RREMEDY FOR CUTWORMS

A considerable number of farmers have complained to me that cutworms are eating up their gardens. The following remedy if followed closely will be found very effective against these worms:

Wheat bran 25 pounds; white arenie or Paris green I pound; lemons or oranges 6 fruits; low grade cane or sorghum malasses 2 quarts; water I gallon. Mix the bran and poison thoroughly while dry. Dilute the molasses with the gallon of water, then squeeze the lemon juice into the diluted molasses, then grind the rind of the lemon with a meat chopper and add this also t the liquid. Mix the liquid thoroughly with the poison bran mixture and mix well. Add more water until a mash is obtained that when squeezed in the hand readily falls apart,

Distribute with a planter, or by hand, along the rows, near the plants, about sundown, on top of the ground.

If you do not need to make up this much poison, then use just half as much of each of the above named stuff in making up your mixure,

This will kill all other kind of worms which cause damage on and under the ground.

Only last Saturday one high-powered car was running loose on our streets and so far as we can learn no arrests were made.







He had asked, as his last wish, that he be buried next to the grave of his daughter, who was interred in a Church of England cemetery. The minister of the latter institution, when he heard of this, refused permission for the Noncomformist rites to be performed in the cemetery proper, where the daughter lay, saying that the body of the father, if be was to be buried in Church of England

for suicides and unknowns. The Noncomformists of Snowden were incensed at this cierical injustice and appealed to Lloyd George for help. He advised that they could break down the cemetery gates, if that were necessary, to bury the dead man near his daughter. This was done, and the burial made as the old man had wished. The result was a law-suit against the villagers by the Church of England authorities.

Dutch Names Given to Old New York Streets

Very curious and interesting are the old street names of New York city. Particularly in the financial district ere to be found historic associations in this relation. Most of the streets had Dutch names, since then more or less changed. For instance, Broad street was called the "Graght," because it-was an inlet from the bay.

Nassau street, between Wall and Pearl streets, was once called "Ple Woman's lane," Stonestreet was called "Brouwer street," because the West Indies company's brewery was at No. 10, South William street was "Slyck Sleegh," meaning "dirty lane." Liberty street was first called by the Dutch "Tienhoven street"; later the British called it "Crown street." Pine street was first called "Queen street" and later "King street," Exchange alley was "Oyster Pasty alley" and "Tin Pot alley." Cortlandt street up to 1728 was "Windmill lane." Whitehall street derived its name from Peter Stuyvesant's mansion, "Whitehall." William street, before it honored the English king, was called "Burgers path." Coentles slip was named for Coentles Ten Eyck.

West Texas Fields Three Tests for Sterling County. William Little is moving material

on a location 1192 feet west of the Durham No. 1 on the east partof Section No. 1, Block "T," T. & P. Ry. Co., 1 1-2 miles of here. The oil right under this location is owned by Fisher Brothers, of Uvalde. A part of the machinery was placed on the location yesterday, and a crew of men are digging the cellar and slush pit. If not hindered, this well will be spudded in within the next two weeks.

The Star rig now in Roy Foster's pasture will be moved in a few days to the Inland Oil Company's new location on the northeast quarter of Section 12, Block "T," T. & P. Ry. Co., at point 400 feet west and 150 feet south of the northeast corner of Section 12, and about two miles southwest of here in D. C. Durham's pasture. The contract calls for drilling on this well by May 1.

A contract was closed this week whereby H. P. Nichols and assoclates are to drill a deep test on the center of the north line of Section 15, Block 30, W. & N. W. Ry, Co., in W. N. Reed's pasture, 18 miles northwest of here. This test is to be spudded in by June 1. The location is about eight miles south and west of the Chalk field. Work of moving the rig on the location is now under way

Unverified reports are out that a showing of oil and gas has been struck in Slator-Exploration No. 1, section 10, block 44, township 1 south, Ector county, at a depth of 4.380 feet. The well was shut down for a few days after this report but has been resumed and no further report has been put out. The Prairie and Roxanna Company have this test in charge and are prepared to make deep well.

The report that there was a showing of oil and gas in Davis No. 1 being drilled by the West Texas Syndicate on section 16, block 42, township 3 south, Ector county, is untrue. The well is drilling at about 1600 feet.
