

Clayton - Nelson Set For Runoff Primary, June 2

Democrats and Republicans all over the state turned out to vote in Saturday's primary elections, polling a heavy vote in almost every precinct in the state.

Results from Saturday's Democratic elections indicate there will be lots of action in the Democratic primary runoff election on June 2, with four statewide races in the runoff.

In the runoff election for Governor is John Connally who tabbed 422,929 votes according to the Texas Election Bureau at 4 p.m. Tuesday, and Don Yarbrough with 312,889.

For lieutenant governor: Preston Smith, 49, a Lubbock business man vs. James Turman, 34, Gober farmer and teacher.

For congressman at large: El Paso District Judge Woodrow Bean, 44, vs. Joe Pool, 56, Dallas, former legislator.

For attorney general: Waggoner Carr, 43, of Lubbock vs. Tom Reavley, 40, of Austin.

Also in the June 2 runoff election of great interest to this area is the race between Democratic Representative candidates for the 91st District, Bill Clayton of Springlake who received 4436 votes and B. M. Nelson, Dimmitt publisher with 3886 votes.

The winners in the runoff election will face Republican candidates in the general election in November.

The Republican candidate for governor in the November election will be Jack Cox who received 87,911 votes.

Bill Hayes who tabbed 53,713 is the Republican candidate for Lt. Governor.

For Congressman at large is Des Barry with a total of 47,567 votes.

In the November race for Representative for the 91st District, Frank Ford of Hereford will seek that post against the winner of the primary runoff election.

Waggoner Carr, running for attorney general received 261 votes. Five other candidates in this race got a total of 50 votes.

es with M. Head following next with 44.

For associate justice supreme court, place no. 1, Meade Griffin won with 204 votes. For place no. 2, James Norvell with 331 votes and place no. 3 Willard G. Street with 223 votes.

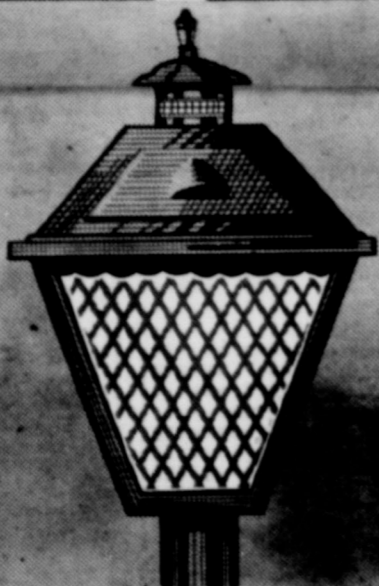

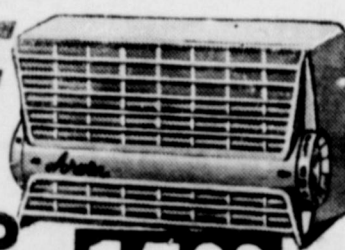

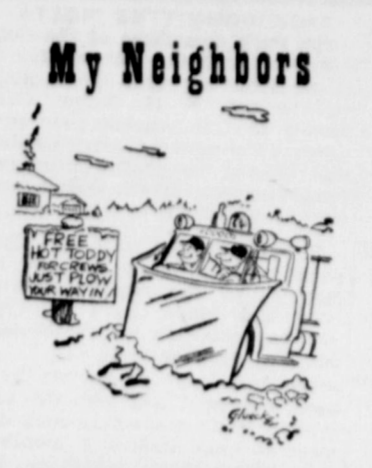
