## Field Day Demonstration Of MM G1000 Set For 2 P. M. Friday

A Field Day Demonstration is slated to begin at 2 p. m. Friday, February 4 to show the new and powerful G1000 Minneapolis-Moline Tractor.

Houston Stephens, owner-manager of Stephens, and Sons Farm Equipment Company said the Demonstration would take place on the Truman Stone Farm 4 miles West, one North, and 1/2 mile West of Earth.

## Poll Tax Count Unavailable At Press Time

Herbert Dunn, Lamb County Tax Assessor-Collector said Wednesday morning that the books of poll tax receipts sold in Amihiers, Earls, Otron, Springlake and Sudan had not been picked up from these towns and tabulated as yet, but in the Littlefield tax office a total of 3,166 had been sold.

Dunn made a guess that the figure would rise to 4,000 or over, when all the receipts had all been tabulated. In Earth the Poll tax receipts sold were 348 with an additional 35 sold in Springlake. This of course does not give the number of qualified voters in the Earth-Springlake area, as many of the area pay their poll tax at the county office.

Dunn said the final count for Lamb County would be available Thursday afternoon or Friday, but he did not expect it to be as large as in 1965 when the county sold 5,896 poll tax.

## RETAIN STATE CONTROL

For more than thirty years, the individual states and the federal government have worked amicably together to provide the best equitable method of operating the unemployment compensation systems.

Now the Congress is considering legislation H.R. 8282 which would greatly revamp our national unemployment compensation program. It would shift control of unemployment benefit policies from the state legislatures to the Congress.

The proposed legislation would: 1. Establish a permanent system of federal extended benefits. 2. More than double the wage base on which the unemployment payroll tax is levied and would also increase the tax rate. 3. Set the stage for the abandonment of experience rating. 4. Establish federal benefit standards that would disrupt state laws and dictate benefit levels. 5. Force all states (after a maximum of six weeks' postponement) to pay regular benefits to people who quit their jobs voluntarily, who are fined for misconduct or who refuse suitable jobs. 6. Provide federal grants to encourage greater state spending for benefit liberalization. These proposed changes would federalize the effectively operating state unemployment compensation systems.

The added burden on the industrial community would hinder its ability to provide the necessary economic growth and new job opportunities. In fact, rather than sustain jobs it could destroy them.

## Earth Volunteer Firemen Answer 20 Calls in 1965

Billie Robnett, secretary treasurer of the Earth Volunteer Fire Department said the department answered 20 fire alarms in and out of the Earth city limits during 1965.

Eight of these fires answered were in the city limits, 12 out of the city limits, and no false alarms were turned in. City Fire Marshall, Clarence Hazlett stressed that it is a violation to turn in a false alarm, punishable by state law.

Robnett described the 1965 fires, classifying them into the following categories, three fires in homes, three automobile fires, two pick-up fires, one truck fire, one tractor fire, four storage house fires, one business firm fire, three grass fires, one fence fire, and one garage fire.

Fire practice in Earth is conducted each 2nd and 4th Monday night. Each fireman is required to attend 2 practices drills a month, or 24 practices within the year, according to Robnett.

The following equipment was purchased for the Earth Volunteer Fire Department in 1965 in order to bring it up to current State standards: a double female adapter, size 4 1/2 inches by 4 inches double female adapter 4 1/2 inches by 4 1/2 inches, three 2 1/2 inch adjustable spray nozzles 250 GPM akron PQ,

three 2 1/2 inch shut-off nozzles 95 GPM QDQ, two 1 inch tips, three 1 1/8 inch tips, three 1 1/2 inch tips, and 2 1/2 inch cellar nozzle approximately 500 GPM, two gas masks, two 24 unit fire department first aid kits, three adjustable hydrant wrenches, a 2 1/2 inch double male adapter, two 2 1/2 inch Siamese connections, two 2 1/2 inch Wye connections, two hose clamps, and two Cooper type hose jackets.

Other equipment purchased was dry chemical extinguishers, battery charger, remote fire alarms, 2-way radio, 2 1/2 inch new hose, and 2 1/2 inch repaired hose.

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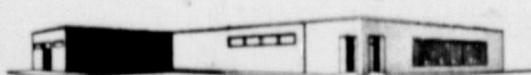

## Funeral Services Held For Borden Price

Panhandle young people lost a good friend Sunday with the death of Oscar Borden Price, coach, athlete, and teacher.

Mr. Price died on a plane enroute from Buffalo, N.Y., to Amarillo. He had been a patient at Roswell Park Memorial Institute.

Borden was born September 7, 1916, at Willow, Oklahoma. He was married January 16, 1943 in San Angelo to Miss Imogene Davis of Turkey. He came to Canyon in 1937 as a student, having been graduated from Springlake High School,

Borden Price was an outstanding basketball player when the West Texas State roster was star-studded.

He was a varsity letterman on both the football and basketball teams at W. T. during his college career. He served as captain of the Buffalo basketball team in 1941. His team played in some top national competition.

He left school in 1942 to enter the Air Force. He was a bombardier-navigator during the war and held the rank of first lieutenant.

Mr. Price was an Air Force hero during the war. He was awarded the Air Medal and the Distinguished Flying Cross, one of the nation's ranking military decorations.

He won the DFC through conspicuous bravery during a bombing attack carried out by his bombing group against Japan. A bomb became jammed in his plane's bomb bay and could not be ejected.

Mr. Price climbed into the bomb bay without a parachute and chopped the bomb loose with an ax, finally ejecting and thereby saving his plane and possibly the lives of his fellow crew members.

On one mission his plane was shot down 20 miles from the Japanese coast. He and his crew were picked up by a friendly submarine.

Borden returned to West Texas State in 1945 and completed his education, receiving a bachelor degree and a masters degree in education.

He was assistant basketball and football coach at WT from 1946 to 1956. He was head Buffalo basketball coach from 1957 through 1959.

At the time of his death, he was a professor of physical education at West Texas State U.

Borden was devoted to his community and his church. He served Canyon First Presbyterian Church as a deacon and an elder. He was active in Boy Scout work and was a past member of the Randall District Scout committee.

He worked the swimming program at West Texas State for many years and operated a swimming pool there during summer months.

He taught many Canyon youngsters to swim and was a favorite of children who knew him.

Borden was a member of Phi Epsilon Kappa, physical education fraternity. He also was a member of the Southern Basketball Officiating Association.

Mr. Price also was a member of the American Physical Education and Recreation Association, Texas Health Physical Education and Recreation Association, member and sponsor of the T. Club and was the only man in the history of West Texas State to participate in two major collegiate sports for three years. He maintained a high grade average along with his athletic participation.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon in First Presbyterian Church, Officiating was Rev. John Lars Hamerson, minister. Burial was in Dreamland Cemetery under direction of LaGrone Funeral Home.

Active pallbearers include Hatcher Brown, Gus Miller, Aubrey Crossland, Riley Troth, Frank Kimbrough and Boudy Pospisil.

Honorary pallbearers include members of the Presbyterian Church session, Virgil Henson, Dr. J. A. Hill, Wallace Clark, L. L. Hix, Dr. J. B. Roberts, Everett Walker, Dr. L. F. Sheffield, Dr. Robert Jarrett, Mitchell Jones and Milton Morris.

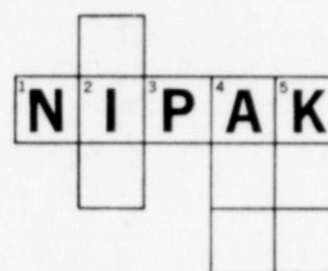

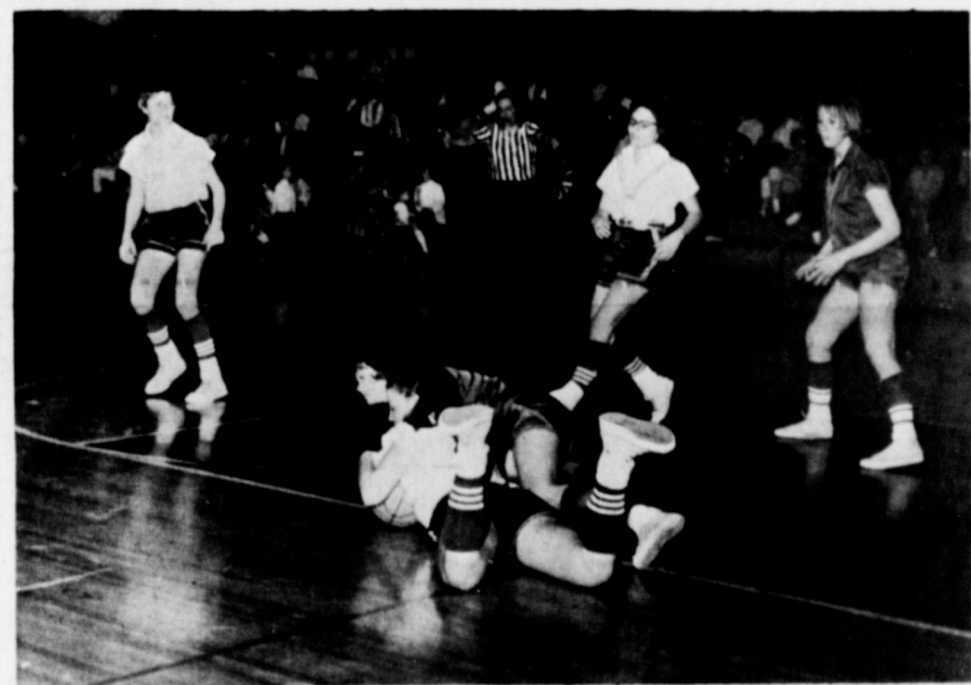

## Hi-Plains Research Foundation To Host Skip-Row Meeting

The High Plains Research Foundation will host an open meeting on the results of skiprow interplanting on Thursday, February 10, 1966 at 10:00 A.M. at the Hale County Exhibition Building, located on U.S. Highway 87 just south of Plainview.

Many farmers are becoming more interested in the High Plains Foundation Farming System. This system of planting two rows of cotton, skip one row, two rows of grain sorghum or castor beans, the skip one row, and back to two rows of cotton, has proven to increase quality and yields of the interplanted crops and save from 20 to 50 per cent of the water necessary to make the crop. The Foundation has completed eight years of extensive research in perfecting this system of farming. It has been used successfully by farmers during the past four years.

Mr. David will answer questions for the farmers and explain just how the Foundation Farming System will fit into the new farm program. 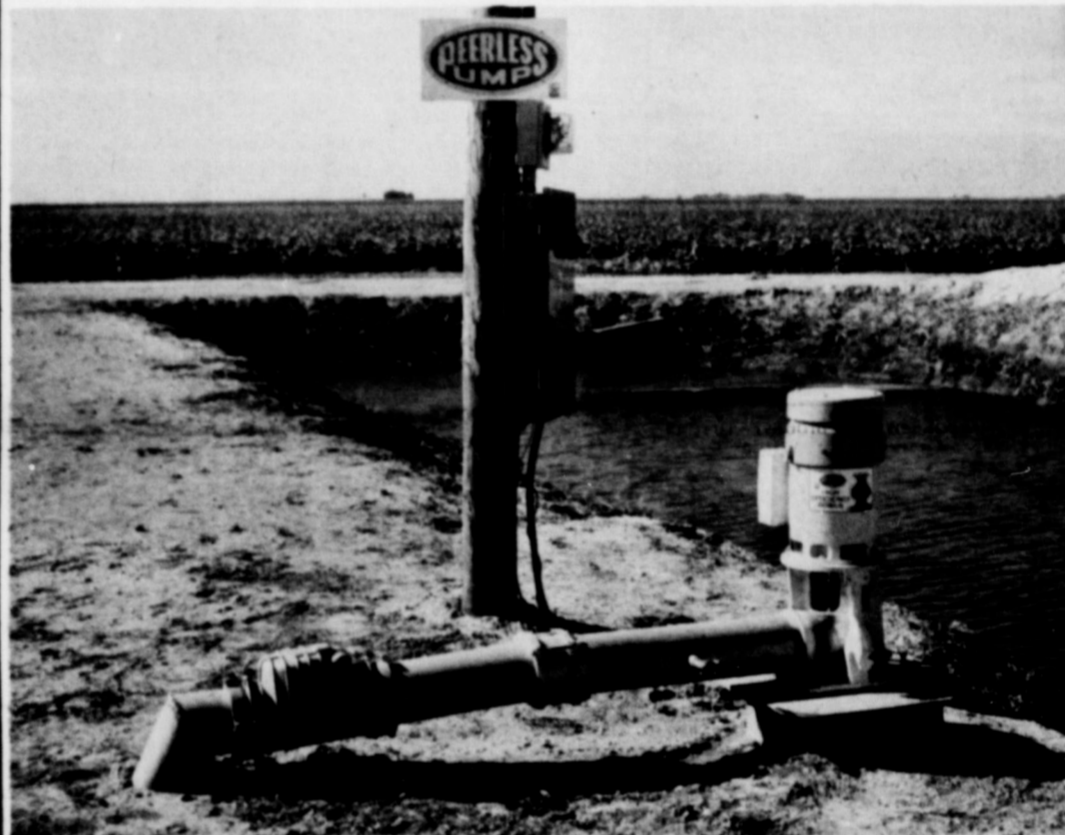
