The crowd, by its applause and by a sign reading "Goldwater in 1964", left no doubt of its enthusiasm for that goal.

The rally Monday night in the Sports Arena climaxed a move

taken last month by more than 100 residents of Lamb County who declared their "independence" from the Democratic party and pledged to join and work for the GOP.

Porter was applauded loudly when he proclaimed that "conservatism" in this nation is on the march and a great deal of the credit for that belongs to Barry Goldwater.

Both Porter and Smith are former Democrats who switched party loyalties several years ago. They were introduced by Ray Keeling, Littlefield car dealer, who was master of ceremonies.

Jack Barton of Littlefield who is chairman of the newly formed Lamb County Republican Club, read telegrams from Goldwater, Towe and former President Dwight Eisenhower.

Following the barbeque dinner Gil Lamb of Radio Station KMLL in Muleshoe led the pledge of Allegiance. John Richey, another leader in the party switch, gave the invocation.

Lucille has been a resident of Earth for 31 years and has had seventeen years experience as a Beauty Operator, being in Earth all 17 years.

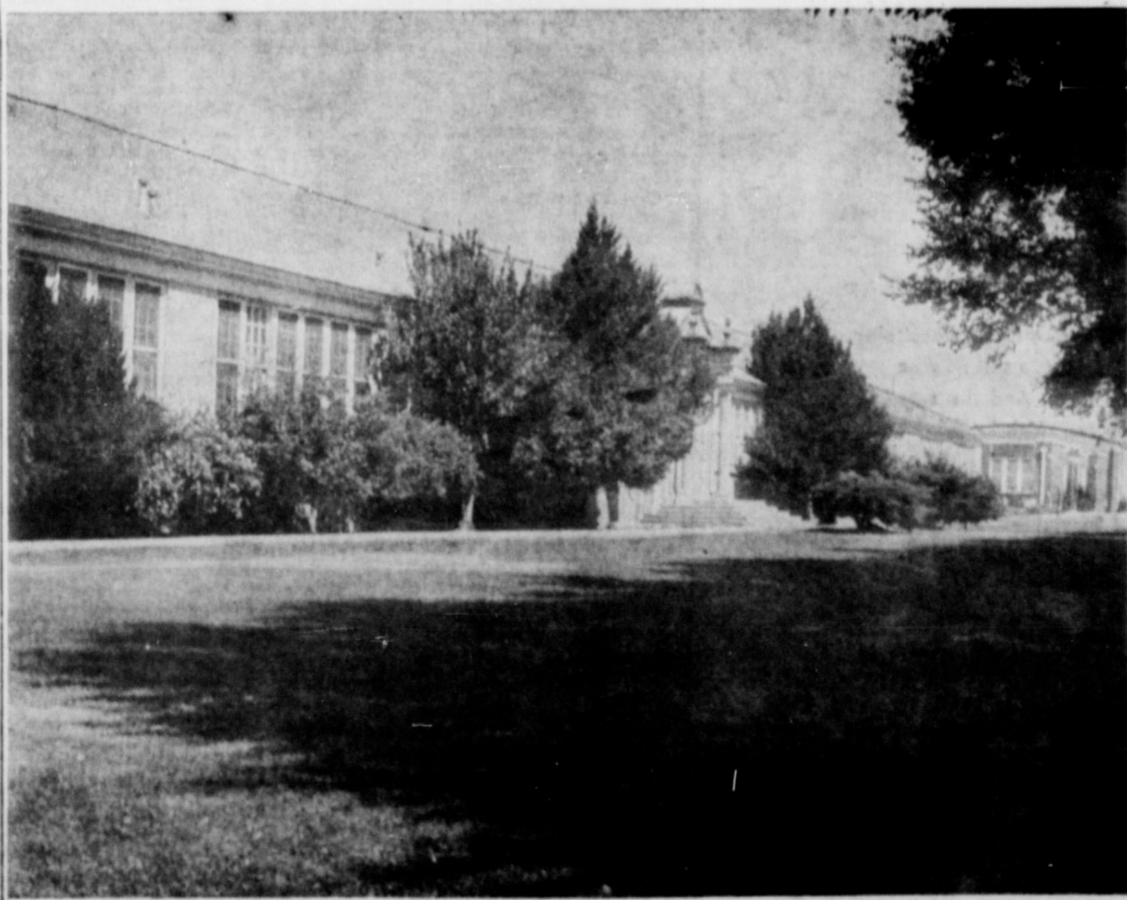
She is a graduate of Springlake High School and also graduated from Arlene's Beauty School in Lubbock.

Farm Facts

About 51% of the 1959-60 cotton crop was harvested mechanically. An estimated 36% was machine picked and 15% was machine stripped.

From the Carolinas to central Texas and in irrigated areas of the Far West, when cotton is harvested by hand, workers pick the fleece from the open bolls. The spindle-type picker duplicates this process as its revolving spindles engage and pull the cotton from the bolls. It does not pull leaves or unopened bolls. Picking, therefore, may be repeated as often as necessary.

In cotton yielding 300 pounds of lint per acre, the average hand picker gathers about 20 pounds of seed cotton per hour. The one-row mechanical picker can pick almost 450 pounds per hour. It can do the work of from 30 to 40 hand pickers.

and Oklahoma. It can harvest more than a bale of cotton an hour — as much as 30 laborers hand snapping. Virtually none of the cotton crop was mechanically harvested prior to World War II; only 3% in 1947.
