## United Methodist Women Meet

The Earth United Methodist Women held one of their most important annual observances—the Call of Prayer and Self-Denial. The program was held at 5 o'clock on Monday January 23, 1978, led by Mrs. William F. Holland, Jr. and Mrs. Gladys Parish. Major events of the observance include the Quiet Day, description of the mission projects for which a special offering is given was presented by Mrs. Norman Sulser. Each woman who took part was asked to give for others by denying herself and to pray. Through prayer, she experiences a spiritual oneness with planners, mission workers and those served in church-related ministries.

The women's Division of the Board of Global Ministries of The United Methodist Church sponsors the Call of Prayer and Self-Denial. Two areas of the large United Methodist mission program are designated for giving this year. In the United States, the offering will be used for Mission Institutions: Maintenance and Improvement of Women's Division-owned Property. The Women's Division owns approximately 95 pieces of property in 30 states, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. At these sites, mission programs are carried out. Most of the buildings have been in service for many years, some as many as 75. A few are newer. All are heavily used, sometimes around the clock. The buildings need maintenance and improvement so that the mission programs can operate more efficiently.

Overseas, the offering will be used for "Children and Youth in Today's World." Children and youth make up most of the world's population, over 60 percent of the people on some continents. Frequently, children and youth suffer the most from poverty, urbanization and violent social upheaval. Despite their large numbers their needs are often neglected, their voices unheard. The offering will go for programs for mentally and physically handicapped children, pre-natal and post-natal care for mothers and babies, nutrition and health care for children, child and youth advocacy, education for children and youth, Christian education programs and materials and other needs.

The service for the Quiet Day, Be Thou My Vision, was written by Jean Hawk Troy. The service is organized around the hymn, "Be Thou My Vision." Musicians for the meeting were Miss Shelia Jordan and Mrs. Ed Dawson. The theme is hunger—physical hunger. Others on the program were Mrs. Bessie Cearley, and Mrs. Lena Grace Griffin.

About 1.5 million women in 35,000 local units in all 50 states will join in the observance. Last year, the offering totaled \$792,455.

## Clayton To Speak

Texas House Speaker Bill Clayton will be a featured speaker at the 11th Annual Membership Meeting of Water Inc., February 11 in the Amarillo Quality Inn.

Clayton, known in the state legislature as "Mr. Water" for his support of water resource development, is a long-time advocate of water importation. He is a former executive director of Water Inc., a non-profit corporation dedicated to seeking alternative water resources for the High Plains.

He has served in the Texas House of Representatives since his first election in 1962. Currently, he is in his second term as House Speaker and he has announced he will seek a third term.

During his legislative tenure, Clayton has played a key leadership role in most major water and conservation legislation. He is past chairman of the Southern Environmental Resources Conference, former chairman of the Interstate Conference on Water Problems and a board member of the Texas Water Conservation Association.

The Springlake resident maintains farming, ranching and banking interests in Lamb County, along with other business investments.

About 200 people are expected to attend the Water, Inc., meeting which is being dedicated to retiring Congressman George Mahon. Congressman Jack Hightower will also participate in the program and dedication.

## Motivational Seminary In Lubbock

Award-winning Olton salesman Jarold Simmons is currently visiting businessmen and bankers in the Springlake, Earth area to tell them about a personal growth and development seminar scheduled 7-10 p.m. February 28 in the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium.

The Lubbock rally will be conducted by Zig Ziglar, one of America's foremost motivators. He is the author of a best selling book, "See You At The Top", and has co-authored two others, "In Search of Agreement" and "The Fine Art of Doing Better".

A new book by Ziglar, "Confessions of a Happy Christian" is scheduled for release this month. Ziglar is a nationally known positive thinker, and recently was on the program of a positive thinkers rally in Fort Worth, sharing the podium with such speakers as Paul Harvey, Art Linkletter, and Dr. Norman Vincent Peale.

The seminar is the outgrowth of a series of positive thinking rallies, sponsored across the nation in recent years, and featuring nationally known speakers.

The event was attended by 12,000 businessmen, salesman, doctors, farmers, accountants, farmers, and homemakers, and was referred to in the Dallas newspaper as an "eight hour pep rally". Speakers at the rally received front page coverage.

The Lubbock rally will be sponsored by Teague Trampoline, Inc., with Mrs. Juanell Teague, President. She attended the rally in Fort Worth and was so impressed with Ziglar that she invited him to Lubbock to speak.

Ziglar has developed a course in personal growth, known as the "I Can" course, which has been taught in high schools and colleges. Another course, "The Richer Life" class developed by Ziglar, uses his best seller, "See You at the Top" as a textbook.

Ziglar has made many commercial movies and has created produced and participated in training programs for more than 50 major national and international organizations.

In Lubbock, Ziglar will discuss topics such as foundations of greatness, establishing proper relationships, setting and reaching goals, "eliminating stinkin' thinkin'" and succeeding in America.

Assisting Mrs. Teague with ticket sales in Olton is Simmons, a top selling Conklin distributor. Conklin's Chairman of the Board, Bob Conklin, has been a fellow speaker with Ziglar at positive mental attitude rallies, and the Conklin company uses Ziglar's motivational material with their sales force.

Simmons is a strong proponent of a positive mental attitude and says he never tires of hearing Ziglar. "I've seen what positive thinking can do," he says.

Simmons worked as a trucker, farmer, auctioneer, on a cotton gin and on the rodeo circuit before he became a top salesman.

Simmons is married to the former Sharon Busby of Springlake-Earth, and the couple has a son, Vee, age 6; and a daughter, Cherry, age 5.

### Growing Awareness

"A Growing Awareness" will be the theme of the 11th Annual Membership

Meeting of Water, Inc., here February 11 in the Quality Inn.

The twofold theme recognizes the increased concern nationally and worldwide over a potential water crisis and it notes the contributions of agriculture to the American way of life.

"We on the High Plains have long recognized the importance and value of water," said Water, Inc., President J.W. Buchanan. "Now there are growing indications that people elsewhere in this country and the world are beginning to look at their water supplies not as inexhaustible, but as a precious and limited natural resource. We see indications of this daily through stories in newspapers and magazines and on radio and television. There is a growing awareness about our water resources."

For instance, the General Accounting Office recently warned of "increasing signs that the next great resource crisis—an inadequate water supply—may be rapidly approaching." The GAO report warned that such a

crisis may be more difficult to solve than the energy problem.

The Water, Inc., theme also recognizes the High Plains farmer for his annual

contribution to the well-being of this nation. High Plains agriculture, on the average, produces 18 percent of the nation's

cotton, 24 percent of its grain sorghum, 14 percent of its fed cattle, 3 percent of its wheat and 3 percent of its corn annually.

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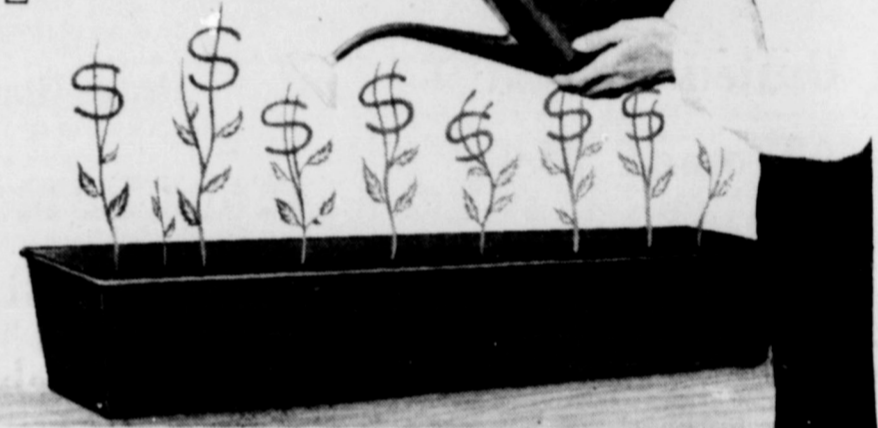
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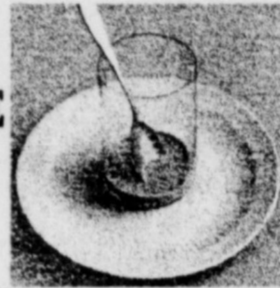
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### Taxpayers Can Avoid Quarterly Tax Payments

Retirees can avoid making estimated tax payments by filing a Form W-4P to have Federal income tax withheld on each pension and annuity payment, the Internal Revenue Service said.

By filing a Form W-4P, "Annuitant's Request for Federal Income Tax Withholding," with the agency paying the pension

or annuity, the taxpayer will not have to file a declaration of estimated tax nor will he or she have

to pay a large sum of money at one time. The only requirement with a W-

4P form is that at least \$5 per month be withheld. Then the taxpayer must only file an annual tax

return on or before April 15.

If a retiree does not file a W-4P and receives pension payments or other incomes which are subject to tax, he or she must file a declaration of estimated income tax, form 1040-ES, when the estimated tax is \$100 or more and estimated gross income includes more than \$500 on which no tax has been withheld.

Payment is then made either in full when the Form 1040-ES is filed or in equal quarterly installments beginning with filing the form, the IRS said.

Taxpayers can obtain further information by checking with a local IRS office.

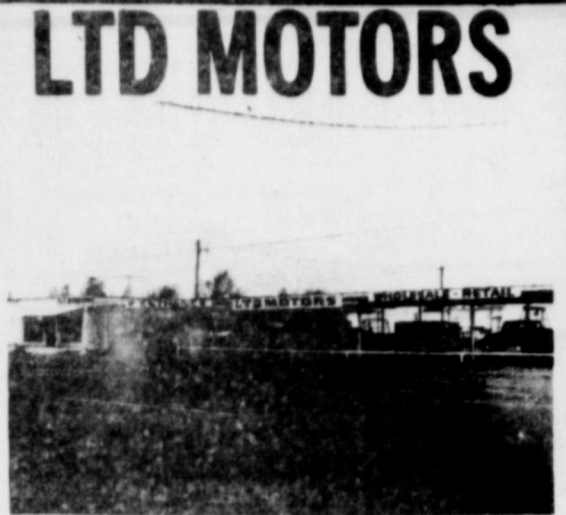
## 'BROWN BAG IT' WITH A WORCESTERED SALAD

### WORCESTERED TUNA-BEAN SPROUT SALAD

- 1 can (6 to 7 oz.) water packed tuna, drained and flaked
- 1 cup bean sprouts
- 1/2 cup green peppers cut in 1/4-inch chunks
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon oil
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon original Worcestershire Sauce
- 1/2 cup cherry tomatoes

## Farmers Swarm Washinton D.C.

By plane, car, pickups and campers, more than 75 Castro County farmers are on their way to Washington D.C., to join the American Agriculture movement's campaign to have at least half a million of the nation's food producers in the capital this weekend.

Meanwhile, another phase of the farm strike began Tuesday when many Castro County wheat producers joined others over the entire grain belt in plowing up part of their acreage.

They plan to repeat the plow up each week "until the federal government decides we are not over-producing," according to a spokesman at the A.A. office here. More than 60 wheat growers in this county signed a statement at the office, pledging to take part in the wheat plow up. Exact totals on the number of farmers traveling to Washington were not available, since many went individually rather than groups, and others joined in groups from nearby counties. The A.A. office estimated "between 75 and 100."

In one party of Dimmitt community farmers flying from Lubbock today (Thursday, January 19) are 24 while as many are going from Hart, including businessmen and bank representatives.

A number of farmers from Nazareth joined a group to leave from Amarillo; several from Easter and other communities in the north part of the county are making the trip with a party from Hereford; some are going from the Sunnyside community with those going from Earth, and others are traveling with Plainview farmers.

Elmer Schulte of Nazareth went in his camper taking several persons. Other campers were reported on their way to Washington D.C., each carrying four to six people who planned to use the campers as their living quarters during their stay in the city where motel rooms were at premium price.

Motel reservations were made in advance by most of the local farmers. Appointments have been arranged for them to see the West Texas lawmakers and those from non-agriculture parts of the country whose to farm

problems is the main aim of the A.A. "swarming" of the capital.

The farmers expect national news service coverage and broadcast coverage in Washington to help their cause, as well as their conference with U.S. Department of Agriculture officials, President Carter's aides and legislators.

Basically, they are asking for 100% parity prices at the market place

for farm and ranch products, limits on imported products that in America, and development of overseas markets for surplus American products.

The farmers also want to be assured of representation in the Agriculture Department so that their voice can be heard in opposition to the consumer oriented demands for cheap food.

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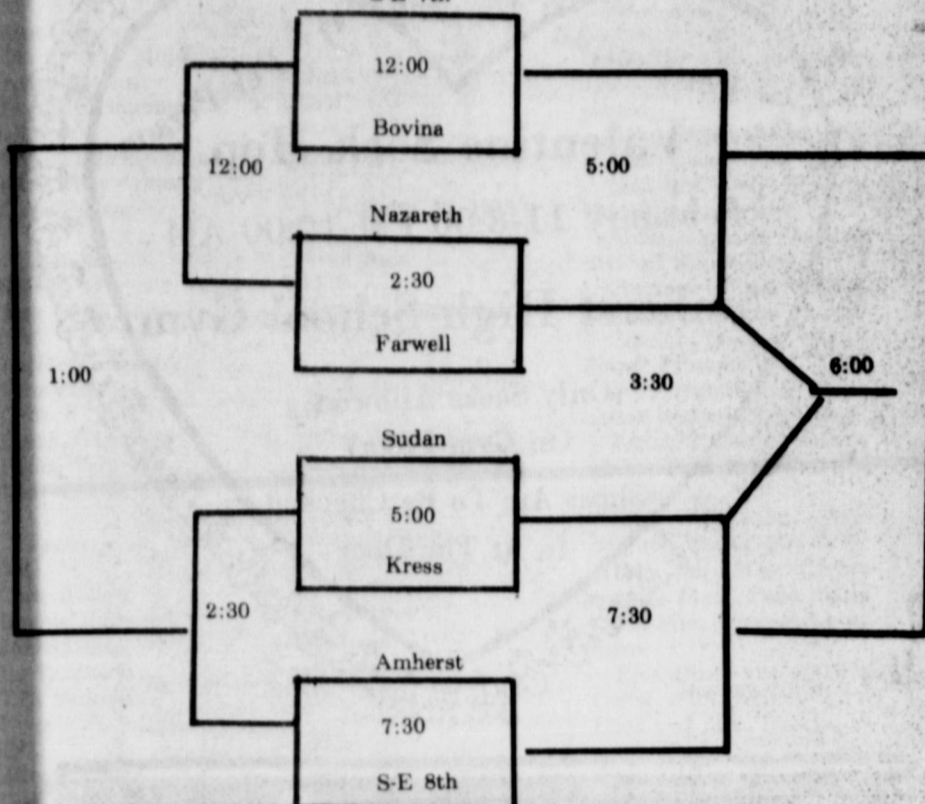

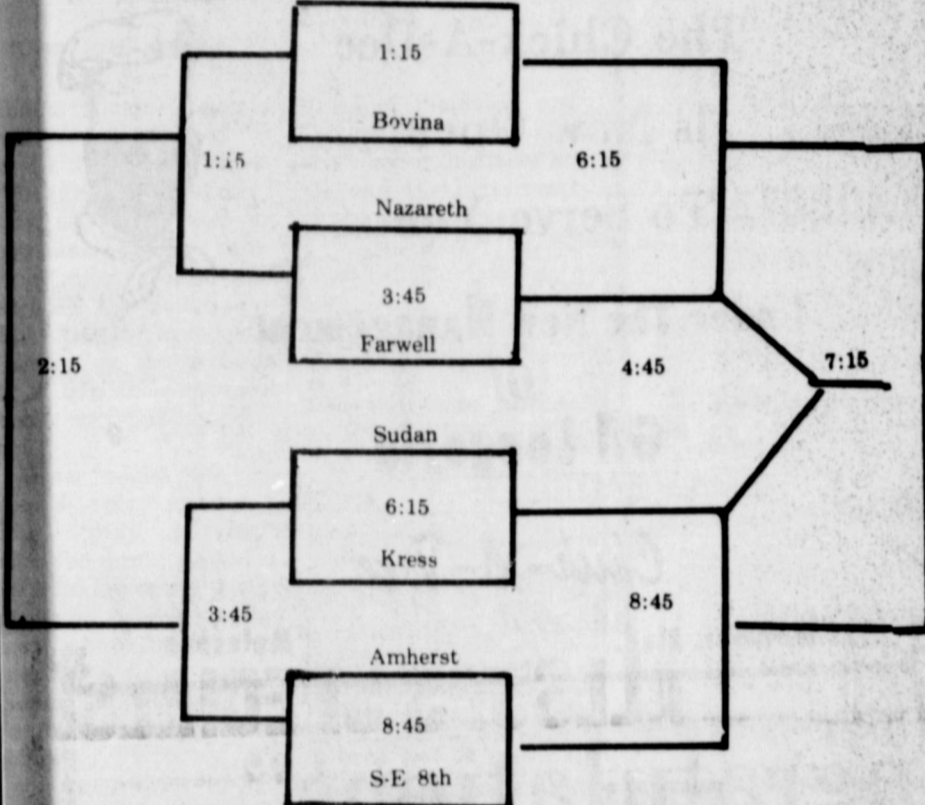

### "Making Earth Tracks"

Editor's Note: "When I think of Bonnie Haberer, I think of leader, world traveler, and progress. She is, indeed, one of the area's outstanding pioneer women. I also admire her attractive hats. Bonnie would not be Bonnie without them. Bonnie Haberer writes: The Haberers came here in 1910, from Nebraska. I (Bonnie Haberer) came in 1918, as a teacher in Deaf Smith near Hereford. We were married at Olney in January, 1920, and then came on to a sheep ranch on a draw in a Model T Roadster. —HABERERS SETTLE IN BIG SQUARE COMMUNITY from The Earth News-Sun, Thursday, August 21,

1969: Early settlers in the Big Square area were Mr. and Mrs. John Haberer, a son, established himself as a farmer and rancher in the community which had been established in 1907-1908 by M.L. Stiles. Herman married Miss Bonnie Angeley in 1920. Mrs. Bonnie (Angeley) Haberer relates the following story.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Angeley made their entry to the plains area in 1917, from Olney, Texas to Hereford. After the area was settled and began to fill, the Angeley family relocated in the Big Square community near Earth in 1924.

Miss Bonnie Angeley,

a 1916 graduate of Olney High School had stayed behind to teach in her old Alma Mater. She related that becoming a teacher at that time did not take the preparation that is needed for certification today.

The two main colleges in Texas at the time were West Texas State Teacher's College (now University in Canyon and the College of Industrial Arts (Texas Women's University) located at Denton. Most high school graduates could not afford formal education of a higher level, however, teacher training was provided for many through Normal Schools.

Miss Angeley, like many others, attended the Normal School in Olney which was instructed by the outstanding teachers in the county. After the summer course of study was completed, students became eligible to take the state examination for teacher certification.

Miss Angeley taught her first year in Olney and then moved to the Plains area in 1918. She recalls getting off the train in Amarillo at Christmas time, 1918. The trainman who carried her bags walked across the yard in fourteen inches of snow. That winter, the first snows came in November and were never completely off the ground until March.

Bonnie established herself in the Hereford area with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Angeley, and taught in

the Hereford vicinity until she met and married Herman Haberer in 1920.

Bonnie first met Herman on July 4, 1918, in Hereford at a dance honoring the Angeley girls. Bonnie states: "The big red headed, six foot man was there and that's where it started." They were married January 29, 1920, at her old family home in Olney Texas.

Mr. and Mrs. Herman Haberer resided on a sheep ranch in the Big Square Community for the first five years of their marriage. Bonnie helped him care 4500 head of sheep and several hundred head of cattle.

Bonnie recalls traveling with the sheep shearing crew in 1923. Herman traveled from Big Square through Castro County up to Deaf Smith County shearing sheep for the ranchers. Ham Lambert traveled with Herman and the Mexican shearers as a tool dresser, (sharpening). During the two week shearing trip, Bonnie cooked for the entire crew in a tent.

Bonnie spent much of her time helping Herman. However she managed to find time for teaching. She taught the first seven grades in the one room plank school building in Big Square. The Seventeen pupils

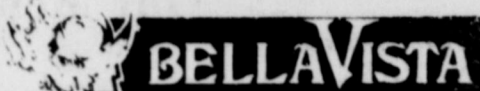
who attended the school walked, rode horses, or came by buggy. After the first seven grades were completed, students went on to

others places and boarded if higher education was desired. Mr. and Mrs. Haberer attended Church services at the Big Square

Schoolhouse, with other area residents. The Union Sunday School met every Sunday. A Methodist preacher from (Cont. on page 7)

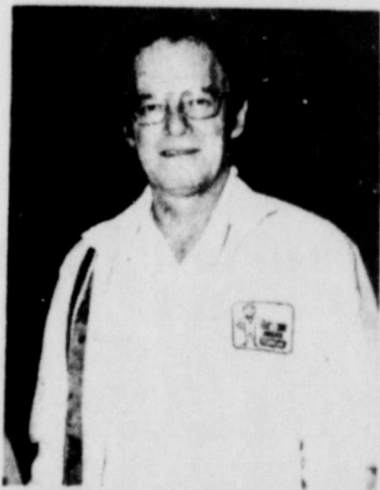

Dimmitt came once a month and helped in preaching services. "Preaching Sunday" was social as well as spiritual. People came from miles around and enjoyed the fellowship. The afternoon involved a "dinner on the grounds or a trip to someone's home for Sunday dinner."

Other social life included "play parties". The "play parties" involved music provided by a fiddler and a group of young people singing and chanting songs instead of a caller. Bonnie quoted one of her favorite chants as follows:

Rusel of Plainview and Ted of Earth, who also share her enthusiasm for life and the betterment of the community.

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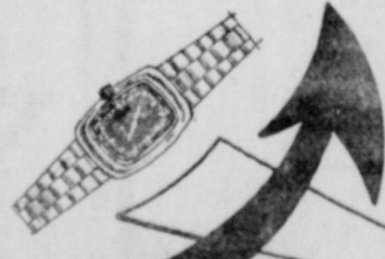
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
