Leonard Gilmore left Tuesday morning by car for Fairbanks, Alaska, where he will be employed with the Federal Aviation Aeronautics.

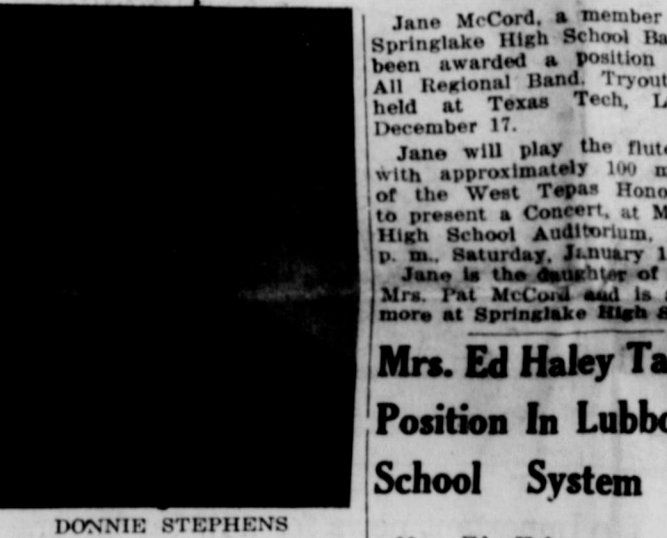
He has just completed special training in FAA in Oklahoma City, having enrolled in the school there last August.

EDITORIAL:

 At the end of this week begins a new semester, and for many of us it is the last we will have in high school.

This being my last year, I realize more than ever the importance of good study habits. The other day, as I was reading, I came across an article in the "Teenage Christian," about study. It was titled "The Magic Formula." I want to pass it on to you with the hope it may help you improve and prepare yourself for whatever lies ahead; whether it be high school, college, or making it on your own.

"The Magic Formula"
 Is algebra hard for you? It sure is for me! Wouldn't it be nice if we could just take a pill and know all about algebra? Along with that, I wish we could take a pill and fly to the moon. But I guess we will have to stop dreaming, for there are no pills for algebra or space travel. There are, however, three learning pills. These pills are the results of years of scientific investigation and they are guaranteed to make learning easier for you. How about it; can I show you these pills?

Goal Pill — Have a goal in life. If you do not know what you have before you in life, then learning is going to be empty, useless, and dull.

Interest Pill — Be interested in what you are learning. Understand how the subject you are learning relates to your goal in life.

Study Pill — Have good study habits. If you take your learning seriously and have orderly study habits, you will be much happier with your studies.

Lets look more closely at the Study Pill. If you understand how these ingredients work, you'll have better study habits. In a Study Pill, you first put one ounce of Tools. There are three tools for your learning: time, books, and teachers. Use them well. TIME is valuable. Plan your time. Have a schedule. BOOKS hold the information you need. Use them often. TEACHERS are not just fact-givers; they are also there to stimulate you to learn. Teaching and learning cannot be separated. Help your teachers to like you.

Next in the Study Pill we add: Books. And there are excellent suggestions for using textbooks. (1.) Have your own book. (2.) Always take your book to class. (3.) Study your text for the se-

quence and plan of the course. (4.) Study topics rather than pages. (5.) Survey each assignment before starting. (6.) Mark and underline your text, if it belongs to you. (7.) Recite the lessons to yourself.

A third ingredient for the pill is assignments. Just remember: (1.) Be sure you have the correct assignment. (2.) Survey the assignment. (3.) Read, then recite, then memorize. (4.) Relate the assignment to what you have already learned about the subject.

The following part of the pill is extra important; LISTEN. If you follow these instructions you will be amazed: (1.) Get ready to listen immediately upon entering the room. (2.) Catch the teacher. Listen to every word. (3.) Listen carefully for directions from the teacher. (4.) Listen to other students recite. (5.) Take notes carefully as you listen. (6.) Think ahead of your teacher sometimes. (7.) Evaluate as you listen. Don't just listen to facts.

As you can see, these contents of the Study Pill are very important. Next we have: NOTES. See if these suggestions for taking notes will help: (1.) Know something of the subject before entering class. This means getting your homework! (2.) Be sure to put the heading on your notes. (3.) Listen until you understand a point before putting it down. (4.) Write down full statements rather than topics. (5.) Don't try to write too much. (6.) Try to write down only important items. (7.) Organize your notes as you write. (8.) Try to put your notes in outline form.

The last ingredient for our special Study Pill is called TEST. If you use these suggestions as rules for studying for tests, you will not dread them so much. (1.) Know the type of test to be given: informational, skill, ability to think, solving problems, etc. (2.) Make up sample questions your teacher could ask. (3.) Review, don't cram. (4.) Review for main points rather than details. (5.) Make an outline of the material on which you are to be tested. (6.) Use the questions at the end of the chapters in the textbook. (7.) Make a copy of each thing the teacher may ask then learn it.

So! STUDY PILL equals Tools plus Books plus (As2) plus LIS-TEN plus NOTES plus (TEST). That is quite a formula, but it will work. It has been tried by many students. If you will just give it a chance, this pill can help you to make better grades, to be happier in your study, and to better prepare yourself for life ahead.

COUNTING ON COLLEGE? ACT NOW!

Seniors in Springlake High School, who are planning to enter college next autumn, are registering now for American College Testing program exams, said John H. Lawrence, principal of the school.

They want to make sure that their registration blanks are received in plenty of time for the closing date of registration, Saturday, February 4.

The three-hour tests, to be given Saturday, February 25, in 48 states and the District of Columbia, are required or recommended for admission to more than 500 colleges and universities in 23 states.

These 23 states, which have ACT-affiliated college testing programs, are Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Idaho, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas and Wisconsin.

Participating colleges use ACT results for student guidance and admissions and for awarding scholarship aid to applicants, as well as for placing freshmen in classes or programs suited to their abilities.

ACT scores and manuals explaining that yield five scores—a composite score indicating overall college potential, and four separate scores indicating levels of general capability in English, mathematics, social studies and the natural sciences.

ACT scores and manuals explaining how results may be interpreted are furnished colleges indicated by students and are sent to the student's high school for his and the school's use in guidance.

Further information about ACT tests, taken by more than 125,000 high school seniors last year, may be obtained in the principal's office.

 "I feel that I've had quite an interesting life," states Mr. Clarence Hamilton, the very capable social studies teacher of Springlake High, and I certainly agree with him after he starts to tell about himself. Born and reared in Childress, Texas, he attended West Texas State College at Canyon after his high school graduation, and majored in political science with two minors, in education and history. He was president of The International Relations Organization for three years, and one summer he was coordinator of Summer Forum, a local public relations program. Besides earning his Bachelor degree from WT, he has done graduate work at both Texas Tech and Eastern New Mexico University.

Feel that first of all, an all out effort to come to terms and agreements must be made and if that fails which it did, I see no other course of action but to break diplomatic relations.

Margaret Meadows: I certainly do, and I think we would have been justified in doing it even sooner. With all of Castro's abuses and insults toward America, we could hardly expect to have any self-respect, or respect from the rest of the world, left if we still kept trying to be friends with Cuba. 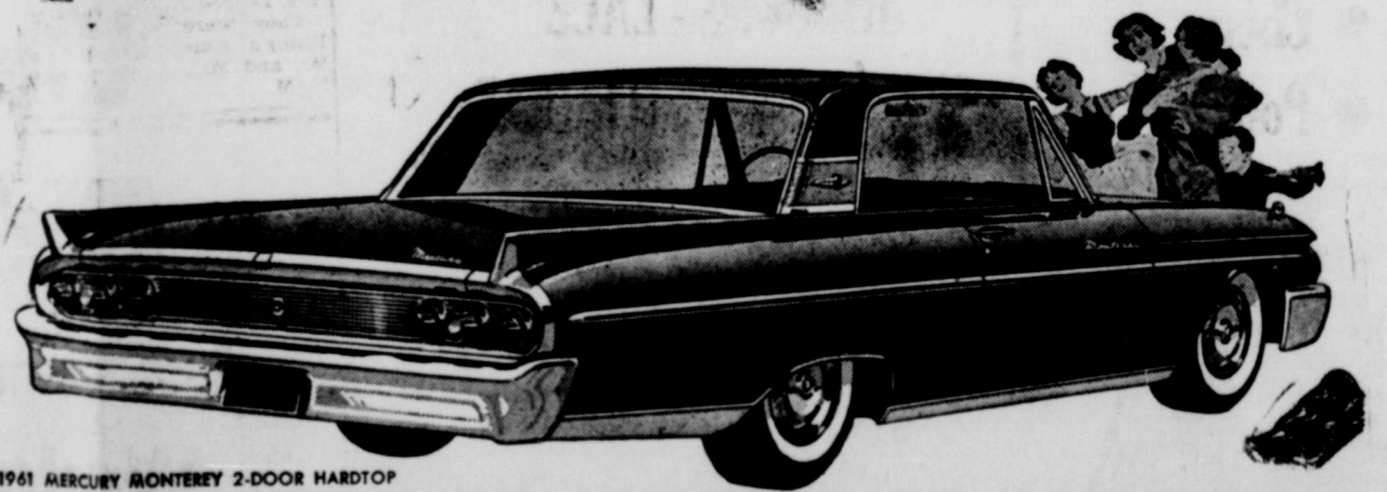

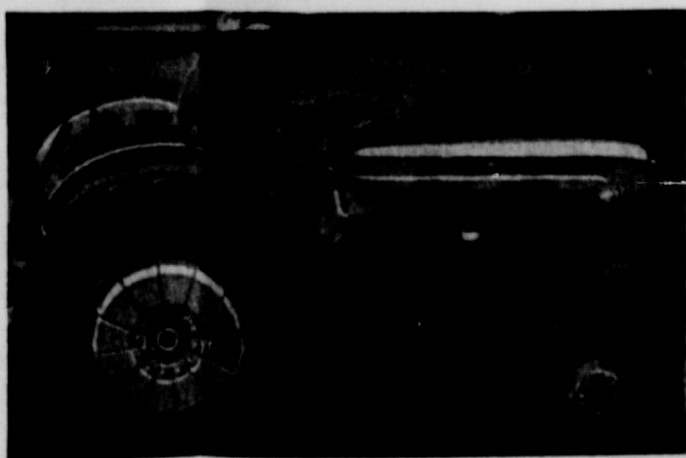
