## Gamblin Brings In First Cotton For Earth Trade Area September 15

The first bale of cotton for the 1965 season grown in the Earth trade area was ginned at the Campbell Cotton Gin, Inc., at 5 p. m. last Wednesday, September 15.

The first load of cotton for the 1965 season grown in the Earth trade area was ginned at the Campbell Cotton Gin Inc., at 5:00 p. m. last Wednesday, September 15.

The load of cotton grown by C. P. Gamblin, weighed 2,150 pounds and ginned out at 520 pounds, yielding 1,000 pounds of seed.

Gamblin received the premium price of 50¢ a pound for his cotton, and \$50 a ton for his seed. In addition to this, his cotton was ginned free of charge. B. Campbell, owner of the gin, does this each year as a courtesy to the farmer growing the first bale.

For five consecutive years, the Campbell Cotton Gin Inc., has ginned the first bale grown in the Earth Trade Territory. Gamblin said pickers began Wednesday morning in his field located 3 1/2 miles north

of the Campbell Gin, and gathered the load from a four acre plot in his field of approximately 23 acres.

In preparing his land prior to planting, he fertilized with Western Ammonia 11-37-0 using 127 pounds an acre. Following the planting of his Gregg seed on April 26, he again fertilized his crop, this time using 126 pounds an acre of Anhydrous Ammonia purchased from Western Ammonia. He irrigated the cotton crops twice.

Mr. Gamblin has more cotton ready for picking, but recent rains slowed down the harvest.

Crops all over the area look real good, and grain harvest, which began approximately 3 weeks ago, should resume after a few warm dry days. If favorable weather conditions continue for the next 2 or 3 weeks, cotton harvest should get into full swing.

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## IMMUTABLE LAW

The New York Times recently carried a story on New Zealand, where an all-embracing welfare state has been established. For example, unemployment and extreme poverty have been eliminated and adequate housing, health service and education are available to all.

The story then says "Yet few visiting Americans are satisfied with what they see. They complain of poor service, of a take-it-or-leave-it attitude toward work when other jobs are readily available, of a lack of competitiveness and what they regard as an air of backwardness compared to the United States."

This caused The Wall Street Journal to observe "The point is simply that any society deliberately fashioned in the framework of governmental gratuities for everything from planting wheat to painting water colors is bound to grow mediocre or worse. That is practically an immutable law, whether the people concerned are New Zealanders, Swedes, Russians, Britons or Americans, and it should not be particularly difficult to see why..."

Everyone favors the elimination of poverty and of human distress and misery in all its forms. In this endeavor, government inevitably plays a role. The problem is how to help those who truly need help without sapping the initiative, the independence and the ambition of vast masses of people. When that happens, national decadence and decline must follow, no matter how great any country's material wealth may be.

## Tower Shows Texas Economy Expanding Under Right-To-Work Law

Many Texans have written to me in support of the Texas Right-to-Work law. I continue to believe that Texas has gained a great deal under its present system permitting freedom of choice about union membership. Both labor and management have benefited as our state has out-paced non-right-to-work states in many vital growth areas. Here are some examples:

Obviously, the economy of Texas has expanded at a greater rate than the average of non-right-to-work states. And this has happened in an atmosphere of relative labor-management harmony. I would like to see this progress continue.

Right-to-Work means a man is free to become an active, dues-paying union member if this is in his best interest. Right-to-Work means he also is free not to join a union if he feels that is best. This is the way of free men. It should continue to be the way of Texans.

We should not any more make a man join a union to hold his job than we would force him to work for a specific firm, if he wants a job.

Because of our Right-to-Work law, we have a better state, better unions, more jobs, and better labor-management relations.

I will be taking a major part in the extended debate by which we will defend in the Senate the right to work. I am a team captain in this effort, and Texans may be assured that a strong, determined fight will be made to preserve the right to work.

- Convenient Care for Ammo**  
New plastic cigarette packs make an ammunition case that is just the right size to hold nine .30/06 shells in your pocket and keeps them from rattling.
- Netting the 'Hoppers**  
Cheesecloth about six feet by four feet makes a handy gadget for catching grasshoppers. Let two men hold the cloth... one at each end... and make a quick pass through tall grass. Jumping 'hoppers will hit the cloth and get stuck there.
- Solves Sticky Worm Problem**  
Store plastic worms in small plastic bags, individually. This prevents them from sticking together in the tackle box.
- Protects Trailer Hitch Ball**  
To prevent the trailer hitch on your boat trailer from corrosion during the winter lay-up, slit a tennis ball almost in half and slip it over the hitch ball. Aluminum foil bunched around the hitch ball is almost as good.
- Scrubbing Brightens Lures**  
Take an old toothbrush, a dish of hot soapy water, and scrub down those plugs, spoons, and feathered lures occasionally. It makes 'em bright as new.
- Deepfreeze Ice Before Trip**  
If you want a block of ice to last longer in camp, put it in your deepfreeze a couple of days before leaving home. It will last twice as long because you've lowered its temperature and it gives off more cold.
- Varnishing the Rod**  
When refinishing your fishing rod, remember that a pipe cleaner is just the right size to varnish under the guides where small brushes won't reach.
- Talcum Treat Your Lures**  
Before putting your tackle away for a long time, sprinkle talcum powder over the artificial baits. By absorbing all moisture the powder keeps rust to a minimum. First toss of lure overboard next spring washes away all signs of powder.
- Drinking Cup for Dog**  
If you're on a hunting trip and want to water your dog, but have no container, try using a hubcap of your car as a saucer. Works swell. Always handy.
- Cleaning Rod Handles**  
To clean grips on fishing rods, use a good cleanser and a pad of soft steel wool. It does the job fast.
- Refrigerating Hoppers**  
Before taking a supply of grasshoppers fishing, try putting them in the refrigerator overnight. They'll be loggy, less likely to escape and easier to put the hook. A few minutes of sunshine restores their bounce.

### "School Day" At Lubbock Fair Is Set For Monday

More than 300 South Plains and eastern New Mexico schools are receiving 106,000 free admission tickets to the Panhandle South Plains Fair, officials said today.

"Area School Day" will be observed on September 27, opening day of the fair. At that time, more than three dozen area high school bands will be in Lubbock to participate in the annual "Parade of Bands," which officially opens the fair.

Fair officials said livestock entries are arriving daily and a new record has already been set in swine competition. More than 20 workmen are busy readying the grounds and facilities.

Times also have been announced for free demonstration flights of Bell Aerosystem's Rocket Belt. The exhibitions will be presented at 2, 4 and 10:15 p. m. on September 27 and at 3, 5 and 10:15 p. m. September 28-29.

The Rocket Belt is believed to be the only workable one-man propulsion system in the world and comes to Lubbock after a series of successful demonstrations from coast-to-coast in the United States, from Canada to Mexico, and in France and Brazil.

Other features of the fair include the return of "Holiday On

Ice," NASA models of the Gemini space capsule and Lunar Excursion Module, industrial arts and hobby shows, wildlife and Navy missile displays, special kiddie rides and the popular parachute jump. Record-breaking attendance of 250,000 is expected.

| 1/2 tsp. salt                      | 1/2 cup melted butter or margarine |
| 1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg             | 1/2 cup sugar                      |
| 1/2 cup sugar                      | 1/2 cup shortening                 |
| 1 egg, beaten                      | 1 tsp. cinnamon                    |

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, nutmeg and 1/2 cup sugar. Cut in shortening until mixture is fine. Mix together egg, milk and apple, add all at once to dry ingredients and mix quickly but thoroughly. Fill greased 2 1/2 x 1 1/4 inch muffin tins 3/4 full. Bake in 350 degree moderate oven 20 or 30 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pans; immediately roll donuts in melted butter and then in cinnamon and sugar that have been mixed together. Serve warm.

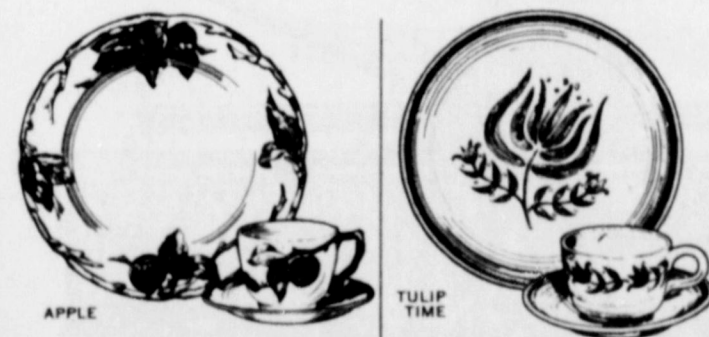

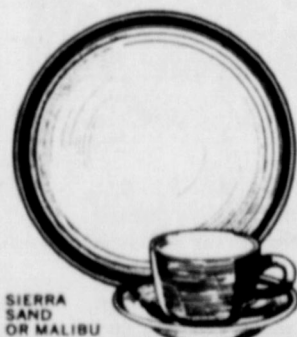

## Research Foundation Has Record Attendance At Annual Field Day

A record breaking attendance of 6,500 turned out for the 9th Annual Field Day of the High Plains Research Foundation.

Four foreign countries and eighteen states and Washington, D.C. were represented at the Field Day. Forty-five out of state communities and 184 Texas communities were included in the registration. Foreign countries represented were Portugal, Turkey, Pakistan, and Iran. Attendance was the largest in the 9 years history of the Field Days at the Foundation's Research farm at Halfway.

The highlight of the day was the announcement of the new short-season soybean named PATTERSON in honor of Virgil Patterson, Vice Chairman of the Foundation's Board of Trustees and Chairman of the Board of the First National Bank in Amarillo.

The new PATTERSON soybean will be available for release to farmers after harvest this year. It is of especial interest to farmers in the North Plains as a second crop with harvest early enough to permit planting of wheat and as a catch crop in the South Plains when weather conditions prevent replanting of cotton or grain sorghum.

A special gift to the Foundation to augment the irrigation system was announced. Valley Manufacturing Company donated a complete sprinkler irrigation system worth \$10,000.00.

Certain-Treed Products Co.

contributed the asbestos cement pipe necessary for the system. Materials were obtained with the help of the Shur-Gro Irrigation Equipment Co.

Large trucks were busy all afternoon transporting the visitors over the research farm to the four stops. Guides on each truck were professional agriculture representatives of the Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, and Farmers Home Administration.

The farm and ranch equipment display had thirty-seven firms with the latest in farm equipment and machinery. A large number of visitors were present at this area all afternoon.

Visitors were treated to a barbecue given by the Hale County State Bank and the Plainview Co-Op-Compress and served by the area Lions Clubs.

The evening program started with a musical program by the Plainview Barbershop chorus. Dr. Oliver Wilham, President of Oklahoma State University, was the Field Day speaker. His address on the need for continuous agricultural research and the future prospects of agriculture was well received by the guests of the Foundation.

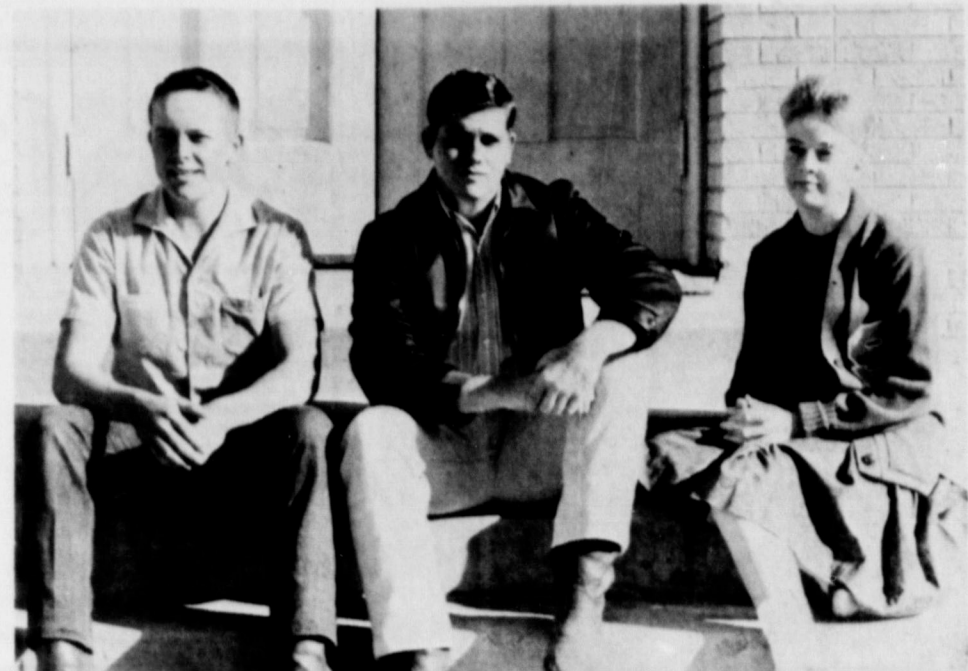



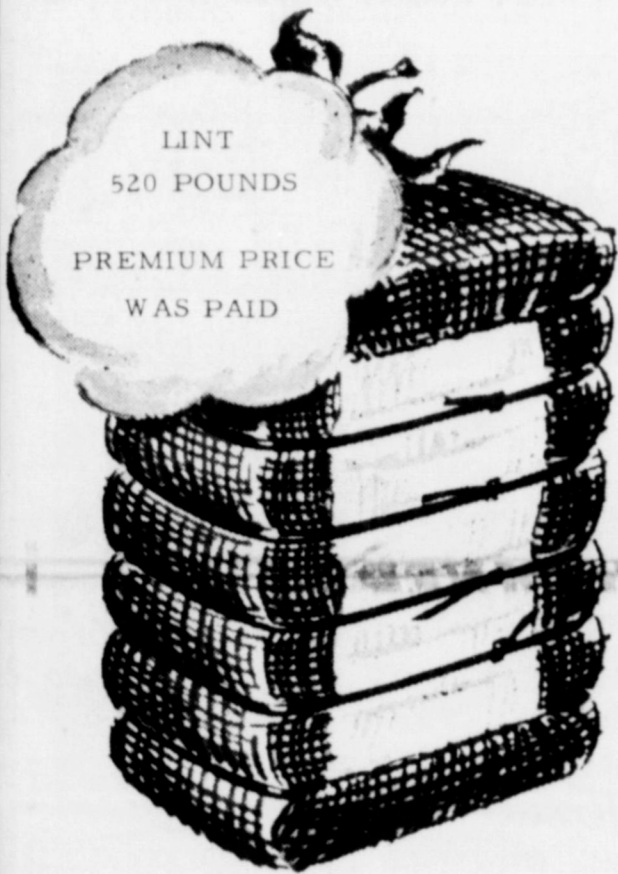

After all the penalties, the Wolverines held the Mustangs to 49 yards rushing, while completing a total of 149 yards for themselves.

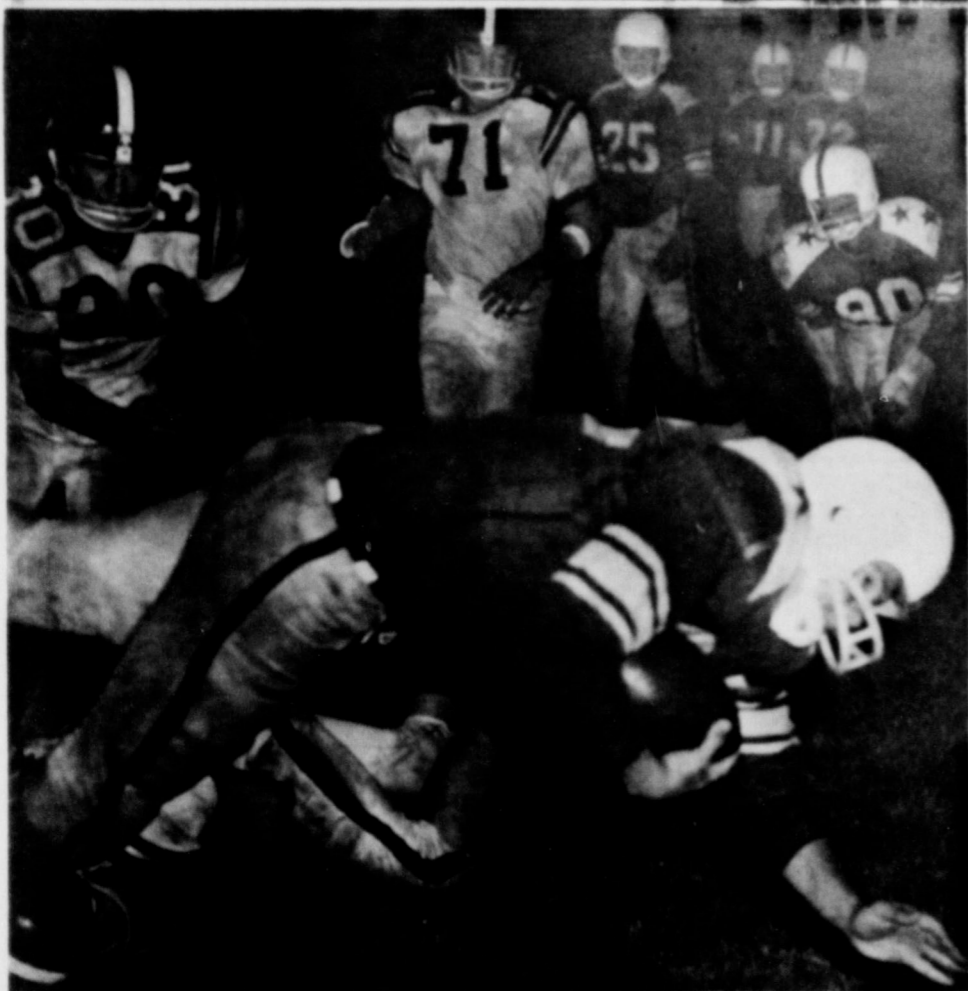
This week the Wolverines play ball on their home field, entertaining Roosevelt. The local squad will be trying for their fourth victory in a row.

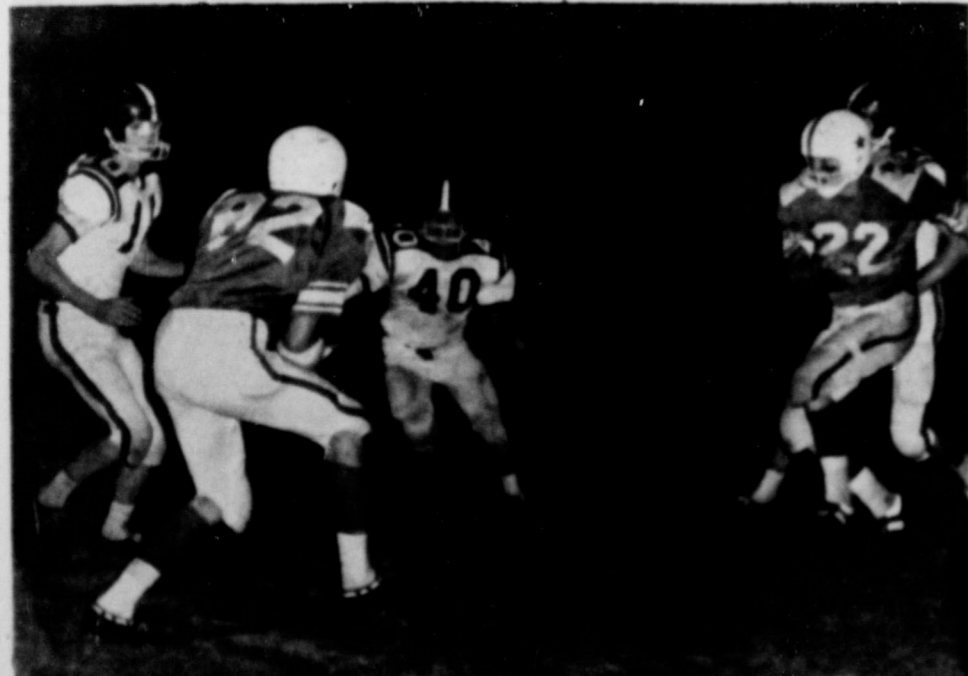
## 7th Grade Wins 16-6; 8th Grade Loses 24-0

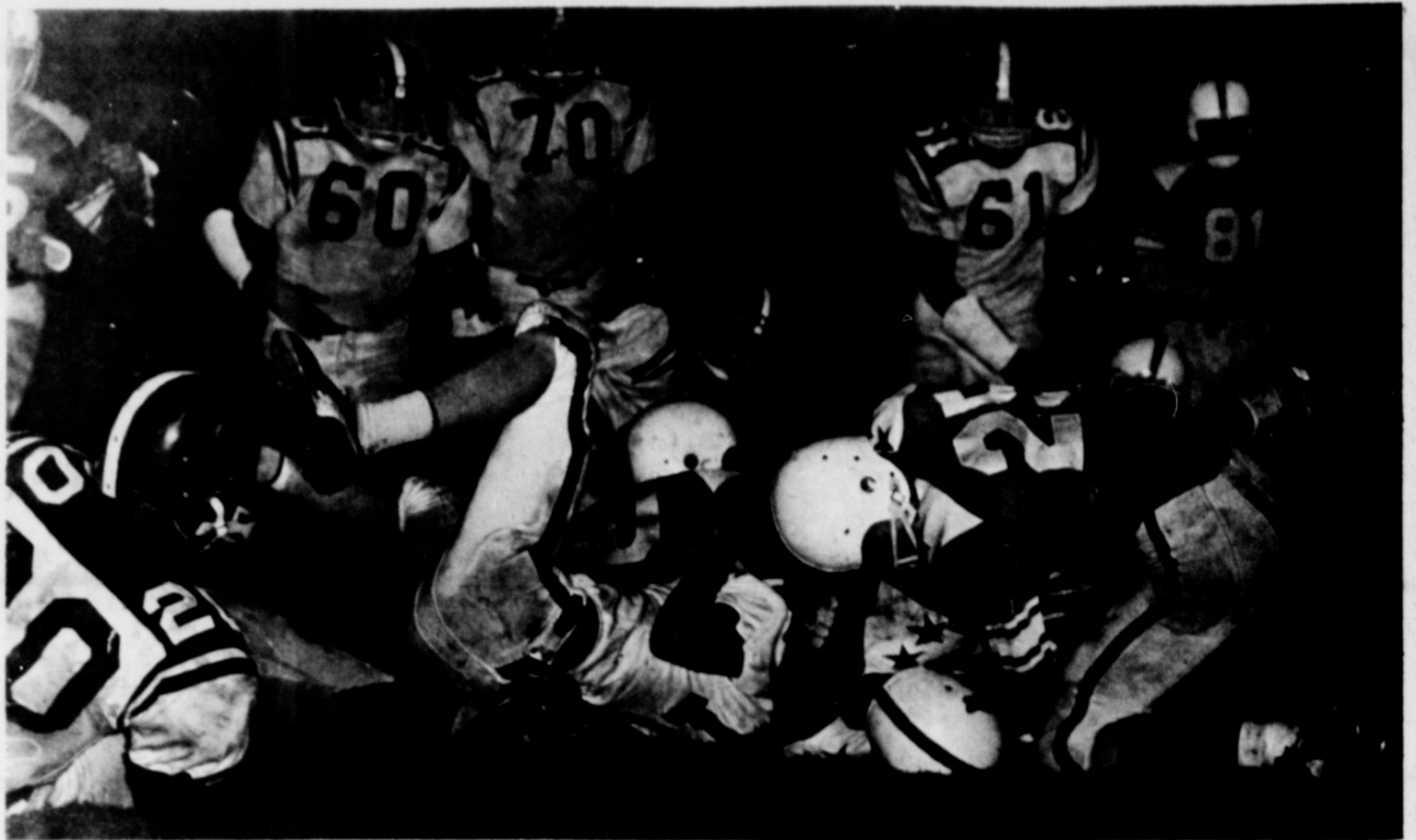
The Eighth Grade Wolverines, according to Coach Earl McKinley, played a good game, even though they were short several players, with the Muleshoe Mules winning with a 24-0
