Democrats To Blame For Social Security Crisis

Washington, D.C. - Senator James McClure, Chairman of the Republican Conference, last week sharply criticized Congressional Democratic leaders for "blocking the only available exit as the economic roof collapses on elderly and disabled Americans."

McClure's comments came in response to attacks by Senate and House Democratic leaders on President Reagan's proposed reform of the social security system. Citing twenty-five years of "spending more in social security benefits than social security revenues provide," McClure called upon House and Senate colleagues to "ignore the irresponsible and discredited claim of some

minority members and act decisively to save the social security program from financial ruin.

"The day of reckoning is here. Social security funds have been squandered away through 25 years of Democratic-fostered overspending," said McClure. "And now, those most responsible for the impending catastrophe are impeding every realistic effort to avert it."

McClure's warning came on the heels of reports from the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services, that project a social security deficit as high as \$11 billion in the next five years, unless drastic action is taken at once.

Health and Human Resources Secretary

Richard Schweiker grimly reported on May 12, that the present social security system will be bankrupt by fall, 1982. Should that happen, an estimated thirty-six million Americans would be financially ruined by the collapse.

"The Administration's proposals would put social security, for the first time in decades, on a firm financial footing," said McClure. "This Congress is duty-bound to protect the financial security of millions of Americans now receiving benefits, by enacting the President's program."

In addition to protecting disabled and retired Americans, the Administration's plan, McClure noted, provides that a young person entering

the labor force next year would pay an average of \$33,600 less in social security taxes over his/her lifetime, a 10% reduction.

"The Administration's program, when enacted, will protect the retirement of America's senior citizens without mortgaging the economic future of our young men and women," said McClure.

McClure specifically endorsed the President's proposal to end "wind-fall" benefits for employees already covered under the federal employees pension plans. The Republican Conference Chairman also

avored limiting qualifications for disability benefits to medical factors alone, thus restoring the program to original purposes.

"By ending costly and unjustifiable benefit payments we can insure that those who truly deserve social security benefits will have their full share," McClure said.

"Congress must catch up with the times and recognize that the free-spending, high-rolling days are over," he added. "We simply cannot allow long-needed social security reform to be devoured by Democratic dinosaurs playing paleolithic politics."

Celebrities Swarm to Support NAACP Freedom Day

New York, N.Y. - NNPA - Sammy Davis, Jr., Mayor Richard Hatcher of Gary, Indiana, noted actor Brock Peters, D. C. Mayor Marion Berry, Jr., tennis star Leslie Allen, Mayor Ernest Morial of New Orleans, and a host of other celebrities and politicians are pledging their support in increasing numbers as the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) gears up for one of the largest nationwide fundraising drives in recent times.

NAACP Freedom Tag Day, a drive aimed at the general public will raise a half million dollars and ultimately enable the Association to increase its attack against the conservative backlash that threatens to undermine the civil rights victories of the past decades, according to Benjamin L. Hooks, Executive Director of the NAACP. The drive is scheduled for Saturday, June 13th in most communities but will extend into the following day in some areas to involve the church community.

"We chose this period," Hooks explained, "in view of the critical decision-making process

currently in progress -- The time to act is now. The magnitude of the proposed shift in national policy requires us to intensify our efforts tenfold, but our financial resources will have to increase at the same time."

Solicitors wearing special blue and white armbands will canvass communities throughout the country, collecting contributions at shopping malls, parks, on street corners or at other public gatherings on that day. In keeping with the tradition of tag day drives, buttons and other small tokens will be given out to all contributors. Local NAACP branches will also spearhead a number of additional activities on that day including public rallies, Freedom Day discos, outdoor concerts and other events to involve the community.

Leroy Mobley, national coordinator for the drive, said "We're enthused about the many individuals even outside of our own membership who are rallying behind our cause and lending their support. In-kind contributions are already coming in from some businesses and corporations who have provided free services and generous discounts to help us prepare for this important event."

CAN Taking New Posture Here

Community Action Now (CAN) - Cherry Point's very own people's organization, is beginning to take on form and substance. When last reported to the public, the organization has elected officers and passed bylaws. CAN is now making plans to have representatives from the various sectors to join the executive board.

Sector I
N - E. Auburn Avenue; S - E. 2nd Street; E - Quirt Avenue; and W - E. 1st Place - Oak Street.

Sector II
N - E. Auburn Avenue; S - Parkway Drive; E - Zenith Avenue; W - Quirt Avenue.

Sector III
N - E. Dartmouth Avenue; S - E. Auburn Avenue; E - Zenith Avenue; W - Quirt Avenue.

Sector IV
N - E. Cornell Avenue; S - Parkway Avenue; E - Guava Avenue; W - Zenith Avenue.

Also, all sectors took part in the City-Wide Clean Up campaign, sponsored by the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, on May 23, 1981. On the 23rd, the landfill was open and all day free of charge. Many took advantage of this opportunity to get their

big stuff to the dump, with free entry. Sector III initiated this activity. Sector III tackled the need for getting Book Mobile Service restored to Cherry Point. Their efforts have borne fruit. Book Mobile Service will begin Friday, June 5, 1981, and every other Friday thereafter, at the Parkway Mall (by Furr's) from 10 a. m. to 6 p. m. We congratulate them! The community will benefit from this effort, especially the young people.

Other projects on the backburner are: refurbishing cement parks, rehabilitating housing, securing parks, jobs, recreational facilities for Cherry Point and working together creatively on economic development for our area of Lubbock.

When others disagree with you and you continue to smile and remain calm, they will soon calm down and are likely to feel rather foolish for having disagreed with you in the first place. The other person may, in fact, apologize to you, feel indebted to you and become responsive to anything that you might say or do. At this point, you take over and control the discussion by calmly stating your position on the issue. And, even if it differs from the point-of-view of the other person, he or she might be inclined to accept your position on the issue.

2. Be positive! You should adopt a position in life that will lead to happiness and emotional security. Feel good life, sparkle with good thoughts, let your mind soar to the heights with ambition and belief in yourself.

Don't be burdened by unhappiness, distrust, envy and frustration. You only live once so live in trust and happiness. Do not burden yourself with fear, consternation and competitive suspicion.

Be pleased with the brilliant sun, be happy that you are alive. Be enthusiastic about everything that you do and everyone you know. Be positive and friends will beat a path to your door as they beg for you to tell them how to be positive.

When you are cool and calm under pressure and never lose control of yourself, you are exhibiting the qualities that everyone would like to have. When you are positive and enthusiastic about just being alive, you will have more followers and admirers than you can imagine.



"We Must Do For Ourselves!!"

With all the talk and speculation of the proposed Reagan cut offs and backs — it is time we focus and refocus our minds in the direction of self help and move away from social action.

One of the major objectives of every group of responsible people is to take their rightful place, by reaching out, in mutual interdependency roles with other people — i. e. Chicanos, Indians, Africans and etc. However, a necessary precedent to acceptance of the responsibility and/or privilege of interdependence is independence. Nonetheless, we are faced with the costly and devastating fact that 27 years after the historic 1954 U. S. Supreme Court decision on school desegregation, now over 40% of our nation's Black youth are "functional illiterates." These Black youth, as such and along with many others — especially minorities — are forced to be in a dependency role on society as a whole. There must be a re-assessment of our immediate goals and priorities. Something must be done immediately to change our past and present policy of encouraging paternalism, etc., which fosters dependency. We must call for and encourage excellence in education — equitable opportunities for achievement and community pride that builds self-reliance or independence.

Our community and nation's urgent priorities during the 1980's call for a shift away from certain kinds of "integration" or reaching-out and immediate emphasis on the things necessary within our communities to save our presently denied youth and millions of others in our community.

The Lubbock Digest as well as other Black Media Newspapers over America — more than 65% of all printed media in Black America cooperatively — is dedicated to eliminate these burdensome needs from within Black America. We have chosen as our overall theme for the 1980's: "Casting Down Our Buckets Where We Are." This new emphasis — or priority — will have to involve getting all our Black community organizations and institutions together to encourage our youth and others to take pride in preparing themselves early to be our community's economic builders.

This means new forms of massive training to take over our Black community's needs for Black brick layers, Black carpenters, Black electricians, Black street sweepers, as well as Black policemen, Black teachers in Black schools, Black firemen, Black doctors, Black lawyers, Black merchants and Black businessmen and women of all kinds. It also calls for new forms of partnerships whereby we, simultaneously, can encourage the Black community to selectively support those white-owned businesses and institutions which have policies that tend to build our long denied communities in an equitable manner. Those that don't need to be boycotted and frozen out of our communities.

This new priority of rebuilding our communities from within calls for new roles for all in the Black community. It means that: the Black Press — Lubbock Digest — and others will have to examine every possible way we can "pull up our communities by whatever bootstraps" we have, as we seek the long-overdue and deserved support required of the white community.

BLACK EMPOWERMENT

DILEMMA OF BLACK REPUBLICANS

Relatively early in the Reagan-Bush campaign in 1980 it was decided that, if victory came, there would be no such thing as "racial separatism" in the new Administration.

This decision was not an easy one. It was arrived at after considerable reflection and soul-searching among the highest circles in the campaign staff. Those anticipating leadership in the Reagan Administration wanted, above all else, to have the image of and to represent genuine fair play.

Additionally, there were the philosophical and practical pressures to do away with any semblance of "reverse discrimination." The well reasoned answer was to treat blacks from within the Administration "just like all other Americans."

The decision was a thoroughly clean and highly laudable one on theoretical (and presumably also on moral) grounds. But there were several crucial loopholes and fallacies involved. One was that those who made the decision were almost entirely white. Black Republicans who were organized were not consulted in any formal way. That again, black Americans are not "just like any other Americans," regardless of our idealized convictions.

The treatment of blacks for centuries by white Americans and the perhaps not altogether wise response to that treatment by blacks themselves have made black Americans into an identifiable segment with characteristics of communication and social life measurably different from the nation as a whole.

What has surfaced within the Reagan Administration after just one season in office is the disruptive and disconcerting tension between racial or national ideals, on the one hand, and racial or national realities, on the other hand. Caught squarely in the middle of the tension have been those black Americans who, in the face of considerable questioning, ridicule or rejection by many or perhaps most other blacks, stuck their necks out for and stood firmly loyal to the candidacy of Mr. Reagan.



Jane Bolin, appointed judge of the Court of Domestic Relations in New York City in 1939, was the first Black woman judge in the U.S.

Without some specifically black vehicle of communication within the Administration, the voices of those blacks who have been loyal to the Republican Party have not been clearly heard. Nor have black appointments been made and publicized with the most realistic understanding of how blacks deal with communications and of how they respond to the relations of others to black heroic symbols.

Further, the several able and highly placed blacks serving the White House in general and non-racial roles have been placed in a position of being the major channels through which blacks both from within and from without the Republican Party have sought to be heard and dealt with by the Administration. Their offices reportedly have a larger volume of this crucial racial work to do than what is represented by their official assignments.

Meanwhile also, the image of accountability by the Republican Party to black Americans has been blurred, and black Republicans have been subjected to much of the same tongue-in-cheek and contempt-laden questioning that they experienced prior to the Reagan-Bush victory.

A number of suggestions were made repeatedly by black Republicans anticipating the practical needs within the White House staff during at least the formative months or year of the new Administration.

One person thought to be ideal for such a position — and any one of a number of blacks could have filled, and still might fill, such a slot — was W.O. Walker, the venerable publisher of the Call and Post black newspapers in Cleveland and elsewhere in Ohio.

Mr. Walker had been appointed personally by Mr. Reagan to head the national "Blacks for Reagan-Bush" organization. He therefore has had the confidence of our new President. Again, W.O. Walker has been a lifelong Republican with national stature and credibility within the party for some thirty to forty years.

"W.O.," as he is popularly and affectionately known, has the widest possible contacts with all segments of black Americans, developed during his distinguished lifetime of more than 70 years. Blacks believe in him, even when they disagree with him. He would cover and close much of the communications gap in a perhaps unmatched way.

"W.O.'s," age would also work in his favor. He would not be looking for advancement or favors, and ideally he could only work part-time, thus lessening the possibility of threat to the roles of any others. He would be an ideal facilitator in the areas of black concern for the White House staff.

What the Reagan Administration needs at this juncture is some kind of practical facilitator or catalyst to make the good intentions of

the Administration work for the good of all American and implicitly also for the responsible treatment of black Republicans; it is, after all, those blacks within the party whose influence is presently muted and whose images are compromised among their peers. It is they alone who can provide for Republicanism the image that it should have in the minds of black Americans; that is, as a true "party of all the people."

Budget to take blame Reagan and Public Wait

Americans are aware of the increase in defense department spending sought by past President Carter in his final year. "Alas, poor Yorick, I knew him well," a William Shakespeare character said upon discovering a predeceased soul's skull. Since President Reagan is still on his honeymoon with Congress, a \$2 billion increase above the Carter Administration defense spending seems like drizzle to the troops.

A trillion dollars is the expectation of record spending, however planned over the span of this spartan President's first term of office. All other programs are to be pushed aside while the defense spending spews forth during 1983-85.

In the meantime, many will wonder whatever happened to the "Great Omnibus Destiny of Terrific" economic growth guaranteed by the presence of the Reagan Administration. All taxes cut will have benefited the haves, while budget cuts harm the more than half the rest of the country.

Cuts in social security checks are not approve reproach of the Reagan Administration, with future retirements delayed for three more years until age 68 from 65. While these senior citizens and others who voted for Mr. Reagan wait for "GODOT" from the White House, 75-year-old Nobel Laureate playwright Samuel Beckett, must be chucking to himself. Mr. Beckett's play "Waiting for Godot," has no beginning or end; people just wait; "Godot" does not come.

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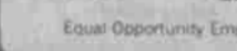
