Welcome for Dunbar Panthers Shown Sunday

Panthers Win State Crown

Prairie View (Special)--The Dunbar Panthers came from behind in the last three minutes to down Galena Park of Houston, 63-52, and capture the State AA championship here Saturday.

With less than three minutes to go in the final quarter, the Panthers trailed Galena Park, 47-42. Willie Haynes popped a jump shot and was fouled on the play. He sank the free throw and Dunbar pulled to within two points of Galena Park, 47-45.

Charles Hawkins, Joe McWilliams and Haynes connected on free throws as Galena Park tightened up, and from then on it was Dunbar all the way.

Several hundred Lubbock fans gathered at Dunbar High School gym Sunday afternoon in a city wide welcome to the victorious Dunbar Panthers who won the State championship at Prairie View Saturday morning

one hard struggle with their opponent.

Among the welcome committee was Supt. Nat Williams and director of the athletic department. Some of the fans demonstrated uncontrollable joy as the champions arrived.

Two KSEL mobile units met the boys on the outskirts of town along with other cars and escorted them in.

Some of the players were carried in bodily by the fans. Dinner was prepared for them and much pleasure was had.
