All school children in Lamb County, 15 years of age and over are scheduled for chest X-ray on December 2 in Littlefield.

Springlake school children time is at 10:30 a.m. Children must be there at specified time.

All adults are requested to come to Littlefield on Saturday, December 3 for X-rays.

The X-rays are free to all persons fifteen years and older. You do not have to undress and it only takes a few minutes to get your X-ray.

You owe it to yourself and your family to have a chest X-ray once a year.

Sandel left the field with a shoulder separation after scoring an extra point and making several other plays.

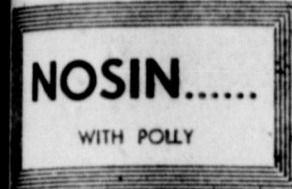
Sandel was immediately rushed to a Plainview Hospital, where surgery was performed Saturday morning.

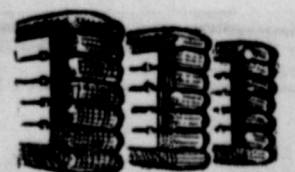
Some folks don't have to see the guilty one to know who does the trick. Seems that a certain lady was checking out at the grocery store and found a large glass of snuff in her basket.



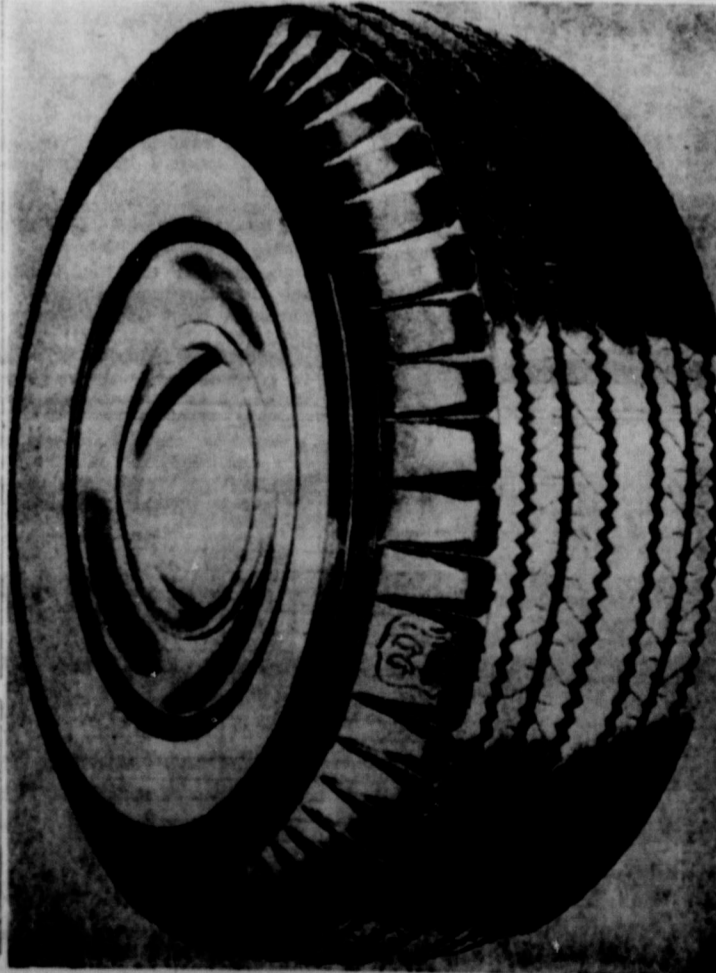

## SCIENCE IN YOUR LIFE



Sore Throat Salved

Scholarly A. E. Housman once wrote that his poetry "sprang chiefly from physical causes, such as a relaxed sore throat." Few of us could rival Housman's literary style, but a waning sore throat often evokes in us at least a poetic sigh of relief.

Your sore throat may show up as one of the most annoying symptoms of the common cold. It can also be a separate infection caused by a variety of bacteria. A particularly vicious type of infection is the commonly-termed "strep" throat caused by streptococcus germs.

Although the common cold so far remains intractable, science fortunately has developed some effective remedies against throat infections. Doctors use antibiotics routinely in treating the "strep" throat. Drug stores now sell antibiotics in the form of candy-like lozenges. These orange-flavored Candettes attack invading microbes and ease throat pain. Saline sprays are helpful in washing out the mucus of a sore throat.

are spread by coughing and sneezing, many attempts have been made to keep germs from floating in the air. Ultraviolet light and medicated vapor sprays have been used.

Still, respiratory diseases, including sore throat and the common cold, cost the U.S. a staggering two billion dollars annually. Other estimates place the toll as high as five billion. A recent study of illness among employees of a major petroleum company revealed that respiratory ailments account for over half of the absences.

Although sore throat may herald only a common cold, medical specialists warn that it may also tip off the onset of a more serious disease. If symptoms hang on or keep coming back, you should consult your doctor.

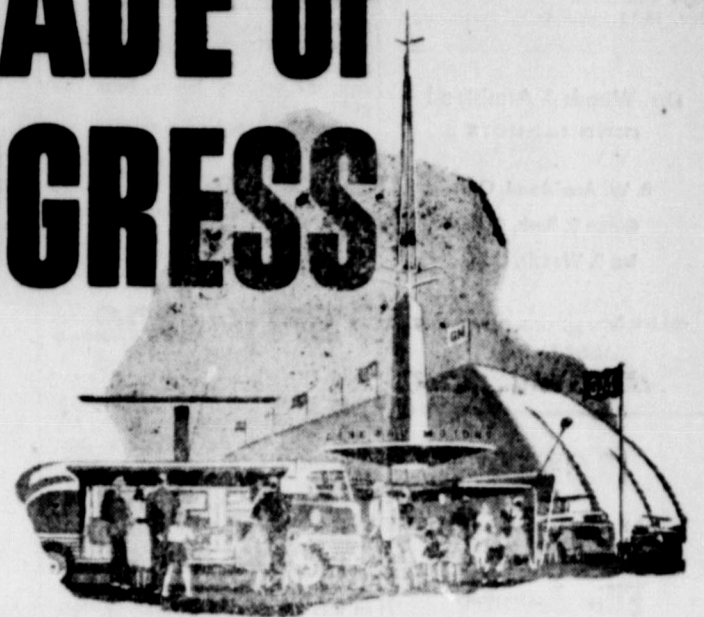

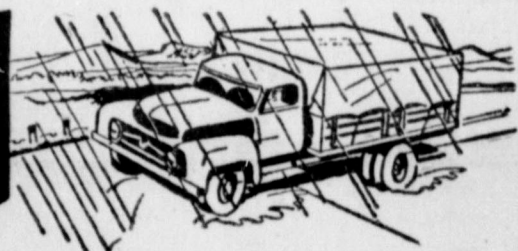

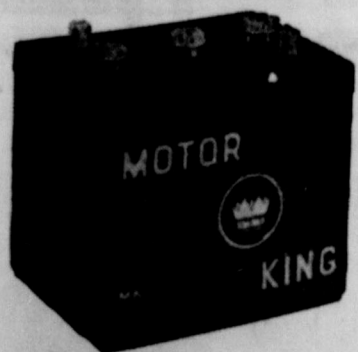

Commercially frozen chickens and turkeys are packaged at the peak of perfection and are government-inspected. So you can't go wrong with them. And, of course, if you've frozen your own prize gobbler, you're sure of the best.

Vegetables for your meal can come from the freezer, too, but a few fresh vegetables just can't be duplicated for honest-to-goodness good eating. Like the tiny white onions so plentiful this time of year. Dress them up with a smacking-good mushroom sauce.

**Holiday Creamed Onions**

2 pounds small white onions  
 1/2 cup cream butter or margarine  
 1 can (1 1/2 cups) condensed cream of mushroom soup  
 1 cup cream or top milk  
 1 cup chopped walnuts  
 1/2 cup shredded American cheese  
 Cook onions in lightly salted boiling water until almost done; drain. Place in a 1 1/2-quart casserole, dot with butter. Meanwhile, stir soup until smooth, blend in cream and walnuts; pour over onions. Sprinkle cheese on top. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) about 30 minutes or until cheese is melted and slightly browned. 6 servings.

Round out the meal with buttered sweet potatoes, hot biscuits with homemade jam, a molded fruit salad (made the day before), and a heaping tray of relishes. Dessert: pumpkin pie and coconut cake. Then sit back and bask in compliments that come your way. Sure enough, you're a champion cook! *FWS*

2. From the body of the apron by sewing the two lengths to the two towels evenly joined. To make pocket, put right side of remaining towel against the wrong side of the bottom of apron. Sew. Turn back up with border showing. Make pocket with 4" stitching across apron.

3. Sew two cut-off borders flat along other side of the apron to build the pocket and finish sides.

4. Sew two 24" striped borders to make apron ties. Attach to side of apron.

5. Make 11" neckband from border. Sewing edges to finish off. Attach to top

of apron bib. Bind cut curve of bib with bias tape.

6) Barbecue glove front and back pieces can be cut from additional towel placed so that the border runs along wrist. Use your own hand on a pattern allowing 1" seamway. Cut outside lining from face cloth. Place all three together, stitch and bind with bias tape. Make tape loop at corner of wrist.

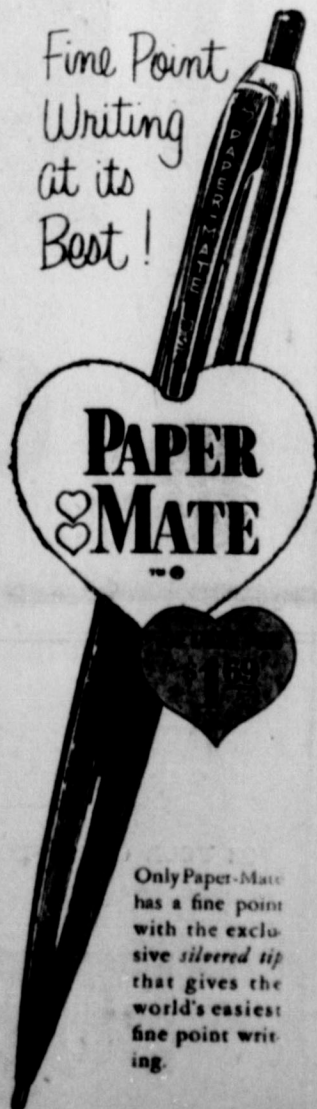

AUSTIN, Tex. — After three elected years, Texas again has an official, accredited Democratic national committee.

Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey's acceptance by the national committee gave Texas full representation for the first time since September, 1932. Wright Morrow was refused

recognition because he supported Republican Dwight Eisenhower. Official groups of both conservative and liberal Texas Democrats supported Ramsey. Only scattered protests were heard, one by the president of the liberal faction of the Texas Young Democratic Clubs.

**SHIVERS OKAYS DEMO RULES**

Gov. Allan Shivers says he is willing to play by the rules adopted for the 1956 Democratic national convention.

He said at a news conference that he expects to be challenged, nevertheless, by a "bunch of wild-eyed pinks."

Rules set for 1956 were viewed by Shivers as being the same as in 1952. Then they required heads of delegations to work for placing the party nominee's name on the state ballot under the proper column.

Shivers said he is not surprised to hear that some old political enemies, like Stephen Mitchell, Ad-

lai Stovenson's aide, think he should not be allowed a 1956 seat.

He held firm that he would not take any pledge to support the party nominee. "I will give no pledge to support a nominee until I know who he is," Shivers said.

He said he considers himself a "bona fide democrat" and feels it is no crime for a democrat to vote for a Republican friend.

"I consider President Eisenhower a friend of mine," the governor said. His statement was widely interpreted as indicating he might support Eisenhower again if he is a candidate.

**UT TESTS SLATED**

High school seniors with a University of Texas career in mind will find a good vocabulary, logical mind and number sense helpful in taking the scheduled aptitude tests.

Tests may be taken in 42 Texas cities on three dates — February 4, May 12 and August 10. Dr. H. T. Manuel, director of the University Testing and Guidance Bureau, said that, as a general rule, a student can be confident of his ability to succeed with university work if he is in the upper three-fifths of his high school class and makes a score of 75 or more on the aptitude test. Most of those applying for entrance would be admitted, he said.

The tests are designed to mea-

sure two very general abilities in academic work. First is the ability to work with words and to understand their meanings. Second is the ability to work with numbers and to solve problems. Scores on the required tests will not be the only basis for admission. Dr. Manuel added. All test scores will be kept confidential.

**GILES APPEALS PENDING**

Former Land Commr. Bascom Giles can count on at least two and one-half months more of freedom.

Both Giles' convictions in land scandal trials have been appealed to the Court of Criminal Appeals. Formal submission of the Austin conviction and three-year prison sentence is set for January 18.

**LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL POSTS FILLED**

Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey announced committee assignments at the first meeting of the new Legislative council.

Serving on the executive com-

mittee with Ramsey and House Speaker Jim Lindsey will be Sen. Abraham Kazon of Laredo and Reps. Obie Bristow of Big Springs and W. G. Kirklin of Odessa.

Studying finances will be Sen. Neville Colson of Navasota and Gus Strauss of Hallettsville. Reps. E. P. Crim of Henderson, W. S. Heatley Jr. of Paducah and Pearce Johnson of Austin.

On the subject matter committee are Sen. Rorer Kelley of Edinburg, George Moffett of Chillicothe, Reps. Tom King of Dallas, Gus Garrett of Raymondville, James W. Vancy Jr. of Houston, Ben A. Glusing of Kingsville and Joe Burkett of Kerrville.

As to subject matter to be studied before the next regular session, committee members say the council already is "loaded."

**HISTORICAL COMMITTEES ORGANIZING**

Every county in Texas is being asked by the State Historical Survey committee to set up a Coun-

ty Committee, announced HSC director George W. Hill of Austin.

The state committee was authorized by the 1953 Legislature to study the subject of preservation

and dissemination of the records of Texas and Texasans. County judges, with other officials, have been asked to appoint committees for their counties.

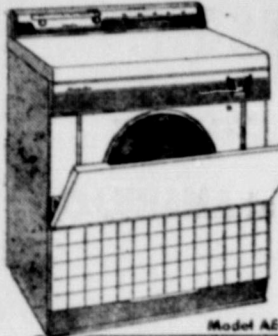

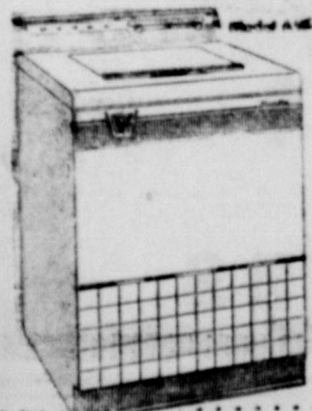

### Stopping The Heart

Cardiac surgeons have demonstrated successfully a variety of ingenious procedures to permit operations under direct vision inside the heart. None has come into regular use, however. The danger of introducing air into the circulatory system through the bloodless but still beating heart, and in the case of some techniques the risk of cardiac arrest have discouraged such surgery. A team of British surgeons, however, boldly proposes to solve these problems by stopping the heart... deliberately.



The suggestion came from D. G. Meirose and a group of colleagues at the Postgraduate Medical School of London and the Charing Cross Hospital Medical School. They became interested in the possibility of stopping the heart for surgery through efforts to repeat an experimental American treatment for the disorganized beating of the heart known as ventricular fibrillation.

Ventricular fibrillation is a cause of cardiac arrest. It can occur during a variety of operations, but is most frequent in hypothermia (artificial lowering of the body temperature as an aid to surgery).

The American group... Dr. A. V. Montgomery and associates of the University of Colorado sought to treat fibrillation by stopping the fibrillating heart with a chemical agent and then starting it again.

The British were not able quite to duplicate the results reported by the Americans. But the experience gave them the idea of stopping the heart purposely for surgery.

Meirose and his colleagues have performed experiments both with

intact dogs and with isolated heart preparations from the dog, cat, rabbit and guinea pig.

Stopping the heart for surgery would avoid altogether the risk of air embolism; the surgeon need only squeeze the air out of the flaccid heart as he closed it after operating and before starting it again. The procedure would also obviate the hard-to-manage emergency of fibrillation. In addition, if further study shows it feasible, the daring British scheme would furnish the cardiac surgeon with an even better object for his labors than he had dreamed... a heart that remained bloodless, open and quiet throughout operation.

## Pioneer Dies At Paducah

J. J. Gibson, 85, one of the most colorful pioneers of King and Cottle Counties died of a heart attack at 11:45 p.m., Saturday, November 19 in Richards Memorial Hospital at Paducah.

Final rites were held at 3:00 p.m. in the Paducah Baptist Church with Rev. Herbert Johnson officiating.

Mr. Gibson came to this section of the state at the age of 16 and worked for the old Mabry Cattle Co. Later he worked for Cattle Baron Ike T. Pryor and Louisville Land and Cattle Company.

In spring 1891, trail driving became a part of Mr. Gibson's routine as he helped drive 1,500 steers

through Indian Territory to the Kansas line, where grass leases had been secured for the herd.

Gibson a tall, robust, typical Texan, could spin interesting facts and tales of this section of the Lone Star State, he loved so much and labored to help settle. He was a progressive citizen, a firm believer in education and had a very active part in the promotion of free public schools in King County.
