Earth, Springlake farmers were happy over the crop-drenching rains that fell Saturday night and Sunday in the area, although several farmers east of Earth received heavy hail damage.

The welcome rain came following several weeks of dry, hot weather for the South Plains.

Farmers who have been reported as receiving hail were Lynn Glasscock, Allen Gover, Bonnie Green, Kenneth Cowley, Arnold Shelby and Ray Kelley. Hail was also reported north and west of Earth.

Shelby's cotton was reportedly beat up pretty bad from the hail, and Kelley's was reported to be 100% lost.

A new rain gauge at the Lena Hite home showed 4 1/2 inches of rain in that area.

High winds around 2:30 a.m. Sunday, blew the roof off the former Brown-White Equipment building and caved in one side of the wall. The building was used to store new tractors. They were housed in the structure at the time, but received no damage.

U.S. Highway 70, one mile west of Earth was under water from 3 a.m. until about 10 a.m. Sunday.

The rain came at a perfect time, as many cotton farmers had been irrigating for quite some time, and others were preparing to start irrigation. Grain generally was in need of rain. Most of the showers were described as just about right.

Gas Promotion At Earth Gulf Starts Today

The Earth Gulf Station's gas promotion starts today (Thursday) and will last throughout the month of August.

RA Group Attends Camp At Floydada

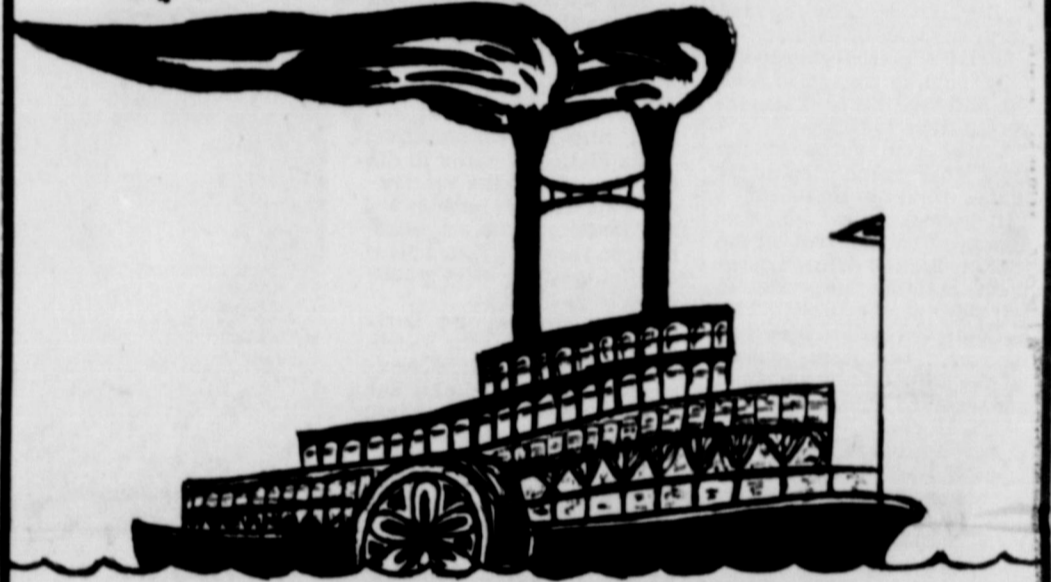

The program includes plant identification, ecology, ranch economics and management, grazing systems, reseeding, noxious plant control, ranch and range planning, and the relationship of wildlife and range management. 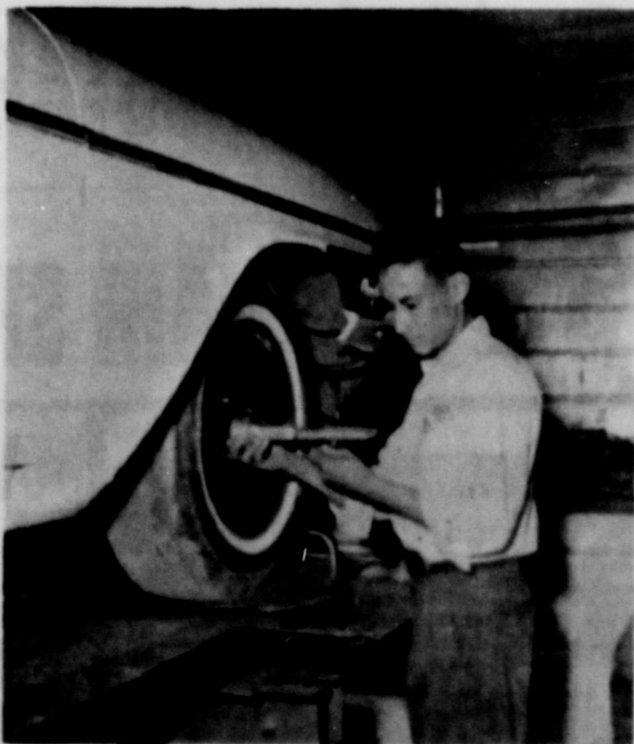
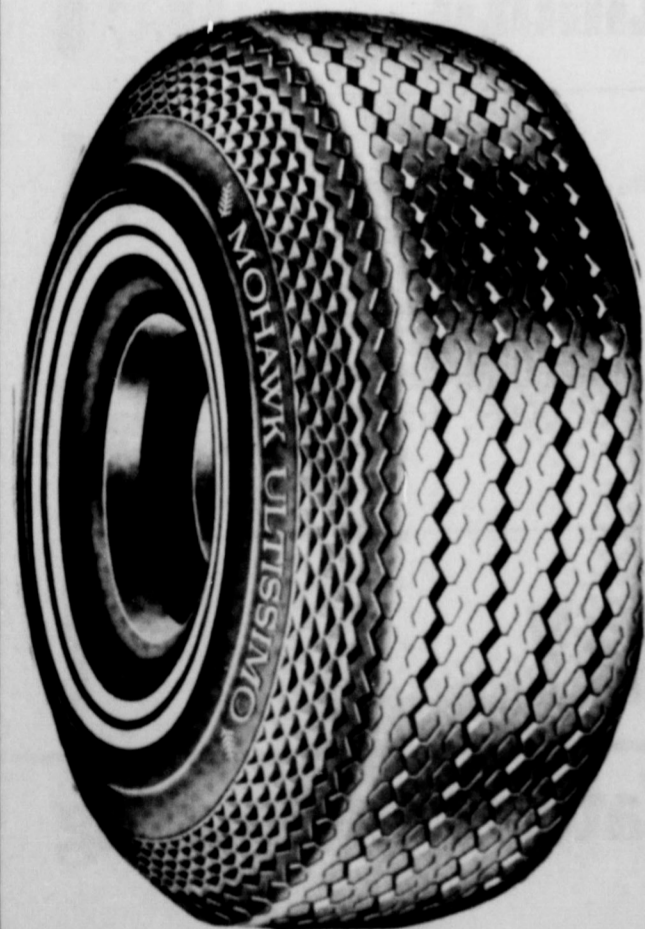

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions of Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, providing for the necessary election, forms of ballot, proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (e), reading as follows:

"(e) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointed officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County, provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision.

"All funds provided for the compensation of each such person, or by the political subdivision of Jefferson County, Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the political

subdivision within said county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and providing that the recipients of benefits for said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the political subdivision is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1964, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the addition of subsection (e) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions."

"AGAINST the addition of subsection (e) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in the month of November, 1963, and have notice of said proposed amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

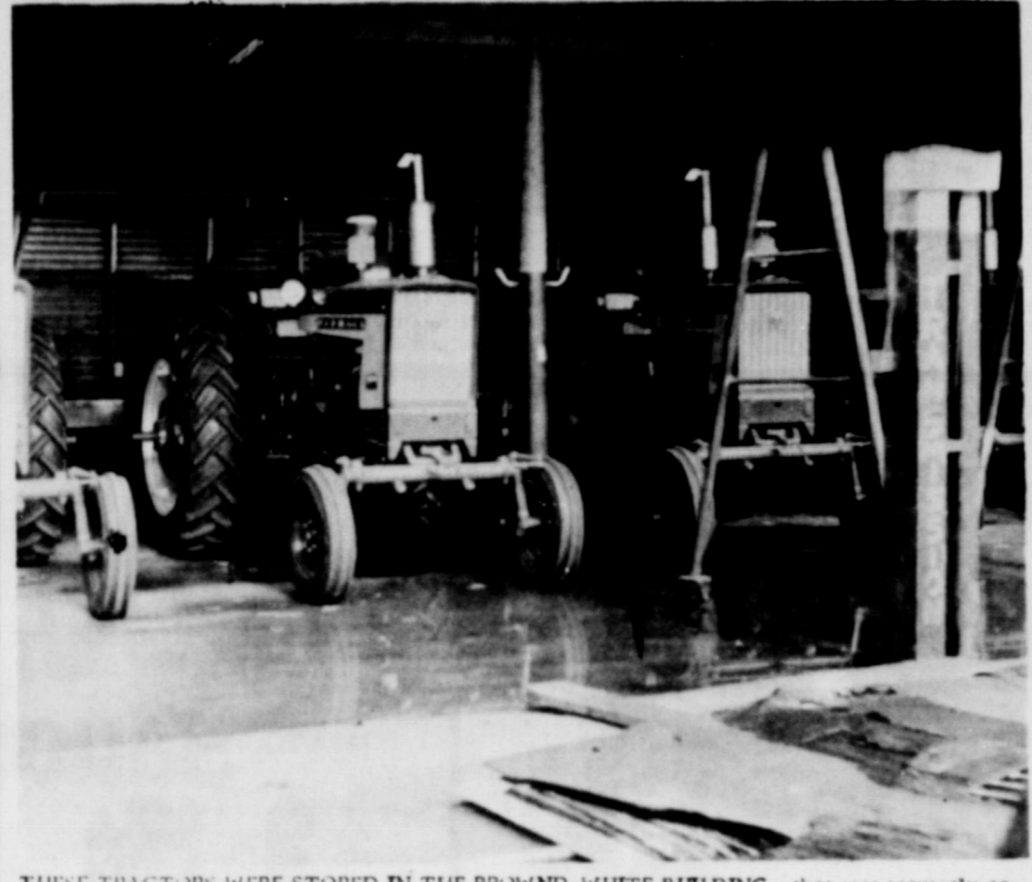

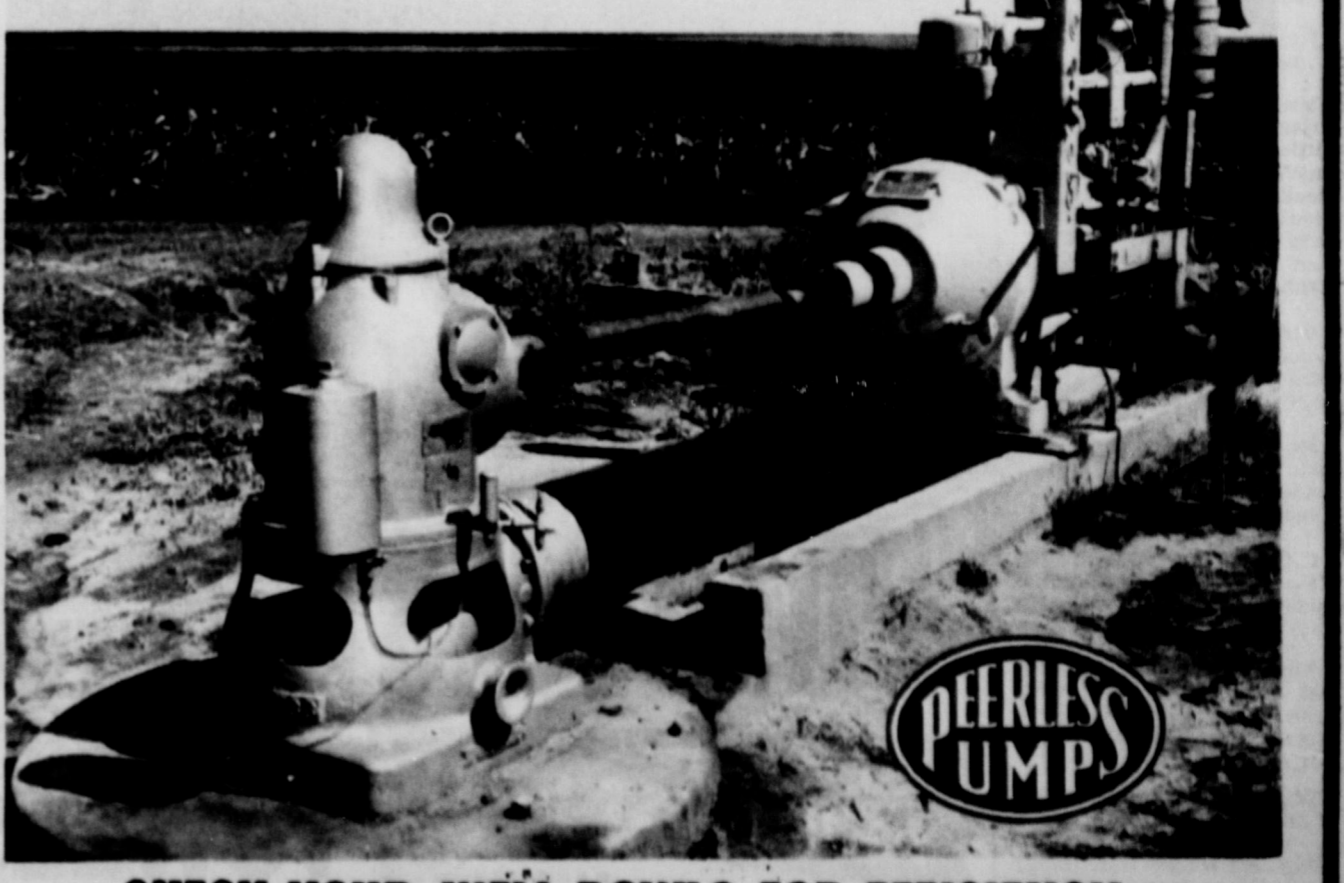

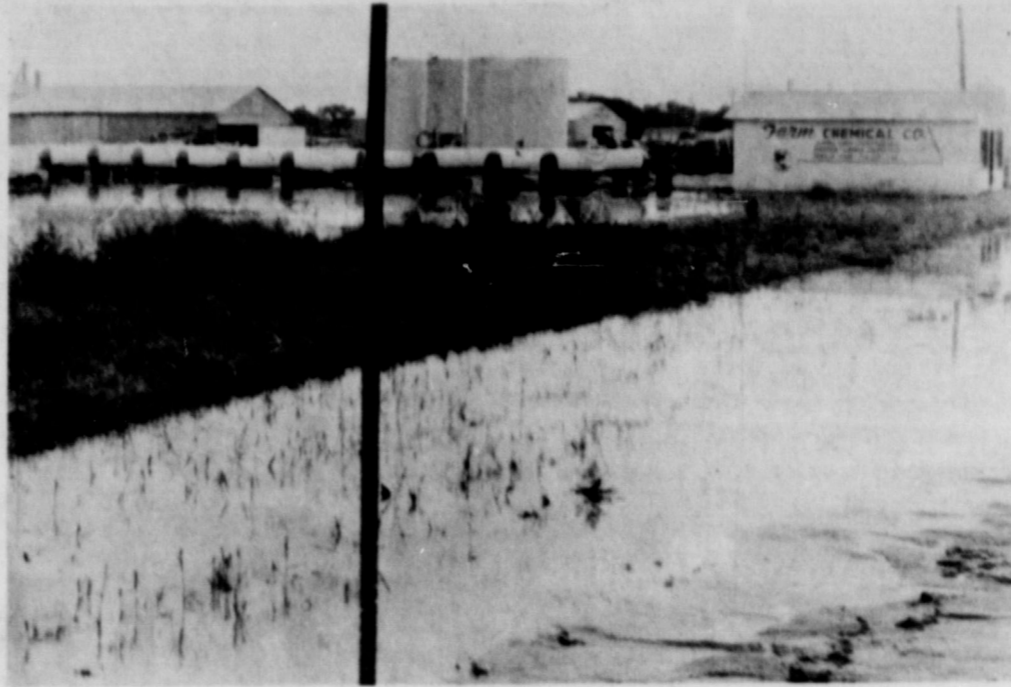
