## Earth's New Clinic Now Occupied

### Dr. Faust Moves To New Building

Dr. F. B. Faust has moved his Clinic from the old Community Building into his recently completed new Clinic Building, Wednesday.

The modern Clinic will be equipped with new furniture throughout. Several new pieces of equipment were also installed adding to his present equipment, giving the community a well equipped clinic.

The new modern fireproof clinic 84' X 32' building is constructed of hydite tile and partitions in narrow tile. The outside is painted coral and trimmed in rose.

The entrance and northwest corner are of Colorado red stone. At the east and south ends of the patio are large flower boxes carried out in the same motif within the glass plate is another flower-box made of white Arkansas limestone mortified in pink plaster. The west end of the reception room is lined with a continuance of this motif.

The draperies in the reception room are traverse glass curtains in Ice Pink with Seafoam Green wall and contrasting floor of carnival tile. The ceilings blend with light cream acoustical tile with sixteen fluorescent indirect lamps. The waiting chairs are large ship captain styled lime oak with grey reception desk and chairs.

Dividing the reception room from the clinic is an accordion door in

The clinic consists of a modern laboratory across the hall is a drug room with a three case arrangement to aid in the dispensing of drugs.

The doctors consulting office has a grey desk and chair and side chair with contrasting red sofa and ease chair.

The examining office has a grey motorized chair which is moved by an electric motor to properly place the patient for ease in all types of examinations.

Another examining office is complete in enameled coral. A tub is furnished in white enamel tube type equipment. A fourth room is equipped with an insulated pine table to be used with electrocardiograms and ultrasonic treatments. The fifth room is equipped for oxygen therapy, and the sixth room contains X-Ray and Fluoroscopy.

The last room has a G. E. heating and cooling system.

The windows are covered by colonial type shutters in natural wood to match the large doors to the individual rooms.

Behind the large double swinging Louver doors in the hall is the apartment, kitchen, utility and library which is added on to convenience the community.

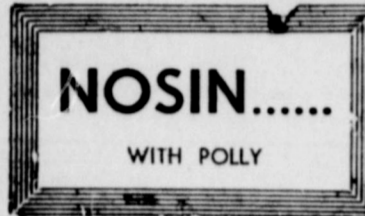

Harken, homemakers! Here are some Thanksgiving tips that are sure to please—and will be popular long after the holiday season is a thing of the past:

### Holiday Stuffed Fruits

5/8 cup sweetened condensed milk (1/2 a 15-ounce can)  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
4 cups sifted confectioners' sugar  
Pitted dates  
Chopped walnut meats, chopped dried apricots, coarsely chopped peanuts, raisins

Blend together sweetened condensed milk and vanilla and gradually add confectioners' sugar, mixing until smooth and creamy. Add chopped walnut meats, chopped peanuts, chopped dried apricots, and raisins each a quarter of the fondant. Form the fruited or nutted fondant into small balls and use as filling for the pitted dates. Roll dates in sugar if desired to make them less sticky to handle.

### Quick Peanut Butter Fudge

1/2 cup soft butter or margarine  
1/2 cup light corn syrup  
3/4 cup peanut butter  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
4 cups sifted confectioners' sugar

Blend first five ingredients in large mixing bowl. Stir in sifted confectioners' sugar gradually. Turn onto board and knead until well blended and smooth. Add nuts gradually, pressing and kneading into candy. Press out with hands or rolling pin into square 1/2 inch thick. Cut into serving pieces. Makes about 2 pounds.

1 tablespoon instant coffee  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 cups water  
1 1/2 cups (8-ounce package) packaged pre-cooked rice  
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar

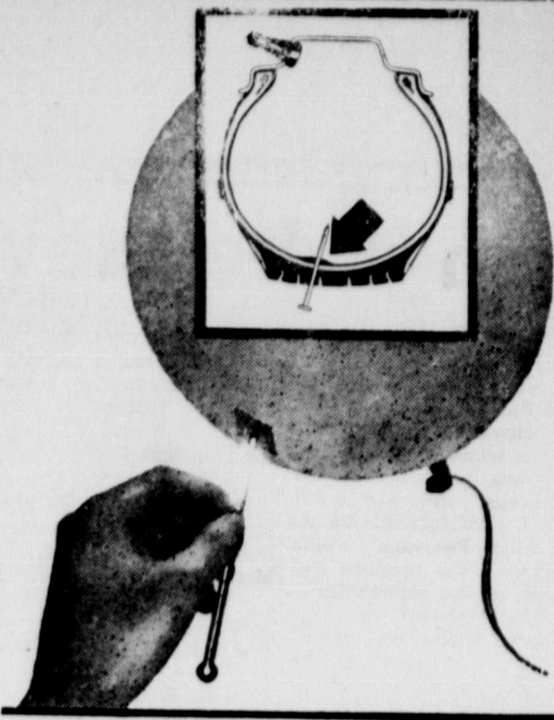

- Dissolve gelatin and salt in hot water. Add cold water and lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Meanwhile, combine cran-

Bone of contention is a weather-beaten frame cottage where the famed short story writer took his bride 69 years ago. History lovers want to preserve it as a "beautiful tribute". Austin Heritage Society gained City Council permission to move it into a park adjoining an exclusive westside residential area.

Nearby homeowners call it a "vermin infested junk heap." They say they'll sue.

While park-lovers fumed, history lovers got the house loaded on a truck, began inching it into the park. Stories went out across the country and brought back a tide of advice for each group. But no solution.

**CO-OP CASE REOPENED**

Texas Supreme Court has agreed to take another look at a case to decide electric power selling rights.

Issue is whether rural electric cooperatives can continue service in areas after they are annexed by cities. In August the Supreme Court refused to review lower court decisions in favor of the co-ops.

Suit was brought by the attorney general, numerous private utility companies and the League of Texas Municipalities. On the other side is the Upshur Rural Electric Cooperative backed by 54 other co-ops and the City of Glimmer.

Private utilities contend the law restricts co-ops to towns of 1,500 or less. Co-ops say they can't be

thrown out once they've legally entered an area.

No date for argument has been set by the high court.

**STATE WINS PRIZE MONEY**

Businesses offering prizes to customers must pay a 20 per cent state tax, according to court ruling.

Third Court of Civil Appeals so judged in a suit against Mrs. Tuckers Foods, Inc. It offered coupons worth 15.25 and 50 cents with cans of shortening. Attorneys for the firm argued the prize tax applied only to theatres and places of amusements.

District and appeals courts interpreted the statute as apply to "any business enterprise."

**HOSPITAL DIRECTOR RESIGNS**

Dr. James Betha, executive director of the State Hospital system since 1953, has resigned effective June 1.

Dr. Betha will be 70, statutory age for retirement, next October. He said he submitted his resignation early to give the state hospital board plenty of time to pick a successor.

Board members will take up the matter at their next meeting December 10.

**DROUGHT UPS WELFARE PAYMENTS**

Impact of the drought is reflected in climbing old age payments, says the Department of Public Welfare.

In its annual report the department said it added 533 to the old age rolls during fiscal year 1956 compared to only 90 the yr. before. Drought, it said, reduced income, not only of oldsters, but of children and relatives who helped support them.

Total old assistance payments for 1956 were \$111,410,645, parcelled out in monthly payments from \$5 to \$55. Average was \$41.71. Cost is paid 33 per cent from state funds, 67 per cent from federal funds.

**"YOUNG TEXAN" JURY**

Picking of the five outstanding young Texans of 1956 is underway. Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce has announced the committee which will name the honorees.

They are Ben H. Wooten, president of the First National Bank,

Dallas; T. Harrington, chancellor of Texas A&M College; Vern Sanford of Austin, manager of the Texas Press Association; Walter G. Wright, president of the General Telephone Co.; Malcolm Meek, Abilene bank president; Dr. Stanley W. Olson, president of Baylor University College of Medicine in Houston; and Tom Easley of Midland, chairman of the Board of Regents of the University of Texas.

**TEXAS, THE MIGHTY**

Texans, despite their reputation for boosting the home state, find they can hardly outdo the latest account by outsiders.

U. S. News and World Report devoted 17 glowing pages to "the new powerhouse of the United States." Post-war industrial boom, says the magazine, has made the state a "modernized Goliath." It's "an empire that keeps getting mightier," says the report, because it's "so big and so naturally rich."

Statistics cited: factory output, up 699 per cent since 1939; business activity, up 488 per cent; oil and gas production, up 468 per cent; construction, up 303 per cent.

Conclude the editors: "The United States is finding more and more that it cannot get along without Texas."

**NEW GOOD ROADS EXEC.**

Callan Graham of Houston has been named to succeed Jim Lindsey as executive vice president of the Texas Good Roads Association. Graham is a former Kimble County attorney and legislator. Lindsey is speaker of the Texas House of Representatives and chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Texas hatcheries produced 9,261,000 chicks in October, a 16 per cent increase over last year. Texans paid out more than \$165,000,000 for hunting and fishing privileges during the 1956 fiscal year. . . William J. Burke purchasing agent for the City of Corpus Christi, will become executive director of the State Board of Control on December 15. He succeeds Walter Bell of Fort Worth, who retired in October. . . Texans fattened Uncle Sam's treasury with \$2,406,585,000

in income taxes during the last fiscal year. Total U. S. income tax collections for the period totaled \$75,100,000,000. . . Texas now is second only to Mississippi in number of certified tree farms, with 912 farms covering 3,434,853 acres. . . October draft registrations totaled 6,018. . . Texas Employment Commission reports placement of 51,172 persons in non-farm jobs during October. Agricultural placement totaled 38,820. . . Prolonged drought and increased discharge of industrial waste have greatly increased its responsibilities in checking local water supplies, reports the State Department of Health. Accelerated growth of Texas cities created another problem. Officials estimated some 25 to 30 per cent of the 800 domestic sewage units inspected were overloaded. . . If junior loses a school book, he must pay the full price, regardless of the book's age, according to a new ruling by the State Board of Education. Formerly book costs were depreciated 15 per cent a year. But it was too confusing, and unprofitable besides, the board decided.

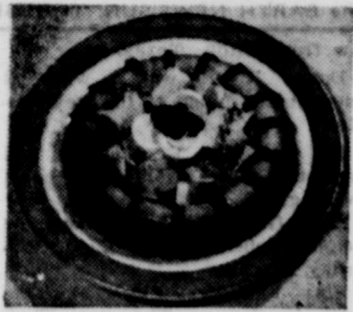

Pour the mixture into a ring mold, and set it in the refrigerator to congeal. When it has set, unmold and fill the center with strips of pimiento for an ished with slices of hard-cooked egg topped with a sprig of parsley. Trim the sides of the ring with big chunks of tuna, garnish extra pretty touch. Makes 8-10 servings.

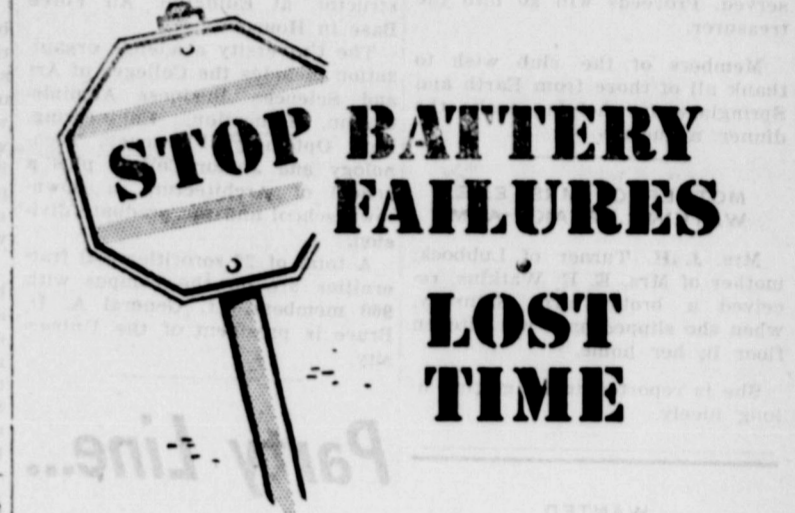

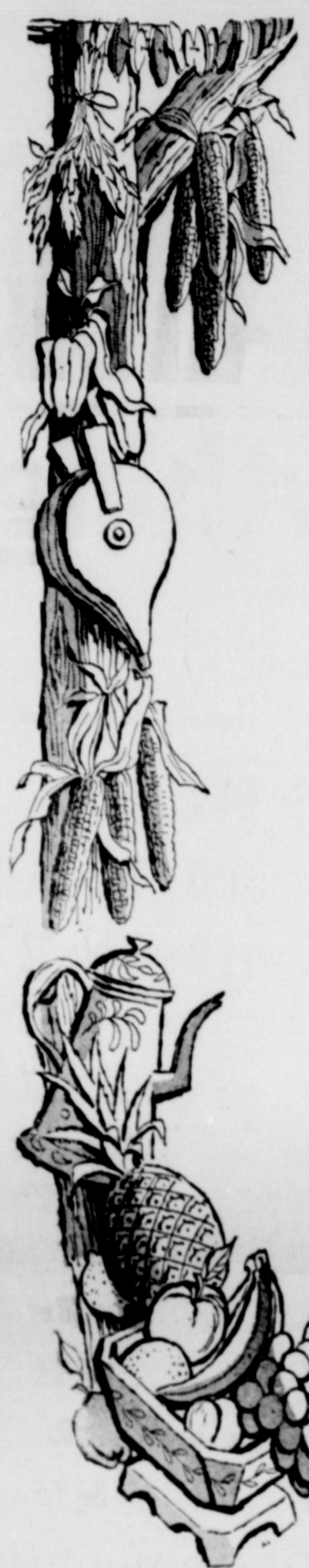

## Andrew Sanchez Charged In Knife Slaying

Andrew Sanchez, 25, farm laborer was charged at Dimmitt, Friday with murder in the stabbing death of Bernardo Lopez, 25. Lopez died Thursday morning at Castro County Hospital of a stab wound he received about 9:30 a. m., November 10. Lopez was stabbed in the lower chest, the knife thrust entering his liver.

Sanchez is also charged with intent to murder Juan De Luna, 27, of Earth who was also stabbed in the lower chest in the same affray in which Lopez was fatally wounded. De Luna still remains in critical condition in the Castro County Hospital.

Sanchez was taken into custody at Houston two days after the stabbing. Sanchez's bond has been set at \$5,000. Dist. Attorney Joe Cox of Plainview, said that the information he had received indicated the three men were returning from a trip to Grady, New Mexico and got into an argument as they drove along a country road in southwest Castro County.

Following the argument and stabbing, Sanchez drove away leaving the two men by the roadside. De Luna crawled to a Mexican farm laborers house a few hundred yds. away and asked for help. The family notified Dent Bradley, owner of the farm and DeLuna and Lopez were taken to the hospital. Castro County Sheriff Jack Carlwright said a switch-blade knife was recovered.

The three men were brothers-in-law.

## Postmaster Says "Mail Early Christmas" Campaign Now In High Gear At Postoffice

Pointing up the need for your cooperation on his 1956 "Mail Early For Christmas" campaign, Postmaster Marshal Kelley says if you will follow these three simple rules, all of your gifts can be delivered before Christmas Day. WRAP THEM SECURELY, ADDRESS THEM CORRECTLY, and MAIL THEM EARLY.

Amplifying these rules, the Postmaster said, "Avoid the risk of mailing poorly wrapped packages. Use corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy brown wrapping paper, and be sure that every package is tied with strong

cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be stuffed with tissue or old newspapers to cushion the shocks." He also pointed out that there are no limitations for Parcel Post packages vary according to place of mailing and destination, and advises us to secure Pamphlet No. 2 at the Post Office, telling all about packaging and wrapping parcels for mailing, and pamphlet No. 3, giving complete details on Domestic postage rates and fees.

Speaking about correct addressing of Christmas gifts and cards, the Postmaster said: "Be sure your Christmas mailing list is up to date and that you have the complete name, address, zone number, city and state for everyone on your list. Send all your Christmas cards by First-Class mail, because they will be processed and delivered quicker, and they'll be forwarded, or returned if it becomes necessary." Only Christmas cards sent First-Class mail may carry written messages, a custom every one enjoys. Moreover, Christmas card envelopes smaller than two and three fourths inches by four inches or larger than 9" by 12" require hand cancellation, and must carry First-Class postage.
