International Park Trail Riders Feted At Springlake Tuesday for Noon Lunch

"We have had a ball, it's been a lot of hard work, but a lot of fun," said T. A. Cowan of Levelland National Guard and one of the supervisors of the International Park Trail riders.

The riders began the long 480 mile horseback ride from Burlington, Colorado to Levelland to draw attention to the newly designated 1800 miles International Route from Regina, Canada to Mexico along U. S. Highways 85 and 385.

The 27 riders arrived in Springlake at noon Tuesday and received a warm reception from the City of Springlake and the Springlake Lions Club at the Springlake Park.

The group and guests were served fried chicken from a campfire with all the trimmings.

The riders left Burlington, Colo. 16 days before arriving in Springlake. The sendoff at Burlington included a parade, square dancing, horse show and other phases of entertainment.

Trail boss was Clyde Presswood, dean of Levelland Junior College, also his son Clyde was among the group of riders.

Cowan said, they arose each morning at 4:30 a.m. and slept on bedrolls on the ground. Several days it rained on the group. Cowan said they had difficulties, trying to dry their bedrolls.

At night the group gathered around a campfire, played guitars and sang songs.

The horses held up real well, only a few had to be replaced, Cowan said. Two boys of the group assisted in putting new shoes on the horses, which had to be done two and some three times since the ride began.

The cookhouse and 500 gallon water tank was on a truck. The tank served for watering the horses at night.

A hired cook prepared the meals. Cowan said, some of the riders had gained as much as seven, eleven and as much as fourteen pounds since the trip began.

Cowan remarked, it had been a wonderful experience for all, who ranged in ages from 11 to 68. Only a few riders dropped out. Several were given hay fever shots and came back to "ride on with the group."

He also said, the towns throughout the route had given them warm hospitality, and goods and services. They spent part of one day and a night at Boy's Ranch. The Sunnyside citizens served doughnuts and coffee to the group about 10 a.m. in their community building.

The trail ride will end today (Thursday) when they arrive in Levelland to head the parade for the Levelland Route.

Cotton Insects Decreasing In Many Counties

Cotton insect infestations were reported low in a majority of fields in most localities. Populations of some of the pests had increased, with occasional plantings being treated for insect control. Although such infestations were rarely heavy, cotton should be checked frequently for any appearance of damaging infestations.

Ahids were reported in heavy infestations in occasional fields, but populations had decreased in many fields.

Fleahopper populations were reported heavy in some fields in Lynn County. Light to medium infestations were reported elsewhere.

Cabbage loopers increased in numbers in some fields but were found in lower infestations in other fields. Disease caused heavy mortality in some plantings. Egg counts increased to a marked degree in many fields in Lubbock County.

18-Inch Yardstick

Congressman Robert P. Griffin says: "Back in 1933, a government corporation known as the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) was created by Congress to administer a navigation and flood control project. It was understood then the project would generate some hydro-electric power as an 'incidental by-product', in order to provide a government 'shot-in-the-arm' for an under-developed region of the country."

What has happened in the intervening years to this innocuous and constructive corporation? For one thing, TVA now represents an investment—provided by all the federal taxpayers of the whole country—of \$2,047 million. For another, about 80 per cent of that gigantic investment is in electric power facilities—not in navigation and flood control works. For still another, 70 per cent of all TVA electricity is now steam-generated, instead of being a hydro-electric 'incidental by-product'. And, finally, TVA is now the largest steam generating power system on earth.

So, to quote Congressman Griffin again: "It should not be surprising that TVA is dear to the hearts of people in the vast 80,000 square mile area which it serves. The system supplies electricity to its customers at almost half the price paid in other areas served by private utility companies But cheap TVA power is not made possible through some form of magic. It is subsidized power provided by the generosity of the Federal Government—that means all the taxpayers of the Nation. As a government corporation, TVA pays no Federal income taxes (while competing private companies pay 52 percent); TVA receives its capital from the taxpayers and it pays no interest thereon."

There's an accurate description of the TVA "yardstick" that was supposed to measure the propriety of rates charged by private enterprise. It's about 18 inches long.

Where Doctors Are Discouraged

A few months ago Harper's magazine published an article on Britain's socialized medicine system. The author had much praise for it, and cited the fact that when he suffered a chipped elbow he was given free care.

This brought a letter from an American doctor, which Harper's publishes in its July issue. This doctor found that statements in the preceding article "sounds like the ecstasies of a confirmed freeloader who has discovered a saloon which still offers the old-time free lunch." Then he went on: "There is a widening gap between the quality of medicine as it is practiced in the United States and in Great Britain. According to Dr. Alistair Lyon, an English physician now in the United States under a Ford Foundation grant—this is a typical English doctor's day:

- "50 patients before lunch
- "50 patients after lunch
- "20 or 30 house calls daily.

"Should we wonder that the English doctor is discouraged and unable to keep up with the march of medicine?"

Deterioration of standards and services is always a result of socialism—socialized medicine included. It could happen here, just as it has happened in England. And anyone who thinks that the socialized medicine issue is dead as far as the U. S. is concerned had better think again. A current proposal, for instance, would provide government-paid medical and hospital care to people drawing Social Security payments. Once that precedent was established, it would be just a matter of time before other groups demanded and received similar treatment. As the old Chinese proverb has it, the longest journey begins with a single step.

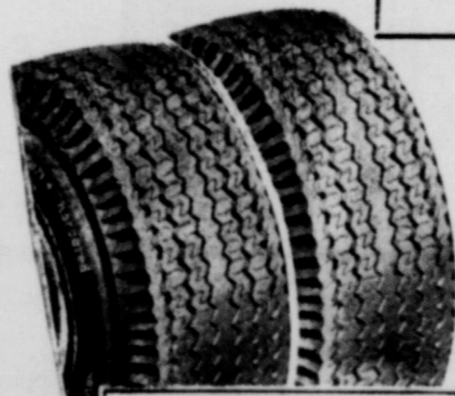

Check . . . Mate, if you are Buying Furniture



Of all the commodities on the American Market, furniture is one of the most difficult to buy with any degree of certainty. We look at a chair, we sit in it, we decide that we like the fabric with which it is upholstered, and we buy it. But do we really know what we are buying? What is under the cover? We are attracted to the basic styling of a wood cabinet. It is the right size and contains the required amount of storage space. But again, what do we know about the wood, the finish, or the construction? Buying a "Brand Name" can be a guide, but this method should not always be used as a hard and fast rule. The important factor in buying furniture is not always the number of dollars spent, but rather the value received for the dollars spent. A combination of three elements establishes the quality of the piece of furniture — design, craftsmanship, and materials used. If any of these elements is missing, the value of the piece is diminished.

Selection of design is a matter of personal preference, but ask yourself this question, "Do I like to look at the piece of furniture, and why? Does it fit into the over-all decorative scheme which I have established?" If it passes this test, then delve into the construction of the piece. Wood furniture (commonly referred to in the trade as case goods) should be constructed in such a manner that over a period of time the basic frame does not warp, the drawers continue to open and close, regardless of temperature or humidity, and any doors, whether hinged or sliding, continue to function. Check to see that drawer openings have center drawer guides (a small rail extending from the front to the back of the case which keeps the drawers in perfect line). Check the sides of the

drawers to see that they are dove-tailed together, and not merely glued or nailed. The sides of the case should be glued and doweled. Scrutinize the interior of the case to see that all supporting members are held in place with screws. These manufacturing methods are used in any wood furniture, regardless of price, which has any degree of quality. Make certain of the materials used in the furniture which you are selecting. There is no substitute for the fine hardwoods and fine hardwood veneers in the furniture industry. Frames for upholstered furniture should be made of hard kiln-dried lumber, eliminating warpage and pulling apart, which necessitates expensive repair. Select upholstering fabrics for weave, not weight—or a combination of both. Finished wood pieces should have solid wood structural members, and either solid or fine wood veneer surfaces. Determine whether you are buying a fine cabinet wood, or whether you are buying another material which is finished to resemble what is represented to you. Remember that fine hardwoods have been designed by Nature to withstand the test of time. They give a natural beauty through the years, and can always be refinished at nominal cost, when necessary. Buy the best quality that you can afford, but learn to look for the trademarks of quality. This is where value received—and not dollars spent—becomes important.

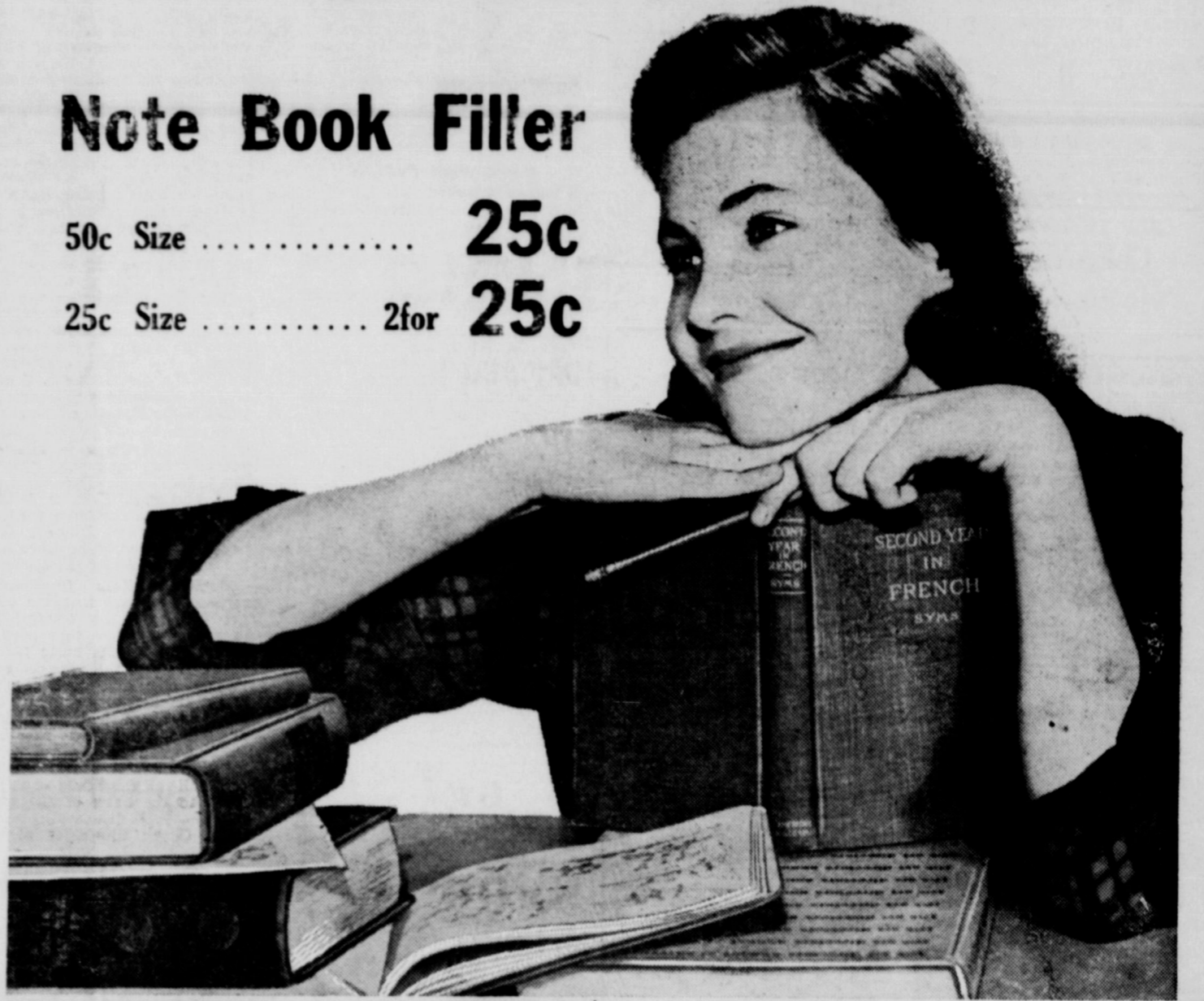

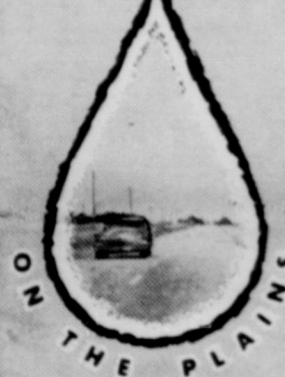

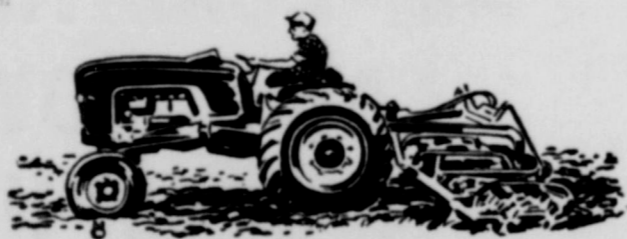
