Three Deacons Ordained Sunday

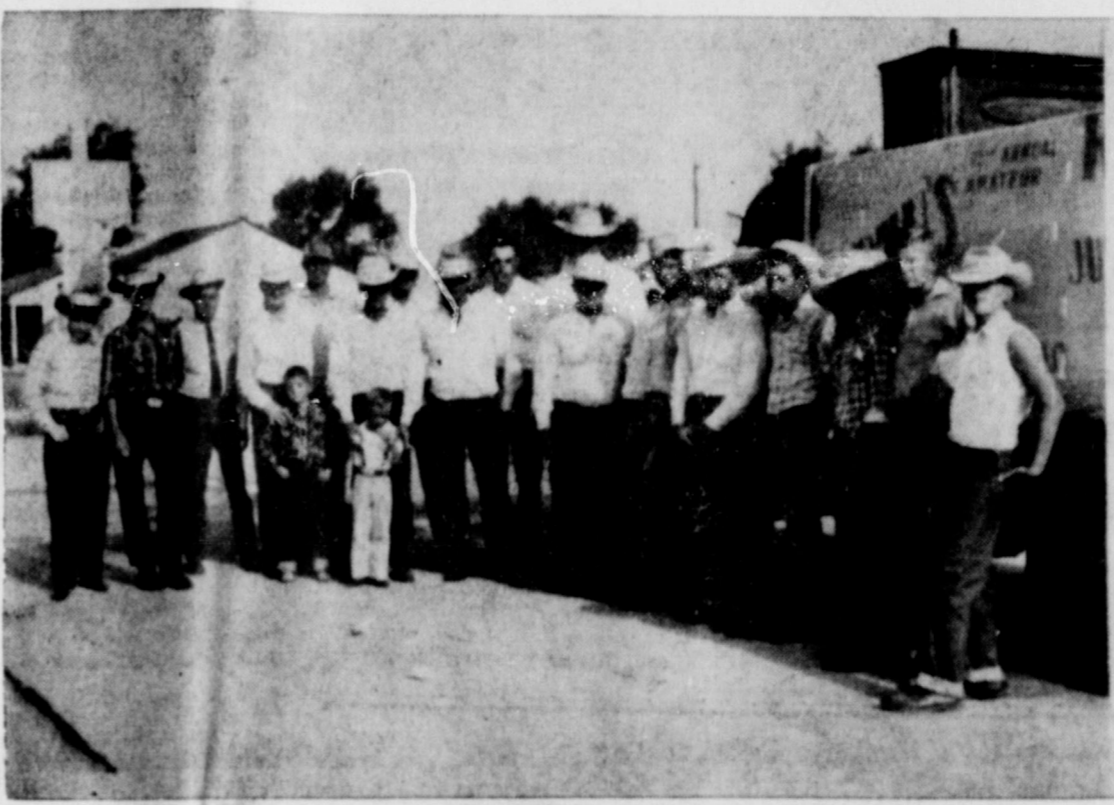
Three deacons were ordained into the First Baptist Church, Sunday afternoon at 3:00 p.m.

Spring Housecleaning

Now that spring cleaning time is here, families all over the nation are breaking out lighter clothes, and putting their winter clothing away in moth balls or crystals.

While this cheerful process is going on, however, it is a good idea to keep the moth balls and the children strictly apart—for naphthalene, the substance from which most moth repellents are made, is a dangerous poison.

Over 490 deaths a year occur in the United States in children under five as a result of accidental poisoning, according to Pfizer Spectrum, the medical magazine.

Naphthalene or moth ball poisoning is especially important because the toxicity of the chemical is not widely appreciated; instead of seeing that it is always out of reach, parents often leave it around and infants or small children pick it up in the belief that it is candy.

The result can be a severe and rapidly worsening anemia caused by destruction of the red blood cells. By the time the child can be rushed to the hospital, it is usually so acutely ill as to be put at once on the emergency status.

Since the alarming symptoms do not occur until three to seven days after the moth balls have been eaten, the parents may have no idea what the cause of the trouble is, and even the doctor may be baffled. Treatment consists of repeated transfusions of whole blood.

So, for safety's sake, put those moth balls on a high shelf when you're through with them—and when you're using them, don't let them out of your sight. The alternative may be tragic.

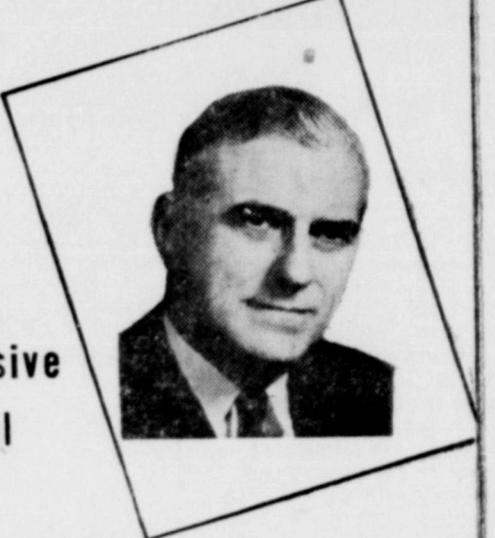

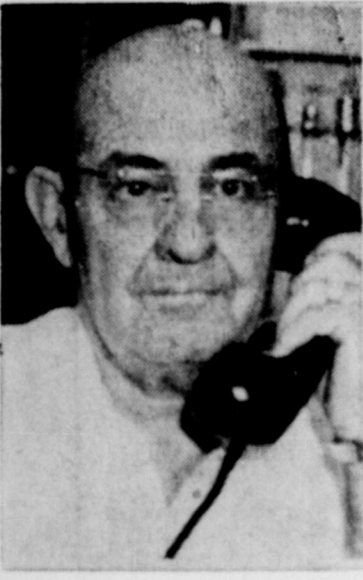

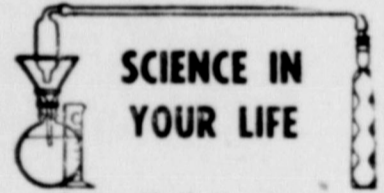

Oyster Shells For Mother
A new mother who had spared no expense to insure a well-balanced diet during pregnancy was shocked when her dentist's first post-natal checkup revealed 23 cavities! Though unusually severe, the patient's cavity-ridden dentures point up the fact that pregnancy places an extra-heavy nutritional burden on the expectant mother. Even "eating for two" often cannot meet every nutritional demand particularly in the case of calcium, an element needed to build the baby's bones. Scientists have long warned that calcium deficiency often leads to dental trouble in pregnancy, since it is vital for sound teeth, too. To make up for this deficiency, vitamin-mineral supplements prescribed for the expectant mother contain calcium, usually in a form called calcium lactate. But only a small part of the calcium in this salt is available for use by the body, so the patient must take a good many pills—especially when nursing the baby further increases calcium demands. One new dietary supplement, however, provides a unique answer to this problem. Its calcium source is purified, powdered oyster shell—almost wholly calcium carbonate. The supplement, called Storcavite, also includes ample supplies of other minerals and vitamins. In some supplements, the mineral is supplied as calcium phosphate. However, phosphate has been blamed for the leg cramps often felt by mothers-to-be and should be avoided. Oyster shell calcium is phosphate-free.

Gives Every Baby Pig A Chance To Grow Up...

Every baby pig that cannot nurse or which doesn't get his proper share of "mama's" feed now has a chance to live out his early days at definite profit to the pig raiser. A relatively new artificial pig feeder heated by a 330-watt thermostatically controlled electric heating element substitutes for the warm milk normally provided by nature.

This new feeding unit may put an additional \$40.00 per litter in the pockets of pig raisers by keeping alive pigs that are often lost during the nursing stage. When something goes wrong with the

mother sow, the entire litter is often lost.

Experience has shown that, under good management, the pig feeder makes an ideal "mother" for orphaned pigs, runty pigs, pigs from oversized litters and pigs from sows who just don't provide enough milk.

While the unit does an excellent job of imitating "mother," it has other advantages. Danger of the sow stepping or lying on a baby pig is eliminated. Baby pigs are

kept fully contented, healthy and clean. Many unexpected emergencies that take place at farrowing time are lessened in intensity.

One hog producer had a sow which farrowed 16 pigs. He placed eight of the litter on the artificial unit and eight with the sow. The sow rolled over on one, reducing her share to seven. At weaning time, the eight pigs on the artificial unit were heavier than the pigs which had been naturally fed by the sow... and all were still alive.

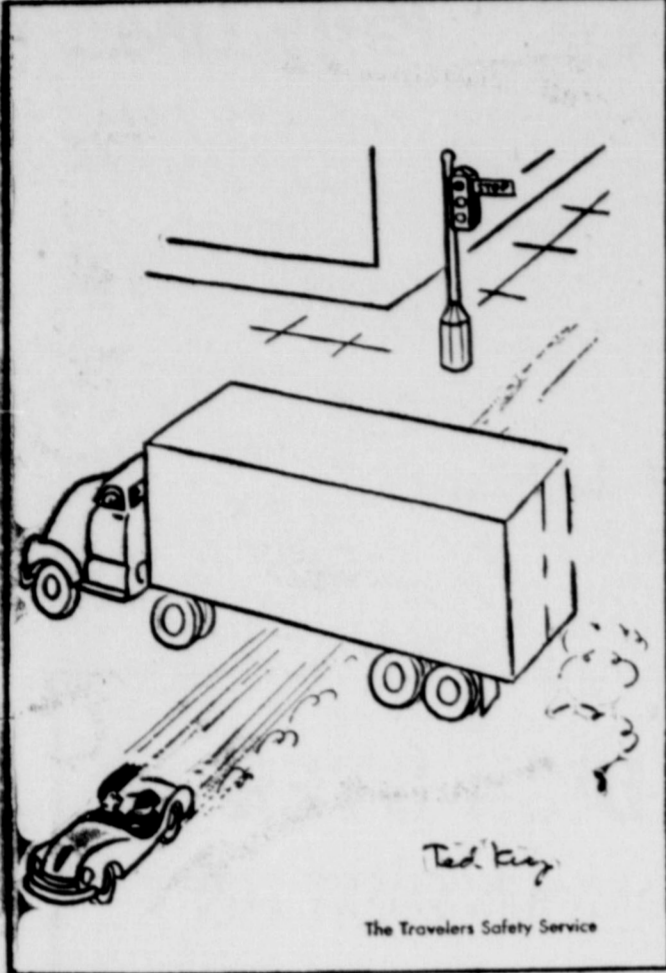

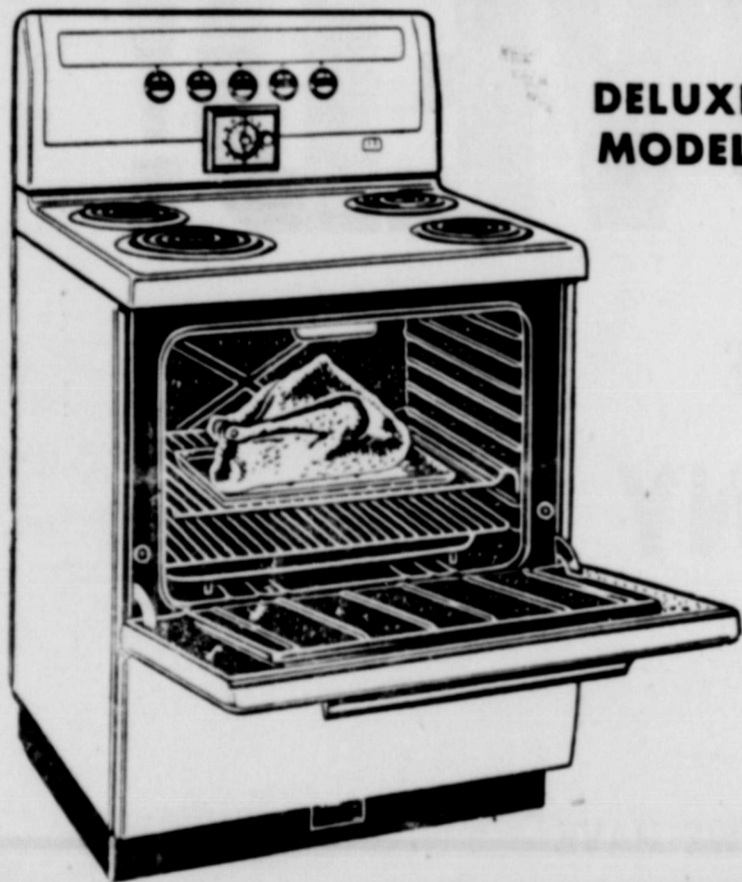

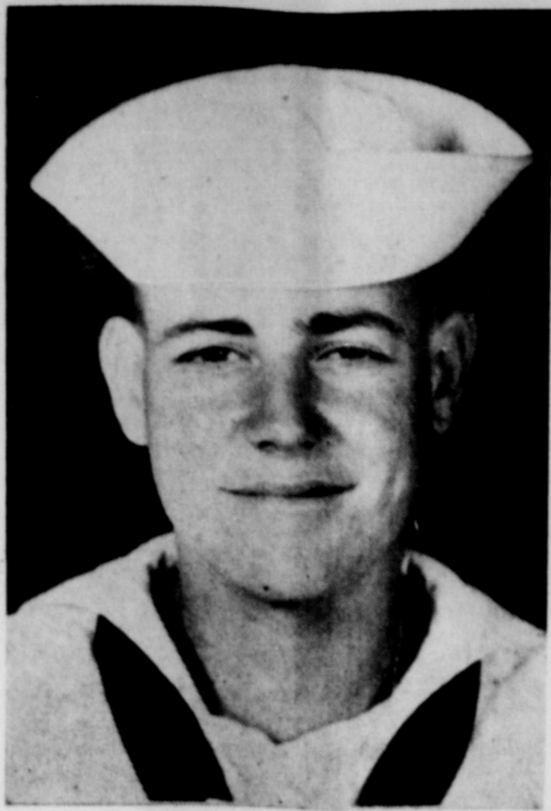
Two Minor Accidents Over the Weekend

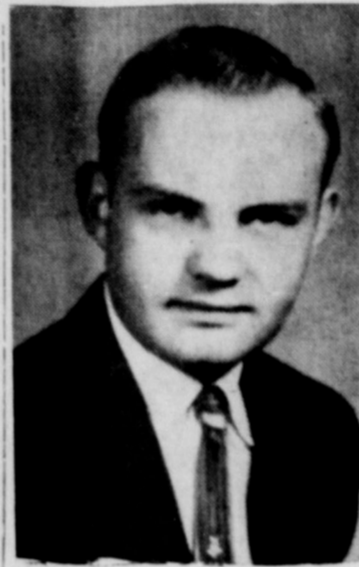
Funeral Services Held For Hale Center Resident

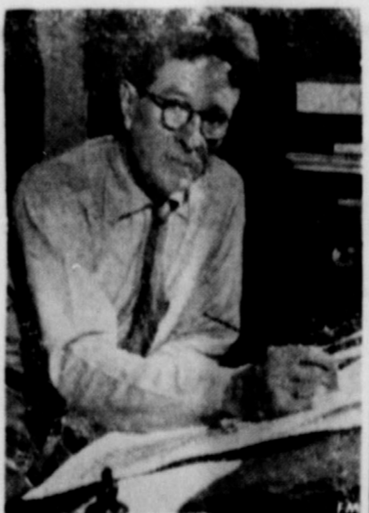

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL
 AUSTIN, Tex. — Reunions, rodeos, fishing trips. From now until school starts, vacationing Texans will take to the highways by the thousands.
 They are likely to find the roads more crowded than at any time in the state's history.
 From year to year, total traffic volume has climbed steadily. Highway Department surveys show. In addition, vacation months bring a steep jump.
 August especially is a headache for the Department of Public Safety. Accident rates climb sharply. During the past five years August accident rates have been from 3 to 27 per cent higher than in July.
 "People try to over-drive on a long vacation trip," says Asst. Chief C. G. Connor of the Texas Highway Patrol. "Fatigue is a particular problem. Speed is another."
 They can't do much about people who drive when they are too tired, Connor admits. But something can and has been done about speed.
 "Installation of radar detection devices has had tremendous impact on driving practices," said Connor.
 Studies made before and after

radar use was begun on state and federal highways in November, 1954, how: (1) excessive speeding dropped from 21 to 15 per cent, (2) accidents dropped 3.4 per cent and (3) deaths dropped 1.9 per cent.

During the same period accidents on the non-radar-patrolled stretches — farm to market roads, city streets, etc.—climbed 13 per cent. A similar increase could have been expected on the state and federal highways, Connor believes, especially since total mileage increased also—nearly 5 per cent.

Had normal trends continued, 181 more lives would have been lost in 1955.

OPERATION ALERT SCHOOL

Would Texans know what to do if atomic bombs fell? To find out, a fullscale drill will be held July 20.

Five key cities — Houston, El Paso, Austin, Waco and the Fort Worth - Dallas area — will be assumed hit by bombs between 11:00 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. that day.

Smaller towns and rural areas also will participate in Operation Alert. Many have been designated as reception centers for evacuees from cities.

State Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Headquarters in Austin has asked all mayors, county judges and other local civil defense officials to cooperate.

Strategic industrial centers, such as Beaumont-Port Arthur, will practice vacating plants and schools. Military bases will test their full-scale emergency measures.

Purpose of the drill is to show up any flaws in the plan whereby federal, state and local officials and trained volunteers would cooperate to cope with a major catastrophe.

Nationally, Operation Alert will presume 52 cities bombed. FCC has ordered all radio and TV stations off the air at 3:10 p.m. July 20. Special civil defense frequencies, 640 and 1240, will be used for test broadcasts of disaster instructions.

PHYSICAL ED TEACHERS REASSURED

Physical education teachers won't be out of jobs if proposed new high school graduation requirements are adopted.

Commissioner of Education J. W. Edgar clarified the plan for alarmed teachers. Physical education and health courses still are required by state law, he said.

A State Board of Education study committee recommended they no longer be counted among the 16 units required for graduation. Committee suggestions were part of an overall effort to strengthen high school curricula academically, especially in scientific studies.

VACCINE FOR ADULTS SEEN SOON

Texans over 20 may be able to get polio vaccinations within a month or two.

But, said State Health Depart-

ment officials, this is still "purely speculative." Actual timing will depend on when the vaccine supply exceeds that needed for youngsters and expectant mothers.

In Texas, polio takes its heaviest toll among tots under four years old. They have 51.2 per cent of all cases, 69.1 per cent of paralytic cases.

Persons over 20 account for only 17.4 per cent of total incidence, 6.8 per cent of paralytic cases.
 Forty-one new cases were reported in the state last week, bringing the '56 total to 440.

WORSE AND MORE OF IT

More and more Texans have less and less water. In its monthly report, the State Water Board listed these gloomy details:

Texas reservoirs were down 17 per cent, and observation and springs were at an all time low.

Storage in Trinity River basin lakes was at 27 per cent of capacity; in Red River lakes, 55 per cent; in Lake Texoma, 51 per cent. Famous Comal Springs near Braunfels ceased to flow for the first time in history.

Ground water levels, below average in almost all areas, hit record lows in four areas.

No general area of the state could claim normal rainfall. State-wide precipitation was 46 per cent of normal

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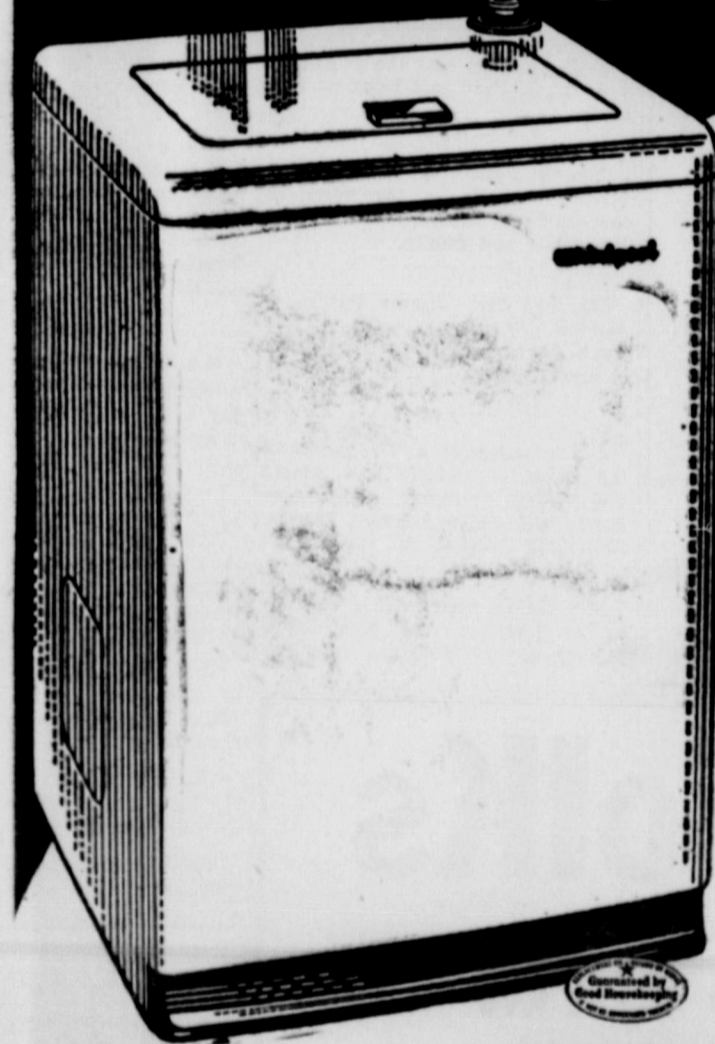

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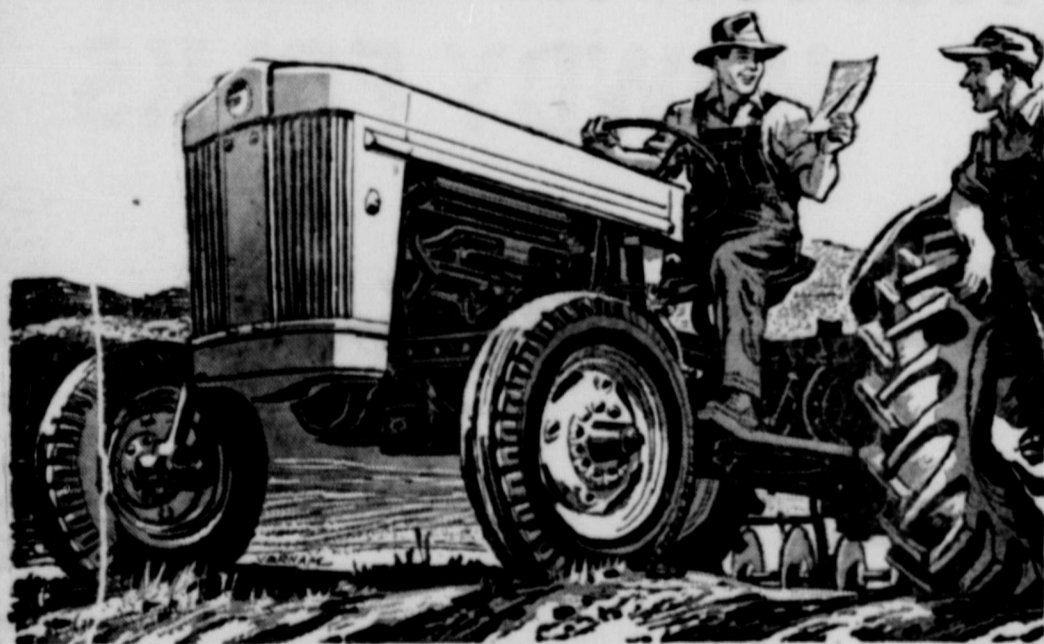

PARK OF THE WEEK —
VISIT TEXAS PARKS —

Balmorhea State Park in Reeves County is built around San Solomon Springs. The park is between the Davis and the Barilla Mountains at an elevation of about 3,345 feet above sea level, which assures cool nights.

San Solomons Springs are remarkable in that there has been no sign of decrease in their flow since the early days when they watered buffalo herds. Even through the state's long drought, the springs have steadily delivered 26 million gallons of chrysal clear water daily into the world's largest walled swimming pool.

Park facilities include 18 air-cooled, Spanish type, stucco cabins with red tiled roofs, and a camping area with twelve units along the cool stream flowing from the springs. Each camping unit is concrete floored with a sheltering roof, and is supplied with an outdoor cooking place, electric lights and water. For cabin occupants and campers who do not wish to cook, there is a large dining room with well prepared meals.

Balmorhea State Park is on U. S. Highway 290 at Toyahvale. It

is reached easily from Midland, Odessa, Monahans, Pecos and other cities on U. S. Highway 80 by turning south on State Highway 17 at Pecos. Farther west turn off at Kent.

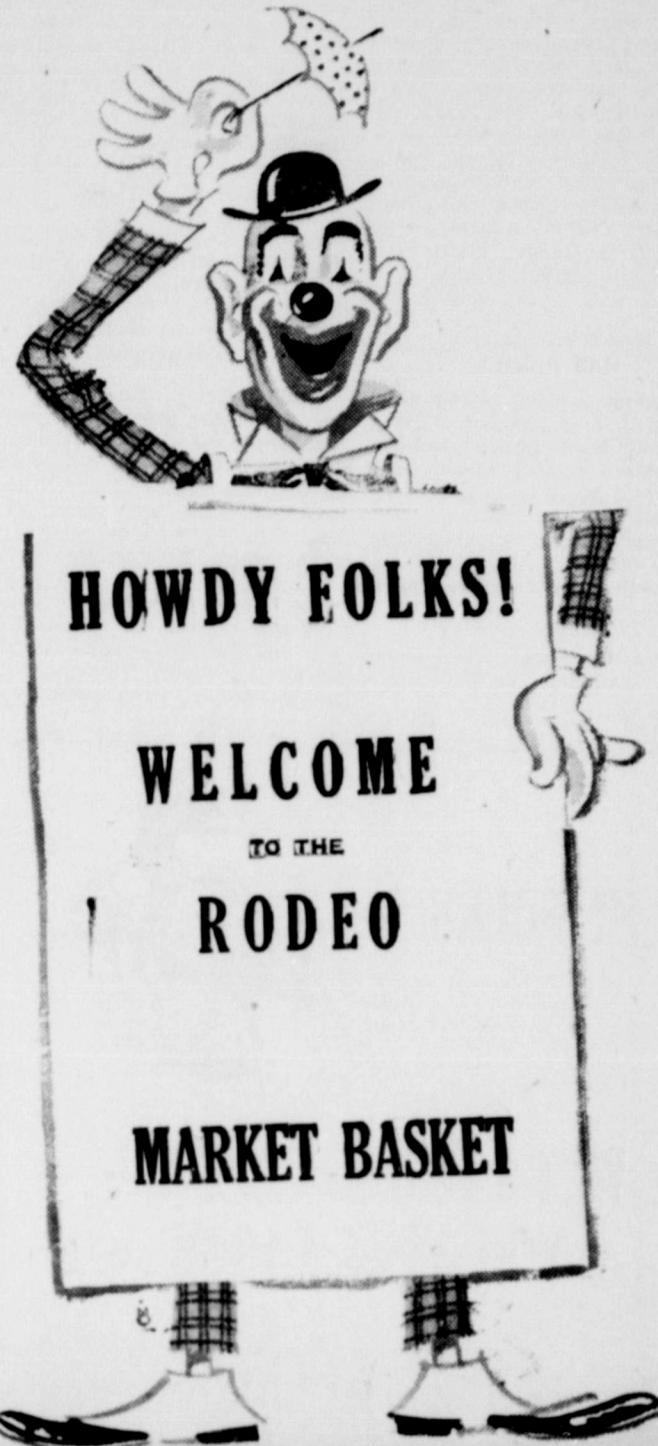

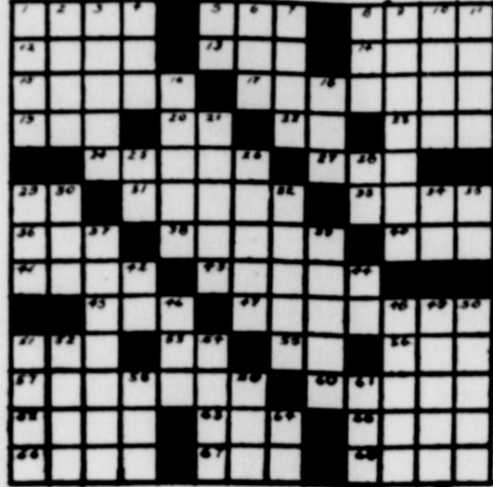
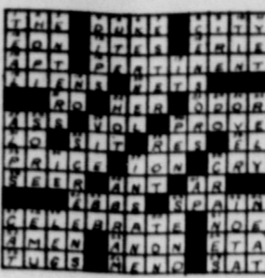

Aikin Pledges Continuance Of Farm-To-Market Road Program

Continuance of the farm-to-market road program in Texas to keep pace with growing needs is being stressed by State Senator A. M. Aikin, Jr., of Paris in his campaign for Lieutenant Governor.

"It was my privilege several years ago to be a co-author and sponsor of a bill that set aside fifteen million dollars each year to be used exclusively in the construction and maintenance of farm-to-market roads," recalls the veteran of 19 years in the Texas Senate and four years in the House.

"I sincerely feel that this has been one of the finest programs that has been adopted, and I know

you will agree that it has done and is doing a lot of good for our people."

The co-author of the Gilmer-Aikin laws for public schools also feels that "our counties should receive some help financially from the state on purchase of right-of-way. The Commissioners Courts are being called on to furnish right-of-way for many projects, and it has grown to such proportions that some help must be forthcoming from some source. The burden is too heavy for the counties to carry alone. In many places the counties are being asked to make available three hundred feet of right-of-way across the entire county, and they are just not able to do it. However, I want it strictly understood that the control and the securing of right-of-way shall be left in the hands of the Commissioners Courts."

Senator Aikin's platform includes proposals for greater improvement of the state hospital system and greater discretion for the hospital board in the matter of salaries to maintain adequate staffs; a workable water conservation program, distinct from the question of water rights, under full local control; more adequate salaries for state employees in line with the salary schedules of private industry; enactment of a strict lobby registration law "With teeth in it;" additional protective measures against unscrupulous insurance companies; enactment of the proposed constitutional amendment to the Veterans Land Program, and any additional legislation necessary to protect both the state and the veterans; for income from the available fund of the University of Texas and Texas A. and M. College to be freed entirely from appropriations so that salaries may be supplemented to attract and hold capable staff members; and amendment of the Teachers Retirement Section of the Constitution, a proposal of which he is the author.

Rudder Lends Prestige To Job As Land Office Commissioner

AUSTIN, Tex. — Earl Rudder, who has served as Land Commissioner since January 5, 1955, is seeking his first elective term in that office. Rudder's platform stresses two points: (1) Under his administration public confidence in the Veterans' Land Program has been restored; (2) The General Land Office is now operating under new and unprecedented efficiency.

Rudder took office shortly after veteran's land scandals first rocked the state.

He is a veteran himself — one of the country's greatest heroes of World War II. As a Ranger commander, Rudder on D-Day personally led his troops up the 100-foot-high cliffs of Normandy to destroy a German coastal battery. He was shot twice, but accomplished his mission.

General Omar N. Bradley, commander of U. S. Ground Forces in Europe, recently wrote in his memoirs that the D-Day assignment he gave Rudder was the most difficult he had ever given any soldier in his entire military career.

Rudder was decorated for bravery in action seven times by three governments — the United States, France and Belgium.

Rudder, the only veteran in the race for Land Commissioner, has been commended for his work in

the Land Office by the American Legion and the V.L.W.

Rudder's first act on assuming office was a wholesale cleanup of the veteran's land program. Not a single whisper of scandal in that program has been heard since. With legislative help, the program has been decentralized—a County Committee must now screen the veterans' transactions before they

may be submitted to the Veterans' Land Board, which Rudder heads. This control at the county level has greatly speeded up the cleanup, Rudder says.

Rudder also has restored order and efficiency in the Land Office. This office handles about \$84,000,000 of the public's money each year—mostly funds which support Texas public free schools, and the University of Texas. The money is derived principally from lease of public lands to oil and gas companies. Rudder increased the price which these companies must pay for such leases, thus helping the school funds. The permanent free school fund now totals about \$350,000,000, of which about \$48,000,000 — or 15 per cent of the total — has been collected since Rudder took office. Similarly, the University fund has been increased under Rudder's administration to over \$256,000,000. Just recently, over \$16,000,000 was added to this fund in one lease sale alone.

The Land Office houses thousands of priceless documents—land surveys, maps, etc. Rudder discovered on taking office that many of them were frayed and worn through neglect. These records are now being restored and preserved—and Rudder's methods have been praised and approved by a committee of the State Bar of Texas.

When Rudder became Commissioner, Land Office books and accounts were in many cases inconsistent. Rudder immediately requested a thorough audit of the Land Office, by the State Auditor, and further requested that a continuing audit be maintained. On the basis of audits already completed, the State has profited substantially in collections on overdue accounts, etc. And, Rudder says, as future audits are completed they will serve as guides for further businesslike operation of one of the State's most important agencies.

Rudder was born at Eden, in West Texas. He attended John Tarleton and Texas A. & M. He is 46 years old, married and the father of five children.

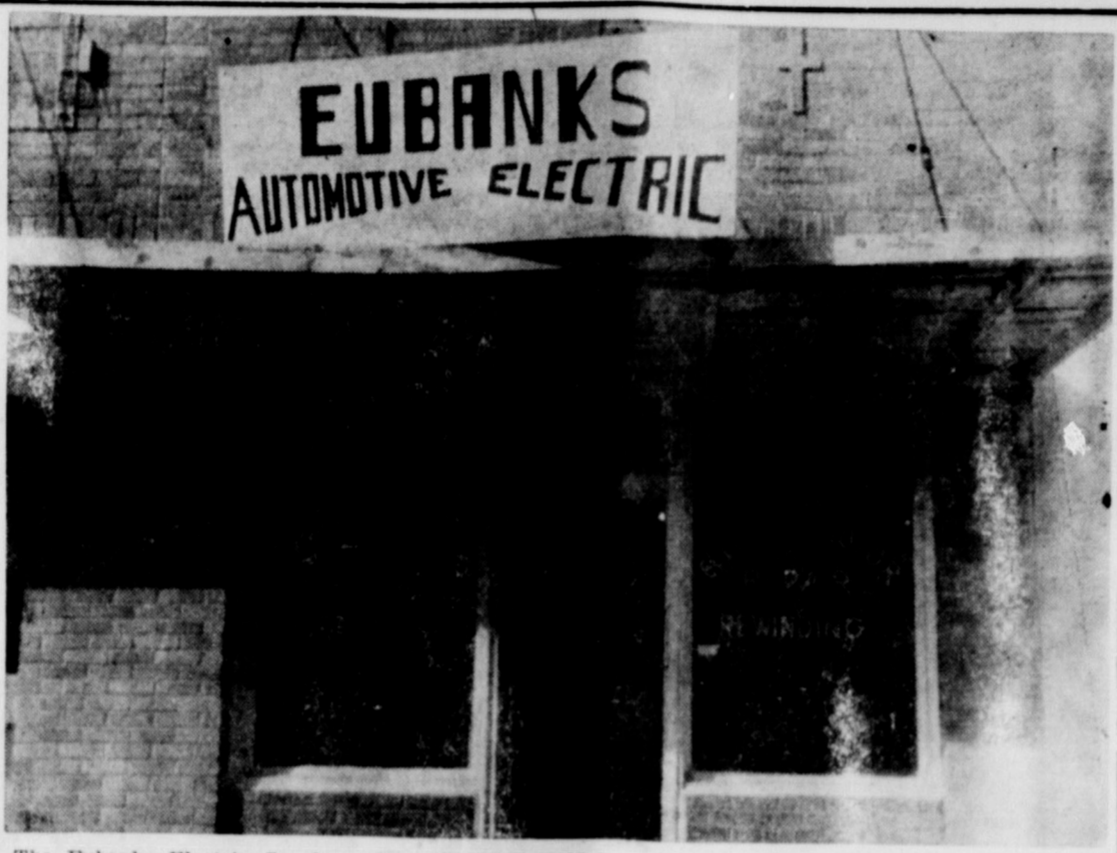

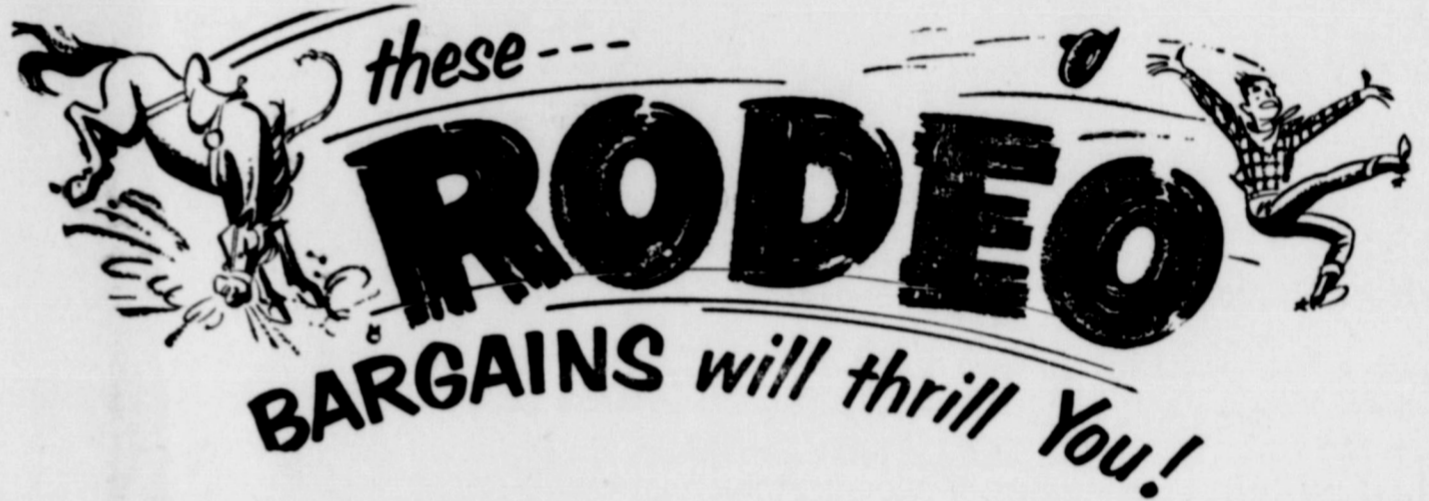
