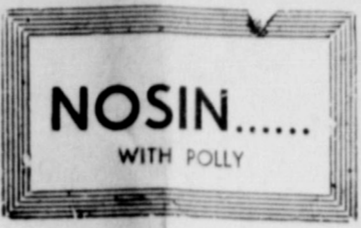

## Hail Last Wednesday Damages Crops In Earth and Springlake Areas

Several hundred acres of cotton was hailed out last Wednesday afternoon in the Earth and Springlake area. The hail damaged area covered about two miles in width and several miles in length. It is believed the farmers receiving hail were damaged from 75 per cent to 100 per cent loss on their cotton. Among those reporting loss were Marvin Sanders, Abe Griffin, George Taylor, Donald Kelley, K. Trot-

ter, Gardner Sanderson, H. H. and B. T. Hamilton, Floyd Burgess, Tuffy Dent, Johnny K. Martin, Dewey and John Moses, Golden Green and Johnny Martin. Some were covered with hail insurance. Most of the farmers began replanting feed immediately. Abe Griffin plans to plant Pinto beans, and then some of the farmers leaving the cotton as they feel it is almost to late to replant anything, and hoping their cotton will produce at least a small quantity

## Work Begins On New Faust Clinic And Laboratory

Ground work begin this week on the site where a new modern 15 room clinic will be erected by Dr. and Mrs. F. B. Faust, according to Delma McCarty, contractor. The clinic will be located directly north of the LaCasa Motel in the east part of Earth. The building will be constructed of cement blocks with a stone trimmed front. The 30'x54' building will have four patient rooms, two examining rooms, laboratory, x-ray room, utility room, drug room, storage room, kitchen, two baths, lobby and waiting room. Dr. and Mrs. Faust opened a clinic and laboratory in the Earth community building in June 1955.

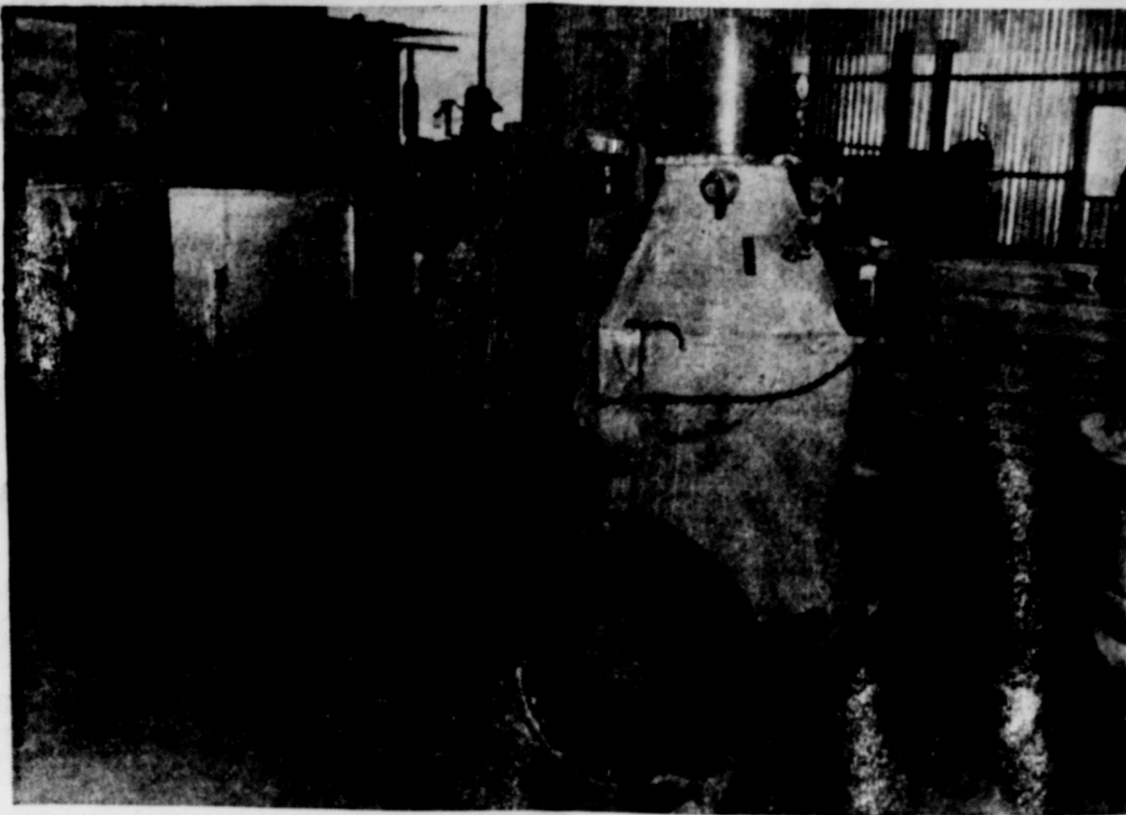
