Brother Of Local Woman Injured As Train Hits Car

Jimmy Nix 17, Amherst, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim D. Nix was seriously injured Tuesday night when his car was struck by a freight train at a crossing in Littlefield.

Nix, brother of Mrs. R. J. Brock, Earth, along with four other Amherst boys were apparently "just out for a ride" when the accident occurred about 8:38 p.m.

George Williams, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. (Wart) Williams, died in the emergency room at Medical Arts Hospital at 10:10 p.m.

Others injured were Jimmy Love, 18, Reagan Cox, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Cox and Guy Brown, 16.

The Love youth was in critical condition at Littlefield Hospital and Clinic late Tuesday. The Nix youth was listed in very serious condition at Medical Arts Hospital.

Cox and Brown were both in fair condition at Littlefield Hospital and Clinic.

The car in which the youths were riding was reported to have been knocked about 75 yards and totally demolished.

Officers said the accident apparently was not caused by weather or glazed roads. They also said the crossing, which is about 150 yards from the Littlefield station, has flashing red lights and bell signals.

Officers reported the youths car appeared to have been struck by the train near the rear door indicating that the boys "almost made it across the tracks."

The youths all attended Amherst High School.

The parents of the Nix youth were in Arizona at the time of the accident.

The Nix family are former residents of Earth.

A record snowstorm which struck unexpectedly, after about a week of spring like weather, and left wide portions of the South Plains virtually paralyzed under a blanket of snow up to 19 inches deep in some areas Monday night.

Thousands of motorists, including hundreds of school students were stranded temporarily by the flash storm in neighboring cities.

Highways and farm roads were impassable and air traffic was at a standstill.

Lubbock measured more than a foot of snow on the ground.

Classes in the Lubbock public schools and at Texas Tech, as well as other schools in the surrounding area were cancelled Tuesday.

The heaviest snow was reported at Levelland, Plains and Lovington each reporting 19 inches on the ground. Littlefield reported 16.

The snow fell at the rate of up to two inches per hour over some of the area.

Elders said they could recall nothing to compare with Monday's snowstorm.

In the immediate Earth area most of the snow melted as it fell.

Two inches of moisture was reported at Earth from the snow.

Mrs. J. J. Barlow Injured In Fall At Her Home

The accident occurred about 10 a.m. when Mrs. Barlow started from one roof to another with an arm load of clothes and stumbled over a leaf from the dining table which had fallen across the doorway.

The leaf had been removed from the table and stood against the wall and fell into Mrs. Barlow's path.

Marion Barlow was present at the time of the accident and took her mother to Littlefield Hospital Clinic where X-rays revealed that her right foot and knee were sprained. She was treated and released but was admitted to the hospital Wednesday for more X-rays and treatment.

Glenda Williamson: No, I don't really think we should because it would create the problem of having two big communists countries to battle.

Ralph Wislan: I don't know, but it doesn't seem fair not to let eight hundred million people have representation.

Gaye Northcott: No, I don't think so because of the way they over threw the government and because they are communists.

Clarence Hamilton: I don't think we can refuse admission to a country with one fourth the world's population and still have a United Nations because the United Nations is supposed to be made up of the world's nations.

Mr. Hemphill: There are two factors to be considered. First, is that by allowing communist china to become a member of the U. N. we would be letting them get away with the unethical over throwing of the Chinese government. Second, is the extreme potential dangers as a power. By not allowing them to enter into the U. N. we may be missing an opportunity of peaceful negotiations that would otherwise be impossible. At this time I favor denying them membership in the United Nations.

Margaret Meadows: Logically it seems that such a large percentage of the world population should be represented in a world organization. But would their voice be the peoples? No, it would be the voice of a small ruling clique—the communists. If we let in even one more communist nation, that will only compound our already serious problems. Yes it would mean just one more vote, but it would also mean just that much more pressure on many undecided nations. Democracy, or world justice and representation, the objective of the United Nations and the heart of Americanism, believes in allowing even our enemies a voice. But with the U. N. already in such a precarious position, can we be so naive as to think that we can let such a vicious, open enemy of democracy have a greater voice and not endanger more our own position & that of the U. N.? True, they are just as active overseas as the U. N., and are making their influence be felt the world over with out being a U. N. member. Their is little we can do about this, except combat it with our own literature, radio programs and ambassadors. But keeping them out might help save the U. N. and we should use every effort to do that. It may be a lost cause; I hope not, but the possibility of over-throwing Communism seems more remote each day, and it is communism that is ruining the U. N. As I see it, there is no clearcut yes or no to your question.

 "Forty percent of our population is connected some way with agriculture; states Springlake High's Agricultural instructor, Mr. E. G. Gaston. Even though there is a trend toward fewer farmers in the future because of the many improvements being made, there are, according to him, many new fields that are fast developing. Among them are: County Agricultural Agents, Agricultural teachers, Agricultural representatives for industries, banks, insurance companies, oil companies, rail-road companies. "Opportunities in these and other fields are wide open," he says.

Mr. Gaston was born in Anson, Texas, to Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Gaston. He did most of growing up in Van Zandt County, and during his high school years, he was active in football and basketball.

After graduating from high school he entered Texas Tech at Lubbock where he held a part time job of assistant farmer, and at another time, he served as a janitor. His major was in Agricultural Education, and he received his B. S. degree upon graduation. Later in the service, he was a Naval Air Corps aviation mechanic.

This is Mr. Gaston's eleventh year to teach, and his fourth year to teach here. He has also served on school faculties of Lakeview and White Deer, Texas. "I like teaching," he comments, "and I like teaching Ag. Its so diversified—the many different types of things we do." Each year, many of Mr. Gaston's pupils win various kinds of prizes and awards at fairs and contests; and Springlake School can be proud of its representation wherever our FFA Chapter goes. Mr. Gaston feels, though, that the two greatest honors that have come our way while he has been here have been; the time that one of Tracy Angeley's swine won the Grand Championship award at Houston and winning the State Leadership Contest last year, which was a rural leadership contest, or a farm skill demonstration. Mr. Gaston and the FFA Chapter can well afford to be proud of these accomplishments, as well as their many others. The agricultural department of our school has certainly developed and grown since Mr. Gaston came. Much progress has been made under his direction. Right now the thing that he and the boys are proudest of is that new FFA barn under construction just west of Earth. Its capacity will be approximately 100 head of calves, lambs, and hogs; and it should be finished before long.

During his leisure time, Mr. Gaston likes "to go around and visit the different projects" of his students, and "attending Texas Tech football and basketball games. I enjoy sports very much—anything that's in season." At one time, he was a member of the White Deer Lions Club.

Mrs. Gaston is an elementary teacher in our school, and teaches a roomful of first-graders. The Gastons have four children: Roberta, who is a second-grader, Marg Paige and Shelly, six year old twins, and James Dyke, age four.

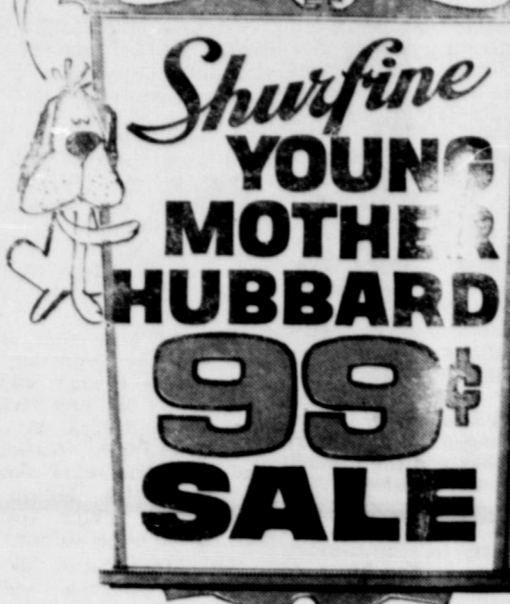

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 48
AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE MAXIMUM RATE OF SPEED FOR MOTOR VEHICLES; ALLOWING FOR SPEED ZONES; PROVIDING FOR PENALTY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Earth, Texas, upon the basis of engineering and traffic investigation, find it necessary to establish maximum speed limits, and create speed zones in certain areas, all within the corporate limits of the City of Earth, Texas.

SECTION 1. Speed limits of thirty (30) miles per hour; It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to drive or operate a motor vehicle upon any street, roadway or highway in the City Limits of the City of Earth, Texas, at a greater rate of speed than thirty (30) miles per hour, except where speed zone signs are erected indicating a higher or lower rate of speed, in which case the speed indicated by the speed zone signs shall be the maximum speed permitted. And it shall be unlawful for any person to operate a motor

vehicle in excess to the speed limits indicated on any official speed zone signs.

SECTION 2. The speed zones established by this Ordinance shall include all of U. S. 70 within the Corporate Limits of Earth, Texas; the maximum legal speed limits shall be as follows:
Beginning at the west city limit the maximum legal speed limit for both eastbound and westbound traffic shall be 55 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.237 miles; thence 40 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.200 miles; thence 30 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.375 miles; thence 40 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.200 miles; thence 55 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.484 miles to the east city limit.

SECTION 3. The speed zones established by this Ordinance shall include all of F. M. 1055 (Amherst Street) within the Corporate Limits of Earth, Texas; the maximum legal speed limit shall be as follows:
Beginning at U. S. 70 within Earth the maximum legal speed limit for both southbound and northbound traffic shall be 45 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.250 miles to the south; thence 55 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.250 miles to the south city limits.

SECTION 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction

thereof, be fined in any sum not less than Ten (\$10.00) Dollars nor more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

Section 5. That the hazards, dangerous to public health and safety, creates a necessity requiring all rules providing that no ordinance shall be finally passed on the day of its introduction be suspended; and this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure, to take effect from and after the date of its first publication.

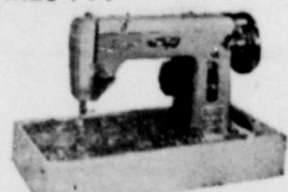
