Improved Phone Service Promised Earth - Lazbuddy

Greatly improved telephone service is in store for Earth subscribers early next year when the dial switching equipment here is replaced with dial equipment of almost twice the capacity of the present equipment.

Fred Mathis, district manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest, today announced the changeout of equipment which will cost about \$27,000 and will begin in December.

As a result of the expansion, the Earth dial building has been enlarged about one-third to provide space for the larger equipment and space for additional equipment expansion in years to come.

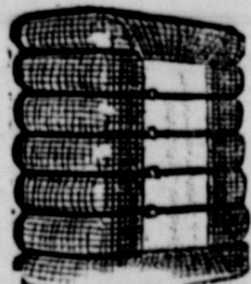
Mathis said some of the present equipment has already been moved in the building to make way for the installation of the new dial unit which has, in some cases, caused slight service disruptions. He asked Earth subscribers to be patient during the months when service might be temporarily interrupted due to the moving of equipment and change out of equipment since the expansion work is necessary to improve the overall efficiency of the Earth dial system.

The new dial equipment is expected to be of a capacity large enough to care for Earth's telephone needs until the third quarter of 1957.

Springlake again knocked a team from the undefeated ranks when the Junior High team traveled to Farwell Tuesday night to outscore Farwell Junior High 26-8. The Springlake team is still undefeated with wins over Lazbuddy, Sudan and Farwell.

In the first half Springlake did not make a first down, but quarterback Gerald Hadaway's 75 yard kickoff return after Farwell's touchdown in the first quarter, and John Bacon's 72 yard touchdown run in the second quarter put the little Wolverines ahead at the half 13 to 6. Other than these two runs Farwell kept Springlake tied up effectively the first half, and also made good gains around Springlake's ends.

In the third quarter Farwell passed for a 70 yard play, coupled with a 15 yard penalty against Springlake that gave Farwell the ball on Springlake's 5. However the boys put up a stout defense led by Sandy Sanders, who played an outstanding defensive game all night, and they took the ball on downs on their own 2 yard line.

On the first play from scrimmage Farwell broke through and threw Springlake behind the goal line for safety and 2 points. That made the score Springlake 13, Farwell 8. Late in the third period halfback Bill Starky intercepted a pass and romped 25 yards for a score. John Bacon ran across the extra point. In the last quarter John Bacon again broke through for a 45 yard touchdown run which ended the scoring, Springlake 26, Farwell 8.

Speedy John Bacon was the outstanding back, having touchdown runs of 22 yards and 45 yards and breaking loose for other long runs. Sandy Sanders was outstanding in the line.

The Junior High Pep Squad also made the trip to Farwell by bus, and about fifty Springlake fans made the journey to witness the Juniors' first out of town trip this year.

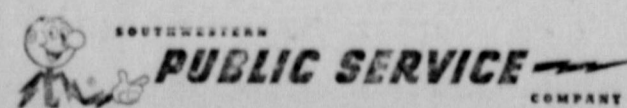

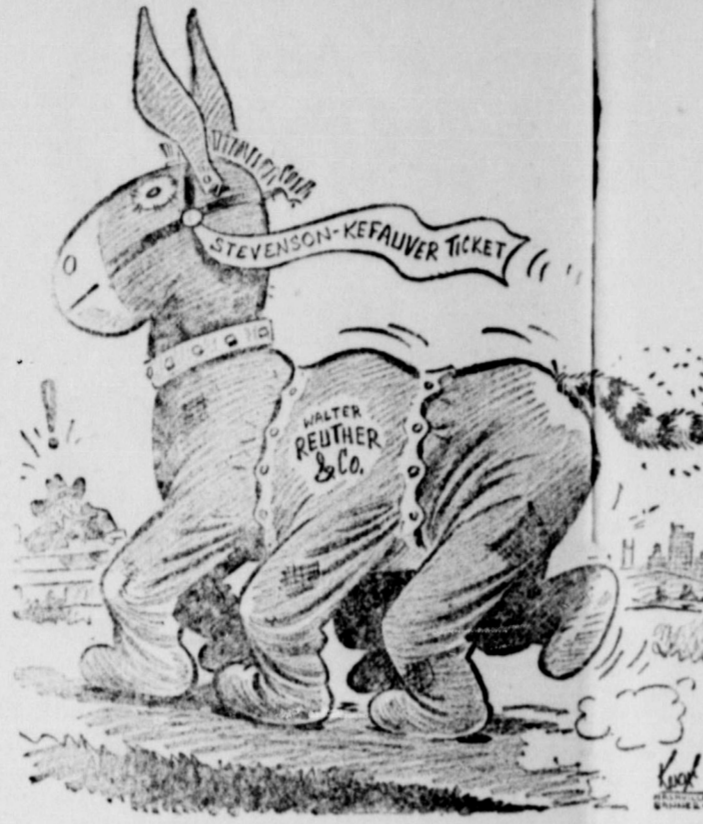
