

Planting Date Important

Date-of-planting on soybear ay be far more critical than ost farmers realize. Results of search at various locations for e past several years has indiated that a 4-5 bushel decrease yield can normally be ex-ected for each 10 day delay in lanting beginning with May 20, specially with the full-seas arieties, On the newer, short-eason types, such as ATTERSON and CLARK 63 t appears that the same rule

will generally apply beginning with June 15.

A test at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1967 was conducted to determine the effect of planting date on the HINN, HILL, PATTERSON, CLARK 63, and WAYNE varieties. Six planting dates were planned beginning May 1 and continuing every two weeks until July 15. Rain and wet fields onditions prevented the June and July I plantings. The l and July I plantings. The planting dates average yields were: May 2-24,4 bushel per acre; May 15-27,1 bushel per acre; June 14-27,3 bushel per acre; and July 12-16,6 bushel per acre. Oil and protein content are also being checked in this test, but results have not this test, but results have not

yet been obtained. All varieties received a proplant irrigation. Subsequent irrigations were applied as each variety reached bloom and podset growth stage. Rains provided adequate pre-bloom moisture. Previous soybean Irriga-tion studies at the foundation have determined the best tim-ing to be pre-plant, pre-bloom, bloom, and pod-set. One quart of Planavin per acre applied in 20-inch bands over the row along with conventional sweep cultivation of the middles gave adequate weed control.
