

News - Sun To Take On New Look Next Week

To keep abreast with progress in this area, and to give the trade territory the very best Hometown Newspaper possible to produce, the Earth News-Sun after eight years of publication on a letter press, will make the vast change - over to Offset Printing, beginning with next week's issue, October 18.

This will be a dream come true for several of the local merchants who have long wanted their advertisements printed in color. This we, will now be able to do, with and additional charge for a special ink and additional process involved in color printing.

There has been nothing spared in selecting equipment for this new and better paper for this area.

Some of our new equipment, arrived Monday. This will be installed Sunday by a representative from the A. E. Heinsohn Co. of Denver.

Monday and Tuesday will be openhouse for newspaper folks wishing to see this new machine in operation. The News-Sun is pioneering the Typositor machine as there is only one other of its kind in the Plains area.

The waxer, Photo Rite and 1 BM typewriters are forthcoming and should arrive in time for use in producing next week's issue.

Control of the News-Sun will remain in the local hometown office where all the work of producing the newspaper will still be done with the exception of the presswork, which for the present time will be done by the Plains Publishers, Inc. at Friona Texas.

This will of course necessitate a deadline for news, pictures and advertising copy, as our finished pages, made-ready for the press run must arrive in Friona early Wednesday evening in order for the presswork to be completed so that the News-Sun can maintain its Thursday publication date.

Deadlines are as follows, advertising copy must be in the office by 2 p.m. Tuesday. Society news must be in by 4 p.m. Tuesday and front page news will be taken until noon Wednesday except in emergency cases. Pictures must be in by Tuesday, 5 p.m.

There are numerous advantages in offset printing as well as various disadvantages.

1. better pictures - The News-Sun personnel has long tried to produce good clear pictures, but had no control over the reproduction of engravings made elsewhere, and with offset printing there will be no engravings used.

2. Sharp Print - Offset at its best can produce a cleaner sharper print. This will give our subscribers and advertisers a sharp clear print.

3. Advertising copy - We will now be able to give merchants a greater variety of type sizes for advertisements. We can also use clear sharp pictured illustrations from various publications instead of using only mats.

4. Increase circulation - With the beauty of sharp pictures, good print and prettier advertisements, it is expected that the circulation will climb upward within the next few weeks at a fast pace.

Cecil Meadows Resigns As Pastor Of Local Church

Rev. Cecil Meadows, whose resignation as pastor of the Earth First Baptist Church is due next week will assume the pastorate of the Shady Grove Baptist Church at Grand Prairie, October 21.

Rev. Meadows became pastor of the Earth church September 1, 1954 and during the eight years of his pastorate here, a total of 548 members were added to the church roll among which 215 joined by Baptism.

Many accomplishments have been reached during this time. A modern cabin was built at the Plains Assembly, property and a church for the colored brethren, was bought, property and church for Latin-Americans acquired, with a full time student preacher from Wayland College for each Sunday service and property was purchased east of the church for its own expansion. A new \$25,000 parsonage is the pride of the church and community.

He served as Lions Club president in 1960-61 and has held various offices in the club. He attended the Lions International Convention in Chicago in June, 1960.

Rev. Meadows has been actively engaged in civic projects and has served on many fund raising projects.

Serving as Sunday School Superintendent for eight years, the Llanos Altos Association, he was elected to serve for the ninth year.

For two years he was leader of District IX Vacation Bible Schools and succeeded in helping the district attain first place among 17 districts composed of ten counties and 196 churches in the state.

Pastorates he has held since Seminary days are six years at England, Ark., three years at San Saba, Tex., six years at Rochester, Tex. and eight years at Earth.

Rev. and Mrs. Meadows and Evelyn will move to Grand Prairie the first of next week, where Evelyn, a senior, will enter high school. Another daughter, Margaret, is a sophomore at Hardin-Simmons University.

Wolverines Take A Squeaker From Memphis 21 - 20

Due to the death of head coach Olin Reddell and his assistant coach in an automobile accident Wednesday night of last week, the game which was scheduled to be played in Idalou Friday night was cancelled. A last minute replacement was selected, in the powerhouse team from Memphis.

The Cyclones from Memphis were a big bunch of boys that outweighed the Wolverines considerably.

Neither team had any idea of what sort of plays would be in effect against them, which made the game even more exciting.

The Wolverines won the flip of the coin and elected to receive. On the opening kickoff the ball was downed on the 28 yard line of Springlake. With lightning precision, the Wolverines turned halfback Jerry Been loose up the

middle of the line, he galloped all the way for a 72 yard touchdown run. Cary Latham's kick for extra point failed and the Wolverines took an early lead.

Jerry Don Sanders kicked off to Memphis and after a couple of first downs, Dwight Gailey, the Memphis quarterback hit James Waits, the big Cyclone end on a beautiful pass that netted Memphis 42 yards and their first touchdown. The Cyclones try for the extra point failed, and again it was a new game, 6-6.

The Wolverines started on the ground with Jerry Been carrying for one yard, Jerry Don Sanders carried for three yards. Finding it rough on the ground, Cary Latham took to the air and on his first pass to Jerry Don Sanders, Wayne Sweatt, the Memphis linebacker, intercepted the pass and went 20 yards for Memphis' second touchdown. A pass play to another big end, Jackie Bridges, was good

and the try for the point was successful. The Cyclones took the lead with 7 minutes 17 seconds left in the first quarter.

Springlake drew several costly penalties and a couple of fumbles really hurt the Wolverines. However they never gave up and Cary Latham finally broke loose on a keeper play that netted eight yards and a touchdown. 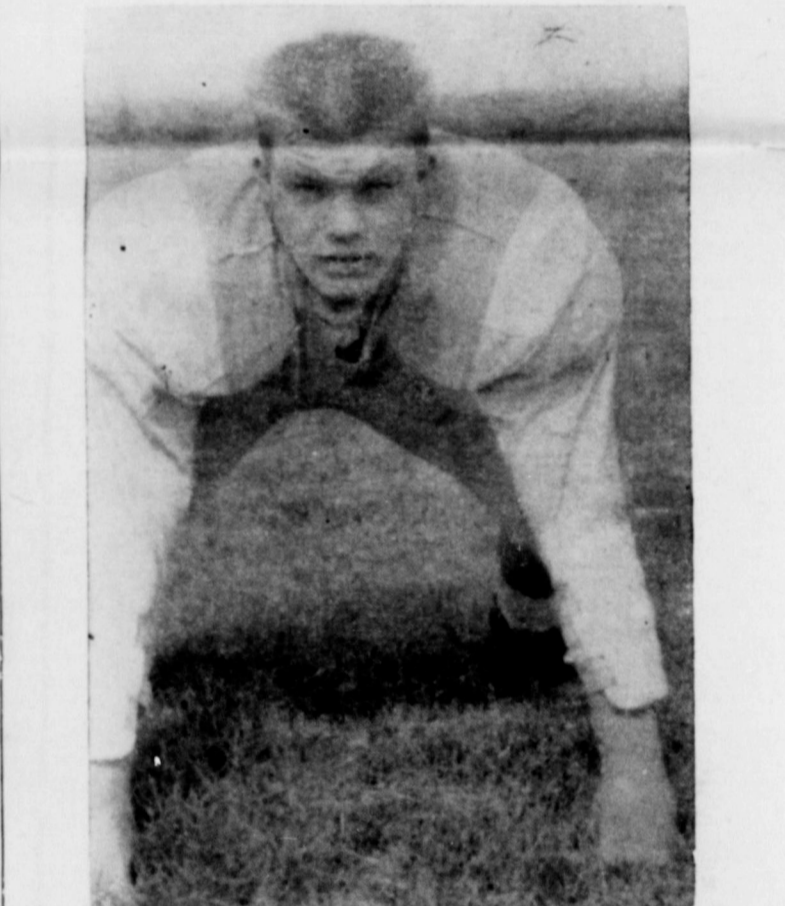

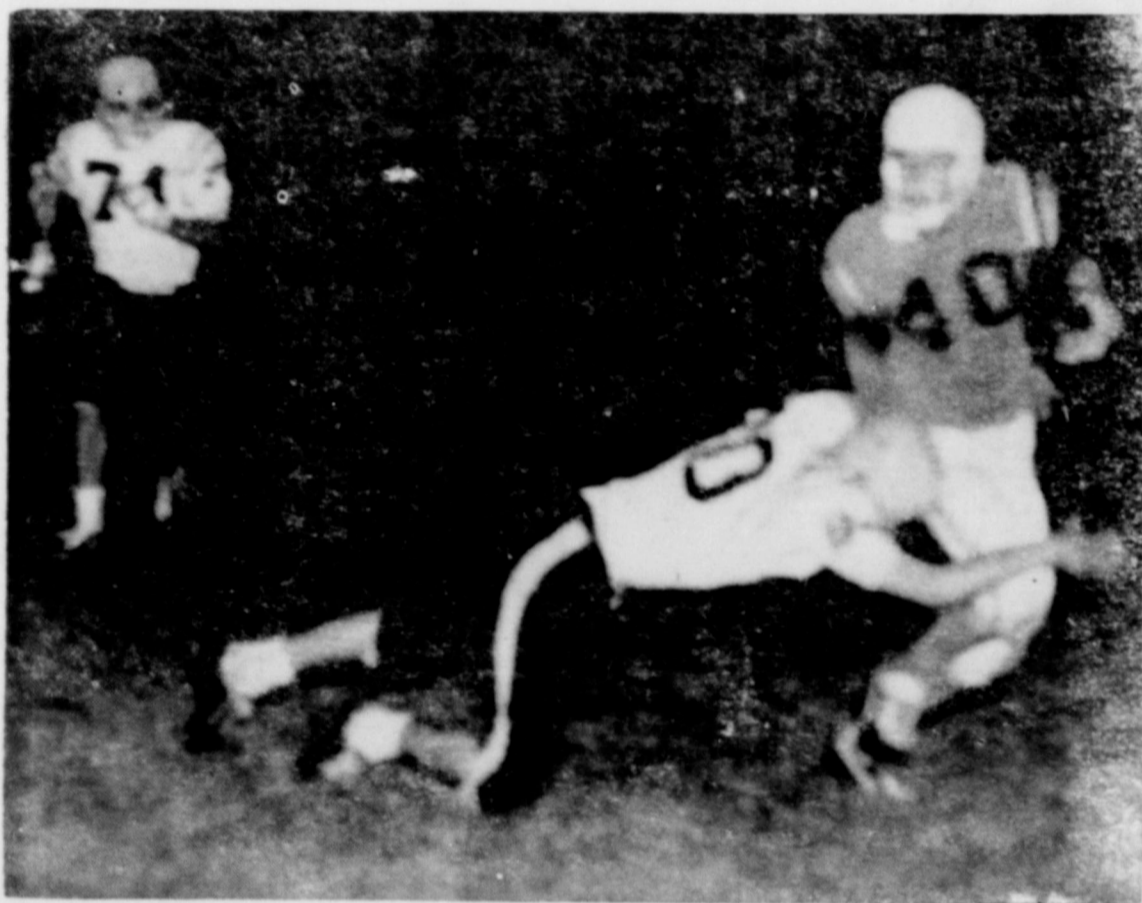

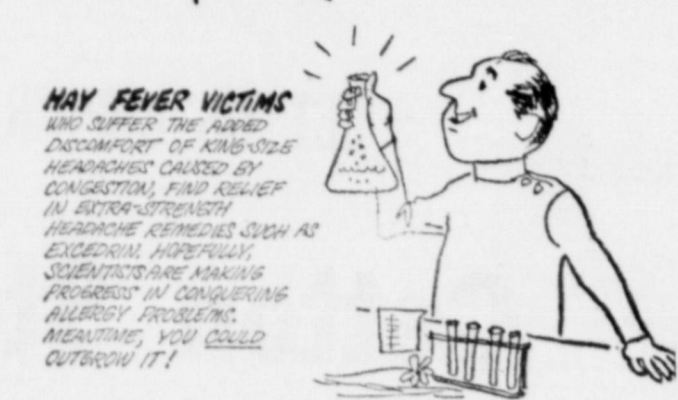
