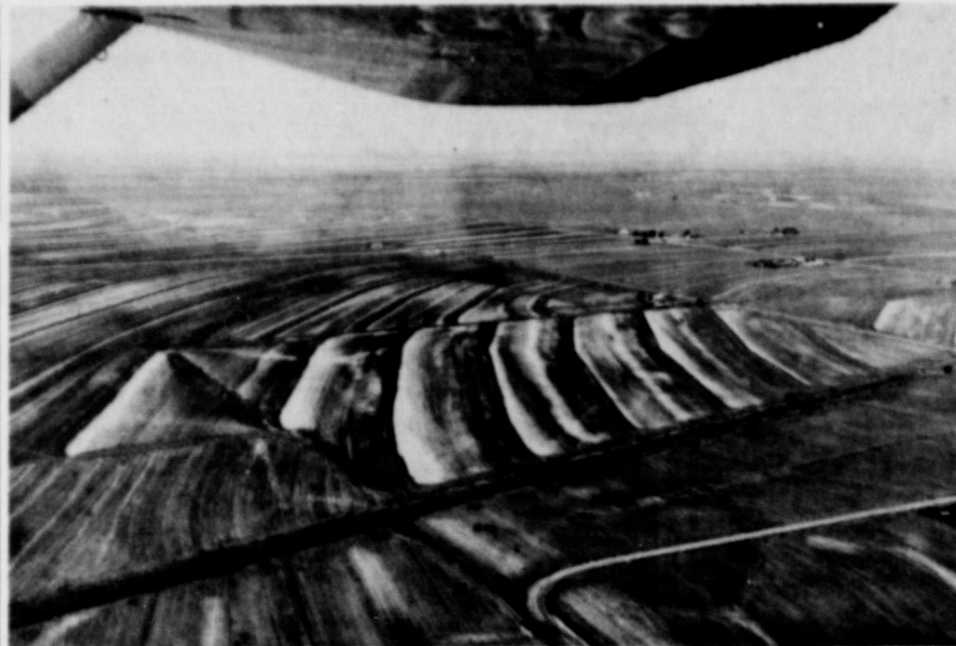

Lamb Has Average Of 18 Inches Rainfall

Rainfall records for the past 75 years show most of the Lamb County Soil Conservation District receives an average of 18 inches or less per year. As a farmer, what are you doing to hold the rainfall you receive? Much of the rain falls hard and suddenly, especially in the Spring. Unless some provisions are made to hold this water on the land, most of it will run off. This causes erosion of rich topsoil and loss of soil moisture. Paralled terraces are the answer to this problem. Point rows are eliminated, erosion is halted, and moisture is saved. The uniform distribution of water will lessen the chance of costly failure. Spacing the terraces to fit four-row or six row equipment means less farming expense and a more efficient operation. Paralled terraces are valuable on any cropland that is dryland or where sprinkler irrigation is used. Many paralled terraces can be constructed from the lower side,

This helps to decrease the slope of the field and eliminates the channel in front of the terrace. This allows the water to spread over a larger area and gives better moisture distribution. High and low places between terraces are cut or filled to keep terraces paralled. Com-share assistance is available through the Great Plains Conservation program and the GPCP is generally 70 percent of the actual cost and ACP is generally 50% of the actual cost, nated most of the objections farmers formerly had against terracing. The benefits of eliminating point rows, controlling erosion, conserving moisture, and permitting a cheaper more efficient operation cannot be overlooked. 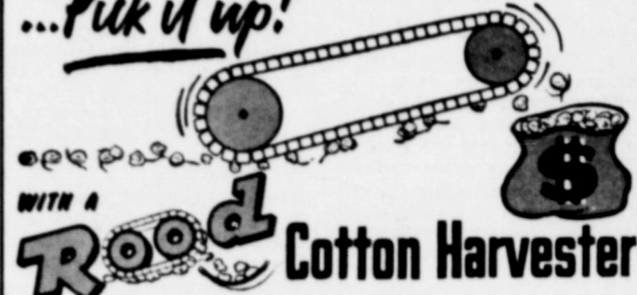

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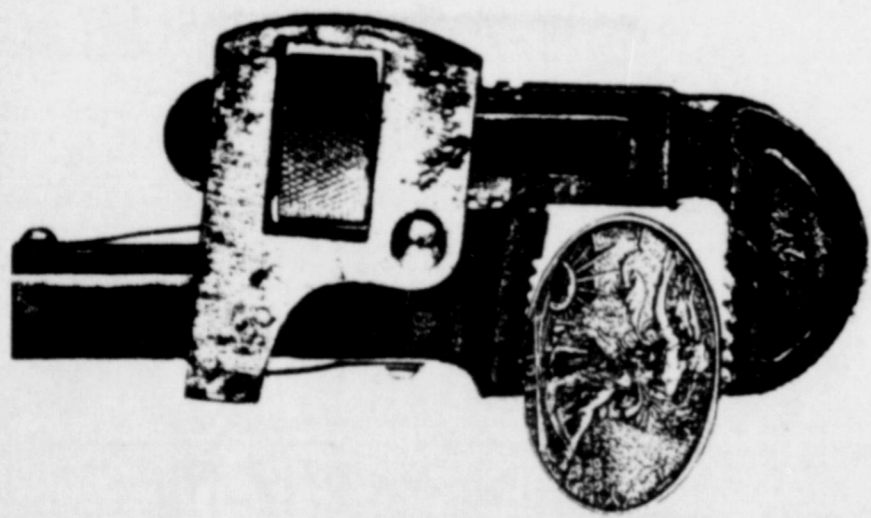

50% Of Teen Age Marriages Don't Work

Teen-agers are flocking to the altar by the hundreds of thousands. One out of two brides this year will be under 20. The same ratio will end up in separation or divorce, according to Changing Times reporting on "What happens to teen-age marriages?"

The chance of success for a teen-age marriage in the U. S. is about a third as good as for marriages of those in their twenties. The fact is that today more girls marry at age 18 than at any other age and this tendency to marry young is one that is peculiar to the United States. It's not just the women either; nearly half of all American young men are married by the time they are 25, compared with only a quarter in most of Europe and as few as a tenth in Norway and Ireland. Only in Asia do you find a marry-young pattern comparable to that of the U. S.

Interested in improving the chance of success of thousands of marrying teens, Changing Times offers these guidelines: The young married--particularly the groom--must understand the necessity of completing high school and, if possible, going on to college or other advanced training. More needs to be done to help teen-agers understand what marriage entails--realistic education on what marriage is like, what obstacles must be overcome, why money is important.

More help is needed for married couples in trouble in family counseling, baby care supplementary education, and general encouragement in making the best of the situation. And, parents must not cringe at prospects of a teen-age crisis. Wise parents can accept what is and give every support they can.

If you teen-ager wants to marry... tell her or him these facts:

One out of two teen-age marriages ends in divorce or separation. Teens who drop out of school to marry rarely go back.

Pregnancy occurs early for most teen brides--ending hopes of career or more education.

Teen husbands average a little over \$2,000 a year, but most families need two or three times that to get by.

Marriage is a serious commitment. Education, job advancement is almost impossible. Most teens are overwhelmed by the emotional and psychological trials of marriage.

Cotton Allotment Cut In Lamb County

Lamar Aten, Lamb County Office manager for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation service has announced that the cotton allotment for Lamb County for 1966 has been reduced.

The allotment, which has been increasing steadily the past years, has been reduced by 834 acres leaving a total allotment for the county for 1966 of 185,268 acres.

The reduction was caused by the revoking of a policy by the Federal Government under which the State Committee was able to transfer a cotton allotment from a county where less than 90 per cent of the allotment was planted to another county where more than 90 per cent was planted.

Aten stated that the ASCS office would determine the acreage cut for farmers in Lamb County on a formula based on the farmer's original allotment last December and that it would be done on a percentage basis with approximately a .2 to .3 cut would be the most suffered by any one farmer.

The acreage cut will be on permanent acreage and Aten's stated that the acreage cut was in all probability based on a five year average. Many counties suffered a much larger reduction under the policy change made by the state committee.

"Another contributing factor to the allotment reduction for Lamb County was a decrease

in the state's overall allotment," Aten said.
