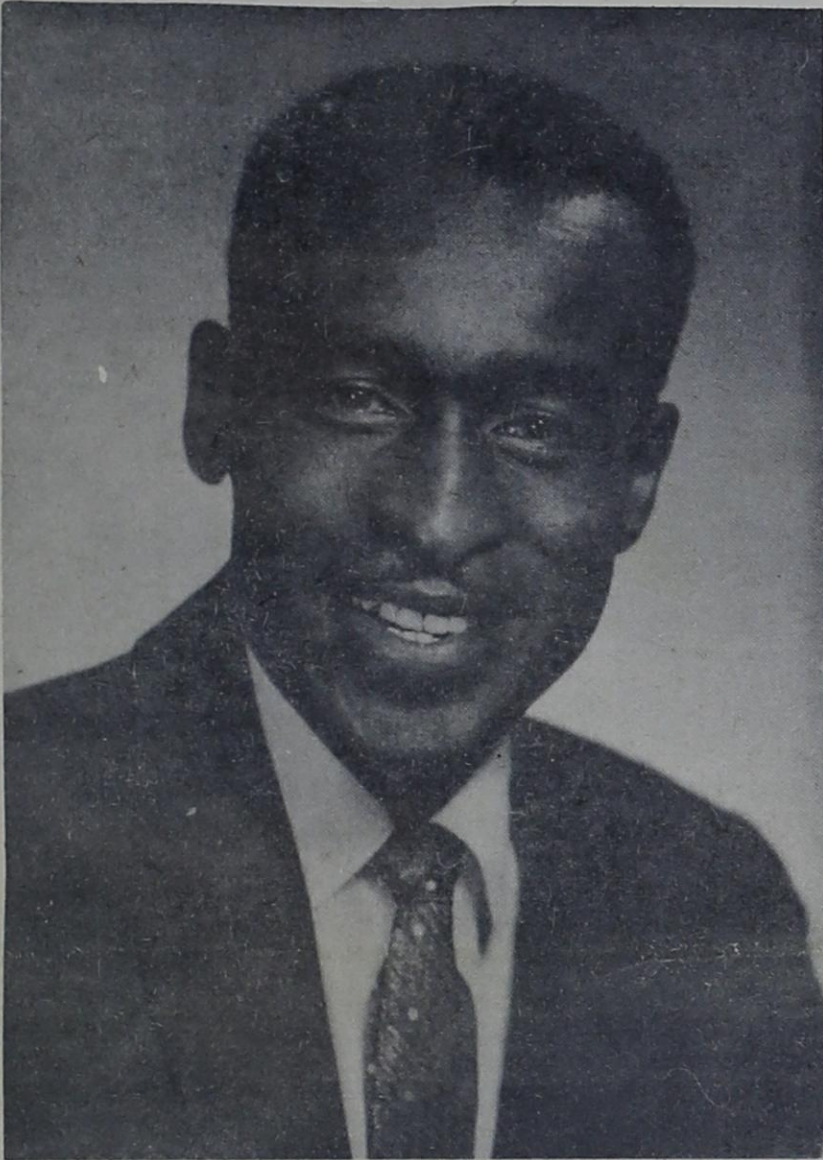

Mallory Named Basketball Coach of Year

Ernest P. Mallory, head basketball coach since 1950 at Dunbar High School, was named coach of the year in Class AA basketball. He was picked by the Quarterback Club of Houston.

Coach Mallory is invited to attend a banquet in Houston at Texas Southern University on April 16, along with other coaches who were chosen in basketball, baseball, football and track honors. Mr. E. P. Mallory gained the right to represent the district by defeating Midland in a sudden death playoff game after both schools ended in a tie. Then his Dunbar Panthers went on to win the state championship at P. V. College. Out of the twelve years coaching at Dunbar his teams have won 5 district titles and have won 4 state championships in 5 trips to Prairie View. His team won the state in 1952, lost their first game to Orange in 1955-56 and won again in 1956-57 with two never to be forgotten players, Ola Dean Chew and Jimmie Peppers; won again in 1959-60 and 1961-62.

Mr. Mallory attended grammar school and high school in San Diego, California, before finishing his college work in Samuel Huston College, Austin. His mother lives in New York. He is married and he and his wife, Vernice, have 3 children. They all reside at 2506 Date Ave.

Clarence A. Laws Speaks to Crowd at New Hope Sunday

Clarence A. Laws, regional secretary of the NAACP, in an address at the New Hope Baptist Church, urged the citizens of Lubbock to accept the responsibility of first class citizens. He pointed out the major

issued facing the Negro today in a changing society.

Mr. Laws also cleared up the thought of a two branch city and urged cooperation with the officers of the local branch. Music was furnished by the choirs from the Mt. Vernon Methodist, New Hope Baptist and Rising Star Baptist Churches. Ministers serving on program were Rev. C. Stanley, Rev. C. H. Hubbard and the local president, Rev. M. T. Reed. Many other ministers were present.

Clarence A. Laws is Southwest Regional Secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Laws is a native of Louisiana and a resident of New Orleans. He is a graduate of Straight College, now Dillard University of New Orleans. He is a Catholic and has membership in the Knights of Peter Claver and the Holy Name Society. He is a charter member of the New Orleans Chapter of the Catholic Interracial Council.

Prior to coming to the NAACP on March 15, Laws had been employed as Executive Secretary of the National Urban League and as Public Relations Director of the Louisiana Weekly Publishing Company.

Laws has been associated with a number of successful undertakings designed to improve the economic, political and welfare betterment of Negroes.

During the Little Rock school integration, Laws was advisor to Mrs. L. C. Bates, NAACP leader of that city. In 1958, he led the action which was integration of the public schools at Van Buren, Arkansas. He represented the National
