A British physician says that practically everyone working in physical therapy is thoroughly dissatisfied with the present results in posture training. The reason, he believes, is partly because the wrong things are being taught and partly because the whole concept of posture training is wrong.

The basis point which is being overlooked in most remedial work, according to Dr. Wilfred Barlow, is that behaviour — not structure —determines the mechanics of the body. A person's muscular tensions are a fundamental part of his defense against the world. When his tension state is removed, he may for a time feel naked, defenseless, and "wrong" as he copes with his affairs. This is one of the greatest difficulties in teaching him new habits. He rapidly reverts to his old tension state and to the old posture associated with it—the posture, say, of submission to authority by slight eringing. 

Pink-Eye And Pilfered Profits



Some diseases kill farm animals outright; others—like pink-eye in cattle—are more insidious than deadly.
For though pink-eye rarely kills, it is a continuous drain on cattle profits. When the disease strikes, cattlemen are liable to heavy losses from poor condition of afflicted animals and falling off in body weight. In dairy cows, pink-eye often cuts milk flow in half.

Scientists believe that this eye inflammation, called infectious keratitis, is caused by a mixture of germs. It often is spread by flies, gnats, dust and pollen. The disease is widespread among range and feed-lot cattle throughout the U.S. and other parts of North

and feed-lot cattle throughout the U.S. and other parts of North America, and has also been reported in India and Africa.

At the onset of infection, the eye becomes bloodshot, eyelids puff up, and in severe cases, a heavy outflow of pus-filled tears keeps the animal's face soiled and moist. Left unchecked, the infection clouds the eye, dimming sight. In advanced stages, ulcers may form and lead to permanent eye damage or blindness.

Pink-eye flares up most often during warm-weather months. An infected animal quickly spreads the disease, and half the herd may be affected. Cattle of all ages are hit by pink-eye although the dis-

among those under two years.

Fortunately, in recent years veterinary researchers have discovered that antibiotics are highly effective in treating pink-eye in cattle. The broad-range antibiotic Terramycin rapidly clears up the infection, gets the animal back on normal feeding routine, and thus prevents loss of poundage.


In addition to sapping cattlemen's profits, diseases like pink-eye have a more sinister foreboding. Agricultural economists point out that the U.S. will have to produce enough meat for an expected population of 225 million 20 years frem now. Every pound lost through disease is a setback to this goal.

Thus modern veterinary scientives, fighting livestock diseases with potent antibiotics like Terramycin, are belping to meet the challenge of greater meat productivity for the years ahead.

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



Vegetable Virtues

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The legions of Rome probably consumed more cabbage than any other army in history. While this ancient partiality to the leafy vegetable may not impress students of military logistics, modern medical scientists find it significant. For the Roman warriors favored cabbage not for its pungent flavor, but as a dressing for battle wounds. soil. Since the discovery of peni-cillin, scientists have tested soil samples from all parts of the globe, and have given doctors pow-erful broad-range antibiotics like Terramycin and Tetracyn which quickly control once-fatal infec-

In the light of recent discoveries, such age-old herbal remedies may have been more effective than scientists once believed. One U.S. physician reports that raw cabbage juice is rich in a substance believed to be helpful in healing stomach ulcers. Substances deadly to many kinds of germs have been found in other veretables, includfound in other vegetables, includ-ing carrots, okra, cucumbers and

Some common fruits, too, contain microbe killers. One tropical fruit known as jagua has been used as a medicine for centuries by Carribean peoples. Researchers at the University of Puerto Rico re-cently isolated an extract from the jagua which hits the bacteria that cause intestinal infections.

Though many higher plants harbor antibiotic-like substances, our most potent drugs have been searched out among the simpler forms of microscopic life in the

CHECK YOUR INSURANCE POLICIES

One of the most familiar types of contracts is the insurance pol icy, ts nearly everyone carries some sort of insurance protection Yet, few people take the trouble to read their policies and lawyers have to answer many questions regarding insurance generally

Here is a problem frequently presented: "I have a hospitaliza tion insurance policy. Will the company pay all of my hospital bills if I become ill."

It may or may not. Insurance is a contract between the insur ance company and the policy holder. In the usual contract the policy holder agrees to pay a certain sum of money for the policy of insurance, and the insurance com pany agrees that should the policy holder incur hospital expenses that the insurance company will make payment to the policy holder of stated sums, as set out in the policy of insurance.

Though evidence is accumulating daily for the value of hypn Though evidence is accumulating daily for the value of hypnosis as a therapeutic tool, its use has largely been limited to difficult childbirths and reclaiming amnesia victims and alcoholics. Now it has been used to stop a cough which had persisted for eight days and was precipitating the death of a 14 year old girl.

The patient had been admitted to the hospital with a deep, brassy, body-shaking cough which had failed to let up in 72 hours. Despite

failed to let up in 72 hours. Despite medication with every cough suppressent in the hospital formu-

lary, the patient continued to cough—and to fail.

With the patient dangerously near exhaustion after eight hacking days, Dr. R. H. Gwartney of San Bernardino, Calif. slowly induced a hypnotic state, suggestively setting up increasing time limits for the patient to suppress her cough. By the third day, the patient had the cough under con-trol, and was discharged from the
