Tests Conducted On Fertilizer Research Plots

Experiment stations and research workers provide an excellent service to farmers in this area. Their results have both immediate and long-range benefits. These researchers not only carry out research at the stations but also carry on some outlaying field research in farmers' fields. These plots are of immediate value to farmers in the surrounding area.

Experiment stations serving this area are the South Plains Research Foundation at Halfway; and the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station at Bushland Some of the tests conducted in this area by the Lubbock station are as follows: A sugar beet test on N. P. and X rates is located on the R. Young farm north of Dimmitt. Two potash rate tests on cotton are located in Lamb County. These are on the Roy

Little Nozzle Does Big **Spraying Job**

A self-prepared spray rig equipped with a 500-fallon fiberglass tank, high pressure pump and oversized tires can be useless if the nozzles on the boom are not designed for the job. That's why sprayer nozzle selection is important for effec-

chemicals, says Beverly G. keeves. Extension agricultural engineer , Texas A&M. Reeves says nozzles have four big jobs. They control the am-ount of chemical applied, uniformity of application, thor-

tive and safe use of agricultural

oughness of surface cover. and safety of application. They do these jobs, Reeves points out, by controlling particle size and application rate in a pressure range, by thoroughly covering the target area, and by permitting minimum spray es-

Classified by spray patterns, the four basic types of nozzles are the flat spray, even spray, solid and hollow cone, and flooding spray, the engineer

said Flat spray nozzles are suited for weed and brush control in pastures and some filled insect controls when penetration of the foilage is not necessary, says Reeves. They produce semi-coarse spray in a fan pattern that permits uniform overlay along the boom, A special advantage of flat spray nozzles is their operation close to the ground and to minimize drift. Even spray nozzles are used in

band spraying where there can be no overlap from other nozzles to get a uniform, even pattern, Reeves said. They give a uniform volume of spray across the entire fan width. Solid and hollow cone nozzles

are used for insect and disease control when penetration of the sprayed surface is essential for

effective control and drift is not necessarily a hazard. These nozzles produce a circular fan

Flooding spray nozzles are best for spraying a wide area while remaining close to the sprayed surface, the engineer points out. They produce a coarse fan pattern at very low pressure which practically eliminates danger from drift. Thus they are ideal for applying post-emergence chemicals in maturing row

Even with the proper selection of nozzles, wear will change the size and shape of nozzle tip openings. This alters the dis-

terns, explains the engineer. To keep wear at a minimum it is important to match the nozzle material to spray solution Some materials are better suited to withstand these chemicals or mechanical wear with a specific spray. Reeves says the high est initial cost spray nozzle may

be the least expensive to use.

Nozzles should be operated within the pressure limits extended by the manufacturer, explains Reeves. Higher pressure will reduce the droplet size and distort the spray pattern with resulting dangerous drift and non-

uniform coverage. If rates are needed they are greater or smaller than those listed for a particular nozzle tip, then tips must be changed to the volume necessarily, for a successful spray job.

Social Security Law Enacted In 1939

More than \$35 1/2 billion in monthly social security benefits has been paid out to wage earner's dependents and supervisors during the past 25 years, Anthony J. Celebreeze, Secre-tary of Health, Education, and Welfare, said today on the 25th anniversary of the amendments to the Social Security Law adding protection for the families of workers. The original Social Security

Law, enacted in 1935, provided only retirement benefits for workers with only a lump sum payable to the worker's estate in case of his death.

Following up on recommendations of the Committee on Economic Security, appointed by President Roosevelt in 1934, and taking note of the exper-ience gained in administering the retirement benefit program the Congress, in the summer of 1939, enlarged the scope of the Nation's social security program, making it a program for the whole family.

Signing the legislation on August 10, 1939, President Roosevelt described it as "Another

tremendous step forward in providing greater security for the people of this country. "The expanded program, he said, would now give "Lifetime family security instead of only individual old-age security to the workers in insured occupations. In addition to the worker himself, millions of widows and orphans will now be afforded some degree of protection in the event of his death whether before or after his retirement."

The 1939 amendments also pro vided benefits for the wives and children of retired workers and for the first payment of monthly benefits to retired workers and to the newly added catagories of supervisors and dependents was moved ahead two years--

from 1940 to 1942. Since 1939, more than \$13.5 billion has been paid out to young women and children. "These benefit payments, "Sec-retary Celebreeze said "meant food on the table, shoes and school supplies, and a chance for the children to live at home instead of in the county orphan assylum or scattered among relatives.

Almost 2 1/2 million mothers and children are currently receiving social security totaling \$130 million a month. Nine out of ten children and their Boosts Texas'


