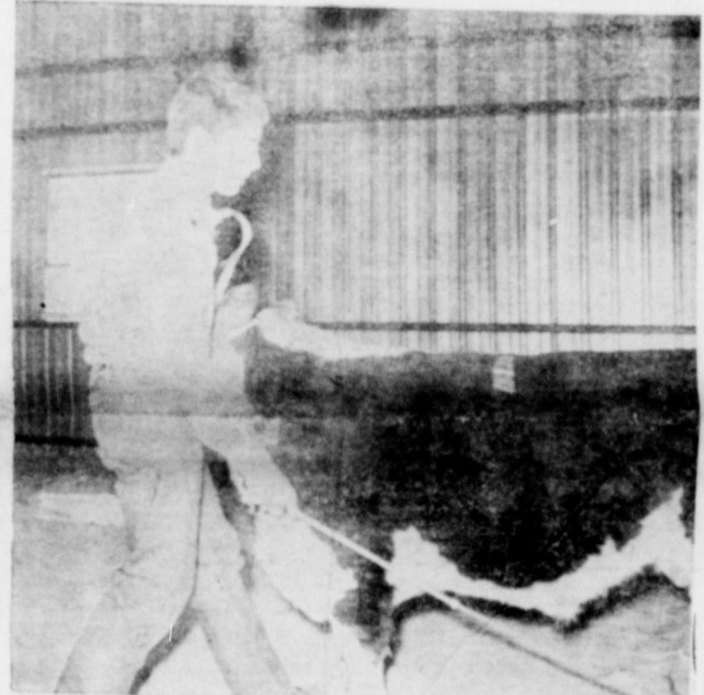

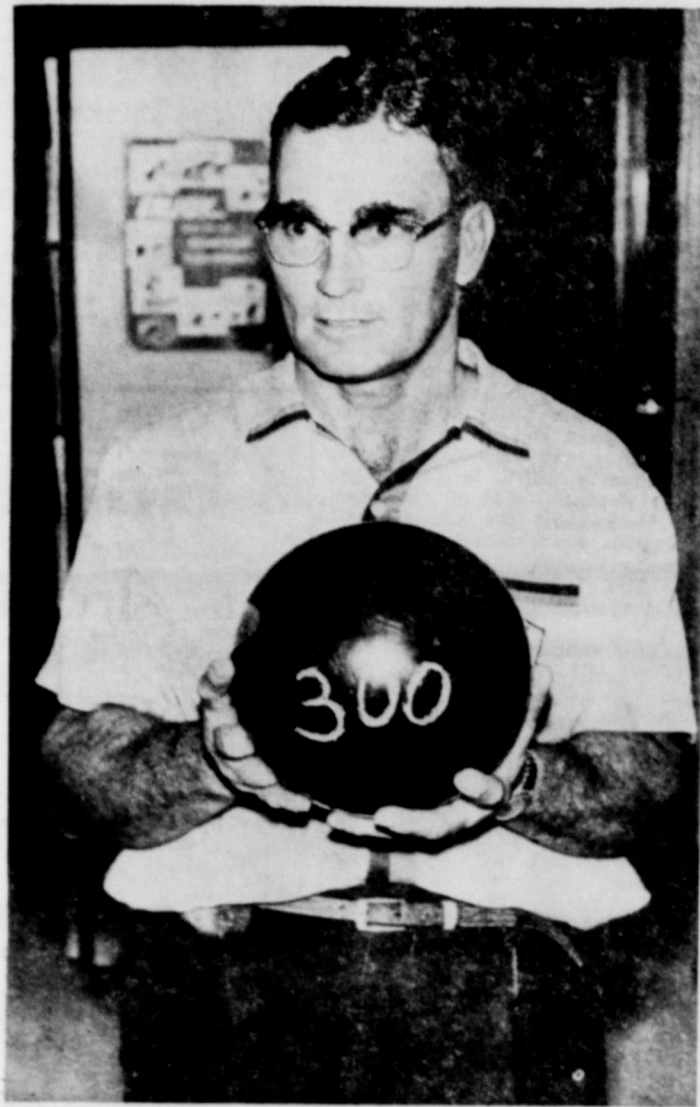
An estimated 150 or 300 pounds of grain donated by each farmer in the Earth area would fill the 20,000 pound quota.

## Perfect Game Bowled On Unlucky Friday 13 At Tri-Co Bowling Center

Friday the thirteenth and a black bowling ball made up a handy combination for Cecil Rundell last week at Tri-Co Bowling Center in Muleshoe.

Rundell, who doesn't believe in the old superstition concerning bad luck coming on Friday the thirteenth, has reason to feel that way. That is the date he made a perfect bowling score, which is as rare in bowling circles as a hole in one in golf.

In fact, this was the first 300 game ever bowled on the lanes at Tri-Co, which has been in operation about two and one half years, which is also the length of time Rundell has been bowling. Bowling on the Spudnut Shop

team in the Friday night couple's league, Rundell rolled a series total of 600 that night. His 300 game was the third of the series.

Nervous? Rundell disclaims any knowledge of the feeling while bowing this highest-of-the-high game. He says he didn't get nervous simply because he didn't think he would make the perfect game in the first place.

"I never even thought about it, really," he said. "I just rolled each ball by itself and didn't worry about the fact that I hadn't missed a one." Then he added, "The roughest frame was the ninth. I just knew I had a split there, but the pins fell and I knew I had it made."

Rundell's previous high game in league play had been 249. He had bowled two lines in the two-sixties, several of 250 and a number of 240 lines in practice, during his estimated 1,000 lines of bowling. His average is 180.

Rundell, who owns the Spudnut Shop in Muleshoe, said the crowd that night helped him to make the perfect mark by not watching him too closely. Bowling went on as usual during the course of his game, though everyone kept track of the score and quietly discussed Rundell's chances.

After the game was over, team captain and league secretary watched the pins being removed from the pinsetters and sealed for inspection by a representative of the American Bowling Congress. Pins and alleys must meet certain specifications in order for the score to be approved by the ABC.

Rundell will receive a trophy and cash award from the proprietor of Tri-Co Lanes, a trophy from AMY, a cash award from the Ripley Bowling Pin Co., a pair of Hyde shoes, a ball from Manhattan Bowling Ball Company, his choice of a ring or watch from ABC, a trophy from City Bowling Association and cash awards from Love Drilling Co. and McBride Gin, among other awards.

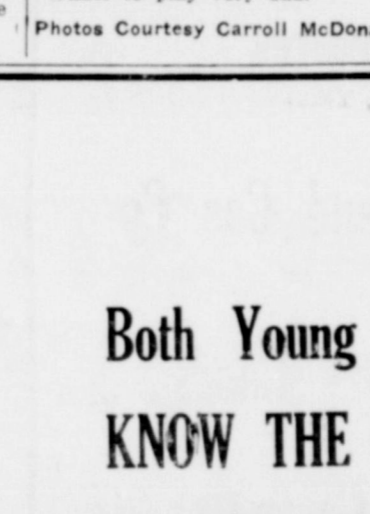

## Purchasers of Autos Warned Against Cars Damaged in Carla

Purchasers of automobiles have been warned to be on the lookout for vehicles with salt water damage from Hurricane Carla.

H. C. Pittman, executive vice president of the Texas Automobile Dealers Association, said, "According to reports received in our office, scores of persons throughout Texas are being victimized by unscrupulous bargain promoters who have purchased automobiles in the Gulf area, after they have been totaled by insurance companies, and are reselling them in other parts of the state to purchasers who are unaware of the salt water damage."

TADA is a state-wide organization of franchised automobile dealers, with headquarters in Austin.

"We have received reports of persons who have made special trips to purchase quantities of these new cars," Pittman continued. "After cleaning them up and removing the factory stickers, they are selling them without advising the purchasers of the certainty of quick deterioration from salt rust. The public in the Gulf area is educated to this type of damage and therefore most of these cars are being sold in Central North and West Texas."

"To protect themselves from such losses, automobile purchasers should beware of suspicious bargains and should buy their automobiles only from well-known, established dealers in their own communities," Pittman stressed. "No legitimate leader would handle such a sale. This same type of unscrupulous activity cost many hard working families their life-savings when they purchased automobiles brought in from Louisiana after Hurricane Audrey," he added.

Burial was in the Hillcrest Cemetery, Temple, under the direction of Hewitt Funeral Home.

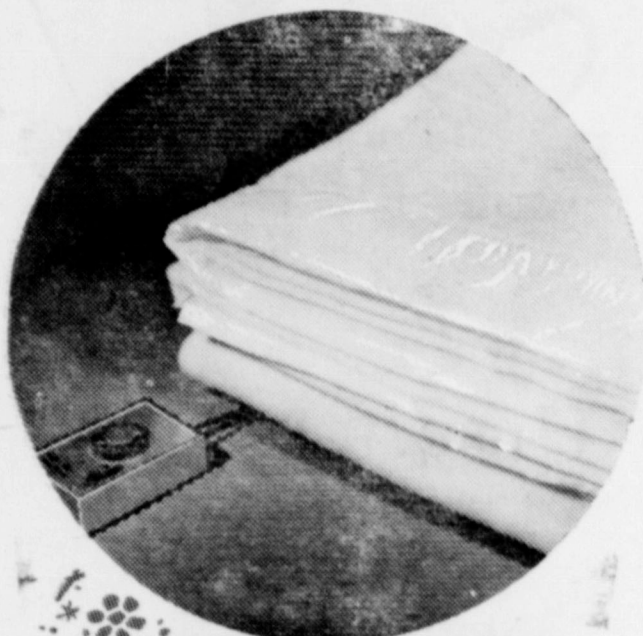
