School May Go To 7 Period Day Beginning In September

Members of the local school board gathered Monday night in a regular session, with a full agenda of business. They paid bills, approved minutes of the previous meeting, reviewed delinquent tax rolls, reviewed end of school enrollment, and daily average attendance for the year. They also approved the school calendar and discussed going to seven period school days for the next year.

The group noted that 929 students were enrolled at the close of school. Of this enrollment there were 512 elementary students, 164 junior high 221 high school, and 32 in special education classes.

The average daily attendance this year showed 73 colored students and 805 white students. Last year's figures showed 60 colored and 852 white students, indicating a loss in white students and a gain in colored students. On this ADA basis, the colored students entitled the school to a gain of one teacher, while the white enrolled accounted for a loss of two teachers.

The appointment of Weldon Barton and Orville Cleavinger was made by the group, to serve on the board selection committee for the High Plains Children Training Center.

The group reviewed delinquent tax rolls and agreed that those on the list should be notified before legal action would be taken. However, legal action would be taken if necessary.

The following calendar for the forthcoming school year was adopted, with 178 days of school. School begins-August 28. Thanksgiving holiday-November 23-24. Christmas holiday-December 22 to January 2. District teachers meeting (holiday)-March 8. 4-day Easter holiday-April 12 through 15. Jr. High graduation-May 18. High School baccalaureate-May 19. High School Commencement-May 20.

The board went on record as being in favor of a 7 period day for students attending Springlake-Earth School. However, Superintendent Mann said, "the schedules have not as yet been

worked out to see if we can change over to this 7 period day without too many hitches." He went on to explain the principals were currently working on their schedules and that in all probability the school would add a period in September, in order to make available a larger selection of subjects to students.

Two Elevators Receive First Load Of Wheat

The Springlake Elevator and Sunnyside Grain and Supply, Inc., each received their first loads of wheat on Saturday, June 10.

Wayne Pharis delivered the first load to Springlake Elevator at 1 p. m. Saturday. The load weighed 16,460 pounds and measured 13 percent moisture content.

The Tascosa wheat was grown three miles south of Circle and yielded an average of 30 to 35 bushels an acre.

Phillip Jones was grower of the load of wheat delivered to the Sunnyside Grain and Supply, Inc. His load weighed 13,000 pounds and measured 13 percent moisture content.

Commissioners Court Buys New Road Equipment

Members of the Commissioners Court of Lamb County met Monday in regular session and voted to pay bills, discussed various welfare cases, and purchased some new equipment for Precinct 1.

The new equipment purchased by the group included a 120 Caterpillar motor grader and a 922 loader from the West Equipment Company, at a cost of \$43,000. After the trade-in of a Gallion motor grader and a model '55 loader was figured in, the actual difference the county had to pay was \$29,000.

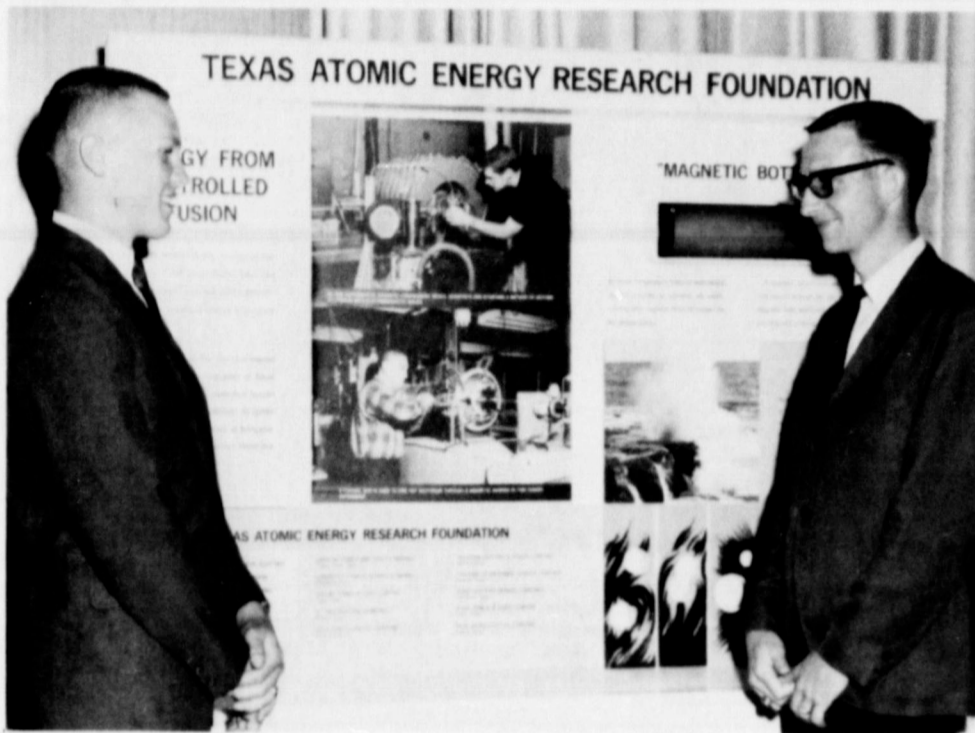

Businessmen's Association Making Plans For The Future

Enthusiastic members of the recently organized Earth-Springlake Businessmen's Association gathered Thursday night at the community building for a briefing on the wage and hour laws, from a representative of the Labor Department.

When it was announced the Labor Department representative was unable to make the meeting, local members used the time to lay plans and gather ideas for the betterment of the area.

They discussed various industries including a soybean mill, cattle auction, and others they felt that would be suitable for this agricultural area. To further pursue the idea of obtaining industry for the area, the group appointed Neil Pounds to contact the West Texas Chamber of Commerce office to send a representative to speak at the next meeting in regard to suitable industry for the local area, and to give pointers on how to proceed with efforts to obtain industry for the area.

To put ideas to work on increasing business in the area immediately, the group voted to begin a monthly Trades Day in Earth. Tentative date for the first Trades Day was set for August 7.

The plan is to work for one hundred per cent cooperation from all business places to take part in the monthly Trades Day and run some type of special on that day to make it a genuine unanimous effort toward the town's promotion.

In connection with Trades Day the three implement dealers will set up an auction sale to take place on that day. Complete details for a drawing, Trades Day, and auction sale were not settled at the meeting, due to the limited time. A three-man committee was appointed to work out further details on the monthly promotion. The three appointed were Leon Dent, Gene Brown and Doug Parish.

Complete plans for the Trades Day will be worked out in the July meeting of the organization, prior to the day set for the first Trades Day.

Glasscock Injured In Head-On Collision Near Lubbock

Ray Glasscock of Truscott, formerly from Earth, was seriously injured in a head-on collision near Lubbock about 8:30 p. m. Monday.

An elderly couple from Lubbock were killed, and Glasscock is in poor condition at Methodist Hospital as a result of the accident.

Highway Patrolman Byron

Deal, who investigated the mishap, said the elderly couple was heading south on College Avenue, and Glasscock was driving north. Glasscock apparently lost control of his pickup as he hit an abrupt rise at the end of the pavement at an intersection. The two vehicles collided head-on in the west lane about 200 feet north of the intersection.

Heavy Damages Estimated In Car, Pickup Mishap

Highway patrolman Bill Angel investigated an accident at the intersection one mile east of Springlake-Earth School on Farm to Market Road #302 last Wednesday afternoon at 4 p. m. Damages ran high but no one was injured.

The mishap involved a 1963 Ford Fairlane driven by Freddy Lee Helms, 16, of Star Route Dimmitt and Larry Delvin Weaver, 29, of Earth, who was driving a 1967 Ford 4-ton pickup owned by the Pioneer Natural Gas Company of Earth. According to Angel, the accident occurred as Helms traveling south failed to yield the right of way at the intersection and pulled out in front of Weaver who was traveling east.

Angel estimated the damages to be \$500 to Helms' car and \$1000 on the pickup.

A ticket was issued to Helms for failing to yield the right of way. Deputy Sheriff W. A. Hatfield assisted in the investigation.

Freak Car Accident Injures Two Saturday

A freak accident within the city limits occurred at 4 p. m. Saturday, on Highway 70 near the rodeo grounds, sending a local man and his son to the hospital. A second son in the accident was uninjured. Those injured were Melvin Bock and his son, Kim. Bock's quick action in throwing his body across his son, riding with him, perhaps prevented his son's injury, and at the same time prevented more extensive injury to Bock as the top of the '65 Ford Bronco he was driving was smashed to a position even with

the back of the seat. Bock still remains in the University Hospital in Lubbock with a cracked vertebrae and various bruises. Kim received a bad cut on his right arm, which required nine stitches to close. He was released Monday.

City Marshal, Alvin Pittman, investigated the accident but has not completed his report at press time Wednesday, as he has been unable to go to Lubbock to talk with Bock. His account of the accident was vague. He said, as well as he could

gather, Melvin Bock and his younger son, Kim, were headed toward Earth driving a '65 Ford Bronco towing a '63 Oldsmobile behind, guided by Gaylon. He said they approached and passed a tractor, and apparently the power steering was stiff in the car. Gaylon was steering, and somehow the car whipped, causing the lighter weight Bronco to lose its balance and they both were overturned.

Pittman said the Oldsmobile was a total loss, and the damages to the Bronco was approximately \$1,000.

Robbins Injured In Traffic Mishap

Charles Wayne Robbins, Fortales, New Mexico, formerly of Earth was seriously injured in an accident, which occurred three and three-tenths miles west of Earth on Highway 70 at 5:30 p. m. last Wednesday. Joe Wayne Stanley, 20, of Spur was the other person involved.

Highway patrolman, Bill Angel gave the following account of the wreck. He said, Stanley was driving west in a '67 Ford pickup pulling a 16 foot

stock trailer with four horses inside and Robbins was traveling east and for no apparent reason was about five feet across the center line.

Injuries received by Robbins were scratches and bruises and a two inch section of bone in his left arm was completely torn out. Robbins underwent surgery at St. Mary's Hospital, Lubbock, for his arm, and will again be operated on during the latter part of this week to replace the missing bone section with plastic bone. Stanley was uninjured.

Damages were estimated to be \$1380 on the trailer \$850 on the pickup, and injury to the horses was \$200. The Robbins car received approximately \$500 damage.

Patrolman Angel said he has not yet finished his investigation because he has been unable to talk to Robbins.

Glasscock Family Receives Medals For Devotion To Duty And Bravery Performed By David

Mr. and Mrs. Basil Glasscock and family recently received three medals awarded their son, Specialist Fourth Class David L. Glasscock for devotion to duty and acts of personal bravery performed by David on February 5, 1967, and again on March 29 of this year, when David was killed in an act of bravery purposely diverting fire from his squad to himself.

The three medals included the "Purple Heart," "Army Commendation Medal," and the "Bronze Star Medal." The detailed report of David's last battle indicated his acts of bravery were in keeping with the highest traditions of military service and reflected great credit upon himself, his unit and the U. S. Army.

By direction of the President, the Purple Heart is awarded posthumously to Specialist David L. Glasscock for wounds received in military operations in Vietnam against hostile foreign forces, which resulted in his death on March 29, 1967. This award, first established by General George Washington in 1782, is presented to you as a tangible expression of your nation's gratitude and everlasting appreciation for your brother's gallantry and devotion in the service of his country. David stands in the unbroken line of patriots who have given their lives that our nation's goal

of freedom and peace may be maintained. I hope that this award and the knowledge of Specialist Glasscock's invaluable contributions will serve to comfort you in the days that lie ahead. ARMY COMMENDATION MEDAL

By direction of the Secretary of the Army, the Army Commendation Medal will be awarded posthumously to Specialist David L. Glasscock for heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force: Specialist Fourth Class Glasscock distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous actions on February 5, 1967 in the Republic of Vietnam. On this date, at approximately 1900 hours, the company perimeter was attacked by an enemy force estimated to be in excess of a reinforced Viet Cong platoon. The enemy had at least two light machine guns and numerous other small caliber and semi-automatic weapons. At this time Specialist Four Glasscock was in the platoon command post. When the firing began, he moved approximately forty meters under heavy enemy fire to reach his platoon leader who was starting to move along the perimeter. Specialist Four Glasscock unhesitatingly moved from position to position with the platoon leader providing both communication and security for his platoon leader as they

moved. As the platoon leader was coordinating the return of the first platoon outposts to the perimeter, Specialist Four Glasscock kept the company commander abreast of the outpost positions to prevent their being fired on. For approximately thirty minutes Specialist Four Glasscock continuously exposed himself to a murderous hail of enemy fire while moving along the perimeter. When the enemy broke contact, Specialist Four Glasscock remained on the front line as artillery was called in to cut off the enemy's retreat. Specialist Four Glasscock's actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army.

By direction of the President, the Bronze Star Medal will be awarded posthumously to Specialist David L. Glasscock for heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force: Specialist Four Glasscock distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous actions on March 29, 1967 while serving as point man for a reinforced squad sized patrol during Operation Junction City in the Republic of Vietnam. On this day, as the patrol approached an enemy base camp consisting of well fortified bunkers and trench lines, Specialist Four Glasscock halted the patrol and moved forward to recon the bunkers on the outside of the enemy perimeter. As he was moving forward, an enemy machine gun opened fire on the squad from a bunker to Specialist Four Glasscock's left front. Realizing that the squad was pinned down and unable to maneuver, Specialist Four Glasscock immediately assaulted the enemy bunker, and in doing so diverted the fire from his squad to himself. Specialist Four Glasscock was mortally wounded but continued to fire at the enemy bunker until the remainder of the patrol was able to maneuver on line with him. Specialist Four Glasscock killed at least one enemy soldier, and due to his quick thinking, allowed his patrol to expel a well entrenched enemy force from their base camp. Specialist Four Glasscock's outstanding display of aggressiveness, devotion to duty, and personal bravery were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army.

W. A. Hatfield said his brother is still in the Littlefield Hospital, suffering a broken jaw, broken ribs, a large cut in the back of his head and severe bruises where he had been kicked.

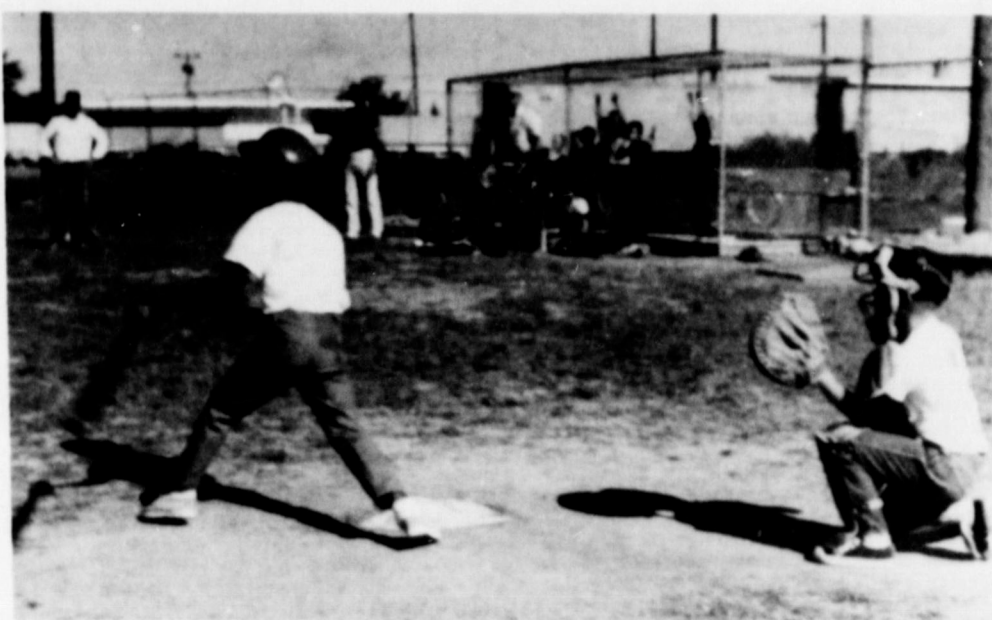

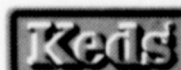

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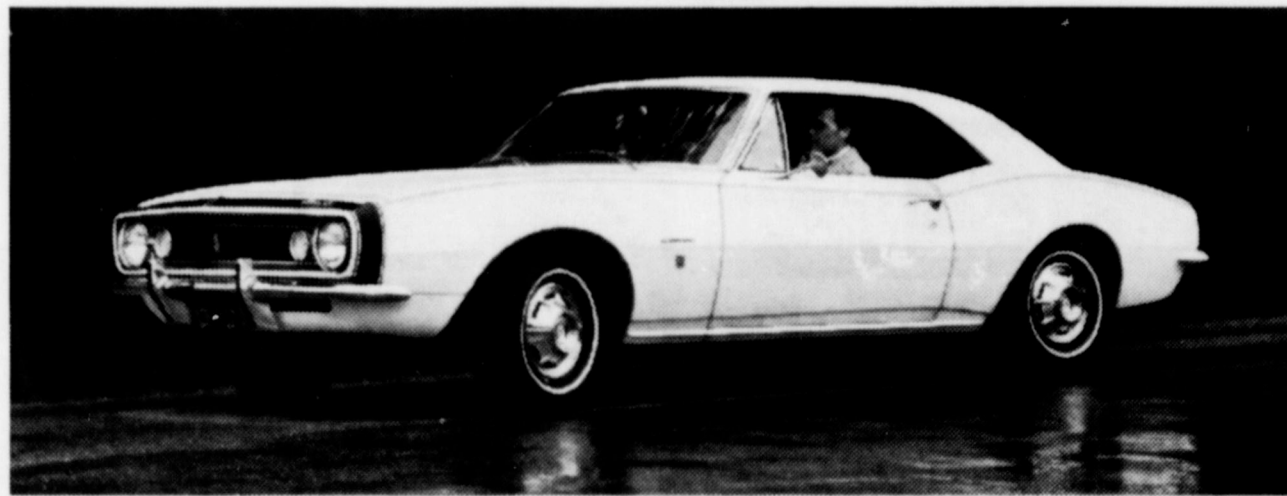
