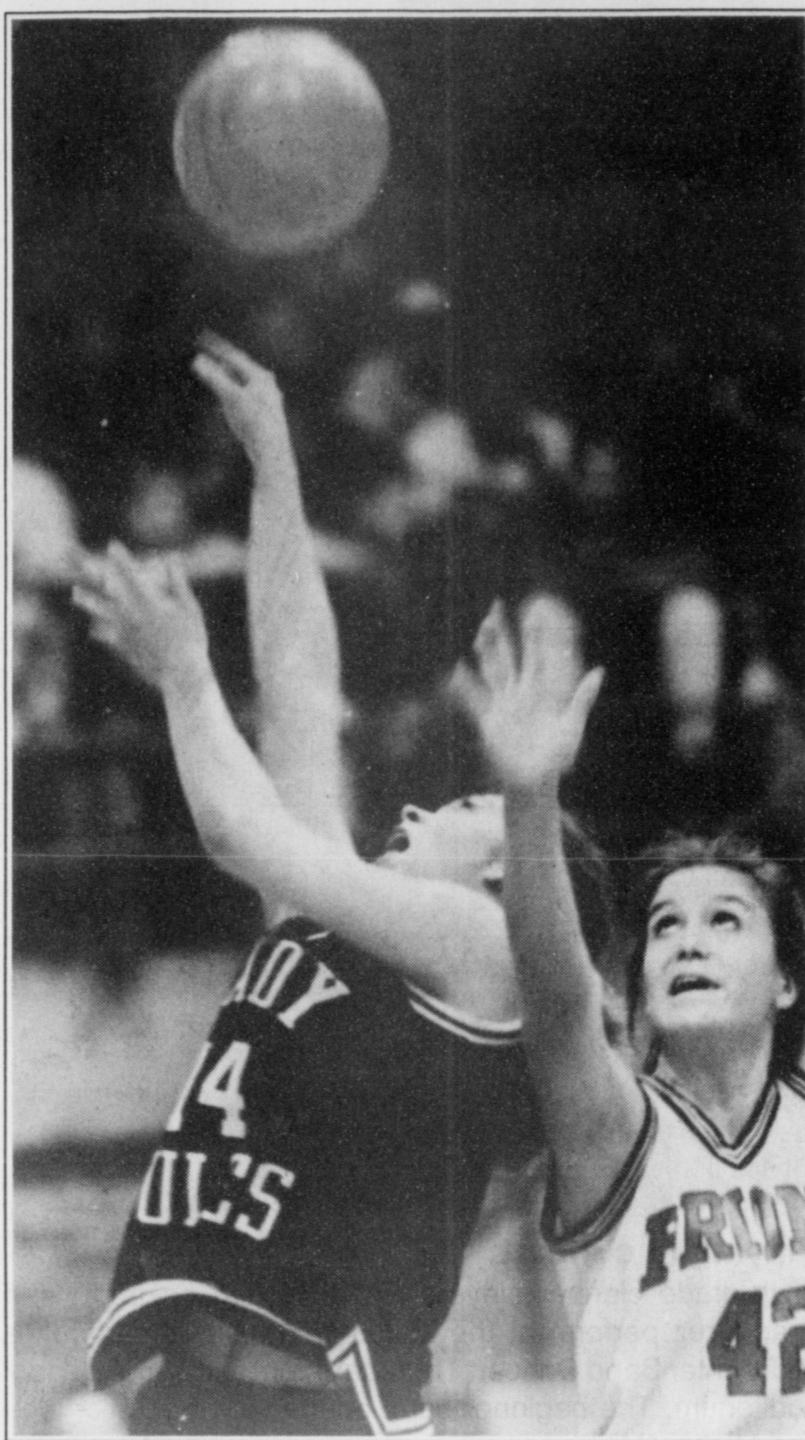

Allyson Field each hit two clutch free throws to seal the Lady Mules' win.

"I felt we played better as a team than we did all year," Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey said. "We started to go back to playing as individuals for a little while and that's when we stopped scoring. That's where our focus needs to lie."

Mandy Cleavinger led Muleshoe with 12 points and combined with Field (10 points) Harrison (9 points) and Williams (8 points) to score all of Muleshoe's points.

Cass and Britny White paced Friona with 9 points each.

Muleshoe played tentative on offense in the third quarter after building a 23-6 halftime lead. Friona managed to shave five points off the lead as the Lady Mules' matchup zone continued to give the Squaws fits.

Muleshoe scored just two points in the quarter, a driving layup by Field with 45 seconds left.

"We were trying to be too patient trying to protect the lead," Gruhlkey said. "We stopped attacking."

White hit Friona's first 3-pointer midway through the fourth quarter, cutting the Lady Mules' lead under double dig-

its (27-18) for the first time since the first quarter.

Williams hit a 10-foot baseline jumper and Cleavinger scored inside on a high-post feed from Harrison to make it 31-21 with 2:19 left.

Muleshoe still led by eight, 35-27, with 51 seconds left when Field scooped up a loose ball and scored on a breakaway layup.

Then Cass got hot, hitting an off-balance shot in the lane and a 3-pointer that made it 35-32.

Harrison hit both ends on a one-and-one with :17 left, as did Field 10 seconds later.

Cass hit an NBA-range 3-pointer with 2.7 seconds left.

"We didn't get away from our game plan," Gruhlkey said. "They hit a couple of 3-pointers late but you can't do much about that."

"They came out so flat," Gruhlkey said. "I think that had something to do with the Dimmitt game."

Friona clinched the district title with a 52-31 win at Dimmitt Tuesday.

Cleavinger scored six points and Field added four as Muleshoe took a 13-4 first-quarter lead.

Harrison scored six points with the help of good dribble penetration in the second quarter.

Garbarino signs with NMSU

Muleshoe's Daniel Garbarino was one of 11 high school recruits to sign a national letter of intent Wednesday to play football at New Mexico State University.

"I'm excited," said Garbarino, a 6-4, 185-pound wide receiver and one of the top hurdlers in the South Plains. "Now I know I have four or five more years to play football. I'm excited."

Garbarino is one of four Aggie recruits from the South Plains. Joining Garbarino in Las Cruces will be Denver City defensive lineman Eric Rivas (6-2, 260), Frenship offensive lineman Trevis Beckworth (6-5, 290) and Randall defensive lineman Kenny Noggler 6-4, 265).

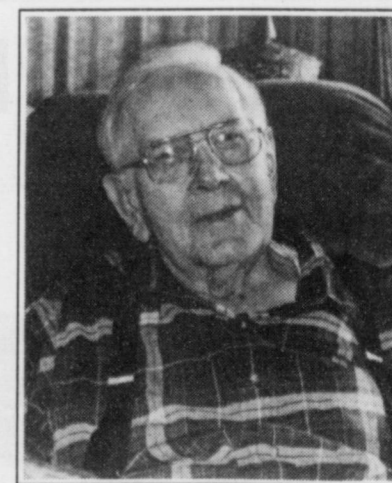

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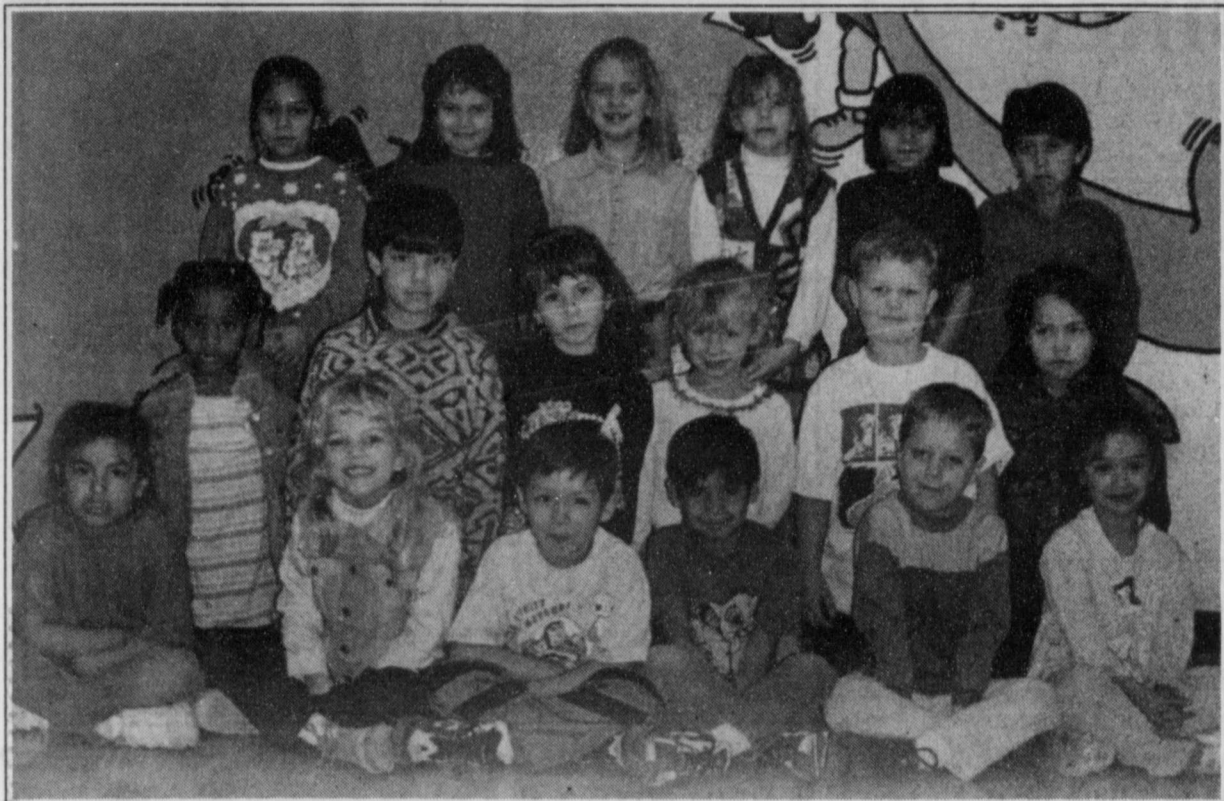

LRGV vote ending weevil eradication

A disappointing vote in the Lower Rio Grande Valley (LRGV) shouldn't create any problems for the High Plains Enhanced Diapause Control Program says Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Director Wayne Huffaker of Tahoka.

LRGV cotton growers voted overwhelmingly to end their eradication program during a recall referendum held in early January.

Huffaker, who also serves as Chairman of the Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) Boll Weevil Steering Committee, notes that the LRGV appears to have become the scapegoat for a problem that occurred even in areas that did not have eradication programs operating.

"From looking at the data that is currently available, it appears the LRGV Program has been unfairly blamed for the disaster that occurred in that area," concludes Huffaker.

Gray's class saw a movie called "Quo Vadis," about the apostle Paul, who stopped persecuting Christians after his Damascus road experience.

Denise said students watched as Peter was crucified upside down and other first-century Christians were killed by gladiators or lions.

The social studies classes have learned about Roman mythology and contributions to civilization—the development of concrete, hot and cold running water, thermal heat-

ing of homes, and a primitive form of glass blowing for stained glass windows.

Gray thought it would be a good idea to combine art and social studies to teach a world history unit on Roman civilization.

Sixth grade social studies teachers Jennifer Givens and Gail Bruns agreed.

Gray also was inspired by a Walt Disney Teacher of the Year, a social studies teacher raised in Vaudeville, who acted out her social studies lessons every day in costume.

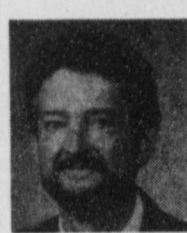

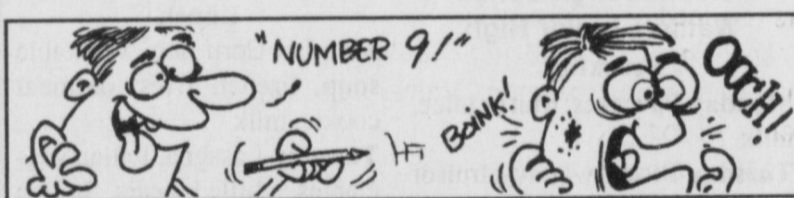

The groom is also a Muleshoe High School graduate and graduated South Plains College with a degree in associate agriculture sciences.

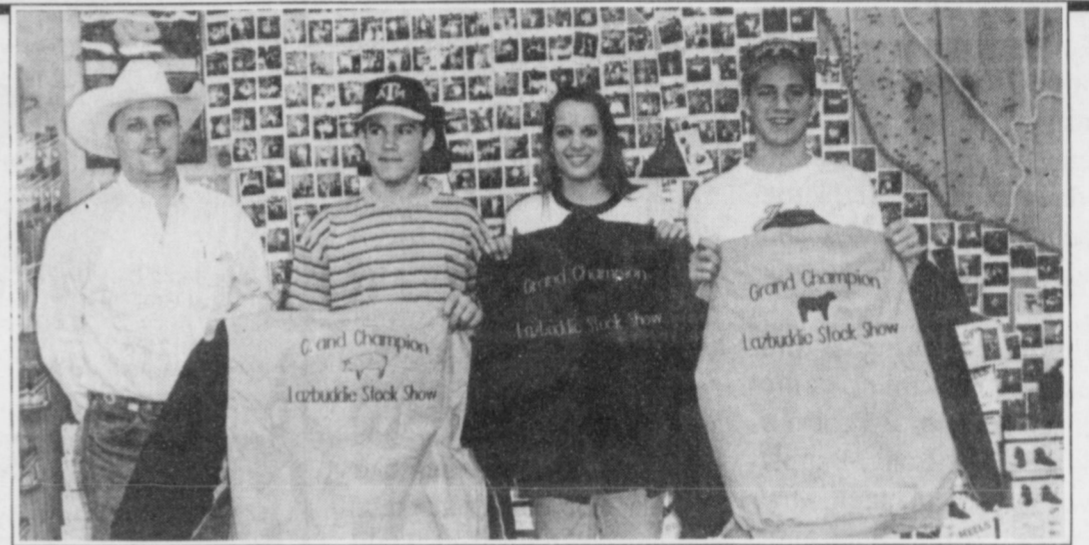

Watson Junior High School's main campus action goal is attaining a "recognized" status in TAAS scores, which were high enough this year to receive a certificate for significant gains.

Projects such as World Lab in Dillman and DeShazo Elementary Schools give students "real world" experience in science and social studies, while DeShazo's "Muleville" post office, school store and bank reinforce the fundamentals of math, reading and writing skills in a workplace environment.

Muleshoe High School's focus has been on raising TAAS scores through tutoring, special TAAS-taking classes, Zero Hour (a before-school academic reinforcement period) and advanced placement (AP) classes.

Moore announced that the State Board of Education is considering the additional graduation requirements of computer technology and speech classes.

"We already require more credits for graduation than the State requires," Moore said. (The State requires 21 credits, compared to 25 or 26 for MISD, depending on a student's program.)

MISD implemented an advanced placement program a year ago. The State may require reporting of TAAS scores of AP students, which MISD is already doing.

State rules for Board Trustee training hours already are being exceeded by MISD Board members, Moore said. The state requires 10 to 12 hours for new Trustees and six hours a year after the first year as Trustee.

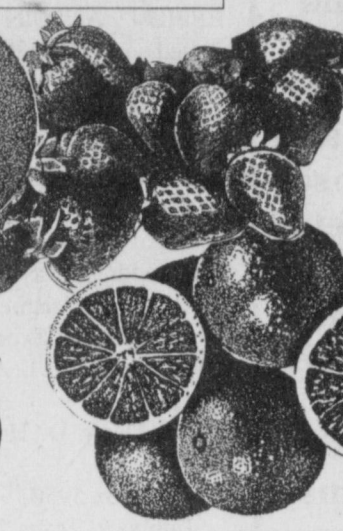
