Doctor To Open Clinic Here June 20

F. B. Faust, M. D. will open his offices in the Lions Club Clinic in Earth as temporary quarters. Dr. Faust is moving from Dimmitt and the Castro County Hospital, opening here in Earth the 20th of June.

Dr. Faust has bought the old Clitzen State Bank building, where he will have his permanent Clinic and laboratory, when Mr. Stockard moves into his new bank building. Dr. Faust received his Bachelor of Science pre-medical degree from Franklin and Marshall College, Lancaster, Pennsylvania. He received his Doctorate of Medicine from Temple University Medical School in 1932, in Philadelphia General Hospital, one of the largest teaching hospitals of the country.

He spent ten years in internal medicine with diagnosis and treatment in Philadelphia, and was visiting physician to the Methodist Hospital in Philadelphia.

Dr. Faust served his country in the Army Medical Corps from 1942 to 1946, serving overseas in Alaska for 14 months.

His family, Mrs. Helen Faust and daughter, Faith Helen and son, Bruce, joined him in Seattle, Washington for 18 months.

After separation from the service he spent sometime at Payne-Shotwell Foundation, doing all the X-ray diagnosis and medical treatments of children and adults in all lines of internal medicine.

Dr. Faust and family lived in Littlefield for about five years. Then moved to Dimmitt for the last two years.

Faith Helen, his daughter, is a student at Stephens College, Columbia, Missouri, receiving her high school diploma May 21.

Bruce, his son, will attend Kemper Military School where he will begin his pre-medical studies in the fall.

Dr. Faust will be joined by Carol Rogers, Laboratory Technician and his wife, Jean, office nurse. Mrs. Nancy Mullis will be receptionist and assistant.

Cochran spent Sunday at Palo Duro Canyon. **ITS THE LAW in TEXAS...** Made your will. If not, the State of Texas may wind up as owner of your estate upon your death. Under our statutes, the estate of persons having no heirs who die intestate revert, or "escheat", to the State. Such provisions have been carried over from the English common law. There, under such circumstances, the estate escheated to the British crown. The theory of the process is that the sovereign (or State) having been the original owner of all lands before they were parceled out to individuals, is entitled to a return of such lands when the possibilities are exhausted. This statute has been expanded to include personal property as well as real estate. It also applies in the case of a person absent for a term of seven years and not known to exist who leaves no heirs and no will. Presumably there is hardly a person who does not have some individual or charity that he would prefer to have his estate, rather than have it go to the State by default, so to speak. Yet, surprisingly, estates worth many thousands of dollars do escheat to the various States from time to time. Now before you shrug the matter off with the idea that these statutory provisions could not possibly apply to you, better think a minute. Suppose you and your spouse have no heirs besides each other and your children. Many people do fall into this category. In event of a catastrophe resulting in death for you and your entire family, no legal heirs would remain. Therefore, if you had no will, your property would go to the State. In preparing a will, it is possible to provide for such an eventuality. In this hypothetical case, you would probably want to designate some friend as executor, to take care of all necessary arrangements and then distribute the estate according to your wishes. On the other hand, if you have plenty of possible heirs, a will could be used to designate which of them shall participate in the division of the estate. And even if you wish your property distributed entirely in accordance with our statutes of descent and distribution as explained in previous columns, a will can perform useful functions. Among other uses, a will could provide for an orderly and economical partition of your property, preventing any waste of the assets by heirs impatient for a settlement. What happens to property which escheats to the State? Following certain required legal formalities and court proceedings, all escheated lands are set apart to the Permanent Free School Fund of the State, and may be leased and sold by the Land Commissioner under certain regulations. Escheated personal property is sold by the local sheriff under a court writ and the money received therefrom paid into the State Treasury.

Grazing Alfalfas Hold Promise for Old Ranges

Today, we are interested in returning alfalfa to its first use—grazing. For the past hundred years, alfalfa has been synonymous with hay—in fact, alfalfa as a hay crop has had much to do with the rapid settling of the West.

But something has happened to these ranges. There is scarcely a western State that supports as many units of livestock per acre as it did 50 years ago, this in spite of irrigation, fertilization, new varieties, etc. Some of the reasons are: (1) replacement of original cover by other plants of little or no forage value, (2) replacement of perennials by annuals, (3) erosion and (4) reduction of organic matter.

Commercial nitrogen, fall applied, often means the difference between success and failure in grass seeding on range land. It can increase the yield of our native grasses amazingly. A fair stand of grazing alfalfas could supply this needed nitrogen.

Professor E. R. Jackman, Oregon State College, suggests that grazing alfalfas may be the key to the problem of maintaining grass stands, keeping out unwanted species, stopping erosion and restoring humus. The Oregon State College is now conducting trials to determine the adaptation of alfalfa in solving the problem.

Nomad and Rhizoma are the only strictly grazing types of alfalfa being used of which seed is available. Sevelra and Ladak are included because they have a small percentage of grazing types. Ladak has up to 15 per cent in some lots of seed. Ranger is in the trials simply because it is now the standard variety.

From the 75 seedings in this test, it is hoped to learn (1) limitations of each variety when grazed, (2) type of grazing most successful, (3) ability of the

various varieties to persist under grazing, (4) difference between hay varieties and grazing varieties, and (5) effect of the various varieties upon the companion grasses and upon encroachment of the unwanted species.

These trial plantings are on low yielding land—land mostly worth less than \$10.00 an acre, so the yield is low in any case. Average rainfall for the 75 plantings is 12 inches.

No definite conclusions have been reached but the tests have already stimulated interest in ranchers' minds. Some of those having trials are now seeding larger acreages on their own. Others may wish to explore this field. Typical grazing alfalfas certainly are worth trying.

- 1/2 cup sugar

- 1/2 cup warm, not hot, water
- 2 packages active dry yeast
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 5 cups sifted enriched flour
- 1/4 cup sliced maraschino cherries
- 1/4 cup chopped citron

Scald milk. Stir in sugar, salt, and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Measure warm, not hot, water into a large mixing bowl. Sprinkle in yeast. Stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture. Add beaten eggs and 3 cups of the flour. Beat until smooth. Add cherries and citron. Stir in remaining flour. Turn dough out on lightly floured board. Knead until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl; brush top with soft shortening. Cover. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Punch down and turn out on lightly floured board. Roll out into an oblong about 14 x 18 inches. Spread with Chocolate Filling (recipe below). Roll up as for jelly roll to make roll 14 inches long. Seal edges firmly. Place on a greased baking sheet and form into a circle. Seal ends together firmly. Cut 1-inch slices almost through with scissors. Turn each slice partly on its side, pointing away from the center. Cover with a towel. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk. Bake at 350°F. (moderate oven) about 40 to 45 minutes. Ice top while warm with Plain Icing.

CHOCOLATE FILLING: Combine 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup cocoa and 1/4 cup evaporated milk in a saucepan. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened.

PLAIN ICING: Combine 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar, 1 tablespoon cream and 1/4 teaspoon vanilla and beat until smooth.

Ladino Clover Rates High as Hog Pasture



Seeing is believing for these farmers, who might have been skeptical about the value of Ladino clover pasture for hogs.

Ladino clover ranks high as a hog pasture, according to Litton & Lewis of Virginia. Tests showed Ladino was superior to lespedeza, crimson clover or ryegrass pasture when grazed with pigs from early April until late August.

The first year the Ladino was seeded in February and grazing started in the spring and as soon as they were weaned were started on the tests. Pigs were full-fed grain on each of these pastures in self-feeders, and comparable lots were hand-fed grain in limited amounts on each of these types of pastures. Additional check groups dry-lot fed were also fed.

Pigs stayed on the pasture until they reached market weights, or until corn was ready for hogging down in the fall. The largest gains of all were made by the full-fed dry-lot pigs, 1.08 pounds per day. But it took 344 pounds of feed to make 100 pounds of gain in the dry lot. This was 73 pounds more than the Ladino lots required. The pigs on Ladino, where protein supplement was used, made .78 of a pound per day.

In the full-fed Ladino lots, 271 pounds of grain with no protein supplement at all made 100 pounds of pork. This was the most economical lot in the whole test. It took 306 pounds of grain where protein supplement was added to achieve the same re-

sult. It is certainly quite evident that the Ladino furnished sufficient protein for the growing-fattening pigs so that no additional protein supplement in the ration seemed to be needed.

The greatest value from Ladino pasture came in terms of grain replacement when the amount of feed the pigs got was limited. A total of 1880 pounds of feed were saved by an acre of Ladino pasture on the limited feeding schedule. Where pigs were full-fed, 1887 pounds of feed were saved by an acre of Ladino. With the usual prices of feeds, this means that an acre of Ladino can be worth around \$100 in the hog producing program every year.

A few noticeable things in the grazing of the pigs were that they were always anxious to graze the Ladino and did so with relish, showing that it was palatable. The fact that an acre of Ladino can mean so much to swine farms is an important factor in economical pork production.

It is the first grazing crop introduced into the hog section of Virginia that would justify taking an acre out of cultivation to grow. The Ladino should be seeded as a pure stand of Ladino rather than with grass mixtures because the pigs do not relish the grasses as much as the Ladino and consequently will not keep them grazed properly.

Primary superintendent was Mrs. Earl Parish. Mrs. Price Hamilton was superintendent of one junior group, while Mrs. Wayne Rutherford was superintendent over another age group of the junior class. Raymond Cole was superintendent for the intermediate class. Charlene Hamilton was pianist for the school.

A total of \$66.98 was contributed by the school to be sent to Dallas as a gift to missions.

During the two week school five people were saved, and a total of twenty rededications.

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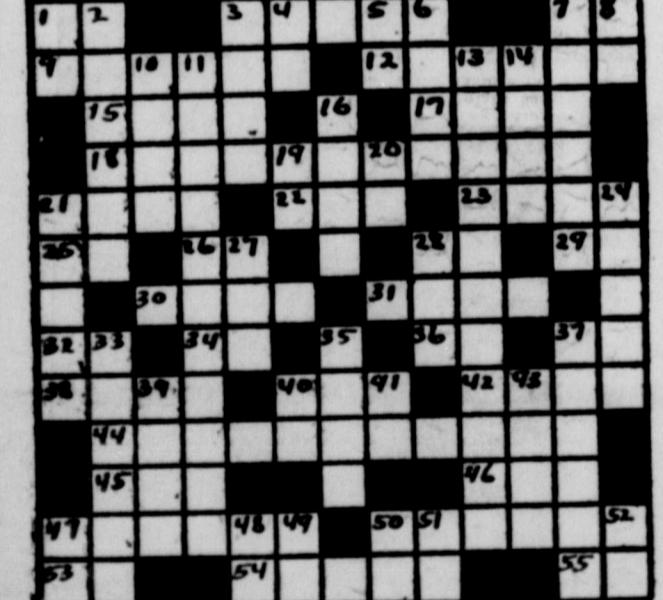
