Former Springlake Resident Succumbs

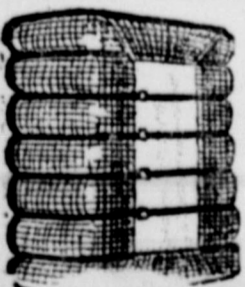
Mrs. Mary Emma Guinn, 71, of Vernon, Texas died Monday in a Wichita Falls Hospital after an illness of almost 2 years.

Farmers To File Social Security Returns Annually

It has been announced by H. O. Nichols, Administration Officer of the Lubbock Office of Social Security, that farmers are no longer required to file Social Security returns on a quarterly basis.

Due to change in procedure, farmers now file one return in January covering all taxable wages paid to farm employees during the preceding calendar year. During 1955 farmers were required to file a quarterly Social Security return with the District of Internal Revenue.

A farmer must file a Social Security return during the year when he quits farming before the end of the year and has paid taxable wages during the year.

Led by halfback Joe Wheat, who scored two touchdowns, and fullback Jimmy Herring, the Wolverines rolled over the lighter Wildcats in the second half. In the scoreless first half, Springlake drove to the 8 and 14 yard lines of Idalou and the Wildcats drove to the Wolverine 5.

Early in the third quarter Max Goforth intercepted an Idalou pass on the Wildcat 46 and returned it to the 31. From there Wheat went off left tackle for the touchdown. An attempt to run for the extra point failed.

Near the end of the third quarter Herring went 25 yards off right tackle for another touchdown. The extra point attempt again failed.

In all the one play that brought the crowd to its feet was the 70 yd. punt return by Wheat. Wheat took the punt in his own 30 yd. line and crossed over to the right side of the field. Springlakes line had formed there in a perfect blocking pattern to give the always necessary blocking. Wheat went up the lane and once by the Wildcats they could not catch him.

Springlake picked up 13 first downs with 417 yds. on the ground and 25 yds. passing.

Idalou picked up 9 first downs with 162 on the ground and 22 passing.

Springlake was penalized for a total of 35 yds. while Idalou had 5.

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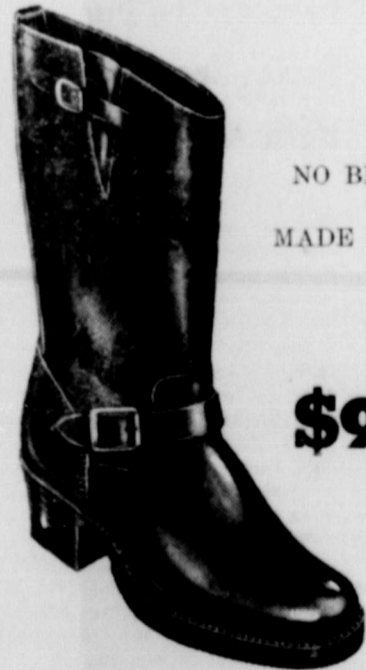
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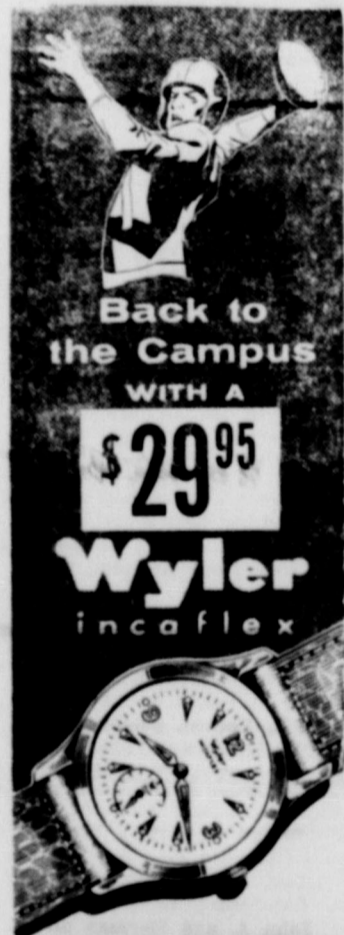

F. F. A. Student Demonstrates Yield Comparison of Grain

Earl Kellar, Springlake Voc. Student is demonstrating a yield comparison of five Grain Sorghum varieties on his project located eight miles north and one and one-half mile west of Earth. With him is Vocational Agriculture Instructor, Travis Scott.

The plot which measures approximately eight acres include DeKalb Hybrid F-62 and E-56 along with Martins, Redbine 66 and Westland Varties. All varieties were planted the same day and each given identical treatment.

Yield records should give a good comparison of the Hybrids in relation to standard grown varieties. As the plots stand, maturity advantage seems to be with Martins and two Hybrid varieties ahead of Westland and Redbine 66 in that order. This plot can be viewed as harvest period is a week or more off.

Earl is active in the Springlake Chapter, Future Farmers of America, and also has a five acre cotton plot which is entered in the Yield Contest sponsored by the local Ginners.

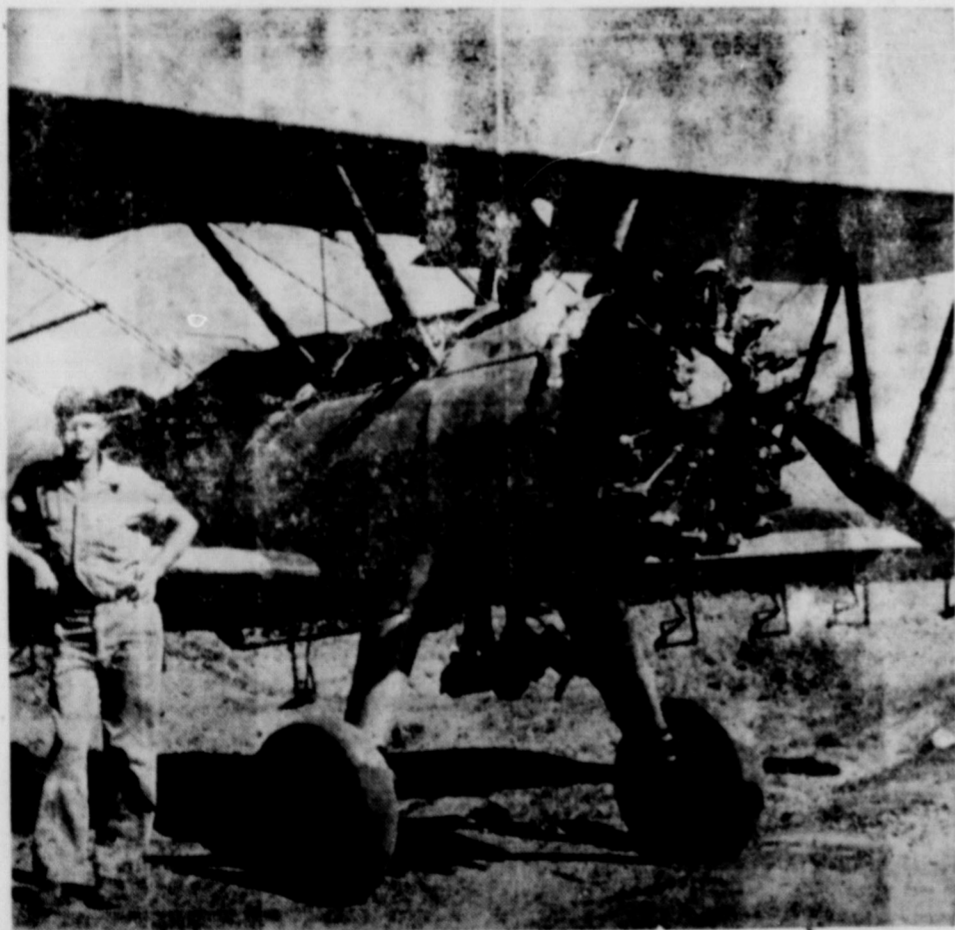
