SPAG Meeting

The South Plains Association of Government (SPAG) held a Community Improvement Workshop Monday, November 27, in the Earth Agriculture building to bring out priorities the citizens of Earth would like to see come about in the near future.

The meeting was called to order by Chamber of Commerce president, Melvin Kinnison who introduced the featured speaker, Truett Mayes of SPAG in Lubbock. Assisting Mr. Mayes was Ken Leggett, Rural Development Planner, also of Lubbock.

Mr. Mayes helped the local people to understand that Earth could undergo many changes or improvements utilizing what resources are available in the community. This was one of the most important details, making sure the people of Earth understand that in order to make these changes reality, it is up to the citizens here to get it done as no one else is going to do it for them.

Mr. Leggett stated that the first important step is to realize what is available and use it to the utmost. Then, if the community is in full support of a project, and the resources are not available here, he will start contacting resource possibilities elsewhere.

Those attending the meeting were broken down into groups who mapped out their wishes and proceeded to discuss the advantages and disadvantages of each item brought before the group. Those priorities will be listed in a small booklet which will be available for inspection soon. Priorities accepted and their committee meetings are as follows:

1. Getting a doctor for Earth. The committee in charge of this will meet December 11 at 7:30 p.m. in the Catholic Church, Beverly Taylor, Chairman.

2. Street Improvements. This committee, headed by Mackey McCarty, will meet December 14 at 7:00 p.m. The designated meeting place was not decided upon.

3. Youth Recreation Program. Ray Phifer's committee will meet December 14 at 7:00 p.m. in the office of W.B. McMillan.

These priorities are but a small portion of improvements readily available to the people of Earth. It will take a full community effort with full community support in order for these things to come about. It will take a lot of hard work and quite a few hours of planning, but when these speculations become reality the citizens of Earth will have an amazingly different city, one which they can be even prouder of.

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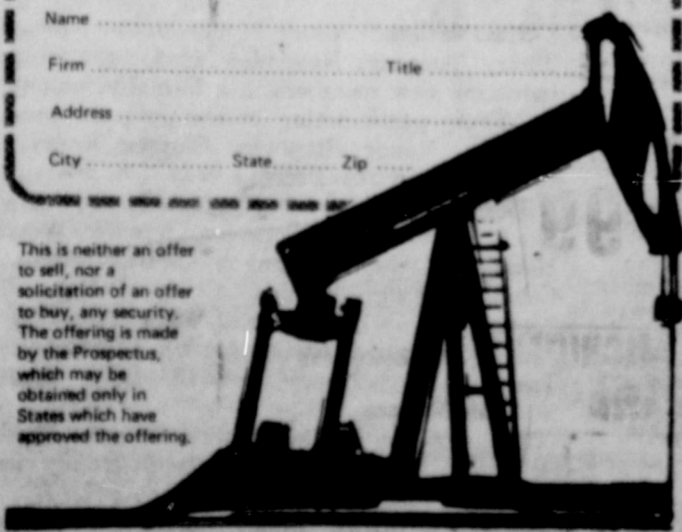
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Dimmitt Locals

Funeral services for Leola Haberer, 74, a resident of Castro County, were held on November 21 in the First United Methodist Church here, where she was a member.

John Street, pastor of the First United Methodist Church officiated. Rev. Howard G. Smith, pastor of the United Methodist Church, assisted. Burial was in the Castro Gardens Cemetery, directed by the Haberer Funeral Home.

Haberer, of 601 Leola, passed away on Monday afternoon in the Memorial Hospital. She was born in 1916 as Leola Roy and they resided on the Big Community in Castro County in 1954, when they moved to Dimmitt. Her husband preceded her in 1959.

She is survived by a daughter, Betty Worrell, and Philip, both of Dimmitt, and two grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a.m. on Saturday at the home of Leola Haberer, 74, a resident of Castro County, were held on November 21 in the First United Methodist Church here, where she was a member.

Harriet Danaway, 16, Johnny Mac Smith, 18, and Marshall Henderson, 19, were admitted to Plains Memorial Hospital after the pickup in which they were riding hit an injured calf about 6:30 p.m. on the farm road near

Sunnyside and overturned.

State Trooper Dyrle Maples reported that the International pickup which Smith was driving was the second vehicle to hit the black yearling.

The calf, one of about 20 that had wandered on to the highway, had been hit just a minute or two before by a Ford Ranger pickup driven by Jacqueline Holcomb of Earth, Maples said. Mrs. Holcomb regained control of her damaged pickup and was not injured, Maples said. She had gone to call her husband to come and move the injured calf off the highway when the teenagers' accident happened.

The second pickup

went into a broadside skid after hitting the calf, and overturned two and a fourth times, coming to rest on the eastside of the road in a pasture, Maples said. All three youths were thrown from the pickup as it turned over.

All three youths have since been released from the hospital here.

"I lost one battle, but I have won another," Sam Killough of Dimmitt said from Highland General Hospital in Lubbock.

Killough ran unsuccessfully as a write-in candidate for county

judge in the November General election. He went into Highland General Hospital the next day after the election for surgery.

 spent Monday night in Dimmitt on a coast-to-coast bike trip from Madawaska, Maine, to Imperial Beach, California. He sleeps "where ever dark catches me" and showers in fire stations along the way, he said.



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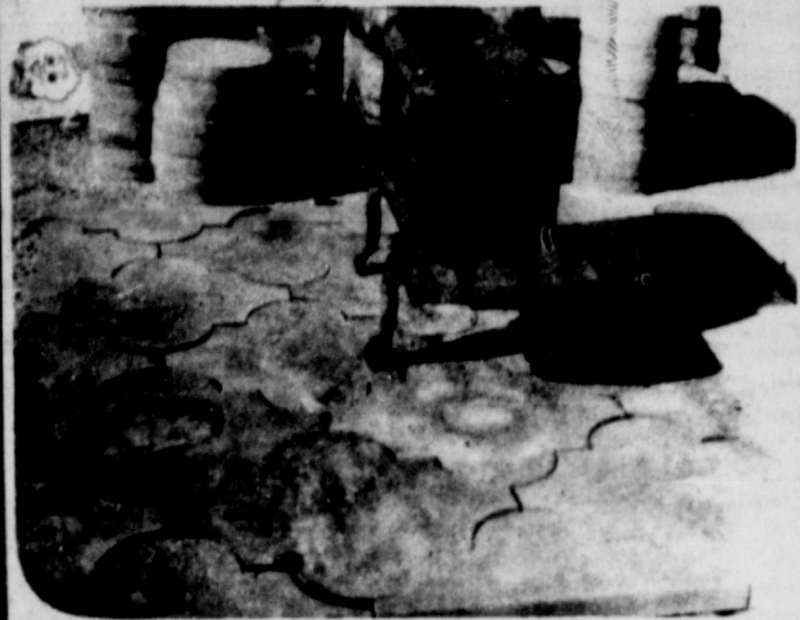
