



The seed separated from cotton lint during ginning once was a waste disposal problem. Now it's a valuable by-product of the cotton crop.

The fuzz on cottonseed is removed at the oil mill. These short fibers are called linters and they're an important source of cellulose for rayon, transparent packaging materials, plastics, photographic films, smokeless powder, lacquers, and paper. Absorbent cotton and felts for upholstery and mattresses also come from linters.

Next, the kernels, or meats, are extracted from the hulls. Crude oil from the meats is refined for salad and cooking oils, mayonnaise, shortening margarine, and other foods. From the "foots," or residue feed, a flour for bread and after refining, come glycerine cookies, and fertilizer. for explosives, cosmetics, and Hulls also are used for pharmaceuticals.



Nitrogen Suggested For Small Grain

College Station-Been wondering how to increase the forage grain yields of your small grain crop? R. J. Miears, extension agronomist, says nitrogen, applied before the plants begin to joint but late enough to avoid the danger of a hard freeze, is the answer.

If the crop has been grazed, much of the available nitrogen has been utilized by the plants and removed by animals. Grain crops need nitrogen at this time to stimulate additional growth for maxium yields, explains Miears. Nitrogen applications also increase the protein levels of grain, and in wheat improves the baking of the flour.

Application rates of 20 to 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre will usually pay big dividends if moisture is adequate, says the in High School and College were specialist. For specific application recommendations, consult your local county agent.



Farm Facts

According to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, an hour of farm labor produces four times as much food and fiber as it did 40 years ago.

Productivity of farm workers increased by 61/2% a year during the 1950's - about three times the increased output in non-agricultural industry, which went up 2% per year.

The average productivity per farm worker has more than doubled in the last 20 years. In fact, it has gone up more in the last two decades than in all recorded time prior to 1940.

Crop production is 65% greater per acre than it was 40 years ago, and output per breeding animal is 88%

In 1910, It took a farmer 135 hours to produce 100 bushels of corn, 106 hours for 100 bushels of wheat, and 276



hours for a bale of cotton.

In 1960, it took about 15 man-hours to produce 100 bushels of corn, 13 for 100 bushels of wheat, and 57 for a bale of cotton.
