Needless to say, I'll be ready to go back Christmas. Our folks have a way of making us know they love us, and like everyone in this world, we love to be loved. So at least twice a year we try to make it back to "Oklie Land" to be with our loved ones. We can't seem to outgrow the need for those we love.

I hit the jackpot while in Oklahoma, saw so many of our Army friends from the 45th Division, and of those long ago days. Also visited with a friend from high school days. Don't know if that is too good for OUR EGO, we both noted a few (may I say, very slight) changes in our appearance since our high school years. (Any way we didn't waste time comparing grey hair and wrinkles. It was too much fun to remember those old time school days).

I don't see why if a fish is going to be caught, why it hadn't just as well be caught on my hook, but somehow no matter how hard I tried I never caught a fish. The folks all caught fish, and there I stood working diligently with my rod and reel, but to no avail, not one measly scrawny fish did I catch.

I kept telling myself I'd catch one, that it takes very little ability to catch a fish, and I guess it does and I don't have.

Harold Britton came by to brag on the peaches he raised in his backyard. "He had a peach of a peach" in his hand weighing three quarters of a pound and measuring 11 inches around.

I had a peach on my desk, one I WAS PERFECTLY HAPPY WITH and anticipating eating it when he dashed in with his fine peach. There and then I lost the appetite for mine.

I have been reading about a compact, long-keeping emergency ration made from whole wheat that has been developed.

The product, in the form of wafers, has an estimated shelf life of five years or longer. They are made from whole grain wheat that has been parboiled, dried, puffed, then crumbled and made into a cookie-sized wafer. Research was done in USDA's Agricultural Research laboratory at Albany, California, under contract from the Office of Civil Defense Mobilization.

The wafers pack a lot of food value into a small space; are quick and easy to serve and the plentiful supplies of wheat make it practical for stockpiling. In a series of three tests, each involving 100 volunteers living in the fallout shelter for varying lengths of time, meals based on the wafer brought few complaints and worked best in maintaining volunteer's weights.

The wafers can be eaten plain and with other foods such as milk, peanut butter, bouillon and spaghetti. The last two items and other seasoned toppings can be stored in dried form and mixed with water for heating and serving.

Each wafer furnishes 84 calories. In the shelter test diet, 12 wafers a day supplied a little more than half the day's 2,000 calories and about a third of the protein. Milk and peanut butter supplied the rest of the protein. This fare does not measure up to all recommendations for a balanced diet, but during an estimated shelter stay of two weeks, human survival and health would not be affected.

I read these items, but somehow fallout shelters and food for survival gave me quite a cramped, uneasy feeling. Guess we who enjoy each day's sunlight, good health, and just wonderful every day living, should spend more time giving thanks for each day that dawns.

Mr. Upchurch is employed by Barton-Watson, Inc., as butane serviceman.

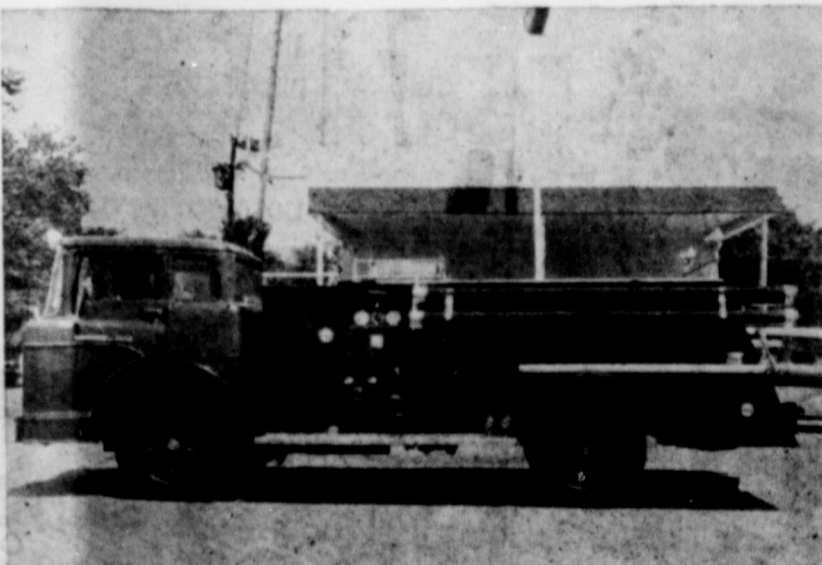
Mrs. Upchurch is supervisor at the Springlake School Cafeteria.

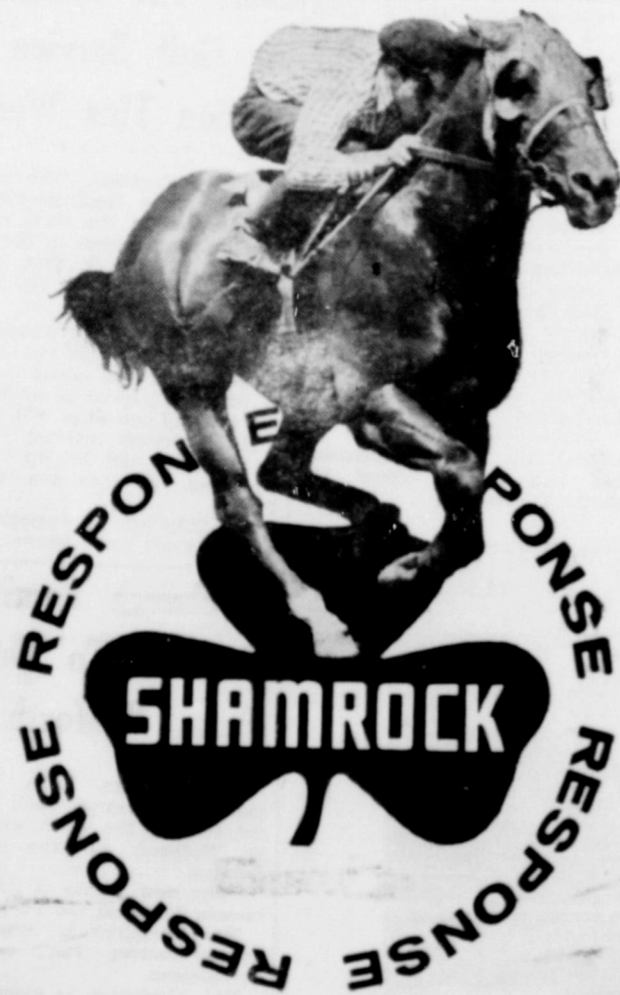

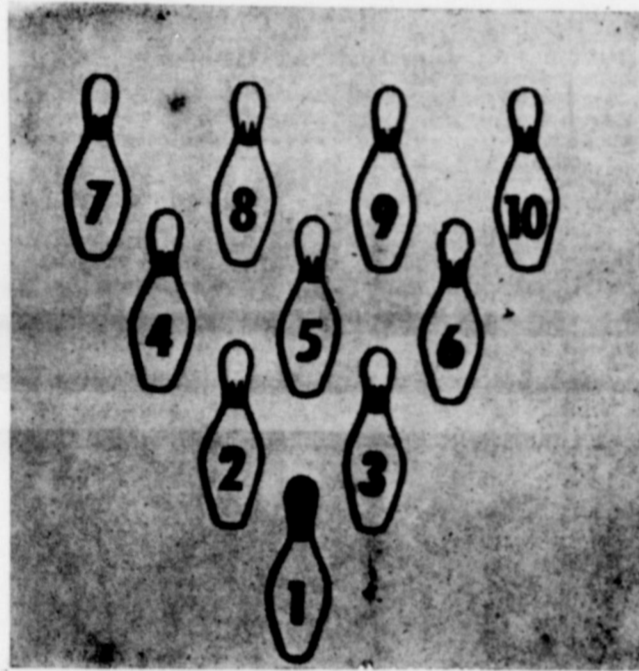

July Accident Report Released

The Highway Patrol investigated 4 accidents on Rural Highways in Lamb County during the month of July, according to Sgt. D. S. Lawson Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for a property damage of \$2,945.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for Lamb County from January through July of 1961 shows a total of 69 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were 28 persons injured and four persons killed. The estimated property damage amounted to \$43,295.00. This compares with the first seven months of 1960's total of 69 rural crashes injuring 26 people, killing four persons and causing an estimated property damage of \$31,881.00.

"Prior to August 1, throughout the state of Texas, there had been a total of 974 fatal crashes resulting in 1214 persons losing their lives needlessly," the Sgt. stated. This compares with 929 fatal crashes and 1134 lives lost for the same period in 1960. Therefore, in 1961 there have been 45 more fatal crashes resulting in 80 more lives lost, or a 7 per cent increase.

With the summer vacation period in its final month and Labor Day approaching, many thousands of people will be crowding in their final visit, visiting, etc., before their children start back to school. This means many people will be trying to travel too far in a short time. Many will be carefree and careless in their driving.

The Sgt. listed some facts about last year's Labor Day Weekend and some suggestions to remedy this. In order to arrive alive at your destination start in plenty of time to allow for delays along the way. Give the right of way, don't take it. Be prepared for the

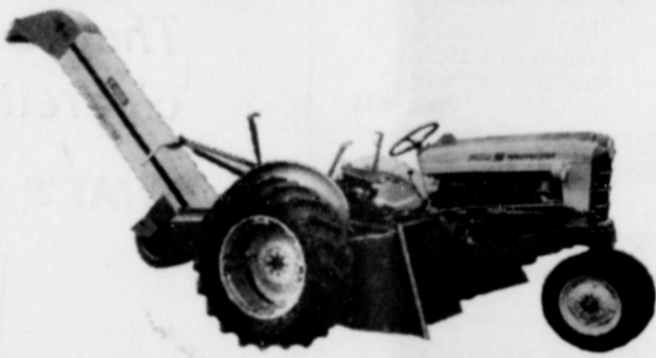

Record Cotton Crop Forecast For This Area

A bumper crop of cotton that could be an all-time high record amount is expected for Lamb County this year.

About 203,000 bales of cotton (500 pound bales) have been estimated for production in Lamb County by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

This would be an increase of about 25,000 bales over last year's cotton production of 175,695 bales.

In 23 area counties the production estimate was set at an enormous 2,258,000 bales. An output of that size would surpass the all-time high of 2,025,433 bales produced in 1958 and would give a hefty gain over last year's crop of 1,942,377 bales this second largest on record.

It would contribute an estimated \$343 million to the area economy in gross income from lint alone, not counting the value of many millions of dollars worth of cottonseed.

A total production of 1,016,000 bales is predicted for Lamb, Hale, Bailey, Hockley, and Lubbock. August is regarded by many veteran farmers as a "critical month" in the making of a crop in this area. Cotton that is blooming can quickly deplete moisture in the top two feet of soil. An cotton may shed many of its forms in August if ample moisture isn't available.

However, pre-planting moisture and rains later in the season gave the cotton as a whole ample moisture to "load up" well.

A few bales are expected by farm observers to come in late this month, but harvest on the High Plains isn't expected to get into full swing until October.

Also coupled with the bright cotton outlook are prospects for another bumper sorghum crop. Grain sorghum harvest is expected to get underway early in September.

a profit from the fertilizer application over the non-fertilizer wheat of \$16.36.

Very close, with a yield of 76 bushels received from an application of forty pounds of nitrogen and 80 pounds of phosphate, was a profit of \$18.41 per acre above the non-fertilized wheat. The non-fertilized wheat yield was a surprising 60.3 bushels per acre.

Nitrogen, phosphorus and potash were used in various combinations. These included 40, 80, and 120 pounds of nitrogen, 80 pounds of phosphorus and 40 pounds of potash.

All fertilizer combinations were applied in preplant applications on October 5, 1960. Tascosa wheat used in the tests, was planted on October 14 and harvested on June 21. The wheat was not winter grazed.

The yield was figured at 60 pounds of wheat per bushel at the price of \$1.75 per bushel. Rainfall received during the growing season, October 1960 to June 1961 totaled 21.9 inches. Irrigation water was applied in the amount of 4.4 inches on April 4, 4.2 inches on April 28, and 3.6 inches on May 15.

The addition of potash to any of the nitrogen and phosphorus combinations failed to increase the yield. Phosphate alone increased yields by 5 bushels per acre and nitrogen alone increased yields 5 bushels but the combination of phosphate and nitrogen increased yields of 16.5 bushels per acre. The fertilizer results closely paralleled the results secured in the 1959-60 season. Delbert Langford, Associate Agronomist, supervised both tests at the Halfway Foundation.

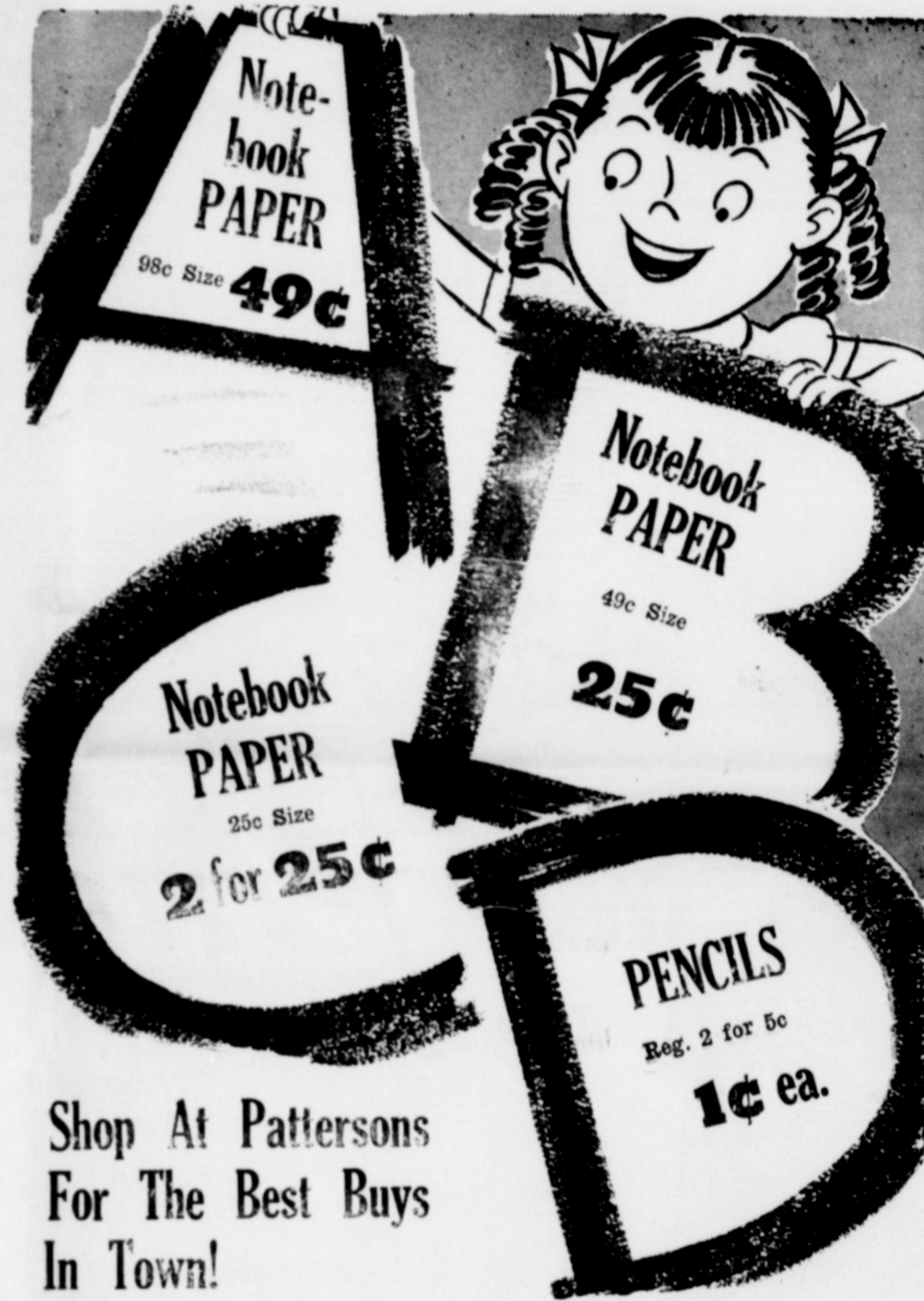
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
