Plans Completed for Anniversary Celebration

When the local bearded Jaycees aren't dipping clean shaven Earth residents in the city's water trough, they are busy completing plans for Earth's Fortieth Anniversary Celebration, Saturday, August 29. The Jaycees volunteered recently to take the lead in planning a calendar of events for the city to celebrate her 40th birthday. Numerous other civic organizations have fallen into the ranks and volunteered their services in making the day the best possible.

The rainbow girls will be in charge of registration beginning at 9 a. m. Saturday and provisions will be made for registering at various points in the city throughout the day.

Several people have indicated an interest in dressing in old fashion clothes for the celebration, so those wishing to do so are encouraged to deck out in long dresses and old fashioned suits, or western gear, or anything that suits your fancy.

Arrangements are completed for a team of Sky Divers from Amarillo to drop in on the celebration between 9 and 10 a. m. to kick off the day's activities.

There will be five divers and two planes. Three of the divers will make low jumps, while two will bail out at approximately one and a half mile heights.

The plains are being furnished by Bruegel Elevators of Dimmitt, Flagg, and Dodd.

From 10 to 11:30, Go-Kart Races are scheduled. Entries for the race can be made just prior to starting time at the rodeo grounds.

Lunch time will be from 11:30 a. m. to 1 p. m. and individual arrangements can be made to picnic with friends or at home, though no city-wide plans have been made.

At 1 p. m. at the rodeo grounds, a greased pig race and calf scramble are scheduled, with two age groups for each event. One race will be for children 4-8 years old; the other for 9-12 year olds.

At 2 p. m. there will be a watermelon eating contest for both boys and girls ages 4-8 and 9-12.

At 3 p. m. the fun continues with sack races and three legged races for children ages 4-8 and 9-12.

Prizes or trophies will be awarded for each race in the contest. At 4 p. m. the city pool will be the scene of a beautiful water show presented by a group from Lubbock.

An old-fashioned cake and pie sale will be sponsored by the Earth Rebekah Lodge at 5 p. m.

At 5:30 p. m. there will be a barbecue in the FFA Barn, followed by judging the beard growing contest, presentation of old folks awards, and the beauty contest.

The barbecue is sponsored by the Jaycees and tickets may be obtained from any Boy Scouts for \$1 for adults and .50 for children. If purchased at the gate the night of the barbecue, the costs will be \$1.25 and .75.

A street dance is planned from 8 to 12 p. m. with several square dancing clubs from the surrounding area invited to attend.

The Jaycees have scheduled a meeting tonight to round out the plans. A booster caravan has been suggested to visit surrounding towns to create interest, and this will be discussed at the meeting. Anyone interested in helping is asked to contact any Jaycee member.

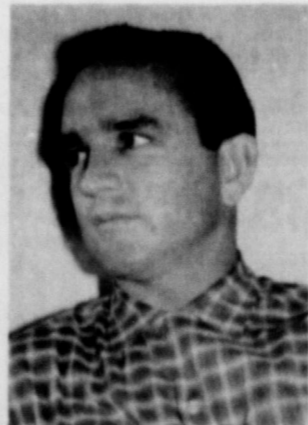

Hamilton Attends REA Convention In Austin

Clarence Hamilton attended the 24th annual REA Convention held August 14 at the Commodore Perry Hotel in Austin, U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough told the nearly 800 representatives who attended that by the preservation and improvement of rural America, they had done so much to strengthen the free enterprise system, but political propagandists portray the REA as enemies of free enterprise.

The right of rural electric cooperatives to generate their own power was stressed by another speaker as essential to the continued development of rural areas. He is Norman Clapp, head of the Rural Electrification Administration in Washington, D. C.

Theme of the annual meeting of members of Texas Electric Cooperatives, state wide association of rural electric, was "Helping Build Texas." And speakers agreed that this job--as it relates to rural Texas--has just begun.

Miss Charlotte Garrett of Breckenridge was named Miss Texas Rural Electrification at the annual banquet held Thursday night, August 13. Miss Jo Lynn Petras of LaGrange was named runner-up. Miss Garrett will represent the Texas rural electric in a national contest to be held at Miami Beach in January.

Three winners in the state-wide contest for the best essays on the history of rural electric cooperative were announced at the meeting. Winning first place and a \$500 scholarship was Miss Kathy Brown of Slanton. Second place winner was Horace Pepkin of Keller, and Jimmy Raffel of Coleman was third. Pepkin received a \$300 scholarship and Raffel, one for \$200.

Miss Brown wrote on the history of South Plains Electric Cooperative at Lubbock; Pipkin of Tri-County Electric at Azel; and Raffel on Coleman County Electric.

Attorneys for the rural electric cooperatives elected R. E. (Bob) Schelder of George West president of their section. Ladies elected Mrs. Michael E. Sloan of Muenster as their new chairman.

Member service advisors for the rural electric also held a separate session as part of the convention, and they selected three men to head their group. They are James Hull of Colorado City, Danny Swafford of Sinton, and Juan D. Nichols of Quitman.

The convention delegates approved several resolutions expressing specific support of the theme of the convention, "Helping Build Texas." One resolution pledged support of the war on poverty, and continued support of a vigorous rural areas development program. Another expressed appreciation to the Farmers Union, Farm Bureau, State Grange, Sheep and Goat Raisers, and other farm and ranch organizations for their support of electric cooperatives and of rural development.

The delegates expressed strong opposition to the Supreme Court ruling requiring reapportionment of both houses of state legislatures on a population basis,

USDA's Texas Testing Lab Serves Cotton Industry

The U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with Texas A&M University has just released a brochure describing the operations and services of the USDA's cotton Testing Laboratory here.

In operation since 1936, the laboratory is one of two fiber and spinning units concluded by the Standards and Testing Branch, Cotton Division, of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

L. J. Watson, head of the laboratory, said the organization serves all phases of the cotton industry--from producer to processor.

"The brochure describes how special equipment and trained workers perform principal fiber and spinning tests to determine the quality and suitability of raw cotton as it makes its way from the field into finished yarns, fabrics and all other processed items," Watson explained.

Here are examples of how the laboratory serves the cotton industry:

A processor who intends to make anything from shirts to drive belts must know the characteristics of the cotton he intends to use.

The ginner may want to know whether he is over-drying or over-machining his cotton.

The insecticide man wants to know what effect his product has on lint quality.

Or, the farmer is concerned about how defoliants or desiccants affect quality of cotton fiber he brings to market.

The brochure, which describes the laboratory and how to take advantage of its services, is available free from the Agricultural Information Office, Texas A&M University, College Station.

Graduates are commissioned as ensigns in the Coast Guard Reserve and join the 3,000 Coast Guard Officers who are charged with enforcing Federal Laws and protecting life and property on the high seas and the navigable waters of the U. S.

Tests Conducted On Fertilizer Research Plots

Experiment stations and research workers provide an excellent service to farmers in this area. Their results have both immediate and long-range benefits. These researchers not only carry out research at the stations but also carry on some outlying field research in farmers' fields. These plots are of immediate value to farmers in the surrounding area.

Little Nozzle Does Big Spraying Job

A self-prepared spray rig equipped with a 500-gallon fiberglass tank, high pressure pump and oversized tires can be used if the nozzles on the boom are not designed for the job.

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A self-prepared spray rig equipped with a 500-gallon fiberglass tank, high pressure pump and oversized tires can be used if the nozzles on the boom are not designed for the job.

effective control and drift is not necessarily a hazard. These nozzles produce a circular fan pattern.

Flooding spray nozzles are best for spraying a wide area while remaining close to the sprayed surface, the engineer points out. They produce a coarse fan pattern at very low pressure which practically eliminates danger from drift. Thus they are ideal for applying post-emergence chemicals in maturing row crops.

Even with the proper selection of nozzles, wear will change the size and shape of nozzle tip openings. This alters the discharge rate and spray pattern, explains the engineer. To keep wear at a minimum, it is important to match the nozzle material to spray solution. Some materials are better suited to withstand these chemicals or mechanical wear with a specific spray. Reeves says the high initial cost spray nozzle may be the least expensive to use.

Nozzles should be operated within the pressure limits extended by the manufacturer, explains Reeves. Higher pressure will reduce the droplet size and distort the spray pattern with resulting dangerous drift and non-uniform coverage.

Agriculture Boosts Texas' Economy In Big Way

The value of Texas' farm and range production is exceeded by only one other raw material, oil. The state's total yearly agricultural production value exceeds the payroll for manufacturing, the total of construction awards, or the payroll for retail trades, says John G. McHaney, Extension economist, Texas A&M University.

Farm and ranch production each year has a total value of about \$2.4 billion. However, explains McHaney, agriculture adds much more to total economy than just income from sales of products. Of the \$2.4 billion received by farmers and ranchers, \$1.8 billion is paid to suppliers for items used in the production of agricultural commodities. About 12 percent of all Texans are engaged in supplying these production items.

Social Security Law Enacted In 1939

More than \$35 1/2 billion in monthly social security benefits has been paid out to wage earner's dependents and survivors during the past 25 years. Anthony J. Celebrezze, Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, said today on the 25th anniversary of the amendments to the Social Security Law adding protection for the families of workers.

The original Social Security Law, enacted in 1935, provided only retirement benefits for workers with only a lump sum payable to the worker's estate in case of his death.

Following upon recommendations of the Committee on Economic Security, appointed by President Roosevelt in 1934, and taking note of the experience gained in administering the retirement benefit program, the Congress, in the summer of 1939, enlarged the scope of the Nation's social security program, making it a program for the whole family.

Signing the legislation on August 10, 1939, President Roosevelt described it as "Another tremendous step forward in providing greater security for the people of this country." The expanded program, he said, would now give "lifetime family security instead of only individual old-age security to the workers in insured occupations. In addition to the worker himself, millions of widows and orphans will now be afforded some degree of protection in the event of his death whether before or after his retirement."

The 1939 amendments also provided benefits for the wives and children of retired workers and for the first payment of monthly benefits to retired workers and to the newly added categories of supervisors and dependents was moved ahead two years--from 1940 to 1942.

Since 1939, more than \$13.5 billion has been paid out to young women and children. "These benefit payments," Secretary Celebrezze said "meant food on the table, shoes and school supplies, and a chance for the children to live at home instead of in the county orphan asylum or scattered among relatives."

Almost 2 1/2 million mothers and children are currently receiving social security totaling \$130 million a month. Nine out of ten children and their mothers can count on monthly benefits if the family breadwinner dies, he said. At the beginning of 1964, the face value of this survivors insurance protection was \$620 billion. Three million aged widows, widowers, and aged dependent parents are now receiving benefits amounting to almost \$150 million a month. An additional 3 million persons, the dependents of retired workers, are receiving close to \$120 million a month in benefits.

Business firms which assemble, process, distribute, transport, wholesale and retail the products of Texas' farm and ranches employ about 20 percent of the labor force of the state and add about \$3.9 billion to the agribusness economy. Their primary concern is to get the agricultural products to the final consumer in the desired form and at the right time and place.

The future of the Texas agricultural industry will belong to those who work to keep their agricultural economy competitive with other areas of the nation and world, McHaney emphasizes.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one percent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one percent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one percent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Diverted Grain Acreage Payments Forthcoming

The postman will soon be delivering portions of a \$1.5-million payload to Lamb County farmers participating in the diverted feed grain acreage program.

L. D. Aten, office manager for the Lamb County ASCS, said his office is getting ready to start payments for acreage diverted from the feed grain program, along with the somewhat-similar wheat acreage diversion, within the next few days.

Payments on the feed grain program, however, will account for the largest bulk of the forthcoming checks. It has been estimated that more than \$1.5-million will be paid to Lamb County producers in the feed grain program, for diverted acres and in bonuses on production for participating in the voluntary program.

Aten said approximately 70 percent of Lamb County farmers are in the voluntary feed grain program. About 38 percent of the allotted acres assigned to the participants has been diverted from grain production.

In addition to figuring payments for the diverted feed grain and wheat acreage, the county ASCS office is gearing for a possible late hour qualifying

of cotton producers for an additional 3.5 cents per pound support payment on their cotton crop.

Cotton producers have a Monday deadline to apply for the additional 3.5 cents. The bonus payment can be made if cotton producers planted with "reasonable expectation of harvest" within their domestic cotton allotment. The domestic allotment is approximately two-thirds of the effective farm allotment given for 1964.

Cotton producers desiring additional information should contact the County ASCS office no later than Monday.
