## Lamb County To Get Federal Aid On Farm Roads

The Texas Highway Department has announced from Austin the first step in setting up a 1961-62 Federal Aid Secondary Program for Texas. O. L. Crain, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at Lubbock has stated that the following farm-to-market roads in this area are scheduled for work under the program, Lamb County farm road 1055, from Earth south to farm road 1843 a distance of 11.7 miles of reconstruction, grading, str. and surfacing at an estimated cost of \$230,000; Lamb County farm road 37, from Amherst to U. S. Highway 84, one mile of reconstruction grading, str. and surfacing, \$20,000; Lamb County farm road 168, between Spade and Hockley County Line 0.5 reconstruct base and surface and raise lake fills, \$30,000. It was announced that work will begin on these projects just as soon as final planning is completed and right-of-way secured. Sr. Resident Engineer, Rhea E. Bradley will be in charge of the work in this area.

## Postmaster M. E. Kelley Retires Friday, After 34 Years Service

Friday is the last day Postmaster Marshall Kelley will serve Earth in that capacity, he will retire from his position as Postmaster after completing 34 years, 7 months and 25 days as Postmaster of our city.

Friday will probably be an ordinary day for most people but for Marshall and his lovely wife Eula Mae it means retirement, and a chance to do several things they have long looked forward to.

Marshall has not only served as a Postmaster of this City, but anyone in this area can tell of good deeds Marshall Kelley has done, some event they especially remember him for, and each event will show something of his fine character, honesty and complete unselfishness. Marshall has served his community well, he has gone far beyond the call of duty to aid a neighbor, a friend or just anyone who needed help.

Dollars and cents could never pay for the many fine things Marshall has done for this area. He helped organize and served as referee at the first football game at Springlake School. He also helped organize many of the clubs and lodges still in existence in Earth.

His contribution to the community has been great. Many times in the long ago years, Marshall has received an urgent telephone call in the middle of the night, some death message, or illness, and though it had nothing to do with his job as postmaster, he being the good citizen that has always so characterized his life arose and drove his Model A car over cow trails through the night to inform a neighbor or friend.

In talking with Postmaster Kelley Wednesday about his retirement and of the long years as postmaster here he told the following story:

I moved to this community in May 20, 1924, what is now Earth, then called Tulsa, Texas. The first building was started in August, 1924. By the time fall season began there was one resident house and a two story hotel with a grocery store in one half of the lower floor. The first cotton gin was also built that fall and ginned about 400 bales of cotton. All those buildings were built by Halseell Land and Cattle Co. In the spring of 1925 several resident houses a garage and another grocery store was built. The Earth Post Office was established on May 25, 1925 and Frank W. Hyatt was appointed postmaster and served in that capacity until February 4, 1926.

On February 5, 1926 I was appointed acting postmaster and on May 27, 1926 was appointed postmaster where I served in that capacity up to this time and will retire on Friday, September 30, 1960.

The Earth postoffice was advanced to third class on July 1, 1938 and to second class July 1, 1954. You can see how the town has grown by the growth of the post office. All authorities will say the best barometer of the growth of a town is by the receipts of the post office.

A great number of people have asked me what my future plans are. Eula and I plan to continue living in Earth, we plan to travel some, and spend a lot of time doing Sunday School and church work. Eula also tells me I will have to keep our yard and will have a garden for pastime. I plan to learn to bowl and help work for our community.

I would like to give my sincere thanks to all the fine people of the Earth community who have made my more than 34 years, serving them as postmaster most happy and pleasant. I know I have made many mistakes but I have done my best to give the best service I could. I will say again as I have said many times before the Earth community is the best community in all the world.

I want to thank all of the wonderful employee's I have had in the post office during the past 34 and one half years, all of them have been wonderful and loyal in every way.

I wish for the one's that continues in the post office the very best of every thing and hope they will have the support and good will of all the fine people of the Earth community.

These years could not be told in their fullness, but as I chatted with Mrs. Marshall (Eula Mae) Kelley, Wednesday about her husband retiring she said, today (Wednesday) is my husband's birthday and I baked his favorite cake, a devil food cake, and he has just consumed a goodly portion of it. Then she said, speaking of birthdays makes me think of that first birthday Marshall and I celebrated together.

The Honorable Walter Rogers of Pampa, representing the 18th Congressional District, will precede Yarborough on the program and will introduce the Senator. It is expected that Congressman Rogers will include in his remarks a review of the two major political parties from the time of Thomas Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton down to the present, identifying the parties with the things for which they stood through the years.

The barbecue will start at 5:30 p.m. and the rally will get underway at 7:00 p.m. The barbecue will be served at the South Grade School, near the football stadium, on the Dimmitt school campus. If weather permits the rally will be held in the football stadium; in case of inclement weather, the rally will be held in the high school auditorium. Dimmitt, which has been selected as the host city because of its central location, will favor the visitors with music played by a select group from highly-rated Dimmitt High School band during the early part of the evening. Walter Jeton, famed catering service of Fort Worth, will serve the barbecue. Tickets are on sale throughout the area at \$1.25 each.

The arrangements committees have been assisted by several men from this community, Arnold Shelby, Orville Cleavinger, and J. A. Littleton Jr. are serving on the ticket committee, and Clarence Hamilton and Ed Dawson are helping with the program committee. Hamilton is also serving as secretary of the general arrangements committee.

Rev. and Mrs. Baldwin and Jimmy, a junior in high school, will make their home in the present parsonage. The church has included in its overall building program a new parsonage.

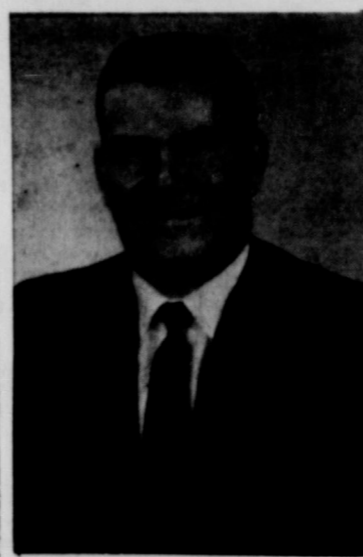
He was born and spent his early childhood near Paducah, Texas, where his father was engaged in farming.

## New 1961 Fords To Be Shown Thursday at Gatewood Ford Sales

The new Ford line, to be introduced by Ford dealers on September 29, consists of 16 models in four series—Fairlane 500, Galaxie and station wagons. Added to the line are two new models—a Galaxie Club Victoria (two-door hardtop) and a six-passenger

### Lamb County Soil Conservation News

The board of Supervisors election for a new Supervisor for the Earth Community will be held at the Earth Elevator on October the 4th at 10:00 a.m. All Land owners in this Zone which extends from the Bailey County Line to Springlake are urged to attend and vote for the candidate of their choice for Supervisor of Zone 2.

All regular elections are held on the first Tuesday in October. To be eligible to vote in a soil conservation district election for supervisors, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. He (or she) must live in a county all or part of which is in the soil conservation district. The voter must have attained the age of 21 years. No poll tax is required. Under the community property laws of Texas the wife of a landowner also owns land and is entitled to vote and hold office.

Soil Conservation district supervisors serve a term of five years. The term of office of a supervisor begins the day after he is elected provided he qualifies: State law requires that a soil conservation district supervisor take an oath of office and execute a loyalty oath before he is officially a supervisor.

I was still called "a young bride" of course I wanted to have something very special for my husband. "He must have a cake," but who could bake a cake without eggs? We had a grocery store, but didn't have powdered eggs, cake mixes, etc. in those days. However I decided to do something about it. The only place that I might find an egg was way out in the country to the R. E. Barton farm. Oh! I can still remember those cow trails, they were pretty hard to follow in a car, especially when you were just learning to drive a Model A car.

It had rained and rained and rained some more.

Anyway I started out to the R. E. Barton farm. Marshall told me just which lakes to miss. In those days we drove in ruts. If you could just get one front wheel in a rut and was going along ever so fast, about 10 to 15 miles per hour, and what should I see but another car coming toward me. That man held the rut on me. I didn't know who he was then. Funny thing though we became close friends as we all worked and grew up together here in this wonderful community.

I have forgotten how my cake turned out, but it took me over four hours to drive out and get the eggs. Mrs. Barton really didn't have the eggs to spare, but she did let me have 3 or 4 eggs for that birthday cake.

Guess you wonder why I should think of my husband's birthday? Well, she said, he has been looking forward to being old enough to retire and doing so many things that we could not do with a confining job.

In speaking of entertainment she said, how things have changed. We had to make our own entertainment. But oh! what fun it was to go rabbit hunting. Most of the country was planted in wheat. We would get in the car at night and the men would ride the fender and shoot rabbits.

In the fall we would go out and wait for the ducks and geese to come in and shoot them. We had so much fun in those days.

We used to all worship together too, you didn't know one denomination from the other. We loved the Methodist pastors like they were our very own. I still clearly remember the old Arbor where all our Revivals were held.

I can never forget how thrilled we were to have electric lights, how wonderful they were. We didn't have to keep that kerosene lamp shade so clean anymore. We have seen the first churches organized, PTA, Masonic Lodge football games, helping hand club, O. E. S., Rainbow for Girls, Study club, Cemetery Assoc. (one of Marshall's loves), we have lived through the depression with these lovely people and through World War II.

We have rejoiced over new babies, have seen these boys and girls marry and make homes for themselves and what joy to see and enjoy them, we love them so.

We have shared sorrows and blessings together. Our blessings cannot be numbered. We deeply appreciate and love our community and still want to be a part of it.
