Lubbockites Pay Tribute To Former Educator & Artist: Vivian T. Cooke

Scores of Lubbockites and friends paid a special tribute to Vivian Tamplin Cooke on Tuesday afternoon, March 20, 2012, at the Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church during memorial services. Rev. Wendell D. Davis, pastor of Lyons Chapel Baptist Church, delivered a eulogy entitled "Anointed to Teach Through Art." Scripture text was Exodus 35:30-35.

Mrs. Cooke passed away Friday morning, March 16, 2012.

As an artist, her art legacy and contributions will be remembered in the Mae Simmons Park with her bronze sculpture "Sandlot Player" and "A Golden Day" in the Babyland section of the Lubbock Cemetery. Also, the mural she developed on Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd. in 2001.

She was born on June 6, 1931, to Matthew and Annie Tamplin as the third of six children in Marshall, and she and her family were part of the great migration to Chicago. It was there that Vivian discovered her passion and talent in art and music.

Vivian matriculated at Wiley College in 1954 and married Charles F. Cooke Jr. in 1955. From this union, three children were born: Charles Fredric Cooke III Ricky, Jaqee Cooke Dean and Gerald Lynzie Cooke

Vivian began her long and impactful career as a public school arts teacher in Brownfield before moving to Lubbock. Vivian received her Master of Arts from Texas Tech University in 1971, and she continually worked to perfect her craft.

She was a member of Alpha

Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. Vivian was a very gifted artist, a compassionate family and community member, and an incredibly sweet spirit.

She was a member of the Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church. At one time, she was an organist for Bethel.

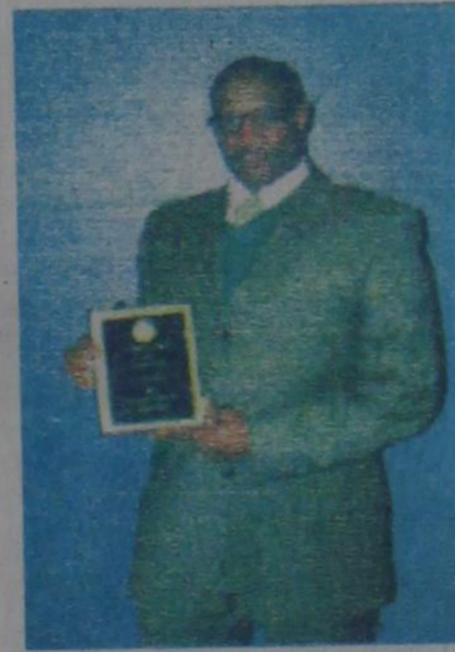

Whitney Gipson Making History!

Gipson Makes History With Long Jump Title

NAMPA, Idaho - Senior Whitney Gipson soared to win the women's long jump gold medal at the 2012 NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships Friday, March 9, 2012, matching the NCAA record with a top jump of 22-8 feet (6.91m).

"I knew it would only take one good jump going to the meet," Gipson said. "I came in ranked first in the country and I knew I needed to stay in that range to give myself a chance. I just had to put everything together. I've really been working on my take-offs and my jumps, but I have never jumped anything like that before. I still have a lot of work to do, but it means a lot to know that I am an NCAA champion. It is amazing to me. Every day, I walk by our banner that has all of the national champions listed and I always pictured myself with them. I knew I was going to have to work hard and now I've done it."

The North Richland Hills, Texas native hit the historic mark on her fifth attempt to pull away from the rest of the field. Gipson's jump ties the NCAA all-time record set by Auburn's Elva Goulbourne in 2002 and rewrites new benchmarks for TCU, the Mountain West, Jacksons Track Complex and the NCAA Indoor Championships meet. Her mark is currently tied for the world lead and is an Olympic standard.

Gipson becomes the first female Frog to ever win an NCAA Championship and the eighth TCU track & field individual overall. Distance runner Jackson Langat was the last Frog to win NCAA gold, capturing the 800-meter indoor crown in 2006. Gipson also becomes the first ever NCAA champion from a field event. She is just the fifth

TCU athlete to claim an individual title, joining former Frogs legends Raymond Stewart, Kim Collins, Khadevis Robinson and Langat.

"It is just outstanding for Whitney to be a senior and a local girl from just down the street in North Richland Hills to come into our program and win a NCAA title," TCU head coach Darryl Anderson said. "She is the first woman to win a title in our program's history and it couldn't have happened to a nicer girl. Her mom is here and had the opportunity to watch her jump and win the NCAA Championship. It just brings tears to your eyes to watch that kind of performance."

"Even if she didn't jump the 22-8 mark, she still would have won," Anderson added. "For her to really dig down and get that big jump was just great. People don't really understand what it means to jump 22-8 feet. It's just a phenomenal jump. I'm proud of her. It is a happy moment for her."

Whitney is the daughter of Winston and Willa Gipson; and granddaughter of Curtis and Hattie Mae Gipson; and niece of Brenda Gipson, all of Lubbock.

SPC urges motorists to stop for school buses, obey speed limit

LEVELLAND - In an effort to keep the roadways safe, the Texas Department of Public Safety wants to remind drivers who travel on Highway 114 to stop for school buses that are loading and unloading children, and to obey posted speed limits.

According to Corporal John Gonzalez, Texas Department of Public Safety, the law says that drivers must stop when school buses are stopped and have activated their alternating red flash-

ing lights or stop sign. Drivers who fail to yield can face fines from \$200 to \$1,000 if convicted on the first offense. The penalty for a second offense is a State Jail Felony which includes both jail time and a fine of up to \$10,000.

"If the road is divided by a barrier or median, the traffic going in the same direction as the bus must stop," he said. "The traffic going the opposite direction does not have to stop."

This reminder comes on the heels of two accidents and several near misses where drivers were either not paying attention or drivers continuing on their way despite the flashing red lights on school buses. In Smyer, Superintendent Dane Kerns said there have been a couple of accidents where cars were legally stopped while buses loaded and unloaded students and other drivers have crashed into the rear end of the stopped cars.

"We just want to get the word out to let drivers know that we are concerned about the safety of our children," Kerns said. "Either some drivers don't understand the law or they are not paying attention but there have been too many incidents."

In cases where the road is divided only by a left-turning lane with no physical barrier or median, drivers on both sides of the roadway must stop for school buses with alternating red flashing lights activated. In neighborhoods, near schools, and at bus stops, drivers need to take special care because children cannot

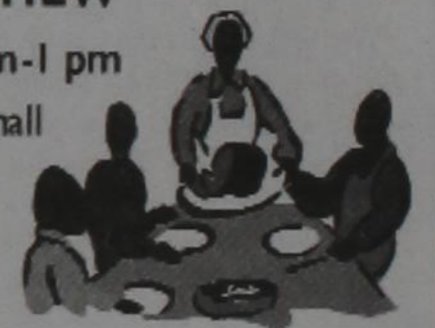

From the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith
"Killing the mandate won't fix health care"

I have listen to a great number of Americans who do not have a pot to drain water in and nowhere to pour it out speak with disdain about the Health Care mandate and hope the law will be struck down. The songwriter who wrote "I pity the fool" must have envisioned the foolish thinking of manipulated suckers of our time as it relates to health care.

Tom Daschle, former Democrat Senior of South Dakota who served as Senate Majority Leader wrote the following explaining to those who just might have a negative objected as it relates to health care the following as it pertains to "supporting a mandate to kill healthcare."

Mr. Daschle noted that congress was well aware of the experience of these states and knew that the insurance market reforms at the heart of improving coverage under this new act are inextricably linked to a mandate that require all of us to take responsibility for our health. For those who need help with the expense, Congress took great steps to provide financial assistance and ensure that obtaining health

insurance does not become an unfair burden.

If the court rules that the mandate is unconstitutional but leaves intact the insurance market reforms, the consequences will be dire. Premiums will skyrocket, while consumers will face dwindling choice and insufficient coverage.

This is not the market of any of us—Democrat or Republican—desires. It will also add to our enormous deficit problem. The federal deficit will rise by at least \$145 billion over the next decade, according to the Congressional Budget Office, if the law is struck down.

Let's us not forget that, at its core, this is not an issue of financial impact but, rather, an issue of human rights. Too many American families know the unparalleled pain of watching a loved one suffer through illness that is preventable and treatable with access to basic medical services. As much as we Americans like to pride ourselves on our resilience and ingenuity, these qualities are meaningless unless the benefits can be shared among all members of our com-

munities, regardless of age, income or geography.

Whether or not the court concludes that the Affordable Care Act is valid, the only path forward is for Congress and the Obama administration to continue the mission to ensure that every American has access to affordable and comprehensive, quality health care. In the two years since this health care passed, stakeholder have come together to create new approaches and make tremendous investments to move forward with its goals. We cannot let these efforts go to waste.

It is increasingly urgent that our leaders put partisan politics aside and instead come up with solutions that align incentives and policies with the behaviors that drive innovation and foster efficiency in all our communities.

There is a reason for encouragement. Most Republicans have long endorsed insurance models with competitive bidding in open exchanges—an idea that originated with the Heritage Foundation in the early



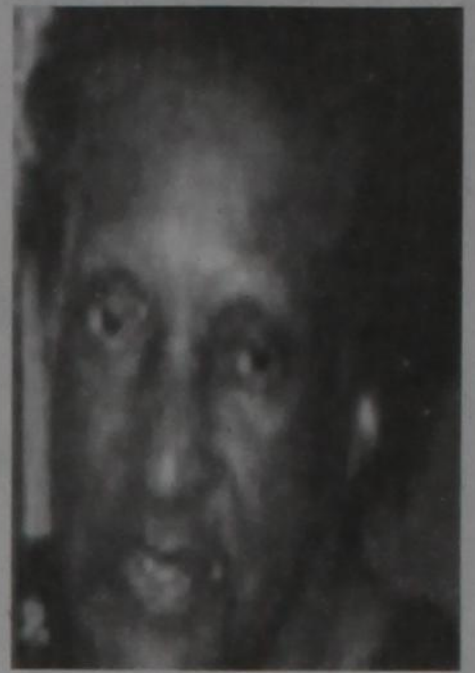

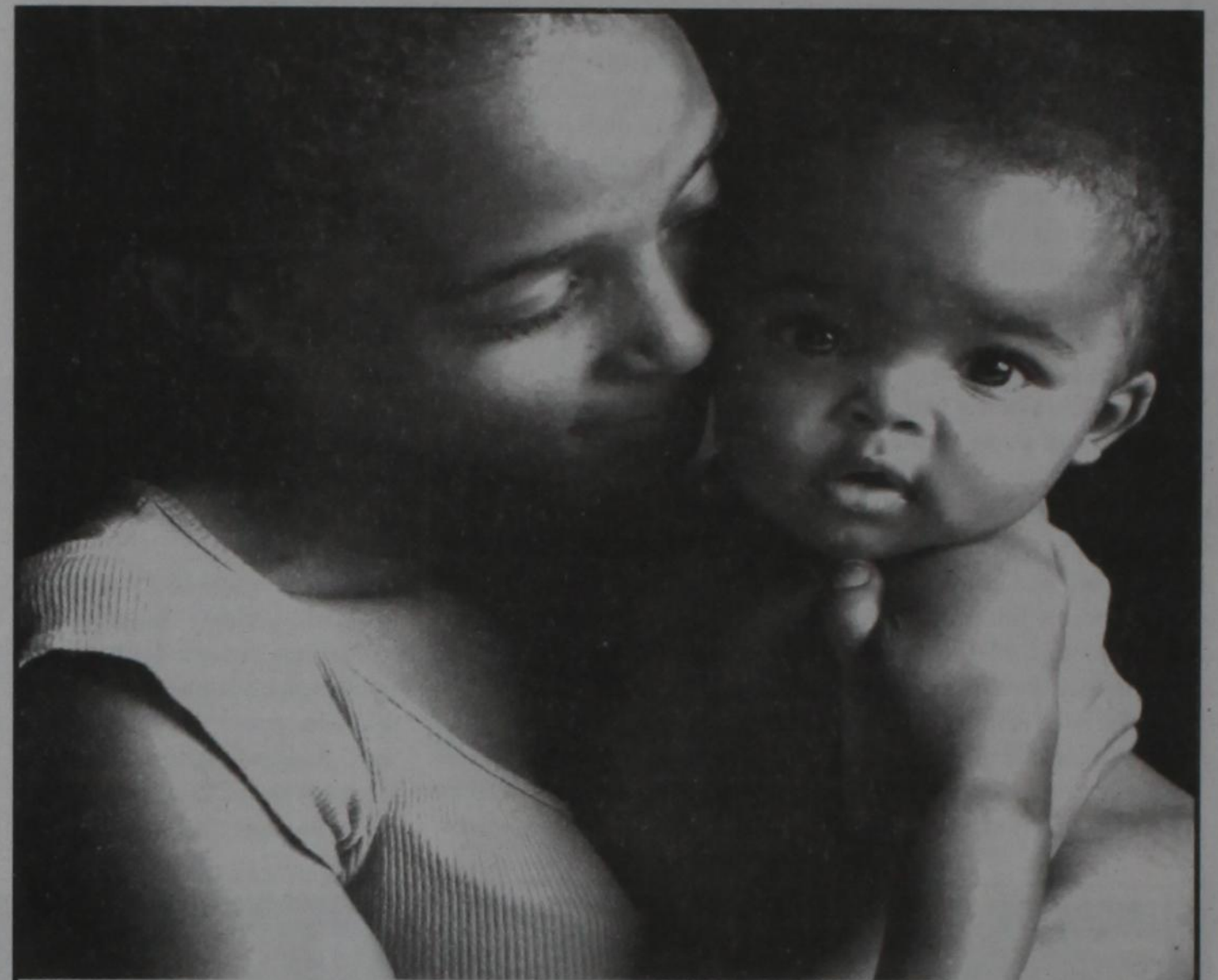

Palm Sunday is our clue that Easter Sunday is near. This is the Sunday which celebrates the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem at the time of the Passover. The Passover is a Jewish holiday which is tied to the commemorations of the slaying of the first born just before the Israelites were freed from Egyptian slavery. It also entails the Feast of Unleavened Bread celebrating the actual Exodus flight from Egypt. According to Paul, Jesus was the Paschal Lamb or the sacrificial lamb of the Passover.

We know the story of the Passover, Jesus' trial before the Sanhedrin, the supreme court of the Jewish people. Because of the Passover, they could not order his death and participate wholeheartedly in the festival, so they delivered him to Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor of Judea, who was the judge in the trial and execution of Jesus.

Jesus had warned his disciples that after two days of the Passover, he would be betrayed to be crucified. It was Judas Iscariot who went to the high priest and offered to deliver Jesus unto them for thirty pieces of silver. They sat to have supper together, The Last Supper, when Jesus told them that one of them would betray him and they all wondered, "Lord is it I?"

Soon afterwards, Jesus went into the Garden of Gethsemane to pray. He asked Peter to go with him and told him how he would deny him three times that night. He went to pray three times and three times he found his disciples asleep instead of praying and watching him. Early in the morning Judas came with a multitude of men armed with swords and identified Jesus with



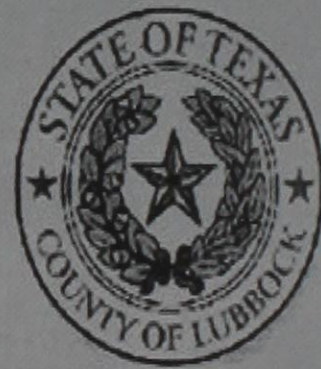
a kiss, so they would know who to deliver to the court to be put to death.

The Sanhedrin was a council made up of seventy-one Jewish sages who constituted the legislative body and the supreme court of Judea during the Roman period. The word Sanhedrin means "sitting together" as a legislative assembly in a semi-circle. The U. S. Senate derived its seating arrangement from the Jewish Sanhedrin.

After the Sanhedrin convicted Jesus with false witnesses, Judas repented and threw down the thirty pieces of silver and went away and committed suicide as he saw that the blood of Jesus was upon him. Pilate's wife warned him not to condemn Jesus because of the visions she had that day and this prompted Pilate to release a renowned prisoner or Jesus. The multitude chose the prisoner, Barabbas and said to crucify Jesus after Pilate could find no fault with Jesus. He released Barabbas, washed his hands and said that he was innocent of the blood of Jesus, a just man. Jesus was crucified and rose on the third day and ascended into Heaven. Hence, Christians around the world, celebrate Easter, the celebration of the Risen Lord.

again and what a job trying to put knobs and handles on painted surfaces that were not as dry as they should have been to handle, but one must cook in a kitchen. Some breakfast items just cannot be done earlier and stashed in the refrigerator and then heated up in the microwave, especially if you are responsible for cooking for someone other than yourself. Space is limited when a kitchen is tied up for painting. My suggestion is to eat out if you can, but some of us cannot afford to do that. Therefore, we must get 'in cinque' and plan way ahead of a kitchen painting by having the cabinets prepared for painting and our food consumption scheduled so as not to let daylight savings time interfere with our breaks and needed sleep. It is Spring cleaning time, so keep this in mind.
