Congressman George Mahon announced a Rural Electrification Administration Loan to the Five Area Telephone Corp., Inc. of Muleshoe in the amount of \$476,000 at 2% interest.

Purpose of the loan is to finance facilities to connect 4 additional subscribers, construct 10 miles of new line, upgrade service to one party line throughout the system, complete the system authorized under prior loan and finance system improvements.

Rodeo Starts Tonight In Clovis

Prize money totaling \$14,030 will be shared by many of the nation's cowboys competing in the three-day Pioneer Days Rodeo beginning tonight at the Mounted Patrol Arena on South Norris Street.

The event annually draws big names in the professional rodeo cowboy world and this year is no exception. A total of 347 entries, 75 more than last year, have paid entry fees for the full range of rodeo events.

Performances will begin each of the three nights-Thursday, Friday and Saturday-at 8 p.m. with the grand entry made up of rodeo cowboys and cowgirls, arena hands, rodeo queen figures and members of the Curry County Mounted Patrol, sponsors of the rodeo.

Contestants will come to Clovis from 17 states and Canada, according to Don Smith, publicity chairman for the Mounted Patrol. In addition to the \$14,030 prize money, there will also be local donations for top riders in some events.

The 71 bareback bronc riders will compete for \$2,275 in prize money; 38 saddle bronc riders will vie for \$1,450; and 57 bull riders will be contending for \$1,925 in prize money.

Calf ropers, 54 of them, will be shooting for a total of \$2,120; and 62 steer wrestlers will split a total of \$2,360.

Thirty-two team roping teams, a total of 64 riders will compete for \$2,420 in prize money. Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association rules this year limit team ropers to one entry.

Eighteen cowboys, all but two of them local individuals, have entered the wild cow milking contest, with \$740 in prize money at stake. Women's barrel racers will also contend for \$740 prize money. Twenty-seven racers are entered.

Among the top rodeo cowboys who will compete in the Pioneer Days event is Larry Ferguson of Miami, Okla., who currently is listed second in all-around cowboy standings on the basis of \$20,861 in prize money won. Larry trails his brother Tom by only about \$700 at the top of the all-around listing. Tom Ferguson is recuperating from an injury and will not compete here this year.

Others from the top 10 all-around list who'll compete in Clovis are Jack Ward of Springdale, Ark., who stands in fifth place; Monty Henson of Mesquite, Tex., who's presently in seventh position; and James Ward of Odessa, Tex., at eighth place in the standings.

Monty Henson of Mesquite, Tex. currently ranked first in saddle bronc riding, had paid his entry fee for the rodeo here; as has Donny Gay, another Mesquite, Tex. cowboy who won the 1976 bull riding championship and stands at sixth place in that event at present.

Nearly all the big names in roping will compete during the three-day Pioneer Days arena competition, including Sylvester Mayfield of Clovis, now standing at fifth place in the standing; and Pow Carter of Fort Sumner, who holds down ninth place in PRCA calf roping standings. Also competing in the calf roping will be Willard Moody of Wynnewood, Okla., who is holding down first place in that event in the last published PRCA standings.

A number of the cowboys signed up for the Pioneer Days event have competed in the National Finals Rodeo, the world series of rodeo held annually in Oklahoma City. They include John Forbes, Bruce Ford, Don and Pete Gay, Bobby Goodspeed, Don Graham, Chris Ledaux, Mike Bandy (brother of recording artist Mo Bandy), and a number of others.

The Mike Cervi Championship Rodeo Company will again furnish stock for the rodeo here. Cervi's string includes the best-known and toughest rodeo stock in the country, among them a saddle bronc named "Frontier Airlines" which was named "Bucking Horse of the Year" for 1975; a bareback bronc named "Little Dan"; and such bulls as "No. 8" and "HH".

Open Meeting 4-H Report On FM 1071

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will conduct a public meeting on June 17, 1977, at 10 a.m. in the Olton Agriculture Community Center in Olton, Texas, for the purpose of discussing the construction of F.M. 1071 in Lamb County from F.M. 168, 5 miles south of U.S. 70, east to the Hale County Line and in Hale County from the Lamb County Line, east to F.M. 1071.

This proposed improvement will consist of the construction of farm to market type pavement consistent with other farm to market highways in the area. Proposed right of way width will be 100 feet. Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design will be displayed at the public meeting, and together with environmental studies and any other available information about the proposed project, are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office on the Clovis Highway in Littlefield, Texas.

Personnel from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will be in attendance at this meeting to answer questions and give information concerning the design, the State's Relocation Assistance Program and right of way acquisition.

All interested citizens are invited to attend this public meeting.

Health Tips

Want to get a good, painful, blistering sunburn? It's easy. Just stay out in the sun in your shorts or swim suit all day on the first truly hot, sunny day of the summer season. You'll get your burn.

Or, do you want to begin picking up a summer tan without burning?

That's easy, too. Just follow the simple rules of the American Medical Association: 15 to 20 minutes exposure the first day; 20 to 25 minutes the second day; 25 to 30 minutes the third day; 30 to 35 minutes the fourth day. Thereafter base exposure time on the degree of redness and tenderness of your skin. The shorter exposures are for those with light skin; the longer times are for darker skin.

Remember this about tanning - it can't be rushed. Trying to rush it will only result in a burn. The burned skin will peel, leaving you pale and pink again.

Of course, the AMA also points out that there is no health value in tanning. In fact, it contributes to early aging, and wrinkling of the skin, and to proliferation of skin cancer. But, if you insist on a tan, start slow and build up gradually.

Wheat Storage Crisis

WACO—With wheat harvest just getting underway, the president of the Texas Farm Bureau said a crisis may be developing over storing this year's crop.

Our problem is we've already got almost a year's crop in storage and we're expecting good to bumper crops in the winter wheat area from Texas to Nebraska," said Carrol Chaloupka, Dalhart grain and cattle producer.

"What we fear," he said, "is that a shortage of storage will depress our prices even more." He said that wheat prices have been falling steadily since last year, and that wheat is now selling for about 40 percent below what it was last June.

If the situation reaches crisis proportions, we will ask that the U.S. Department of Agriculture approve loans on wheat stored in temporary facilities, even on the ground," Chaloupka said. "We believe this may be necessary to keep the

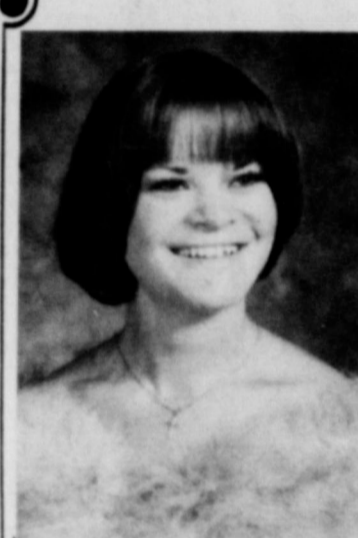
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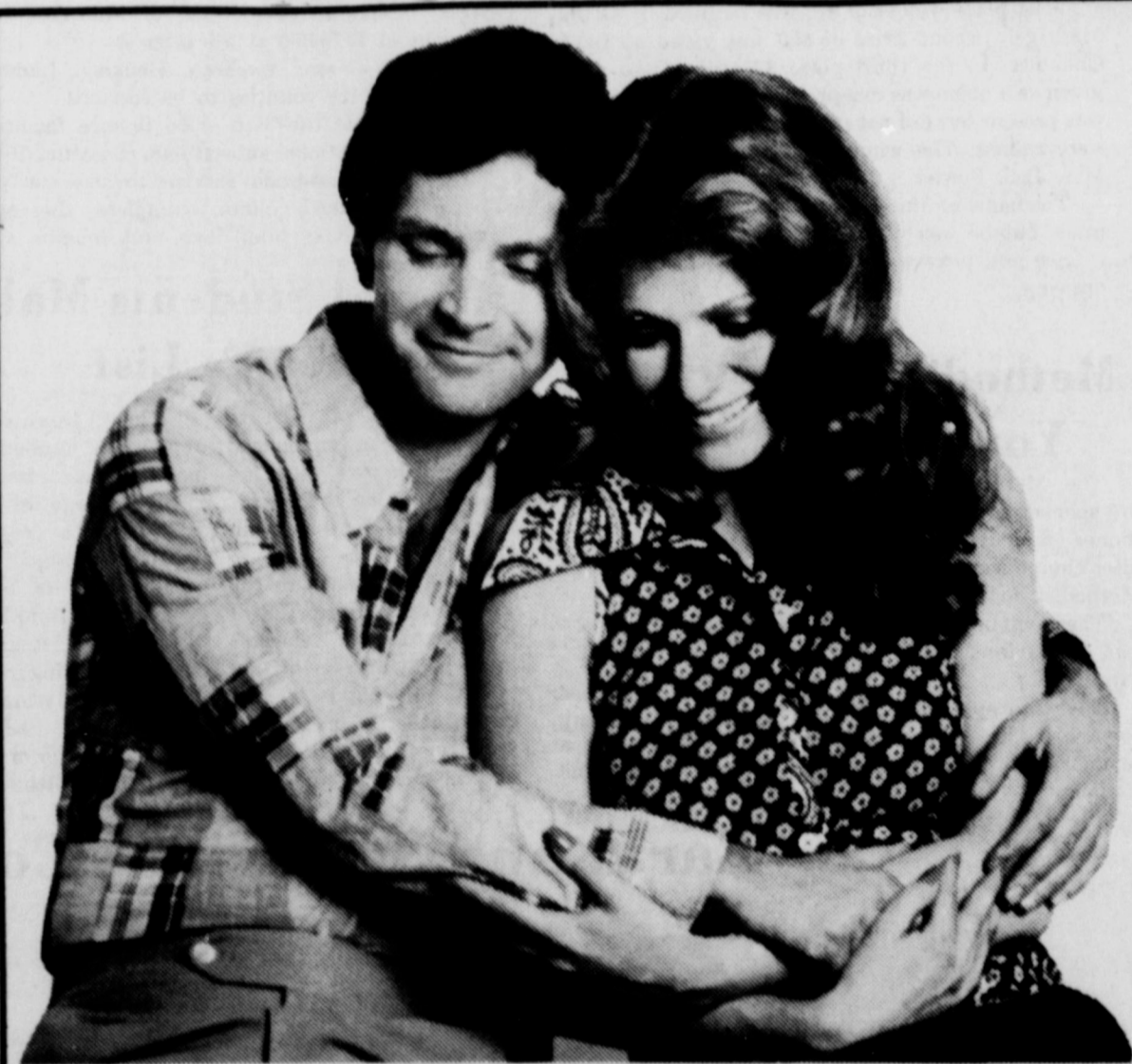

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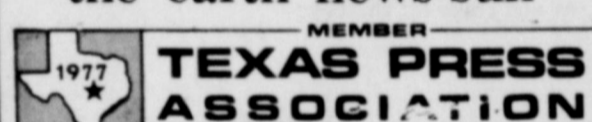

DIMMITT (Special)—Services for James Raymond Riley, 72, of Dimmitt were at 3 p.m. Thursday at the Fourth and Bedford Church of Christ here. Ronnie Parker of Dimmitt and Morgan Sturgess of Tulsa officiated.

Burial was in the Hart Cemetery in Hart under direction of Dennis Funeral Home of Dimmitt.

Riley died about 6 p.m. Tuesday in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital from injuries sustained in a head-on collision with a car driven by his grandson about 13 miles southeast of Dimmitt. Investigators said the youth, Kevin Ray Riley, 14, was traveling north on a dirt road and his grandfather was south-bound when the collision occurred. The spokesman added that both drivers apparently crested a small hill unaware of each other.

Riley's wife, a passenger in his car, and the youth were reported in satisfactory condition today in Plains Memorial Hospital here.

Riley was born in Grayson County and came to the Hart area in 1905. He was a member of the Fourth and Bedford Church of Christ.

Survivors include his wife, Edna; two sons, Ray Joe of Hart and Steven Kin of Austin; one brother, Furche of Hart; three sisters, Eva Olson and Dorothy Burt, both of Beville and Marie Cloner of Leander and two grandsons.

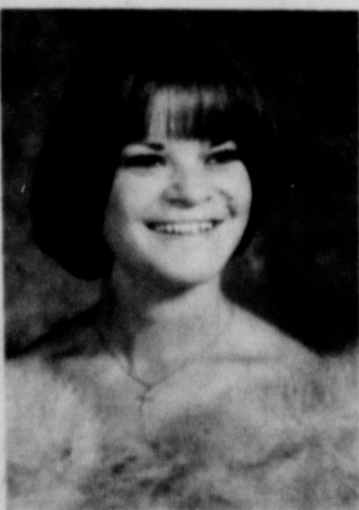

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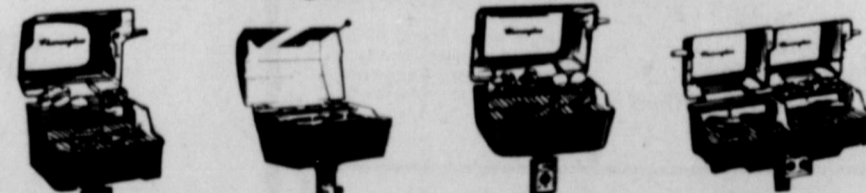

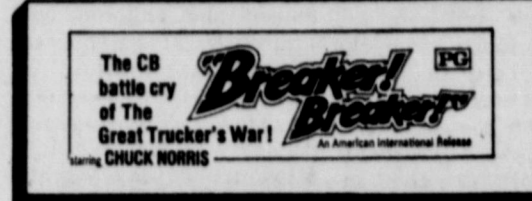

Mrs. Tollett is married to Marvin Tollett. They have two children and two grandchildren.

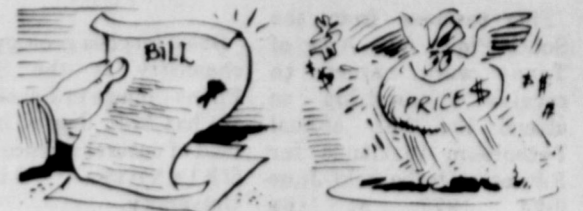

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
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South Plains Teachers Receive Fellowships

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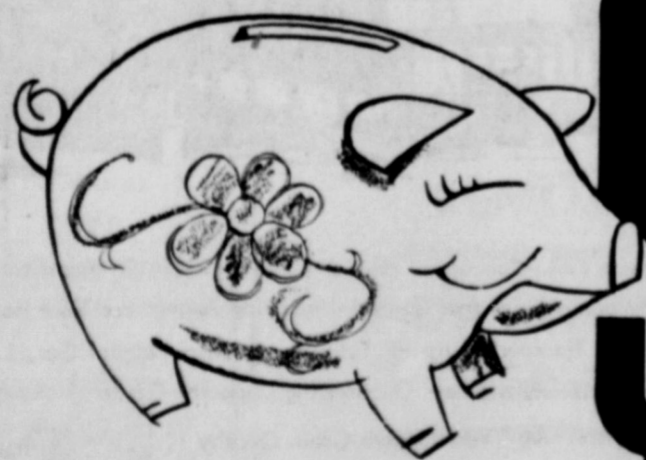
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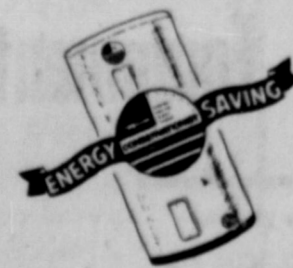
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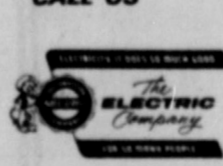


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
