Both Busby and Haberer are seeking re-election. Other candidates include Jack Angeley, Earl Parish and a former board member, Bob Armstrong.

The three men selected from these candidates will have a great responsibility in assisting the remaining board members in the operation of our schools. The four remaining on the board are R. L. "Sport" Byers, Guy P. Kelley, Price Hamilton and Orville Cleavinger.

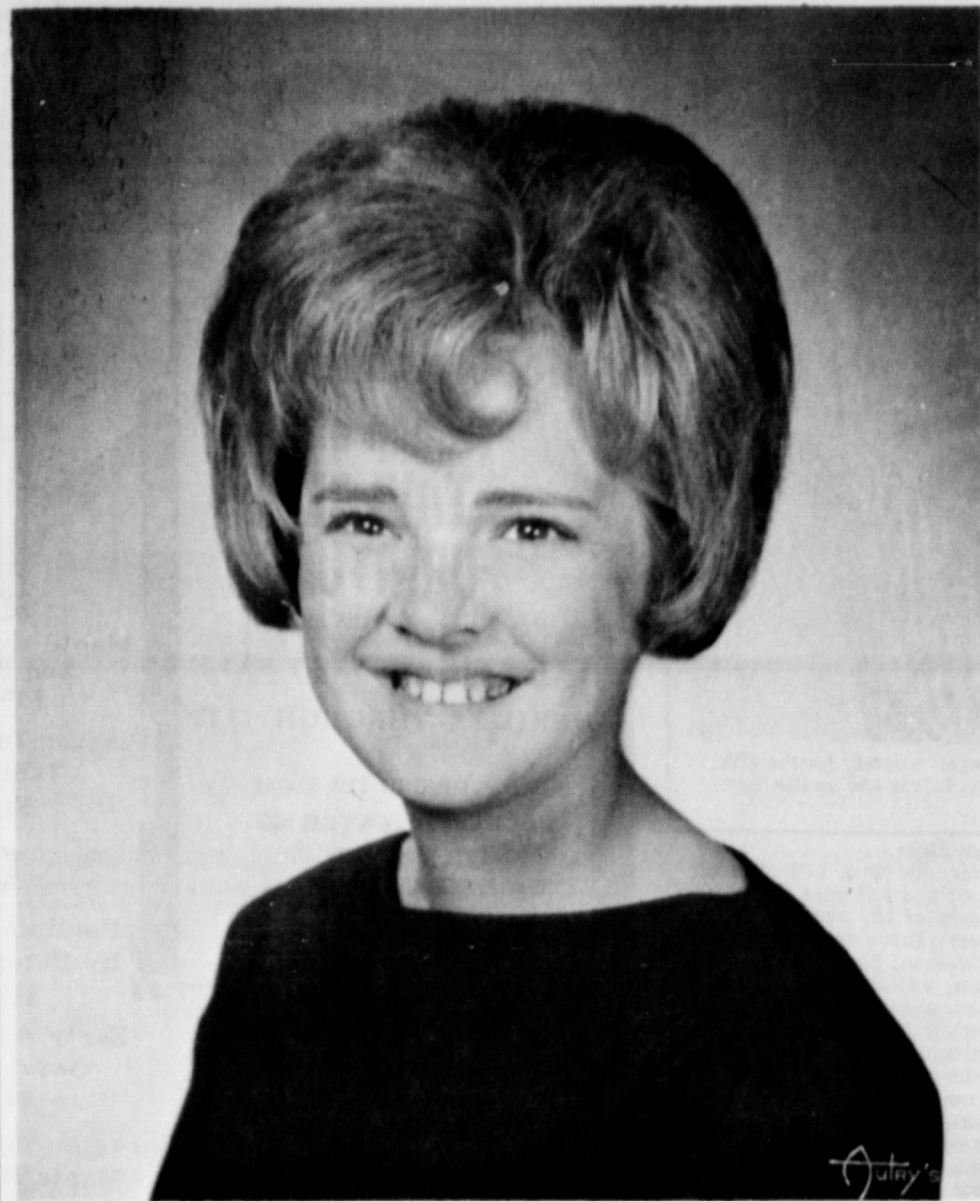

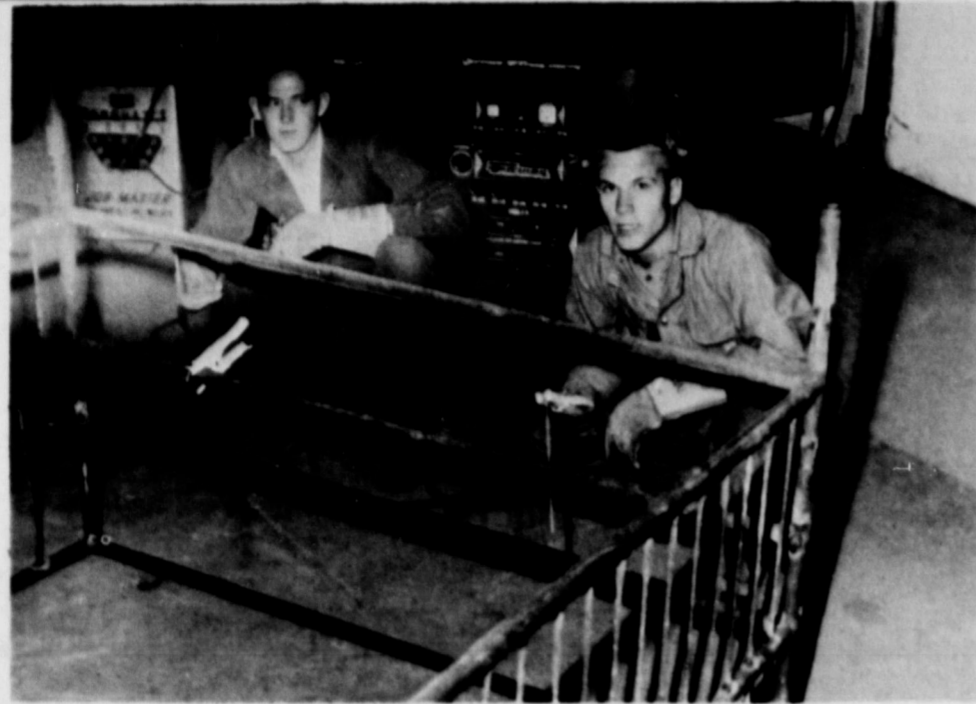
Rev. Albert Lindley presented several scripture readings, appropriate at Easter time.

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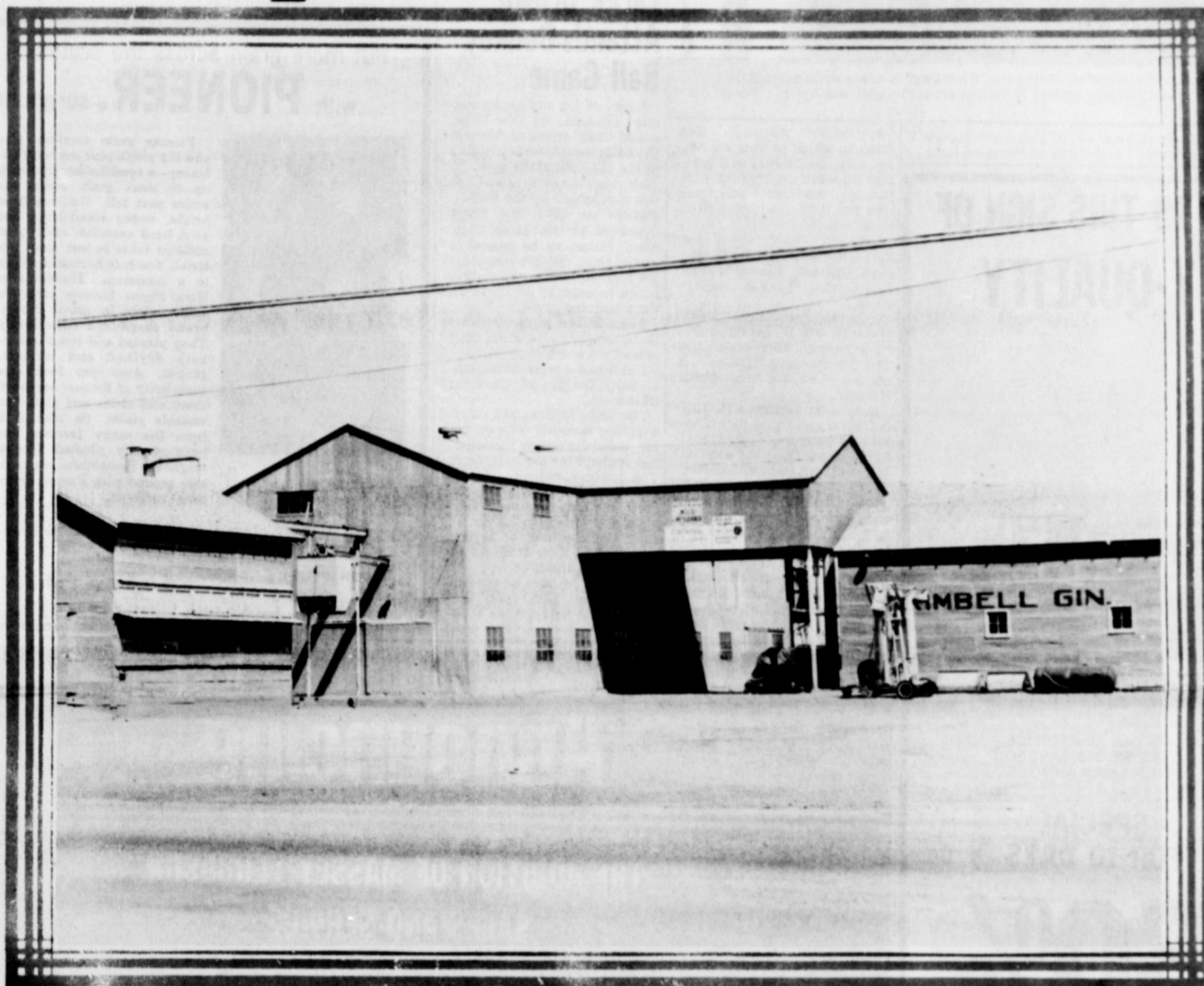
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Freshmen Take Top Honors At Boy's Ranch

Weldon Barton won the mens' hobby horse race over Red Murtell and Furchie Riley. Mrs. Richard Bills won the women's division.

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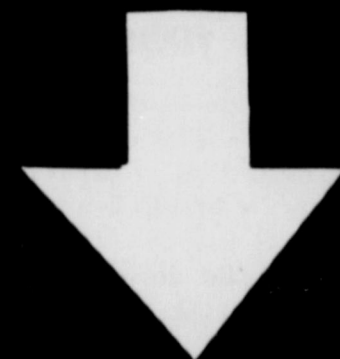
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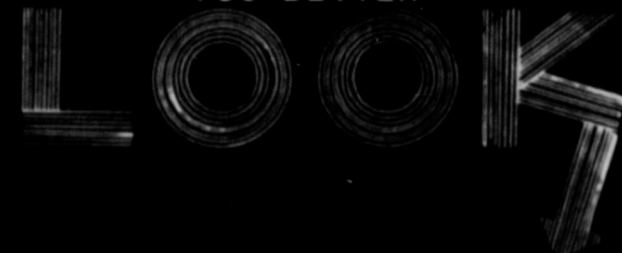
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Springlake Takes First in Track Meet Saturday

Records fell like flies Saturday afternoon as area school-boys competing in three divisions of the Annual Springlake Invitational Track Meet whittled away 29 standards and tied another in the process, of crowning three new champions.

Vega dethroned Bovina in B. Springlake replaced O'Donnell as the A champion and Friona and Olton tied for the AA title vacated by Dunbar, which didn't enter this year.

The Class B division was the main victim of the record assault, as 11 of 14 standards in that bracket were broken and another was equalled. Nine each fell in the other two divisions.

The susceptibility to failure by the records, however, were mainly due to the weather instead of exceptional times. Although there were some formidable exhibitions in Saturday's running, the weather contrasted

greatly that which prevailed here last year in the meet's initiation ceremony.

Perfect weather was on tap Saturday, and the 500 athletes representing 35 teams used it to good advantage.

Springlake had little trouble in copping the A title. The Wolverines took first place money in the 100 and 220 dashes and in the 440-yard relay. Coach Jody Mahan, the meet title already iced down, withdrew his mile relay team from competition to prevent risk of injury.

And it was in the Class A mile relay that the best race of the evening developed. Idalou, runner-up to Springlake in the team totals, jumped into the lead and maintained it through the first three laps. When sprinter Chris Weems took the baton for the final quarter, he had a comfortable lead over Hale Center's Freddie Weill, the only other man even in the running.

Weems, one of the outstanding athletes in the meet, stayed out front through the final turn and into the home stretch. But a tremendous spurt by Weill nipped him by scant inches.

Probably the top performance of the afternoon was the one turned in by Tullia's mile relay team, which shattered Dunbar's record with a commendable 3:29.9 effort.

Dennis McLain of Hart was named top individual performer

in Class B, John Patterson of Springlake received the honor in A and it went to George Jones of Olton in AA.

Another outstanding individual was Melvin Bell of Anton, who grabbed first places in the Class B broad jump, 100 and 440. McLain took first in the low hurdles and 220.

Patterson won the Class A discus and 100 and ran a leg on the champion sprint relay. Jones won the broad jump and low hurdles.

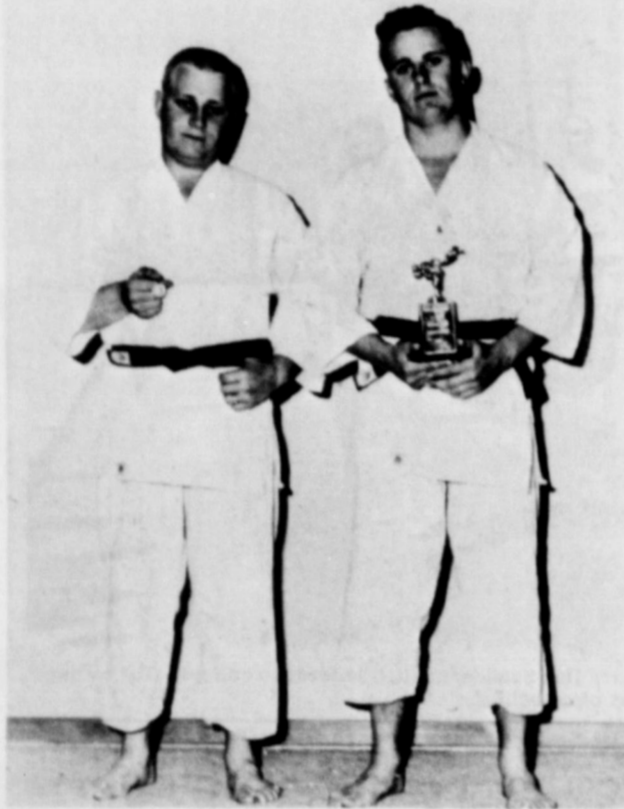

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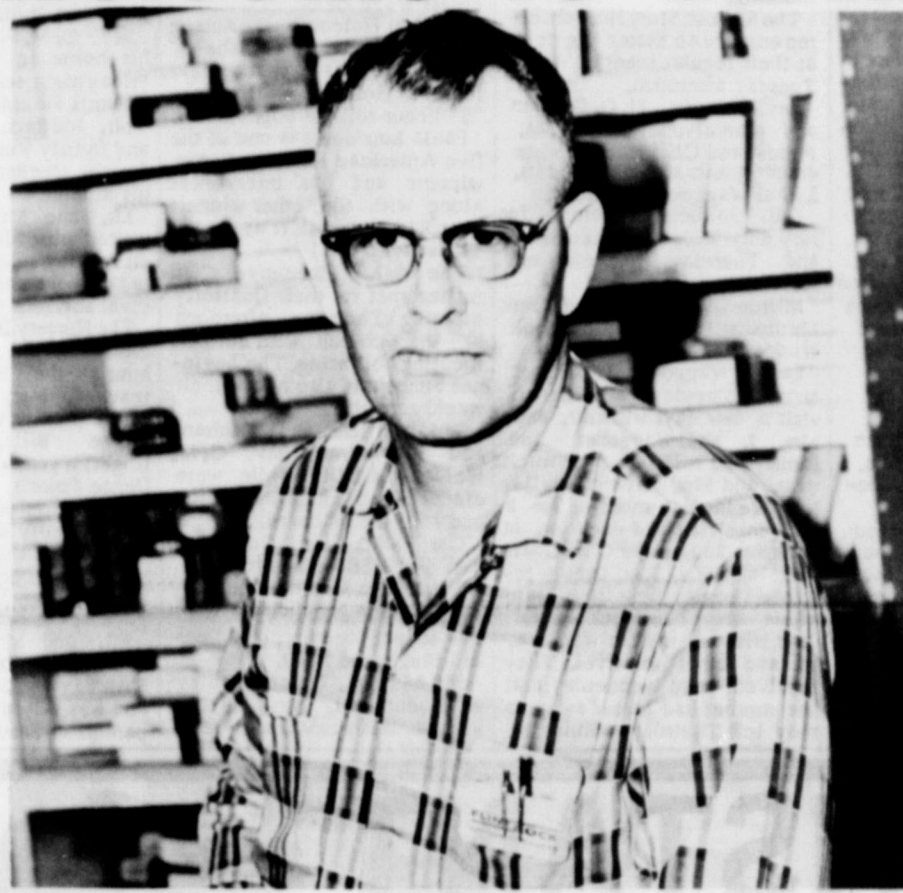
