Homer F. Hodge Dies Sunday In Muleshoe Hospital

Homer Franklin Hodge, 65, died about 10 a. m. Sunday in the West Plains Hospital, Muleshoe.

Born May 9, 1897 at Bellevue Texas, Mr. Hodge resided for a time in Sayre, Oklahoma, prior to moving to Earth in 1929. He was in the general mercantile business in Oklahoma and was formerly in the grocery business in Earth, and also was engaged in farming in the Earth area.

Mr. Hodge was a member of the Masonic Lodge, a 32 Degree Mason, a member of the Scottish Rite Khiva Temple Masons in Amarillo and past patron of the Order of Eastern Star, Earth.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 10:30 a. m. in the Earth First Baptist Church with Rev. Earl Landroop, Baptist minister of Clovis officiating, assisted by Rev. M. B. Baldwin, pastor.

Burial was in the Earth Cemetery under the direction of Singleton Funeral Home, Muleshoe. Masonic services were conducted at graveside.

Tony Barton Competes In Dallas For National Honors

DALLAS--Tony Barton, 9, of Earth, Tex., competed Sunday in the Cotton Bowl in the second annual Punt, Pass and Kick area competition sponsored by the National Football League and the Ford dealers of America.

Tony, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ardis Barton, joined four other Texas boys in the seven-to-eleven age group in a display of punting, passing and place-kicking prowess immediately before and at halftime of the Dallas Cowboys-Cleveland Browns NFL game.

His score and those of the others will be compared with boys of their own ages who competed in 13 other NFL team areas. The top scores will qualify for the Tour of Champions and the show-down competition for national PP&K honors at the NFL championship game.

Tony, an 89-pounder, says he would like to play football later on but has no definite plans. By becoming a state winner in PP&K, he earned his first trip to Dallas and saw his first professional football game.

Tony and the other Texas winners, J. B. Robinson, Jr., 11, of Lancaster; Jimmy Moffett, 10, of Dallas; Dennis Wessels, 8, of Winters, and Ricky Allen McKee, 7, of Sonora, were honored at a banquet Saturday night at the Sheraton-Dallas hotel. There they met some of the Cowboys stars, including quarterback Don Meredith, halfback Don Perkins and end Lee Folkins.

Winners in the various area competition will be picked on the basis of their highest total scores. The scores are computed on the distance and accuracy of their punts, passes and kicks.

Nationally, about 400,000 boys entered the PP&K contest which started out with local contests at Ford dealers.

The list of 70 youngsters who took part in area competitions will be trimmed to 10 for the national finals. The 10 boys will be division winners, five representing the NFL Eastern Division and five the Western Division. Each age group will be represented in each division.

These 10 division winners will then go on a "Tour of Champions" with their fathers and mothers and sponsoring Ford dealers and their wives to the White House and the NFL championship game on Dec. 30.

At the championship game the boys will compete for the national PP&K championship. There will be five national winners--one from each of the age groups. National champions will receive national championship trophies. Runner-up trophies will be awarded to the other five boys.

Commissioners To Award Contract For Sewer Line

The Earth City Commission met Monday night at the City Hall for the regular monthly meeting.

The meeting opened with Mayor Marcus Messer presiding.

A discussion of the public use of the Community Room was held. Plans were made to post a list of instructions on cleaning up the room after use and to designate a place in the room where the key can be hung by the person engaging use of the room. It was pointed out that the door can be locked upon leaving, without the use of a key.

Two sealed bids were opened regarding the contract for additional water and sewer lines north of Earth on the Amherst Highway and the contract was awarded to the low bidder, Messer Construction Co. of Littlefield.

A majority vote agreed upon the installation of a vapor light to be installed in the alley behind the First Baptist Church. The light, at no cost to the city, will be installed on a wood pole by Southwestern Public Service Co. and will be paid for by the church. The church will assume the responsibility of paying the monthly electric bill as the light will be on a separate meter.

An agreement was made to re-imburse City Marshal Clarence Hazlett for shells used in the drive on the dog situation.

Johnny Freudenrich, water superintendent, discussed present meter situation and listed materials needed to bring the meter system up to standard.

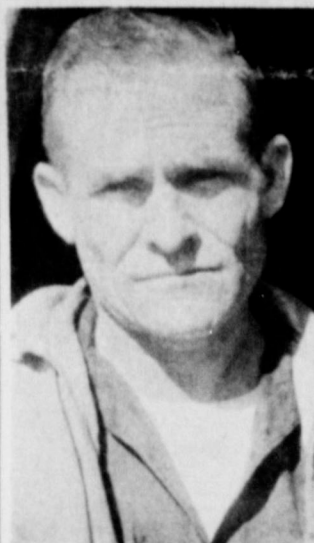

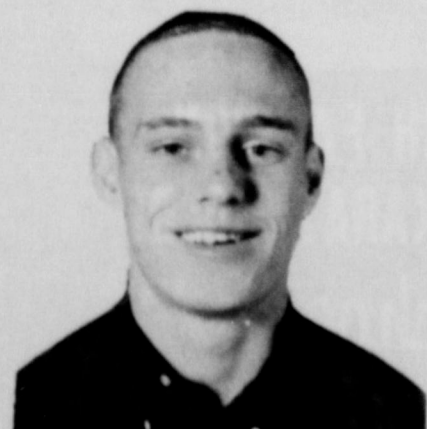
The Wolverines closed the season with a victory over Farwell, resulting in a 5-5-0 record for the year.

Type III Sabin Oral Vaccine Will Not Be Given Sunday

Type III Sabin Oral Vaccine will not be given this Sunday as originally planned by the Earth-Springlake Lions Clubs.

The American Pediatric Association has suggested that Type III not be offered until the Spring of 1963.

Since the incidence of polio is at an extremely low level during the winter months, it is felt that no harm will be done to wait until spring to offer Type 3.

It is also felt that further assurance of safety of Type 3 Sabin Oral Vaccine will be demonstrated. The Surgeon General's Oral Poliomyelitis Vaccine Ad-

visory Committee advised that Type 3 vaccine be restricted to pre-school and school age children and to those adults in high risk groups (those traveling in areas where Type 3 polio epidemic is present and impending). Since the vast majority of polio cases occur among young children and since children are the principal disseminators of the virus, continued intensive immunization programs among the group are clearly indicated. If the group can be adequately immunized, the spread of poliomyelitis will be restricted, if not eventually eradicated.

FISHING LINES

By **DICK WOLFF**

A recent study of marine angling reveals that salt water boat
fishermen catch approximately 75 more fish per man a year than
surf and pier fishermen.

The study also pointed out that by averaging the weights of
all the marine sport fish taken in 1960 — the average fish weighs
2 1/4 pounds. If we're sport fishing for fun and food, the figure
certainly gives a boost to light salt water tackle. For the meat
fisherman who manhandles a 14-pound tuna or a 6-pound yellow-
tail on 3-thread line, a net would get more fish with about as
much fun and satisfaction.

The finest sport fishermen swear that the fun is in the catch-
ing. A couple of hundred yards of 17 pound test monofilament
on a Mitchell salt water spinning reel or an Ambassador 8000
is more than enough to take a 14-pound tuna in 15 minutes
with plenty of thrills and a
feeling of pride.

Fresh water trout and bass
fishermen have given up on
heavy line long ago. Inland
fishing today is done with ultra
light tackle and hair-thin line
to keep the sport in it. It's
about time salt water anglers
earned their fish with techni-
que and not just muscle.



Taken in conjunction with
the 1960 national survey of
fishing and hunting, the study
by Fishery Biologist John F.
Clark estimates the total ma-
rine sport catch in 1960 at 633
million fish weighing over 1.4 billion pounds. To get the figures,
outdoor writers, sport fishing groups, magazines, charter and
party boat operators, conservation agencies, and government and
private marine laboratories were polled.

Clark found that "regular" salt water fishermen caught an
average of 102 fish per year per man. Approximately 369 million
fish were taken by Atlantic coast fishermen, 185 million on
the Gulf Coast, and 79 million by Pacific coast anglers.
