

He supplies a plow and animals to his neighbor with the understanding that he is to receive one-tenth of the increased production. The neighbor will profit nine times as much as he himself by this arrangement. The saving and industry of the first nan benefits the second man far more than himself.

The first man becomes a capital-

ist by supplying animals and tools

ist by supplying animals and tools to the farmers throughout the community. In so doing he becomes rich himself, but the benefit accruing to his neighbors exceeds his own gain by many times.

If his neighbors refuse to pay him, he will stop working, inventing, and creating new improvements for their benefit. He will suffer, to be sure, by reason of their refusal to give him sufficient reward to induce him to continue his improvements, but the community will sufents, but the community will suf-

r incomparably more. Unless adequate reward is offered the saver, the risk-taker, the into the saver, the risk-taker, the in-novator, and the enterpriser, the efforts of such men will decline and all will suffer thereby. Under a free enterprise system, seeing benefit accrue to the risk-taker, other men are stimulated to save and invest their savings to the further enrich-ment of the community.

A bold, hardworking man saves enough to build a factory and employs a number of other men to operate his machines. The employees benefit by less exhausting toil and by much higher incomes than they might enjoy if they worked for themselves and labored with they hands

with their hands.

If the right to own property and receive reward for its use is denied, people will not work hard, invent or initiate in order to create property. If this right is taken away the results will be unfortunate for property of the results will be unfortunate for property of the results. respits will be unfortunate for property-owning citizens but the results will be infinitely worse for the mass of people whose high standard of living is made possible by capital equipment. This equipment came into being through the efforts of risk-takers aided by savings, inventions and good management.


